

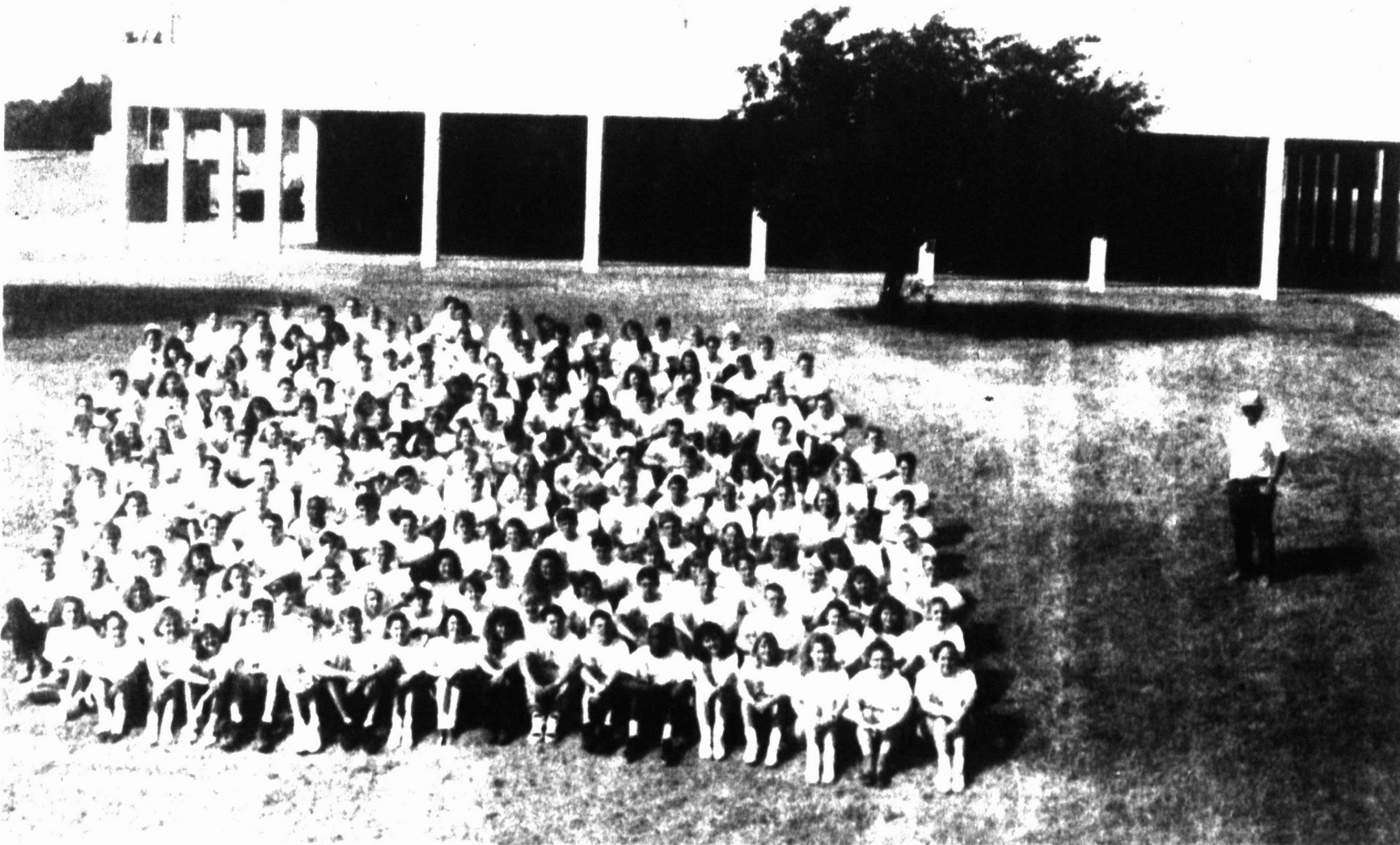

College Receives Grant

Dr. Jerry Stockton, President of Clarendon College, announced receipt of a \$59,823 grant from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board in Carl D. Perkins state leadership funds. The

project will create a model program of professional development in gender non-traditional teaching methods for K-12 classroom teachers.

The college's proposal links the TEA's Region XVI Education Service Center and Panhandle Tech Prep Consortium with West Texas A&M to provide accredited training for isolated rural school personnel. The model responds to the National Council for Research on Vocational Education's December, 1992, findings that all members of a school community must be in-

involved in teaching method changes for the changes to result in student success.

The acclaimed "Power Teaching" methodology developed by Dr. Shirley McClune will be presented to teachers. The model program will specifically facilitate professional development for teachers in Clarendon College's eight-county service area; teachers in all 67 Panhandle ISD's will be encouraged to participate.

A manual for reproducing the program will be available upon completion of the model.

Spilled Your Guts?

Saturday, June 26, about 1:00 p.m., Aljandro Frausto stopped a Valley Proteins truck a bit too abruptly at the Kearney Street traffic light. Part of the cargo of the Valley Proteins truck he was driving spilled onto Highway 287, lending a unique aroma to that area of Clarendon. The truck was carrying a load of guts from a slaughter house.

Customers and workers at The Grocery Store, the banks and other businesses in the area were not amused by the incident. In the noonday summer heat, the incident was neither pretty nor "perfumey".

Officer Milton McElroy investigated the accident. The Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department, Clarendon Street Department and the Texas Department of Transportation all worked to clean up the repugnant mess.

This was not the first such incident in the town. In October, 1992, the City of Clarendon passed an ordinance declaring it "unlawful for any person, corporation, company or other entity to allow the leakage or spillage of garbage, animal parts or waste, organic material or other waste material within the city limits..."

The Act further provides that such spillage can result in a fine "not to exceed \$1,000."

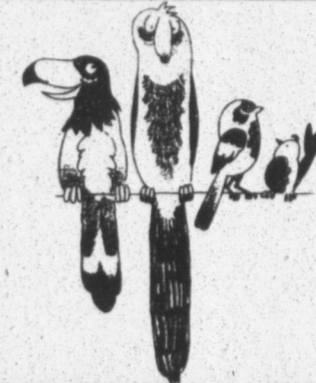
50th Anniversary to be Celebrated

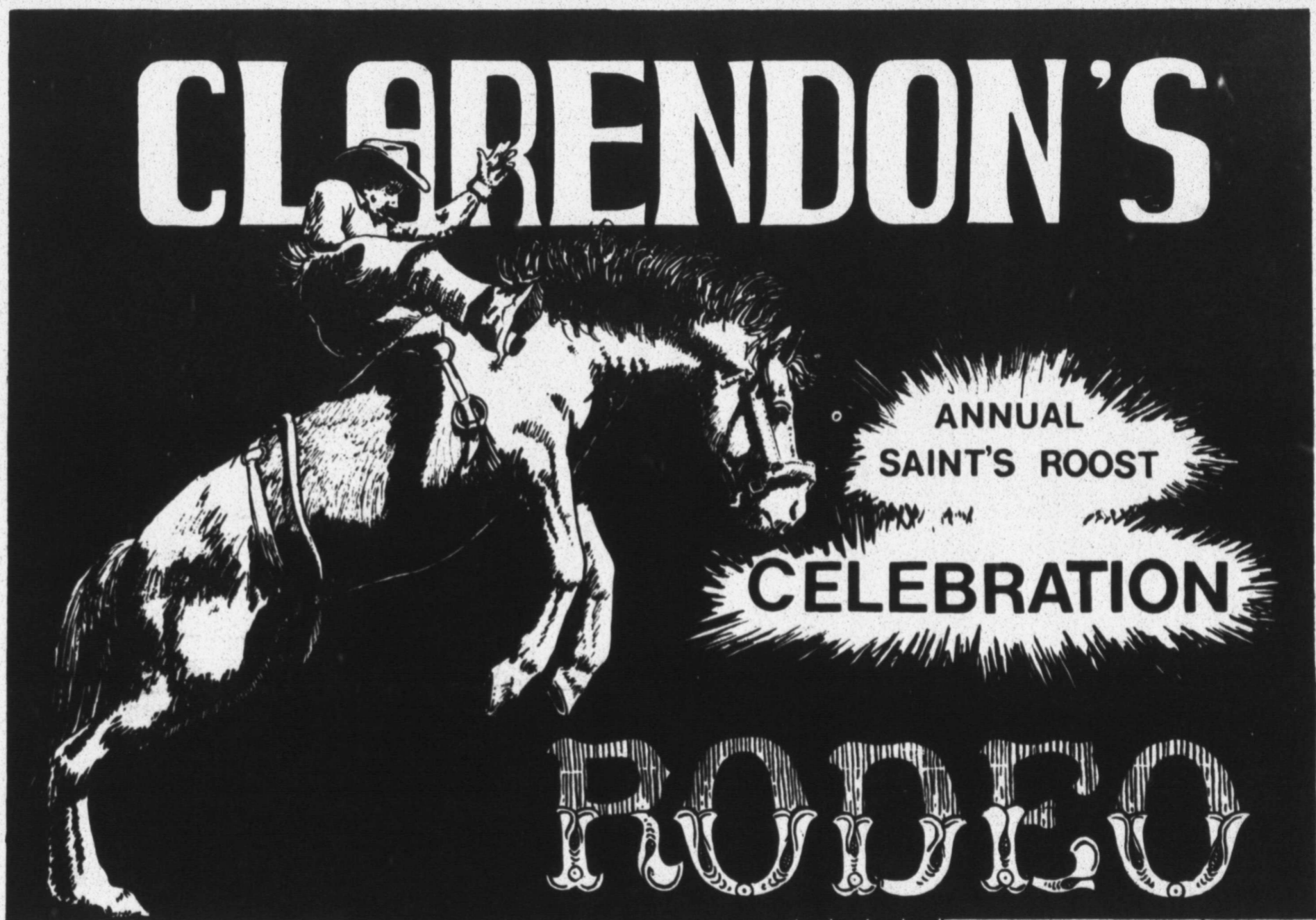

ASCS News

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service is currently accepting crop certification for the 1993 cotton, sorghum, corn, peanuts, haygrazer and other spring seeded crops.

"Donley County producers have until July 15 to report the acres and intended use of their spring seeded crops, ACR and Conserving Use Acres to our office," said Andrew Thornberry, County Executive Director.

To be eligible for price sup-

port loan, deficiency payments and other acreage reduction program benefits all program participants must correctly certify their entire farm after planting. The reports contain crops and acres planted, the uses to be made of these crops and cropland acres to be devoted to the acreage conservation reserve (ACR).

Spring Crop Certification

Even if you do not have crops planted you should report zero to protect your bases. Call this office as soon as possible for an appointment to report your acres. The phone number is 874-3561.

If you are not sure of your acres, measurement service is available and can be requested at this time. Tolerance rules are very strict; therefore, it is very important that you have an accurate report of acreage. Tolerance is the larger of 1.0 acre or 5 percent of the reported acreage not to exceed a maximum of 10.0 acres. Tolerance rules do not apply to crops or land uses when measurement service after planting has been performed.

If you are unsure of your acreage, measurement service is available from this office for a fee. The request for measurement service must be made by July 15.

CRP Certification

CRP participants need to certify their bases by July 15 if the base acres are above zero and they have any excess cropland acres not in CRP. If there are no bases or excess land you will have until September 15 to certify your CRP acres. Remember to call the Donley County ASCS office for any appointment.

Marketing Loans and Deficiency Payments (LDP)

Producers are reminded that warehouse and farm stored loans are available to producers participating in the farm program. However, you must retain beneficial interest in the commodity.

Loan deficiency payments (LDP) or (POP) will become available to wheat and feed grain producers if the market price fall below the county loan rate. Remember: It is imperative that you retain beneficial interest in the crop. Once the crop is sold or contracted, you have probably lost beneficial interest in the crop.

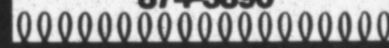

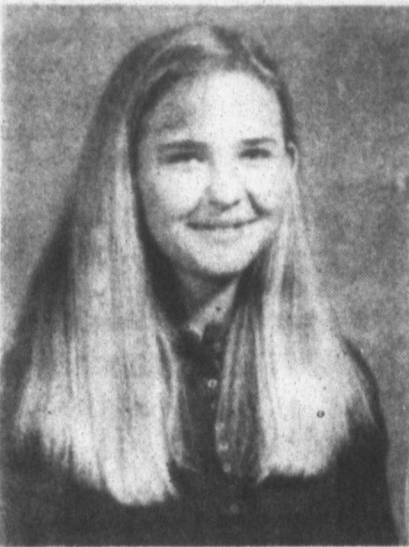

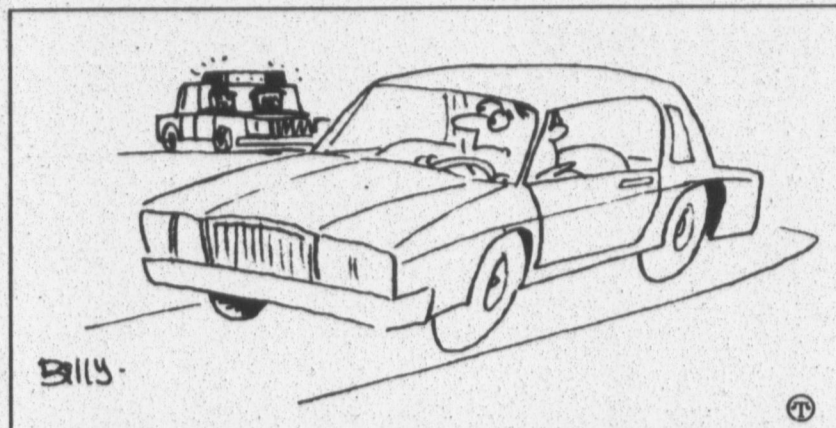

Cameron Joins KLSR

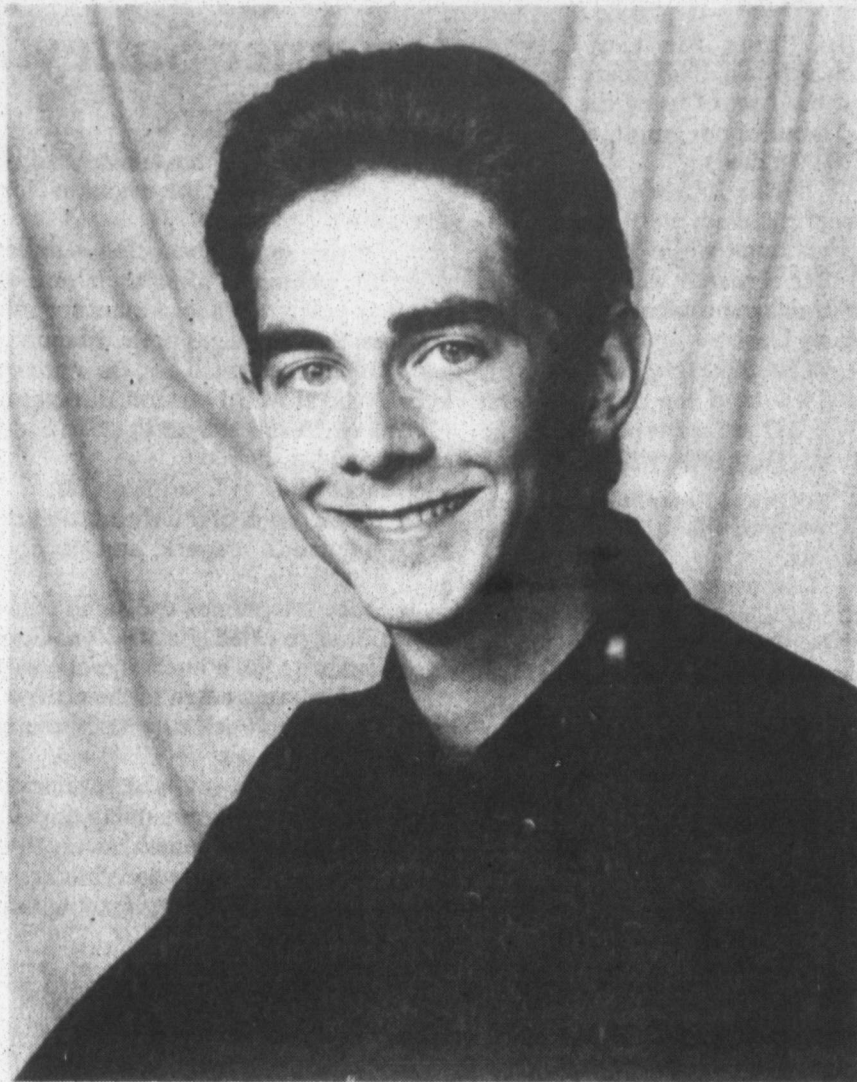
Drue Cameron has joined the staff of KLSR radio station in Memphis, according to Joe Davis, owner of KLSR.

BUG WATCH

We would like to thank our readers for the overwhelming response to our first column and the most asked question was "What is 'cashe'?" "Cashe" is an area of your computers memory separate and distinct from the RAM (Random Access Memory) that acts as a sort of buffer between the CPU (Central Processing Unit) and RAM memory. At one time the "DRAM" (Dynamic Random Access Memory) chips were the fastest component of any computer its speed being measured in NS's or nano seconds or 1/1000's seconds. In the early days of desktop computers RAM rated at 100 ns was fairly common. But with the advent of the 80286 Microprocessor by Intel the CPU operating at 16 MHz was finally able to execute instructions faster than RAM could keep up with so then memory manufacturers started producing faster memory chips in an attempt to achieve what became known as "zero wait state" which simply means the CPU does not have to "wait" on the RAM of the computer. This increase in RAM memory speed came with two price tags the first being dollar\$ the second being heat. The first of these was relatively simple to overcome the second was nearly impossible. So up springs a new technology known as "Static Random Access Memory" or "SRAM" these chips were lighting fast they could refresh themselves in as little as 20 or 30 ns the draw back this time was simply the cost of producing them was so high. So now comes cashe this is a small portion of very fast memory set aside simply to store microprocessor instructions giving the slower RAM memories a chance to keep up. There by still achieving "zero wait states" at a reasonable price.

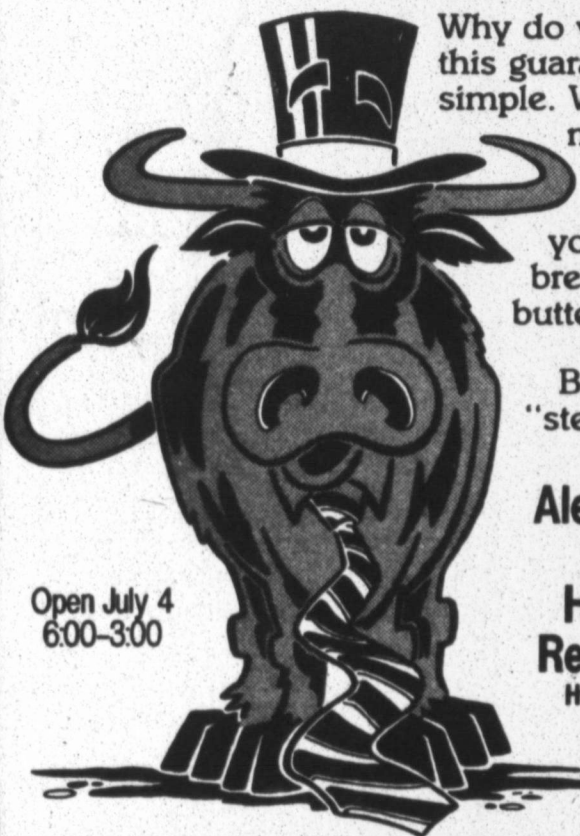

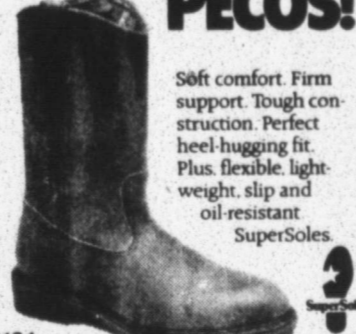
