Shelton Appointed D.A.

Governor Ann Richards today announced the appointment of James T. Shelton of Clarendon as District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District.

The district includes Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley and Hall Counties.

Shelton will replace David M. McCoy of Childress, who was elevated to the position of Judge of the 100th District Court.

Shelton will serve until the next general election. Shelton, 35, is an attorney in private practice. From 1987-90, he was a partner in the law firm of Lowe, Courtney and Shelton in Clarendon. A native of Childress, he earned a bachelor's degree in accounting and his law degree from Texas Tech University.

Shelton has served as Acting Donley County Attorney Pro Tem since 1987, attorney for the City of Clarendon since 1990 and Assistant District Attorney of the 100th District since January, 1993.

He is a member of the State Bar of Texas and currently serves as president of the 100th District Bar Association.

Shelton belongs to numerous civic and community organizations including the Donley County Chamber of Commerce and the Clarendon Lions Club.

The appointment is subject to Senate confirmation.

Local Judges Attend Seminar

Judge Jimmy B. Johnson, Precincts 1 & 2, and Judge Ann Kennedy, Precincts 3 & 4, were certified at a recent 20-hour Justice of the Peace Seminar held September 14-17, 1993 in Lubbock. The Seminar was sponsored by The Justice of the Peace and Constables Association of Texas and is conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. The Seminar is one of many held state-wide to allow Justices of the Peace to meet their continuing judicial education requirements as set forth in (ART. 27.005) Texas Government Code. Judges were allowed to select areas of study that closely matched their courts activity. Topics covered were as follows: Criminal Complaints, Traffic Law, Rural Court Financial Management, Criminal Law-filing Thru Appeal, Juvenile Law, Civil Law, Magistrate Warnings, Contracts and Torts, Rule of Civil Procedure, Justice Civil-VS-Small Claims Court, Alcoholic Beverage Laws, Forcible Entry and Detainer, Bond Setting and Forfeiture, Post Judgment Remedies, Jurisdiction and Venue, and Judicial Ethics.

CEUs Important to Get Pesticide License

CEUs or continuing education units are required for any producer to recertify their applicators licenses. Texas has about 180,000 private pesticide applicators in its files, more than any other state.

But many of that number, including homeowners as well as crop and livestock producers, will

cycle out of the computer if they don't requalify by a given date.

Private applicator licenses expire on the last day of February in the fifth year following the year of issue.

Licensed private applicators must "recertify" every five years by obtaining 15 continuing education credits. Two of the CEUs must be in pesticide laws and one unit must be in integrated pest management training.

Private applicators "certified" prior to January 10, 1989, must recertify by December 31, 1995, by obtaining 15 credits. Farmers and ranchers may, on a one time basis, attend a Texas Agricultural Extension Service private applicator training program, pass the private applicator exam and obtain a private applicator license.

Funeral services for Robert Stanley Cockerham, age 57, were held at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 21, 1993 in Robertson Chapel of Memories with Rev. Private applicators certified between January 10, 1989, and December 31, 1989, must be licensed by December 31, 1994, to recertify.

Cost for the single-session Extension service training program is \$10 for training materials and \$50 for the license upon completion of the course and passage of the exam.

What are called commercial and noncommercial pesticide applicators licenses by the TDA must be licensed annually and recertified every three years.

At least two private firms are holding courses in conjunction with

the TDA to teach the required information. The TDA program is Texas' response to federal law and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency which required the training and licensing of private pesticides applicators.


