

## **Dove Season Coming to Area**

Dove season for the North Zone will open on September 1 and run through November 9, 1993. The North Zone includes all of West Texas north of Interstate 20, including all of the Panhandle. Shooting hours will be from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. The daily bag limit in this region is 12 mourning, white-winged and white tipped (white fronted) doves in aggregate, to include not more than six whitewings and two whitetips. Possession limit is twice the daily bag limit. (White winged and white tipped doves are not common this far north.)

It is illegal to use any firearm other than a legal shotgun. Other illegal devices include traps, snares, nets, crossbows, fishhooks, poison, drugs, explosive devices or stupefying substances. It is illegal to bait birds by placing corn, wheat, salt or feed to lure birds, or to hunt over baited areas. (An area is considered to be baited for 10 days following the complete removal of all bait materials.) Standing crops or fields containing shocked grain or grain scattered by normal agricultural activities are not considered baited areas. It is not necessary for a hunter to know an area is baited to be in violation for hunting over a baited area.

The use of live birds as decoys is illegal, as is any recorded or electronically amplified bird calls or sounds.

Hunting from a motor-driven vehicle is illegal, including any kind of land conveyance or aircraft. (There are limited exceptions to this rule for the benefit of severely disabled people. See you game warden for details). Hunting from a sink-box is prohibited.

## Clarendon CISD Adopts 1993-94 **Budget**

Looking toward some capital improvements, the Clarendon CISD school board approved a budget 3.3% higher than the previous year's budget. Total budget expenditures for the coming year totaled \$2,877,552. This reflects some mandated salary increase as well as provisions for some building improvements. Projected revenue for the year will be \$2,812,087. State funding has been reduced \$100 per average daily attendant for all schools or a total of about \$50,000. for Clarendon School. Any expenditures above revenues would have to be taken from the existing fund balance.

Phil Barefield, district superintendent, stated that the Clarendon School Board has always adopted lean, yet efficient budgets. "This budget will allow us to be progressive without being extravagant. We must maintain our facilities and provide a safe environment for our students. I am pleased that this community takes pride in its facilities and school program."





Many children of our com-

munity are already aware of the wide variety of fiction, non-fiction, and biographies available in the special Youth Section, great for pleasure reading involved in book reporting which is always part of Language Arts requirements in various grades. Social Studies and Science reporting can be enriched by, not only updated encyclopedias in the Library's exceptional reference section, but many books from the Texas Collection. Also available are a variety of beautifully illustrated books such as John Jay Audobon nature folios and other animal and Western resource material. Allan Carpenter's New Enchantment Of America is a series of fifty books which will attractively acquaint students with each individual state in our country.

Elementary Teachers, Burton Memorial Library is even ready to provide a worthwhile variation in your lesson plans. I speak only for myself, but one of the highlights of each semester during my teaching years was the refreshing walk on a beautiful fall and spring day to the City Library to enrich the reference and research skills which are becoming increasingly necessary to today's students. work being done by MDA-sponsored researchers to find treatments and cures for muscle disease. One of the most promising experimental techniques now under investigation is "myobla transfer therapy." This technique involves the injection of healthy immature muscle cells, called myoblasts, into diseased muscle in an effort to produce hybrid muscle cells that display healthy characteristics. The procedure has shown positive results in laboratory mice. "The people of the panhandle area cant take great pride in their contributions to this major research undertaking," said Karen Lane. "Scientists are closer than ever to developing a treatment or cure - if increased public support of MDA'S work can be achieved."

The association currently sponsors some 500 individual research projects worldwide. It also supports some 230 outpatient clinics nationwide, where people with any of the 40 muscle disorders covered by MDA receive medical care, orthopedic aids and related services. The MDA clinics serving the panhandle area are located at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo.

### **Public Notice**

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) is asking the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) for approval to offer Caller ID service in Texas. This service includes Calling Number Delivery, Calling Name Delivery and Anonymous Call Rejection (ACR). This service will be deployed statewide on a staggered, city-by-city basis, over a period of years in Texas in association with residence, business single and multiline services, but not PBX, Centrex or Plexar services, where facilities are available. Caller ID is an optional service which allows a subscriber to see date, time, and the phone number (Calling Number Delivery) and/or name associated with the number (Calling Name Delivery) of most direct dialed local calls and some select long distance calls before the telephone is answered. Anonymous Call Rejection is a Caller ID service which permits a subscriber to automatically reject calls from callers who have blocked their number/name. Per-call and per-line blocking will be available when the service is de-ployed. Detailed information on Caller ID service and how to block will be sent to each customer in their telephone bill during the next few weeks.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in this proceeding should notify the PUC before October 6, 1993. Other parties may seek to also obtain Caller ID service in association with PBX, Centrex and Plexar service. A request to intervene, participate or receive further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. Further information may also be obtained by calling the PUC Public Information Office at (512) 458-0256 or (512) 458-0221, teletypewriter for the deaf. Tax Notice Explanation Given

A tax notice published in this newspaper and paid for by Clarendon CISD may leave some local taxpayers scratching their heads in confusion.

The notice incorrectly states that the school tax rate will grow by 439 percent. But in publishing the notice, local school officials are only comply-

"This is one of those situations where the law doesn't make any sense, but we must nevertheless comply with it or risk serious consequences," said Phil Barefield, school superintendent.

Clarendon CISD is required by the state's "truth-in-taxation" law to publish an official notice reporting last year's tax rate, the proposed tax rate for this year, and the percentage increase. However, due to a drafting oversight in the new school finance law, the notice significantly understates the tax rate for last year and produces a misleading comparison between last year's and this year's school taxes.

Under the previous school finance law, the county education district (CED) levied part of the taxes used for operating schools and the school district levied the rest. Under the new school finance law, CEDs are eliminated and all school taxes are levied for the school district.

Last year, the county education district imposed a tax rate of \$.85527 (per \$100 of value) and Clarendon CISD imposed a tax rate of \$.21709 for a combined school tax rate of \$1.07236. This year, Clarendon CISD is proposing a tax rate of \$1.17.

Because of the mistake in the new school finance law, Clarendon CISD is required to report a 1992-93 tax rate of \$.21709 a 1993-94 tax rate of \$1.17, and an increase of 439 percent, when in reality they will increase

In an effort to correct the misinformation, Clarendon CISD is publishing alongside the tax notice an advertisement indicating that the official tax notice is wrong. The supplemental advertisement, also paid for by the school district, provided the correct tax information.

The new school finance law, Senate Bill 7, was enacted on May 31,

### THE ACCOMPANYING TAX NOTICE IS WRONG!

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District is required by law to publish the accompanying tax notice in this form, even though the notice is deceptive.

Because of an omission in the recentlyenacted state law, Clarendon CISD may not include revenue collected by the county education district in the calculation of taxes for the 1992-1993 school year. The effect of this is to understate last year's actual school tax rate and produce an inaccurate comparison of last year's tax rate to this year's tax rate.
