SBA disaster loan deadline approaching

Business in some Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico counties have until June 23, 2003, to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA).

The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses due to drought and excessive temperatures that occurred from January 1, 2002, and continuing.

Businesses in Donley and surrounding counties are eligible to apply. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans.

Applications are available and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303.






The Clarendon Lions Club held their regular Tuesday noon meeting June 10 with Boss Lion Myles Shelton conducting the meeting.
