

# Terrorists win again with new airport security

The attacks of September 11, 2001, drastically changed America in many ways, and one of those changes reared its ugly head last month in the form of a new tool in the War on Terror. The Computer Assisted Passenger Prescreening System (referred to as CAPPS II) is getting ready to come online and regularly violate the rights of decent Americans everywhere.

CAPPS II is apparently a sequel to the original CAPPS which was so successful it flagged up to 11 of the 19 September 11 hijackers but let them on the planes anyway because they didn't check their bags. By inference, I would take that to mean the other eight hijackers were not flagged.

The new system, "CAPPS II: The Wrath of CAPPS," which will be tested by Delta Airlines in three airports starting next month, will do a background check on every person buying a ticket on a commercial airliner and assign that person a threat level. Among other things, it will do a cross check of a potential passenger's credit report and their bank account activity.

If that doesn't send cold chills down your spine, then you are hopelessly out of touch with the concept of freedom and what it means to live in a free society.

If you believe the government, the system will not look at data based on race, religion, and ethnicity. That seems strange since statistically that would be the quickest way to pinpoint potential terrorists. After all, they're aren't a lot of 85-year-old Presbyterian women from Midland, Texas, who hijack planes and ram them into symbols of American power.

Here's another comforting thought. The government won't keep this information forever after it's through with the background check. It will only be on file... FOR 50 YEARS! That's what the Associated Press found in the Federal Register, but a transportation department spokesman told the AP - paraphrasing now - "Oh, that's just a typo." That's only for "people deemed security risks," the AP reported.

Yeah, right. And my Socialist Security number isn't really a national identification number either.

CAPPS II will use a color-coded method for tagging passengers. I suppose this was inspired by Homeland Defense Secretary Tom Ridge's Crayola Warning System for terror alerts. Ticket purchasers will be defined as either green, yellow, or red. Green people are okay. Yellow people will get "extra screening," and red people won't get to fly. (My Cherokee blood thinks there's an insult somewhere in there for Native Americans.)

The Associated Press also reports, "Unusual behavior, such as purchasing a one-way ticket with cash, is supposed to prompt increased scrutiny."

I wonder what kind of security would be triggered if a fellow bought a one-way ticket to D.C. with cash two days after passing a background check to buy a new handgun, three months after his wife divorced him, five months after declaring bankruptcy after his business partner Mullah Mohamed embezzled all the company pension accounts, and two weeks after purchasing "A Visitor's Guide To The Capitol" and "How To Get a White House Tour" from Barnes & Noble. Think that guy might get a full lower gastrointestinal exam in windowless room at the airport?

I'm all for going and killing bin Laden and Saddam and hunting down all the other terrorist lowlifes in the world. But trying to scare the hell out of the American people is the exact opposite of what our federal government should be doing.

"We can't let the terrorists win," you say. But they've already won. The American people are gladly giving up their liberties incrementally since September II in the name of "Homeland Security," and CAPPS II is just the latest example.

The way we win the War on Terror is take the battle to the terrorists. I say we arm the pilots and a few flight attendants and tell them they can shoot to kill any person who tries to take over a plane. I guarantee that will be more effective than humiliating mastectomy patients when their surgical staples set off the metal detector or having people's underwear pulled out of their suitcases in a public spectacle.

CAPPS II is a blatant violation of individual civil rights. It presumes ordinary, law-abiding citizens are guilty of something - anything - until their credit check

I recently heard a lady say, "Well, it [CAPPS II] seems like a violation of privacy to me, but it doesn't really bother me because I have nothing to hide."

Unfortunately, it seems like that's the attitude of a lot of people. "They can do a background check on me because I don't have anything to hide." "They can let a drug dog sniff my teenager's backpack because she doesn't do drugs and has nothing to hide." "They can search my house if they want to because I want my neighborhood to be safer and because I have nothing to

Whether you have anything to hide is not the point. The American Constitution says you have the right to be secure from unreasonable searches in your person, house, papers, and effects. The burden is supposed to be on the government to show probable cause against you to get a warrant to subject you to a search.

CAPPS II does an end-run around the Constitution and makes Joe Six-Pack the bad guy. It's not the kind of system which should be allowed to operate in a free country, and I hope a court somewhere will shut it down.

# US can't afford wait, see attitude on Iraq

One of the country's leading editorial writers, Charles Krauthammer, recently wrote that the central problem of the 21st century is "the conjunction of terrorism, rogue states, and weapons of mass destruc-

Most of us prefer not to think about that - the awful destruction and death that results from the combination of terrorist can kill millions. As unpleasant as the topic may be, however, we cannot afford to stick our heads in the sand.

The cold, hard reality of these times is that such weapons do exist, and they are spreading around the world. The truth is that there are groups and individuals whose primary aim is to kill as many Americans as possible, and they are quite willing to die to do it. Whether we fight back or not,

September 11, 2001, was the opening shot in this new war. Iraq will probably be the next battlefield. Others will come, for this war will last a long time.

We hope that the actual fighting in Iraq will end quickly. There are serious dangers which our troops could face, including the use of chemical or biological weapons against them, and we trust that they will be as prepared as possible for whatever confronts them. No one doubts, however, that

the U.S. military will prevail. I have been asked, "Why now? We groups, outlaw states, and technologies that have lived with Saddam Hussein for more than ten years since the Gulf War. Can't we just wait and see what happens?" My answer is that we could decide to wait, but whatever the risks of military action now may be, the risks of waiting are far greater.

We know what kind of person Saddam Hussein is. He has murdered with his own hands; he is responsible for the torture and death of many, many people. We know that he has a very large number of chemical weapons and of biological weapons, and we know that he is using every resource available to him to acquire nuclear weapons. We know that he will not hesitate to use such weapons. He has used them

before in war and against his own people. We could decide to wait until he uses them again — or until he gives them to some terrorist group like Al Qaeda. But if we wait, our job will be even harder in the future, and the resulting devastation will not rest easily on our consciences.

Unfortunately there are some other nations that have a financial interest in continuing to work with the current government of Iraq. Others are taking a wait-and-see approach. The United States cannot afford to take such a path. We are the primary target, and we have the responsibility of world leadership. No one else can do it.

Our work will not be over once the

shooting stops. Just as our continued involvement in Europe and in Japan after World War II led to decades of stability and economic growth, true success in Iraq will require years of effort. We will work with others - perhaps including some of those who refuse to join in the initial military action - to help the Iraqi people get back on their feet and to develop a stable, democratic government. We will have to look for ways to give the millions of Muslim young people around the world hope for a brighter future so that they will not be such easy prey for the terrorist recruiters.

Tough challenges lie ahead, but a bright light during these gloomy times can be found in America's past. We have faced tough times before at places like Valley Forge, Gettysburg, and Iwo Jima. Americans always have risen to the challenge, guided by our strong faith and indomitable spirit. I have no doubt we will do so again.

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

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#### NFIB reports state spending out of control

An NFIB national study examining how state spending has dramatically increased in the last two decades has added fuel to the argument against tax hikes.

NFIB/Texas, the state's largest small-business advocacy group, today vowed to fight any state tax increase proposals. Noting that state spending not low taxes has caused a budget deficit, the group called on the Texas Legislature to hold the line on

"The general trend in state legislatures, including Texas, has been to increase spending without regard to the long-term consequences," said NFIB/Texas State Executive Director Jeff Clark.

'Small-business owners and their employees should not have to pay for the state's spending spree by paying more in taxes to clean up our budget mess. During this difficult economic time, the last thing we should do is raise taxes. It's time to trim the fat and reassess the proper role and size of government."

The study found that all states' expenditures rose from \$191 billion in fiscal year 1977 to \$1 trillion in fiscal year 2000. The sharpest growth occurred in the last 15 years of the period with a 40 percent increase between 1986 and 2000. However, Texas showed an increase in the last 15-year period of 48.5 percent.

"This study proves that our budget woes are a result of living beyond our means," continued Clark. "We need to reduce spending not increase taxes on the backbone of the state economy, small business. Not. only do they employ the majority of the workforce, but they also create the most new jobs."

On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues associated with VALOR's surcharge application are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee.

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$.99 for residential customers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.
