# Worth Waiting For

eventy-year-old Kenneth Stokes this Friday night will fulfill a dream he's been holding on to for almost 20 years. He'll cross the stage during graduation ceremonies at Clarendon College and receive his diploma.

Stokes started back to school in 1985 at the age of 47 and was set to graduate in May 1990 at 52, but health problems changed those plans.


"I think graduation was to be on the 5th of May and on the 1st of May I had bypass surgery," Stokes said. "The doctor said I could go, but I didn't. I was too sore."

Stokes received his diploma in the mail; but something never seemed complete

"My sights were set on that graduation and never diminished."

The opportunity to participate in graduation ceremonies was arranged by Stokes' daughter after a phone conversation one day this spring.

"I have a daughter, my baby, and she's going to school over in Oklahoma, and she made the remark that she had to go and apply for graduation," Stokes said. "I jokingly said graduation is not important. (Then) I said, 'No, that's not right. It is important.'

Stoke said. "I wouldn't trade my wife of 52 years or children for all the degrees in the world, but I'm one of those people who always wanted to go to school.'

In the fall of 1985, Stokes got his start after reading in the local newspaper that State and Local Government would be offered. "I thought, I think I'll go and see if I can

Stokes said Mrs. Norman walked around and read over his shoulder what he had written and began to laugh.

Stokes is a native of Wheeler County, having lived there all but two years of his life.

He graduated from Shamrock High School in 1956, married the girl who has been his wife for 52 years, and moved to Dumas. Two years later he moved back to Shamrock and never left.

"I ran the auto parts store here for about 15 years; and before that, I ran a truck stop down here on the highway. Before that I was in the trucking business.

His health has been okay the last 18 years except for a spell two or three years ago when he had to have another surgery.

"I had another serious heart attack," Stokes said. "I had to have a pacemaker and defibrillator."



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## **Figuring out** disaffected libertarians

Campaigning in the Mountain West, Sen. Barack Obama said that the Bush administration's policies on warrantless wiretaps and executive authority would drive libertarian votes in his direction.

8:21 Libertarian voters played a big role in swinging control of Congress to the Democrats in 2006. Could April 6:05 Mr. Obama hold them against Arizona Sen. John McCain? While base voters still voted along party 9:15 lines in 2006, Republicans lost big among indepen-4:25 dents. According to an analysis that David Kirby and I did, libertarians may be the largest bloc of such inde-6:14 pendent-minded swing voters. Particularly in states with high concentrations of libertarians such as Ari-6:54 zona, Nevada, Colorado, Montana, and New Hamp-7:39 shire, disaffected libertarians likely cost Republicans House and Senate seats. 7:47

Recent polls suggest that 10 to 20 percent of 8:52 Americans hold "fiscally conservative, socially lib-9:04 eral" or libertarian views. Indeed, libertarians are a bigger share of the electorate than the much-discussed 9:05 "soccer moms," and they are increasingly a swing 10:0 vote.

> Libertarian voters have often given 70 percent or more of their votes to Republican candidates, including George W. Bush in 2000. But after six years of war, wiretapping and welfare-state social spending, libertarians gave barely half their votes to Republican candidates in 2006. The swing was even larger in Senate races. It seems clear that a lot of the centrist, moderate, and independent voters who swung to the Democrats in 2006 were libertarian leaners.

The presidential campaign this year has been bleak for libertarian voters, with full slates of big-government liberals and big-government conservatives.

The campaign of former New York mayor Rudolph Giuliani is especially interesting. Many libertarian Republicans were attracted to a candidate who was fiscally conservative, pro-choice, and gay-friendly. That profile, along with his Sept. 11, 2001 hero image, gave Mr. Giuliani an impressive lead in the polls for much of 2007.

But then Mr. Giuliani clashed with Rep. Ron Paul over foreign policy issues in a May 15 debate, and that led to increased scrutiny of Mr. Giuliani. Libertarian opinion leaders began to criticize Mr. Giuliani for his hawkishness and his authoritarian streak. As voters paid closer attention and libertarian criticisms accel-

At the beginning of the fall semester, I was given a list of works to choose to be examined over. I had to select 10 works from five of the six possible sections



erated, he fell in the polls. His fourth-place finish in libertarian-leaning New Hampshire-after spending a great deal of time and money there-was in retrospect the end of his campaign.

David Kirby has calculated that political futures markets were interpreting Ron Paul's successes as a setback for Mr. Giuliani, further evidence that it was a loss of libertarian support that caused Mr. Giuliani's campaign to plummet.

Now the choices are down to three. Hillary Clinton, a self-proclaimed "government junkie," is not likely to have much appeal for libertarians. But what about the two frontrunners? Mr. McCain will try to keep libertarian voters in the Republican column by defining Mr. Obama as a big-government, big-spending liberal friend of Ted Kennedy and Nancy Pelosi. But President Bush and the Republican Congress have severely undermined Republican credibility on fiscal conservatism.

Mr. McCain is also the leading supporter of the war in Iraq, which is unpopular with independent and libertarian voters. And he has a long record of hostility to the First Amendment, from campaign finance regulation to regulating blogs to banning flag desecration.

But his maverick, "straight talk" image will appeal to libertarians, as will his support for free trade and a reasoned approach to immigration reform. He could put some meat back on that maverick image by announcing that his attempt to crack down on political speech was misguided-and by reminding voters of disagreements with the religious right.

Mr. Obama offers virtually the opposite profile. He's been against the war from the beginning. He has tried to scale back the excesses of the Patriot Act and promises to review Bush's sweeping claims of executive power. His rhetoric about moving beyond liberal-conservative fights appeals to libertarians and independents.

But buried inside the soaring eloquence of his speeches is a veritable laundry list of taxpayer handouts for every voting bloc, and he has even questioned the benefits of free trade. If he wants to appeal to libertarian and independent voters, he should show a tiny bit of independence from the Kennedy-Pelosi-Clinton-labor agenda. He could advocate Social Security private accounts as a way for low-income families to build wealth, or endorse school choice for children condemned to failing schools.

Republicans have been trying to drive libertarian voters out of their party. But so far Democrats aren't jumping on that opportunity.

## No reason to stall free trade pact

President Ronald Reagan once observed, "The way to prosperity for all nations is rejecting protectionist legislation and promoting fair and free competition."

Last week, the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives indefinitely blocked a vote on the pending Colombia Free Trade Agreement (FTA). Their action sends the wrong message to trade partners around the world and squanders an opportunity to help Americans shouldering the burden of unemployment and a stalling economy. Indeed, failure to ratify the FTA with Colombia denies economic growth opportunities for both the United States and Colombia, stifles competition, and undermines efforts to create a safer, more stable world.

Economically, enactment of the Colombia FTA would level the playing field and foster fair trade by removing the costly tariffs levied on U.S. exporters trying to sell their goods in Colombian markets. The U.S. International Trade Commission projects the deal would increase U.S. exports to Colombia by \$1.1 billion a year, which will in turn create jobs for American workers.

In 2007, America exported high quality beef, cotton, wheat, soybeans, fruits and vegetables, and other goods to Colombia, with sales valued at \$8.6 billion. While Colombia was able to export goods into the U.S. duty-free, American businesses and producers are still obligated to pay tariffs on exports to Colombia. The U.S. Trade Representative estimates that, since negotiations of the trade pact were completed in 2006, American products have been taxed nearly one billion dollars in tariffs paid to Colombia. By eliminating this inequity, producers in the U.S. will have greater access to this lucrative market.

This would be particularly beneficial to Texas, which led the nation in merchandise exports to Colombia last year, resulting in \$2.3 billion in revenue for the state. Nearly 21,000 companies export goods from locations in Texas. The vast majority of those are small and medium-sized businesses. Without costly tariffs, Texas businesses could bring more of their goods to more

customers in Colombia. The FTA would also ease regulatory practices associated with trade and would

More broadly, with the U.S. economy declining, Americans are consuming domestic goods at a slower pace. Expanding U.S. exports to international markets can help offset a downturn in domestic consumption.

The economic growth that trade can stimulate is part of a larger imperative - global leadership. If the Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives successfully subverts the Colombia FTA, our nation could take a step toward an isolationist posture that is short-sighted and imprudent in a global economy. China, Russia, and India are surging into the marketplace and dominating key sectors like manufacturing, technology, and services. Though American manufactures are matchless in quality, without preferential trade agreements, our access to world markets is inhibited; and we jeopardize our competitive edge. Prefer-



ential trade pacts between our competitors in Europe, Asia, and Latin America are rapidly outpacing and outnumbering U.S. trade deals. How can we lead if we limit participation?

Countries like Colombia, which has made great strides under the administration of President Alvaro Uribe, are looking to the U.S. as an example of democratic governance and economic freedom. Fostering stable democracies through trade relationships in Latin America and other regions of the world is in our nation's best interests. But by stalling the deal, we risk sending Colombia - and future trade partners - the message that parochial politics supersede policy.

It is reckless to imperil a partnership with Colombia when neighboring Venezuela is led by a dangerous dictator who threatens freedom in all of Latin America. We will need strong allies like Mr. Uribe to stand up against Mr. Chavez's political abuse of Venezuelan oil and the terrorism he levies against our hemisphere.

The United States has an opportunity to bolster our economy, to reaffirm our position as a global leader, and to build the diplomatic relationships that will help keep us safe. The time to move forward and ratify the Colombia FTA is now. Congress' failure to consider the pact cannot be justified.

#### **Drugs May Lower Heart Disease Risk in Diabetics**

The number one cause of death among diabetics is coronary (heart) artery disease because high glucose levels in the blood can cause buildup of plaque (a combination of cholesterol, calcium and other blood components). It is the plaque buildup in the blood stream that thickens the arteries and slows the flow of blood through the heart. If the process (the medical term is ischemia) continues, arteries in the heart often become clogged.

To help prevent this condition, physicians prescribe cholesterollowering drugs and drugs that lower blood pressure (BP). The results of a study of over 400 adults with Type 2 (adult) diabetes were published recently in the Journal of the American Medical Association. Researchers evaluated the aggressive use of high blood pressure drugs and "statin-type" cholesterol lowering drugs in such a way as to reduce BP and LDL (low density liproprotein cholesterol) lower than is usually recommended. According to study results, thickening of arteries was reversed. Some researchers predict that this approach may lead to fewer heart attacks and strokes.
