Evergreens Block Wind

For a tree row to be an effective wind break or barrier, species selection is critical. Evergreens should be used exclusively in windbreaks made up of only one or two rows of trees. Since evergreen trees are densely branched and retain their foliage in winter they provide year-round protection. For maximum protection it is important to select a tree that also retains its branches to the ground line. Pine trees such as the Ponderosa, Austrian, and Afghanistan pines all have a tendency to shed lower branches which allows the wind to pass freely underneath. Other evergreens, particularly Arizona Cypress, Eastern Redcedar, and Rocky Mountain Juniper maintain their lower branches and thus provide better protection. All three of these dense evergreens grow well in our area. They are all drought and heat tolerant and will survive our winters. Of these three, Arizona Cypress will grow to be the largest in our area reaching a height of 50 feet. The other two will grow up to 35 feet height. Arizona Cypress also maintains its density best as it ages. The Arizona Cypress does best on deep soils while the Redcedar and the Rocky Mtn. Juniper grow well on poor sites.

All three are generally available through the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District, however, the Arizona Cypress is usually in short supply. The Texas Forest Service usually sells out before we can place an order, therefore, if you are interested in placing an order for evergreen trees especially the Arizona Cypress, please call 874-3576 or come by the SCS office at the corner of 4th and Sully as soon as possible.



NEW TREE OFFERED. The Donley County Soil Conservation Service is offering a new tree this year. The tree is the Southwestern White Pine (*Pinus strobiformis*), and holds considerable promise for the Clarendon area. There are no known disease or insect problems associated with this species in Texas. One authority wrote that this was Texas' "most attractive pine". The bluish-green, conical tree may reach 60 feet. The specimen above is ten years old and grows at Leland. The pine is native to higher elevations in the Texas trans-Pecos. Chile Pepper Workshop To Explore 'Hot' Potential Crop For Plains

A potentially "hot" alternate crop for High Plains cotton growers, the chile pepper, will be explained in detail during a workshop here October 29 at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center.

Farmers' heightened interest in growing chiles--or non-bell--peppers is related to the increased demand and higher prices being offered for the crop, explained Dr. Roland E. Roberts, vegetable specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The workshop will be from 8:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. The \$10 registration fee includes lunch and workshop materials. The center is just north of Lubbock International Airport on FM 1294 at the Shallowater exit of Interstate 27.

"Many cotton farmers are interested in growing chile peppers to diversify, but have never grown peppers," he said. "They want to learn chile management from seed through harvest, processing and marketing as members of a grower-owned, professionally managed cooperative." Last week (Oct. 8) 45 farmers met in Slaton to discuss such a cooperative.

"Our goal with this workshop is to present information on peppers that will equip the farmers to profit from producing and marketing chile peppers," Roberts said.

A multitude of food and commercial uses for different types of chiles has pushed the demand beyond the capacity of traditional growing areas in New Mexico, Roberts said. Cayenne peppers are in strong demand by processors in Louisiana. Jalapenos are used in picante sauce. Paprika and red chile are used for red, yellow and orange pigment in food and clothing, and in seasoning food.

"As with any alternative crop, the non-bell or chile type pepper may offer a limited opportunity for some people who have irrigation and can adjust their farming methods to this intensively grown crop," the Extension Service vegetable specialist said. "Farmers must study marketing opportunities, too. A cooperative may offer some help in this area."

Workshop topics and speakers will include: "Variety performance and field-grown transplants" Dr. David Bender, associate professor of vegetable production, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock.; "Cultural practices, midbed trench", Dr. Frank Dainello, Extension Service vegetable horticulturist, College Station; "Soil fertility, tissue testing", Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension Service soil chemist, Lubbock; "Disease management", Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension Service plant pathologist, Lubbock. "Insect management", Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist, Lubbock. "Cultural practices, windbreaks", Roberts. "Costs and returns budget, co-op organization", Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension Service economist and farm management specialist, Lubbock. "Pepper types and pepper products", Dr. Al Wagner, Extension Service food technologist, College Station; "Texas virus resistant varieties, keys to production success", Dr. Ben Villalon, professor of vegetables, Experiment Station, Weslaco.

A panel will discuss crop management, critical practices, harvest mechanization, markets and co-op management. Panel members will be Kenneth Gray, Lorenzo grower and marketing consultant; Jim McClendon, Tulia, agricultural engineer and equipment designer; L.K. Shepherd, Lubbock, co-op organizer and general manager, and Martin Tune, Hale Center grower.

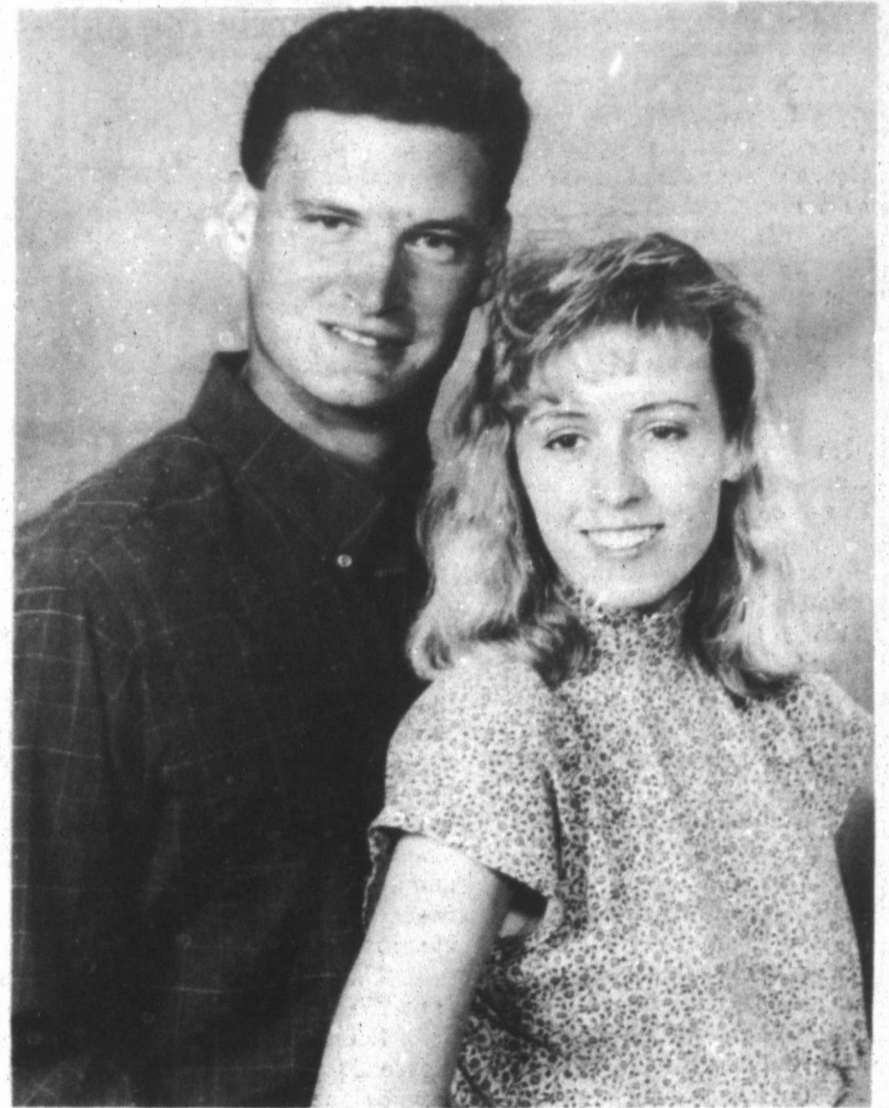

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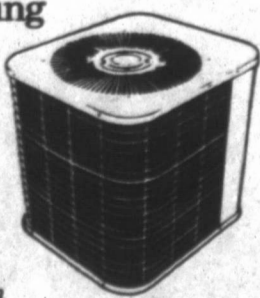

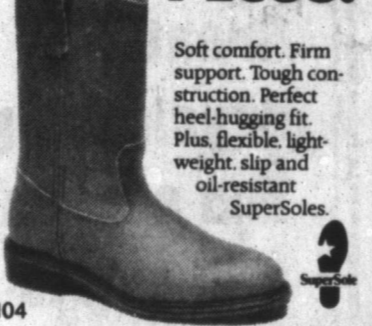

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New Reforms Speed Medication Approval

Last year the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) tied an earlier record (1985) for the most new molecular drug entities approved in a single year. Thirty-one new medicines were approved in 1991. Some of the medicines approved were not distributed to pharmacies, however, until 1992. Part of the credit for the increase in prescription products is being attributed to a federal plan to speed up the drug approval process, a process that has been criticized by many officials and victims of life-threatening illnesses. Most of the concerns have come from persons who cannot understand why it often takes 10 years for a new drug to make it through the entire approval process.

Key elements in the new movement toward faster approval of needed medicines are listed in a recent issue of *American Medical News*. According to the report, the FDA may allow indicators other than prolonged survival or longer time periods without disease to prove a medicine's effectiveness. Another element that should speed the approval process is the use of outside contractors to review applications. These approaches are expected to help reduce the backlog of pending applications. According to the report, guidelines soon will be released which allow animal testing in another country to be accepted for review in the U.S.

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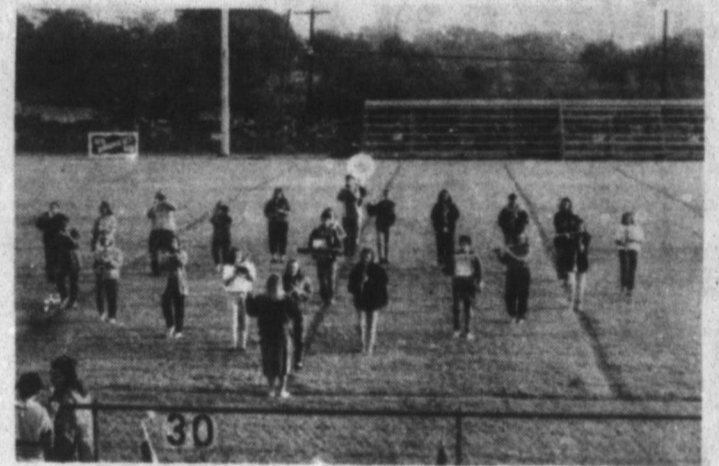
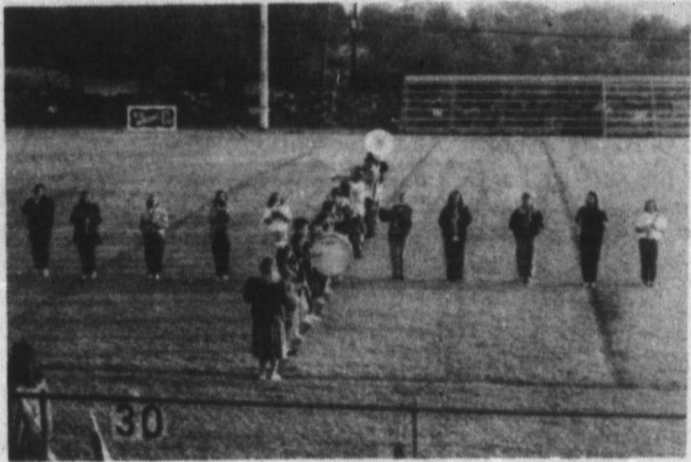

Tonsillitis is prevalent in the schools now, with temp of 102 degrees or more, severe sore throat, and swollen and tender nodes in the neck. The intestinal flu is still around but usually controlled with Imodium AD or Donnagel. hay fever and sinusitis are severe this year. Drixoral or Dimetapp will help with the sneezing and runny nose, if there is no infection. Ocean or Ayr are saline nasal sprays that help wash the pollens out of the nose and are safe for any age. Colds are now starting to appear. Your pharmacist can help you pick out a good decongestant and cough syrup.

Remember to drink plenty of fluids and get adequate rest. The initial sore throat will be gone in a day or two and the cold will be over in two weeks.

The influenza vaccine is available for everyone this year, but the pneumonia vaccine is still recommended for only those of high risk.

Remember to get your flu shot!

Disaster Sign-up Extended

ASCS has extended the disaster sign-up for Phase II until February 12, 1993 for those crops planted in 1991 for harvest in 1992. The extension was made to ensure producers who qualify for benefits under Phase II and Phase III to the Disaster Program will receive a payment rate of 50.04 percent. The payments for crop losses will be made as soon as all applicable documents are submitted and approved by the County Committee.

The extension period does not change the requirement for producers to purchase crop insurance on the same crop for 1993 if this year's crop loss was more than 65 percent. Note: The final date to apply for multi-peril crop insurance on wheat, barley, and oats, has been extended to October 31, 1992.

Phase III of the disaster program will start October 13, 1992 to February 12, 1993 and it is for program crops and non-program crops for commercial use.

To be eligible for Phase II or Phase III Disaster benefits, producers of 1992 wheat who suffer losses greater than 65 percent must purchase 1993 crop insurance by October 31, 1992.

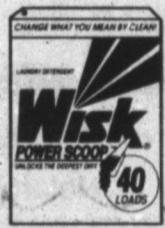
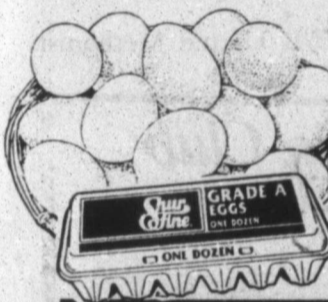

Recently the *Amarillo Globe News* released the article that Yesterdays Children received a \$25,000.00 grant from the Economic Development Commission of the U.S. Department of Commerce specifically to help pay for the costs of developing the plan and design of Thunder Junction. By the time you read this article, Ira West of Duell Corporation will have already made this first tour of the current Thunder Junction site to start the plan.

The Thunder Junction board is being restructured and interim financing scheduled. This board is aware of your interest and concerns and are developing additional means by which they can communicate with you. They are considering another "town meeting" with the entire board present.

Would another theme park in Amarillo hurt Thunder Junction? No, it would only bring more tourist to the area, helping the entire panhandle.

I will keep you informed as best I can. Thunder Junction will be built.

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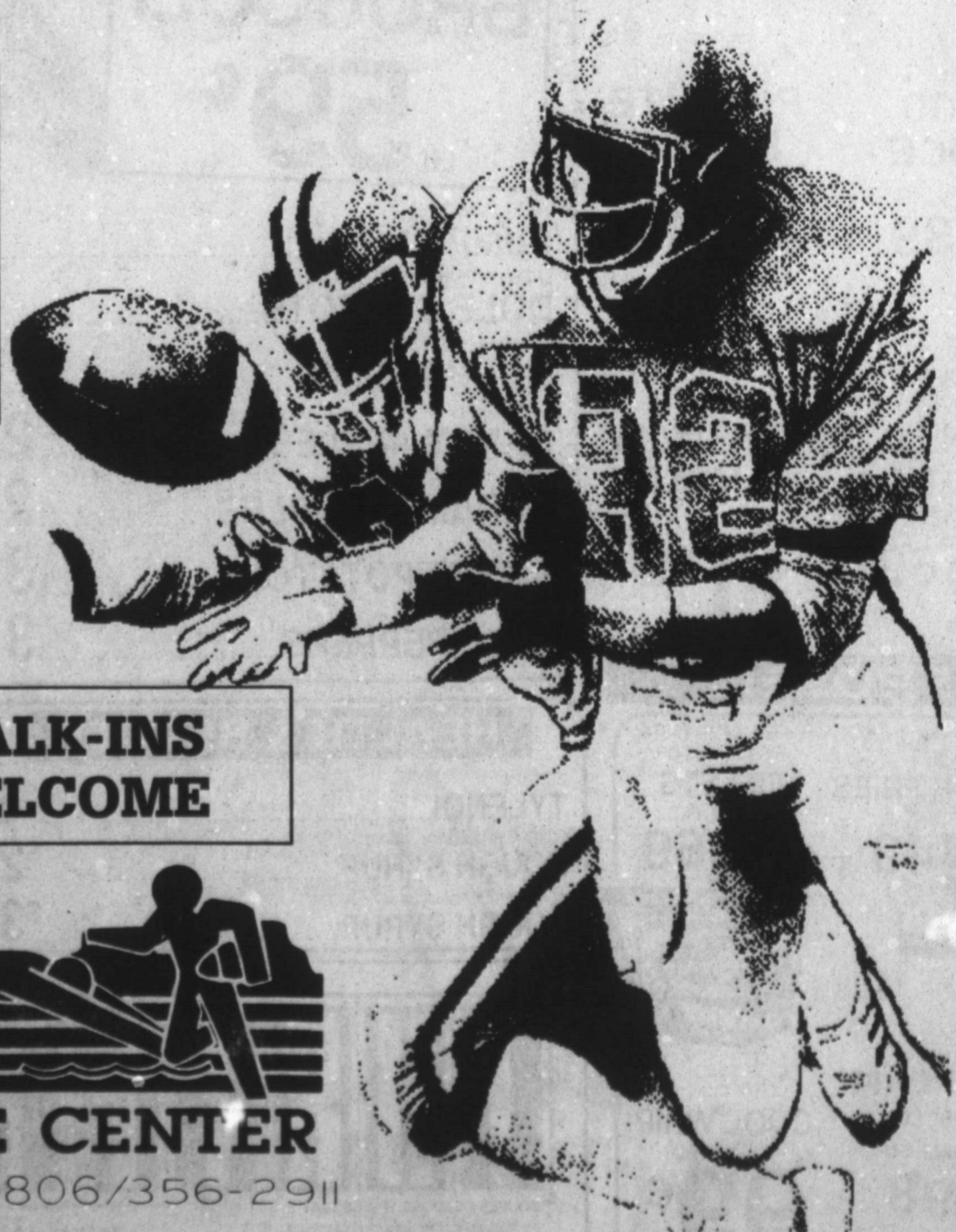
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Medical Center News

**ORDINANCE NO. 297
AN ORDINANCE
PROHIBITING THE ALLOWANCE OF LEAKAGE OF WASTE MATERIAL AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

Section 1: That it is unlawful for any person, corporation, company, or other entity to allow the leakage or spillage of garbage, animal parts or waste, organic material, or other waste material within the city limits of the City of Clarendon.

Section 2: That any person, corporation, company, or other entity violating the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined a sum not to exceed \$1,000.00. Each and every violation of this ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

Section 3: That an emergency is apparent for the immediate preservation of the general welfare of the public that requires this ordinance to become effective immediately; therefore, it shall be effective from and after the date of its passage, and it is so ordained.



Tax Practitioner Workshops Set

They are directed at the practitioner with substantial experience with individual returns, who does some business work, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in Amarillo, on December 7-8.

In addition to the General Advanced Workshops there will be

four each of the Estate Planning Workshops, and three each of the Fiduciary Income Tax, S Corporation and Basic Partnership Workshops. The Agricultural Tax Problems Workshop, which was introduced in 1989, will be offered this year in two locations - Lubbock and San Antonio. A new workshop for 1992 will be the Taxation of Non-Profit Organizations and Charitable Giving held in San Angelo.

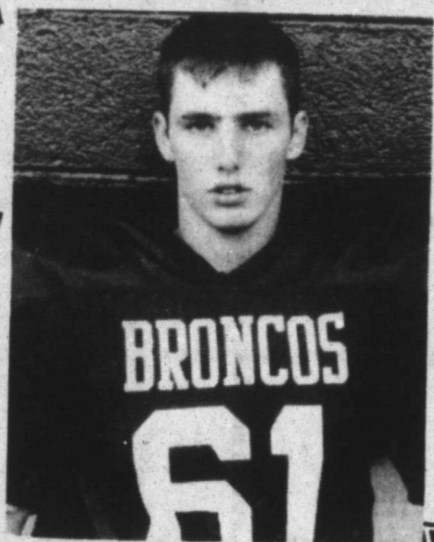

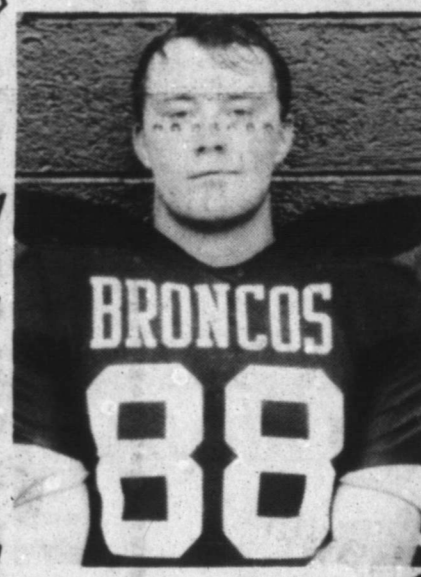

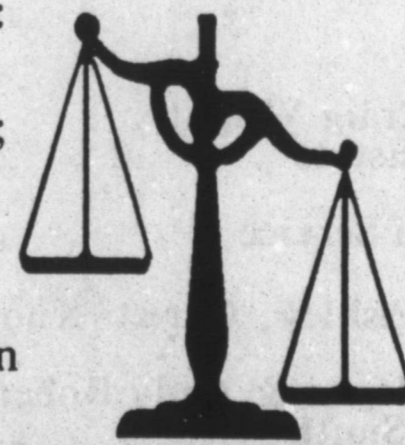
