

Republicans' free spending **boosts Dems**

By Stephen Slivinski and Chris Edwards, The Cato Institute Republicans used to be considered the party of limited government while Democrats were the defenders of the overgrown welfare state. But a recent poll suggests that the public doesn't see it that way anymore. A national "Battleground" poll of likely voters taken at the end of March found that John Kerry is favored over George Bush 48 to 39 percent to do a better job at "holding down federal spending." When asked the same question about Congress, voters favored Democrats over Republicans 47 to 42 percent.

If the parties have traded places in the public's mind, the Republicans have only themselves to blame. Aside from fighting a costly war, President Bush is spending time on the campaign trail touting his expensiye prescription drug benefit, advocating large-scale federal intrusion into state school systems, and promoting wasteful subsidy schemes such as hydrogenpowered car research.

The cumulative effect has been to send a powerful signal that Bush is out of touch with fiscal conservatives and with federal budget realities. To make matters worse, Bush has just asked for another \$25 billion for Iraq, and Republicans in Congress are motoring ahead with a pork-laden \$275 billion highway bill. This is no way for the GOP to get the party base energized for the coming election. Republicans should be worried because it's clear that the Democratic base is energized with a big anti-Bush block of voters likely heading to the polls this November.

A group of House conservatives is launching one last attack on the bloated budget before the electionin hopes of showing that Republicans can "hold down federal spending." A group led by Jeb Hensarling (R-Tex.) and Paul Ryan (R-Wisc.), is championing a list of reforms they want included in the 2005 budget resolution to be voted on in coming weeks. The reforms, under the rubric of the "Family Budget Protection Act," include a form of presidential line-item veto, caps on entitlement spending, and a mechanism to enforce agreed-upon spending limits.

The House leadership should get behind the proposals to rally the troops for the election, much like the Contract with America did a decade ago. Unfortunately, the House conservative proposals have received close to zero support from the White House so far. The White House isn't necessarily against these reforms. It has simply not exerted any energy to move them for-

That is short-sighted because John Kerry will hammer the administration on "fiscal irresponsibility," and the GOP needs a pro-active plan to counter him. Kerry has been moving to the political center in recent weeks and making himself sound like a sensible moderate on fiscal issues. He now promises middle-class tax cuts and says he will cut the deficit in half in five years, just like Bush.

Bush and the Republicans need to set their budget agenda apart from Kerry's. The Ryan and Hensarling proposals are a start. But an even more powerful idea is to impose an overall cap on federal spending. It could be modeled after Colorado's successful Taxpayer's Bill of Rights, which limits state spending growth to the growth in population plus inflation. A federal version could be called the Taxpayer Protection Act, which would protect taxpayers as rising entitlement costs and high deficits spur calls for tax increases in

Capping overall federal spending would force Congress to set priorities and eliminate wasteful and unnecessary programs. The cap should cover all federal spending, including defense and entitlements. It is not true that Social Security, Medicare, and Mediçaid are "mandatory" programs that cannot be cut. If members of Congress were constrained by an overall budget cap, they could make a choice each budget cycle to cut these programs or to cut other lower-prior-

The Bush administration and Republicans in Congress have a successful tax-cutting record to run on this year. But that may not be enough to convince their grassroots supporters that their party stands for reform rather than business as usual in Washington. Adopting a Taxpayer Protection Act would assure voters that the Bush tax cuts will not be reversed and that Republican policies are not just "Kerry-lite." If Republican voters see no compelling reason to turn out and vote, there could well be job turnover at both ends of Pennsylvania Avenue this November.

Medicare prescription benefit starting

This month the government begins to be drug discount implement the new prescription drug benefit in Medicare. Unfortunately, Medicare continues to be used as a political football with charges flying back and forth. I think that it is very important for people to have the straight facts so they can make decisions that make sense for them.

That is the reason I have written a brochure that will be going out to every person over the age of 65 in the 13th Congressional District. The brochure contains the essential information about the new prescription drug coverage and tells you where you can go for more information.

The most important fact about the new benefit is that it is completely voluntary. You do not have to participate in any part of the program if you do not wish to do so. If you already have a drug discount card or prescription drug coverage, you may prefer to keep that coverage.

Even if you choose to participate in the new Medicare benefit, you will have a choice of plans. You will not be forced into a "one size fits all" government program. You can select from several options the plan that best meets your needs and your

is underway this month. But, be careful. Already, there are people out there trying to convince senior citizens to buy phony discount cards or attempting to trick them into giving out private information. You should keep in mind that Medicareapproved discount card providers are not allowed to make door-to-door visits or solicit customers through "cold calls." Don't fall prey to con artists.

The best way to obtain a drug discount card is to contact an approved card provider yourself. To see a list of available cards and to compare prices, you can look

can also get the same information by calling 1-800-MEDICARE.

ested in, you can contact the company offering the card and ask for a Medicareapproved drug discount enrollment form. Some companies will let you apply by mailing or faxing your form while others phone or on the web.

Special assistance is available for seniors whose income was less than \$12,569 in 2003 (\$16,862 for couples). They may be eligible for up to \$600 per year in 2004 and in 2005 to help cover drug costs, as long as they do not have other drug coverage.

The drug discount cards may be used until 2006, when a new Medicare D will offer permanent prescription drug insurance coverage. This coverage will also be voluntary, and beneficiaries will have their

TxDOT encourages youth to buckle up

Many people - especially teenagers and young adults - still do not take one of the simplest and most effective steps to stay safe: Buckling up. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 59 percent of the passenger vehicle occupants killed in crashes in 2002 - 32,598 men, women and children - were not wearing seat belts.

Teenagers and young adults are particularly at risk. Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens and young adults in the United States from age 16 through 34, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Yet, 64 percent of 16 to 29 year old (and 68 percent of 18 to 34 year old) passenger vehicle occupants killed or seriously injured in crashes in 2002 were not wearing a safety belt, according to NHTSA.

Sometimes the fear of getting a traffic ticket is the only reason that someone will wear a safety belt. That is why state and local law enforcement officers across the

country are joining the national Click It or Ticket/Operation ABC (America Buckles Up Children) May 2004 Mobilization that runs from May 24 through June 6, 2004. Officers across the country will aggressively ticket unbelted drivers and passen-

The combination of active law enforcement, high-profile publicity, and the advocacy ad promotion by public and private groups continues to be an extremely effective means for increasing safety belt use and saving lives across the country.

Bottom line, law enforcement officers would rather write someone a ticket than find that same person dead or critically injured because he or she was not restrained in a crash.

Wear your safety belt every trip, every time, and encourage teenagers and young adults to do the same.

Williams blew away her competition in the 100-meter hurdles, 400-meter dash, and the 200-meter dash and splattered the old records in first two events to rewrite the record books, some of which have stood for 27 years.


Williams' 14.27 in the 100-meter hurdles broke the old record of 14.70 that was set in 1989, and her personal best time of 54.97 in the 400-meter dash bested the old time of 56.20 that was initially set in 1977 and tied in

Williams' closest opponent in the 400-meters came in at 57.95 and running second to Williams in the 100-meter hurdles was a 15.66. As if two gold medals were not enough for Williams, she went on to claim the 200-meter gold as well and ran it in a time of 24.69.

Weatherton didn't set any new records, but she glided to the gold in the 100-meter dash with a time of 12.22.

Last year in the state meet, Weatherton ran the race in 12.56, which gave her the bronze. This year Weatherton also qualified for the 200-meter dash and brought home the silver, running second only to Williams with a time of 25.67.

Williams and Weatherton were the lone Lady Broncos that participated in the state meet and together racked up 48 points, which gave the 'team' second place in the meet behind Granger who scored only two more team points with a total of 50. That's quite a feat for only two run-
