

Sales tax revenues increase

All three Donley County municipalities posted gains last week when Texas Comptroller Susan Combs delivered sales tax revenues collected in October.

The City of Clarendon received an allocation of \$37,791.40, which is up 16.44 percent from the same period one year ago. That brings the city ahead 2.52 percent for the year to date with \$285,033.99

Hedley's revenue for the month increased 36.53 percent to \$1,303.56, but that city is still lagging for the year-to-date, which is down 5.54 percent.

Howardwick saw a 5.19 percent increase for the month with an allocation of \$1,570.35; but after two disappointing previous months, the city is still down 12.28 percent for the year.

Statewide, the comptroller collected \$1.52 billion in sales tax revenue in October, down 12.8 percent compared to October 2008.

"Declining sales tax collections, which began in February, have continued with October's collections," Combs said. "Tax collections are down in major sectors of the economy, including retail trade, oil and natural gas, and construction."

Statewide sales tax allocations are down 8.7 percent compared to November 2008.

November sales tax allocations represent September sales reported to the Comptroller in October by monthly tax filers and July, August and September sales reported in October by quarterly tax filers.

The United States took another step towards a total government takeover of the healthcare system last week when the House of Representatives approved a Democratic "reform" plan.

It remains to be seen what amalgamation of a reform bill could possibly come out of the Senate, but there is general agreement that it will care a price tag of about one trillion dollars - give or take two or three billion - and that it will raise taxes, include mandates on individuals and employers, violate your personal and economic freedom, take money away from Medicare, increases the cost of private insurance, and expands the role of government.

Proponents of these reforms claim they can pay for it with savings in Medicare by eliminating waste and by also reigning in costs associated with "unnecessary" tests and treatments. (And by raising taxes and imposing fees and fines, but they don't like to talk about that.)

Every politician promises to save money by ending waste, fraud, and abuse. But no politician ever accomplishes that. It's just a smoke screen to get another big spending project pushed through, and this one is no different.

The national Democrats don't give one damn about your well being. They care about power, and what could be more powerful than having control over someone's healthcare?

Healthcare reform has nothing to do with actually receiving healthcare. Everyone can receive healthcare right now. It's just a matter of who is going to pay for it, and how much it will cost. But know this, the only influence government has ever had on the cost of healthcare is to make it more expensive.

And then there is the constitutionality of all this. No provision of the United States Constitution was ever intended to give the government the ability to take over the healthcare system (or, for that matter, the auto industry or any number of intrusions into the marketplace that have occurred recently).

Your healthcare is your business and your responsibility. Whether you have healthcare through your occupation is between you and your employer. The terms of your coverage are between you and your insurance company and could be rightly influenced by choices you make in your own life. None of this is the government's business

That's the way things are now, but what we're seeing happen in Congress is a very different vision of America. Now is the time for people to stand up and oppose these "reforms" and to demand that our leaders respect our rights. Do not let your freedom slip through your fingers.

At a time when the world is full of conflict and strife, my three-year-old son is becoming quite the little diplomat.

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
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Obama should represent everyone

Thrown the first pitch at an All-Star game in St. Louis, Missouri, and flown to Copenhagen in order to personally pitch Chicago as the site of the 2016 Olympics;

Jetted to New York City for a date night on the town with his wife (on the eve of GM's bankruptcy filing, no less);

Hosted a luau-themed congressional picnic complete with tiki torches and potted palms and thrown a fiesta, featuring Marc Anthony, Los Lobos, and Gloria Estefan, (part of the continuing White House Music Series concerts) apparently as part of Hispanic Heritage Month;

Welcomed the Tar Heels, the Phillies, Pittsburgh Steelers, Chicago Bulls and NBA champions to the White

Enjoyed numerous rounds of golf at Fort Belvoir and countless games of basketball on his personal court at the White House, not to mention the weekend trips to Camp David with family and friends and family vacations to the Grand Canyon and Martha's Vineyard;

Visited more foreign countries than any president within the first year of office (Iraq, Turkey, Great Britain, France, Germany, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Moscow, Italy, and Ghana); he also recently announced plans to visit Japan, China, Singapore, and South Korea in

Attended almost 30 Democratic fundraisers in various parts of the country (contrast this with George W. Bush who attended six political fundraisers and Bill Clinton who attended five during their first nine months in office) and campaigned for various Democratic candidates, including Chris Dodd, John Corzine and Deval Patrick, among many

The White House provides no exact figures for the costs of presidential trips, yet consider this: the Pentagon estimates that it costs more than \$100,000 per hour to operate Air Force One - and that's not even with Obama on board. As CNN reports, "Presidential travel requires much more spending. The president's armored limousine (and its double) must be transferred in advance to the designation, where Secret Service agents may have spent days making preparations. Numerous presidential, military, and security aides go with the president, and they must be housed, fed and paid." Thus, these trips cost in the millions of dollars - again, we taxpayers are footing

This isn't to say that Obama is the only president who has ever enjoyed such lavish perks of the office at taxpayer expense. Ronald Reagan took frequent trips to his California ranch to chop wood and clear brush, while Bill

Clinton traveled at taxpayer expense to a variety of glamorous vacation spots. However, it's time for a reality check. What Americans need right now is a hard-working president, one who stays

at his desk and does his job. We certainly don't need a president who's enjoying a jet-setting lifestyle at taxpayer expense - partying while wars rage around us, deficits soar and the economy crumbles. In fact, the money being spent on glitzy White House soirees and foreign travel would be far better spent on other muchneeded programs to help the American

America is hurting on many fronts, but we're especially hurting for leaders who take their jobs seriously and recognize that we are grappling with critical issues. We need a president who understands the urgency of the situation and reflects that sobriety and represents all the people.

Barack Obama promised to be that kind of president. Thus far, however, he has fallen far short of his campaign promises. Instead, he is busy trying to stay in power, keep his party in power and add to his legacy, but that's not his job. His job as president is to get this country back on its feet economically and to represent all of the people again, whether they be Republicans, Democrats, Independents, Tea Party activists or people who watch the FOX News Network (a network he has been making war with).

Thus far, a large part of Obama's presidency has been taken with attending fundraisers for the Democratic Party. It's as if he's working for the Democratic Party instead of the American people. In fact, if he's going to raise money, he should be raising money for all the parties because he should be representing



For it has been declared to me concerning you, my brethren, by those of Chloe's household, that there are contentions among you. CHS physics students break unique record

by two Clarendon High School Physics students, using just one piece of construction paper and a foot of tape.

Seniors Matt Henderson and Jadon Thornton built a free-standing structure out of these limited supplies that reached a height of 181.8 cm, beating a former Hedley student's record of 176 cm.

"I think it's wonderful that these students used their creativity and were successful," said Clarendon High Physics teacher Bruce Howard.

Although no other students' structures reached such an height, all 21 except for two were able to build one that was above one meter high.

"We just tried different things and found the best way to build it," Henderson said. "It's cool knowing that we broke the previous record."

According to Howard, this project is only one of many that the class will complete. He also plans for them to build wooden bridges and towers later in the year for class

"The students seem to enjoy doing special projects, and that's always fun for me to see," Howard




"I thought we came ready to play and we looked good early," coach Randy Yelverton said. "I thought we lost a little focus late, but regained it in the last game."




Medication Approved for Rare Hereditary Condition During early October, the FDA approved a new drug called Berinert for the treatment of a rare condition called hereditary angioedema (HAE). 


