USDA Announces Percentages

Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy today announced a 1994 acreage reduction program (ARP) of 5 percent for corn and 0 percent for grain sorghum, barley and oats.

The 1994 crop acreage reduction percentages are down from the 1993 levels of 10 percent for corn and 5 percent for grain sorghum.

Corn Stocks entering the 1994/95 marketing year are expected to be about 810 million bushels lower than the previous year's levels because of reduced yields and lower harvested acreage largely due to recent extensive flooding in the midwest.

Grain Sorghum 1994/95 marketing year beginning stocks are expected to be down 84 million bushels from the previous year's level.

"Lowering the ARP is necessary to ensure adequate feed grain supplies during the 1994/95 marketing year", Espy said.

This year's ARP levels for barley and oats are unchanged from 1993. The oats ARP level is set at 0 percent by law. Malting barley producers will not be exempt from compliance with the barley ARP requirements in order to be eligible for price support benefits and program payments.

The 1994 feed grain acreage reduction percentages must be announced by September 30. Any final revision must be made no later than November 15.

Other 1994-crop provisions will be announced later.

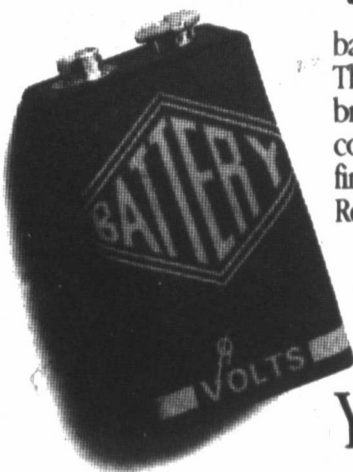

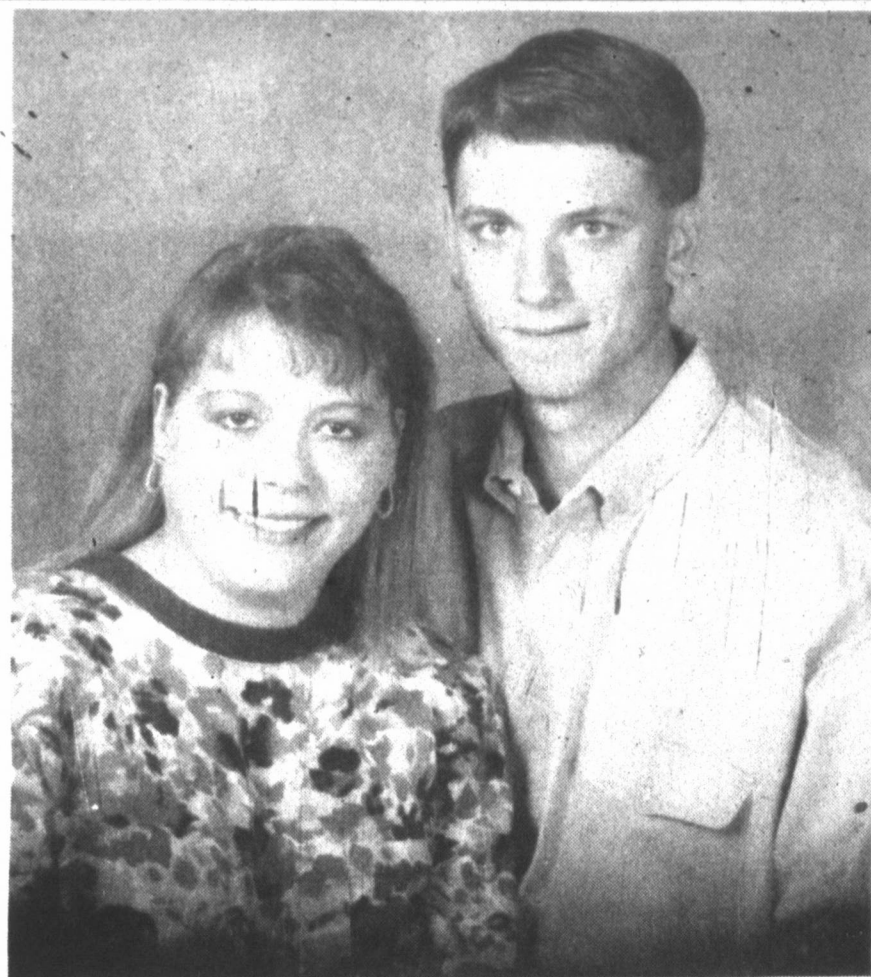

Lucero Returns From Deployment

Navy Seaman Apprentice John C. Lucero, son of Jose C. and Angie Lucero of Clarendon, Texas, recently returned from a six-month Mediterranean Sea deployment aboard the Amphibious assault ship USS Saipan, homeported in Norfolk, Va as lead ship in its Mediterranean Amphibious Ready Group (MARG).

During the time in the Mediterranean, the MARG steamed nearly 20,000 miles and participated in four bilateral amphibious training exercises. Additionally, the MARG operated in the Adriatic in support of Operation Deny Flight, which enforces the U.N. sanctioned "no-fly zone" over Bosnia Herzegovina; Provided Promise, a relief effort for war-torn former Yugoslavia and Sharp Guard, NATO's enforcement of U.N. imposed economic sanctions in the region.

The MARG also took part in major bilateral exercises in Spain, Tunisia and Greece. Lucero visited Palma de Mallorca and Rota, Spain; Haifa, Israel; Naples, Italy and Rhodes, Greece.

In Naples, sailors and marines visited an orphanage where they cleared a large section of the yard which was covered with weeds and vines. In Sicily, they repaired and painted another orphanage.

The MARG consisted of the USS Saipan, USS Ponce and USS Pensacola, as well as more than 2,000 marines from the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit. The Navy and Marine Corps are capable of a full range of actions from humanitarian relief to major offensive actions, from the sea.

The 1991 graduate of Clarendon High School joined the Navy in October 1991.

Health Hints For Today

Influenza is starting early this year, so now is the time to get your "flu shot". For the first time Medicare will pay for the im-

munization for those with medicare coverage. A severe epidemic is expected with influenza type "A" this year.

Allergies and hay fever are bad this year. If antihistamines make you drowsy try sudafed which is a decongestant and won't make you sleepy. It comes in a 12 hour preparations which makes it easy to use. Simple nasal sprays help also. Even a nasal wash with salt water helps this time of year when the pollen levels are high.

The intestinal flu or gastroenteritis is still prevalent.

Fortunately Imodium AD in either tablets or liquid will halt the diarrhea and stomach cramps usually within 24 hours.

No, I'm not retiring the first of the year. In fact I have signed a contract with Hall County Hospital District to serve as medical director of the Donley County Rural Health Clinic for five years. The rural health clinic allows us to use physicians assistants or nurse practitioners, and allow for adequate reimbursement from medicare.

Poor reimbursement from medicare is one reason physicians will not practice in a rural community. A rural health clinic can therefore be attractive choice to a new physician. We now have a better chance to acquire another doctor.

With Robert Powell, our P.A. it is more important than ever to make an appointment. Too many are simply walking in without an appointment and are having to wait. We see our patients on an appointment basis, not first come first serve. We will try to stay on schedule since your time is important.

Yes, Thunder Junction is alive and well. More planning and looking for financial aid is currently the goal. It is certainly economically feasible. They hope to start construction next year.

Influenza vaccine is now available at your physicians office. There is enough again this year for anyone who wants it, not just those 65 years of age and over. Get your flu shot now.

Local Software Approved for Nationwide Distribution

On Monday, October 8, the national corporate offices of United Parcel Service (UPS) notified a local company that their software had been approved for use by local shippers throughout the country.

Terry Bernabe, head of Kiowa Creek Resources Corporation, said that the company had notified him of the approval. "There are 1,700 shippers in Amarillo alone who could use this program," said Bernabe. Apparently no one knows—not even UPS—the exact number nationwide. The company adds new shippers each day.

The software makes it easier to ship a UPS Package out. Even a shipper who puts out only one or two packages per day, can use the program easier than manually filling out the necessary forms and looking up rates. But it can also help shippers who handle 100 to 1,000 parcels per day.

The program has been in operation at eight Beta test sites for some time. Suggestions by these shippers and from UPS headquarters have led to numerous revisions in the program. But both UPS and the programmer feel that the package is now ready for sale.

The program maintains a database of customers, so that labels can be generated without re-typing names and addresses that are already on file. It computes charges based on zone information and generates the necessary forms. It is currently available for all domestic shippers, and allows for overseas shipment, too.

"We expect to sell at least 200 sets of software in the remainder of 1993," said Bernabe. The program is available to any UPS shipper. Retail price is \$799.

Bernabe started the program for his own use when he was shipping out computer hardware. When other shippers wanted a copy, he began to look at commercial production of the software.

"I first thought that we could finish the program in 90 days," Bernabe grimaced. "That was in November of 1991!"

But the program has helped Kiowa Creek Resources shift its emphasis from hardware to programming. Other programs are in the works.

Bernabe will have to turn some of his efforts to marketing now. He has an appointment with one shipper who has 27,000 "pack- and-ship" outlets.

There are perhaps 100 shipping programs on the market, but none have caught on throughout the market. Bernabe says, "Our is unique in its database provision." He estimates that there are probably less than 100 shippers in Texas who are computerized. Naturally, he hopes to change those numbers—and quickly.

Meeting Scheduled

A free, informational meeting addressing how area farmers and business owners can receive relief from rising health insurance and medical costs by using a tax advantaged, employee benefit program called AgriPlan/BizPlan, will be held on Thursday, October 14 at the First Bank and Trust in the Bronze Room at Memphis.

More Markets For U.S. Beef

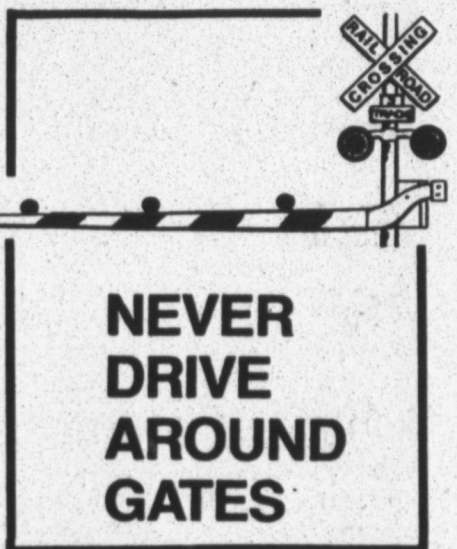
(NAPS)—Americans concerned about the country's economy as well as their own may be heartened to hear about opportunities for foreign trade that will increase employment at home.

One significant new market for an American product is the People's Republic of China. According to a recent study by the U.S. Meat Export Federation (USMEF), that country is looking more and more for outside sources of quality beef products. The USMEF is a national trade organization responsible for developing foreign markets for U.S. red meat products. Many of USMEF's foreign activities are funded by an industry checkoff program. This self-help program has made it possible for the American beef industry to make significant inroads into the Japanese and Mexican markets.

"The current economic boom and, more importantly, the growth in private enterprise and local autonomy have opened the doors for exporting countries to market beef directly into China," says Philip M. Seng, USMEF president and CEO.

The study also found:
 • Demand for high quality beef in China's tourist hotel and restaurant sector will easily exceed the size of the Hong Kong and Taiwan market combined by the end of the decade, reaching as high as \$30 million in sales.

• Demand for U.S. variety meat products in China's general

market will create a major export target for U.S. suppliers. Seng estimates an initial market size of 200 million consumers in China for U.S. beef variety meats and sales of \$60-\$70 million in beef by the turn of the century.

During the 1980s, "Discretionary income (in China) was used largely to buy televisions, video recorders and basic home appliances," said Seng. "Today, incomes are channeled into purchases of gold, cosmetics and food."

The proliferation of supermarkets, fast food restaurants, family style restaurants, steak house chains and theme restaurants in the region are all expected to have a positive effect on U.S. beef sales in China.

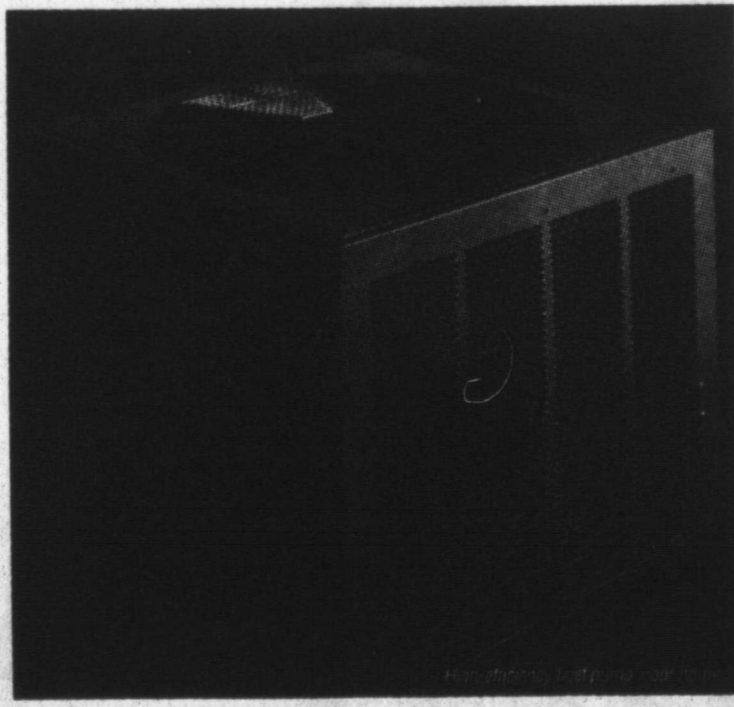

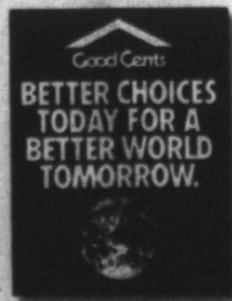

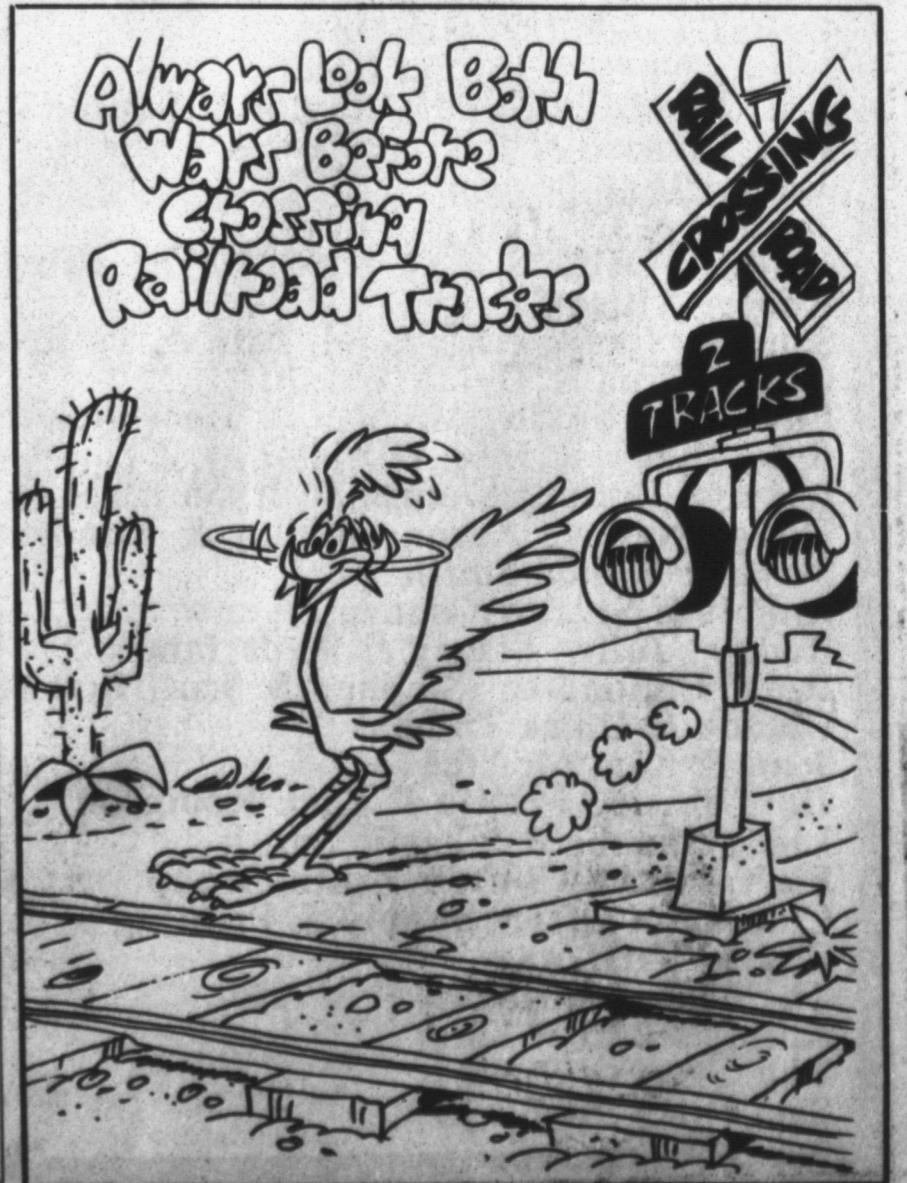

Researchers Progress Against Parkinson's

(NAPS)—Parkinson's, a disease that affects some 1.5 million Americans, has no known cause or cure—but researchers are working on it.

In one fascinating study at the University of Calgary, for example, nearly 400 people were tested. When those with and without Parkinson's were matched for age, sex and other factors, the only significant predictor of Parkinson's disease risk was previous occupational herbicide use.

This research could lead to a new flowering of ways to prevent and perhaps treat the debilitating disease.

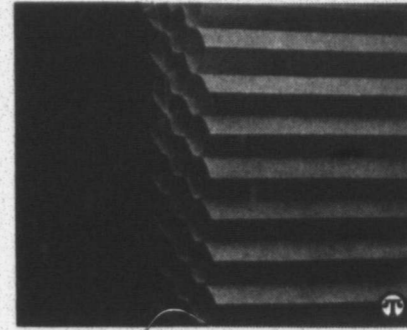

Program Chairman Smith introduced Staff Sergeant Alvin Friend, a U.S. Army Field Recruiter, who brought our program. Sergeant Smith, who is stationed in Amarillo, serves the Panhandle area. He told us that the average starting salary for an Army Recruit is \$754 per month. The recruit can choose his field of training, and can request assignment to a geographical location which is usually honored if training in his chosen field is available there. Seventy-five percent of the recruits tuition can be paid for college courses he takes while in the Army, and up to \$30,000 in tuition payments are available after he is discharged.

The Army is much more selective than it used to be. Ninety-nine percent of its recruits are high school graduates. A criminal record may, in some instances, make a person ineligible. Drug use can result in ineligibility for enlistment, or in discharge after enlistment.

We would like to thank Sergeant Smith for a very informative program.

The Lions will have a program on Russia on next Tuesday, October 19. It will be given by Dr. Howard of Clarendon College, and will be based on his experiences visiting there this past summer. The meeting was adjourned.
