

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# **Economics** driving gold price higher

The price of gold has recently spurted to a new all-time high in terms of U.S. dollars. I'm neither an expert nor a market timer, but let me offer a few perspectives on this event.

To most people, including gold bugs, gold is an inflation hedge, preserving purchasing power at a time of currency depreciation. Today, unlike the gold bull market in the 1970s, gold is rising while consumer and producer prices are falling. Nevertheless, many economically knowledgeable market participants are getting out of dodge-that is, they are reducing their holdings of dollars now—some to avoid potential losses from future dollar depreciation and some for

The market price of things reflects how much people value them. For people to value a currency highly, they must have confidence both in the integrity of the currency and, in the case of a fiat currency, the political and financial viability of the government issuing the currency. Confidence in the buck is currently low because Washington's fiscal policy is profligate and out of control, and because Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke has stated that the Fed will create as many dollars as deemed necessary to prevent a depression. (For the record, there is no guarantee that monetary policy, inflationary or otherwise, can prevent a depression. It is possible to have a hyperinflationary

Market prices decline when sellers outweigh buyers. The dollar currently has lots of sellers. China, for example, is hedging its exposure to dollars by exchanging paper assets for hard assets, buying massive quantities of raw materials around the globe, while also encouraging its own citizens to diversify into gold and silver. There are recurring rumors that some Arab Gulf states, China, Russia, France, and maybe even Japan would like to replace the buck with a basket of currencies and gold for oil transactions. The Federal Reserve Note may become "the old maid" of the global currency markets.

Another important, but generally under-appreciated, factor affecting the price of gold is geopolitics. \$800/oz. gold in January 1980 was, among other things, an emphatic no-confidence vote for the United States as a world power. Under Jimmy Carter, the United States appeared impotent and incompetent on the world stage. Soviet tanks rolled into Afghanistan, Iran held over 50 Americans hostage for 444 days, and everyone remembered how Carter had kissed Leonid Brezhnev. The dollar tanked and gold soared. When Ronald Reagan reasserted America's resolve and effectively stood up to Soviet expansionism, the dollar entered a prolonged bull market and gold a prolonged

Today, President Obama seems paralyzed in Afghanistan, clueless about Iran, makes unilateral concessions to the likes of Vladimir Putin and Hugo Chavez, and gold is at record highs despite overall price deflation. Nobody wants to hold the currency of a declining power; hence, until our president starts projecting strength, the dollar is likely to remain under pressure. Many foreigners love to gripe about American power, but when push comes to shove, they generally prefer the relative stability provided by a strong United States and a strong dollar.

Another major factor affecting the gold-dollar exchange market today is "the carry trade." This is a currency-trading technique whereby speculators (everyone from financial institutions to hedge funds to individual investors) borrow money at low interest rates in one currency, then sell that currency to buy another currency where they can earn higher interest rates, thereby profiting from interest rate spreads.

In recent years, the Japanese yen had the lowest interest rates, and therefore was sold to finance the carry trade. Incidentally, this policy was designed to prop up politically connected too-big-to-fail bankrupt banks, resulting in years of economic stagnation in

Uncle Sam and the Fed have adopted a similar program today. The Federal Reserve is keeping interest rates near zero, so currency traders are selling dollars (accentuating the already bearish trend in the buck) to buy other currencies in the search for yield. Since the Fed has insisted that it will hold interest rates at these amazingly low levels at least through 2011, many currency traders are selling dollars to buy euros, yuan, the Brazilian real, Canadian, Australian and New Zealand dollars, etc. (Note to amateur speculators: The carry trade isn't as risk-free as it seems. If there is a financial panic similar to last fall's, panic buying of the dollar might crush those who are "short" the buck.)

Incidentally, since one of the traditional arguments against buying gold is the fact that it pays no interest, today's super-low interest rates on dollardenominated savings practically eliminate the opportunity costs of converting dollars to gold, further incentivizing a shift from dollars to gold.

This economist doesn't know the future, and this article isn't giving investment advice. Gold prices may continue to soar or they may get caught in a deflationary downdraft. I will, however, make one categorical assertion: Gold is warning us that our country is on the



## Capitalism allows most freedom

While the debates rage on with health care, cap-and-trade, and the overall role of government in the average American's life, economic societal terms like "capitalism," "socialism," and "communism" often get careless bandied. Many on the right feel like America is on the move towards "socialism" and many on the left believe that "capitalism" is the root of all social ills.

The only way to set the record straight is to understand the precise definitions of these terms and how are they being used in today's rhetoric.

Capitalism has been blamed for the Great Depression and the current financial crisis. It is often portrayed by the left as being full of greedy rich people who can control the nation with their

The truth is, capitalism is simply private property as the means of production. In other words, an individual owns his or her land, and that individual owns all that is produced from it. The individual is then allowed to trade with other individuals who have used their private property to produce something of value.

Of course, this works not only for land, but for labor, as well, as an individual owns the production of his or her

Socialism, on the other hand, is the term that is often used by the right to

describe Barack Obama's current policies, along with what is considered to be like France or Italy. But the truth is, the economic system of Europe. Most Americans see it as a system of government with high taxes and massive government programs.

But the truth is, socialism is what

Marx considered to be the final stage before Communism. Its definition is state ownership of the means of production. That means the government must own an industry, making all workers government employees. This is what has been seen in the Soviet Union and is curing to his needs." rently applied in North Korea.

And last but not least, communism is the stage where the "state of man" changes and the state is no longer needed to enforce communal living. In other words, its envisions a utopian as the means of production.

This is what most people consider when they think of the Soviet Union and China. But, in fact, this was only their end goal. The idea of a communist society is so far-fetched that it has never even came close to manifesting itself. Instead, the propaganda mills of Stalin and Mao made people believe that they were instituting communism once they realized that it was not appearing after

Many on the left today want what they envision as socialism-lite. They tell the average American, it will be much socialism is the abolition of private property by whatever means necessary - and by whatever moniker it is peddled.

Put in more individualistic terms, that means the proponents of socialism want to prevent Americans from owning the key materials that make "the American Dream" possible. They would prefer for those items to be state-owned and rationed to individuals "from each according to his ability; to each accord-

So the next time the left calls for more government intervention, -- or, in fact, the right wants purer capitalism-Americans must ask themselves: what is their own end goal? If it is to give the government control over every industry, system where communal property serves and, in fact, individual, then socialism is the clear choice. If, on the other hand, it is to allow Americans to reap the fruit of their own labors, then capitalism is preferable option.

In either case, the definitions must be as clear as the alternatives. For, as Mark Twain observed, a difference in terminology is the difference between "lightening bugs and lightening bolts."

Cross Texas Transmission, LLC (CTT) is proposing to construct a 345 kilovolt (kW) double circuit high woltage electric transmission line as part of the Competitive Renewable Energy Zones (CREZ) initiative. The CREZ project is being developed to integrate additional renewable energy and increase system reliability throughout the Electric Reliability Council of Texas (ERCOT). CTT intends to file a Certificate of Convenience and Necessity (CCN) application in the first quarter of 2000 requesting authorization from the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCI) to construct and operate the transmission line between the Gray and Tesla Substations.

CTT's routing consultant has identified a number of preliminary alternative routes to connect the Gray and Tesla substations. These routes, to the extent possible, were developed parallel to existing right-of-ways (ROW) and property boundaries while avoiding or minimizing impacts to environmental and physical constraints. The proposed Gray to Tesla transmission line will be approximately 90 to 120 miles long depending on the route selected by the PUCI. The line will connect the Gray Substation, southwest of LeFors, and the Tesla Substation, east of Childress near Kirkland. The transmission line will be potentially located in the following counties: Gray, Wheelet, Doniey, Collingsworth, Hall, Childress, Hardeman, Cottle, and Fourd Counties. The proposed line will be constructed in a ROW that is approximately 200

Please note that there will not be a formal presentation as part of these meetings. Detailed maps showing the preliminary alternative routes and other information will be available for individuals to review. Individuals have the opportunity to wisit with us anytime between 4:30 and 7:30 PM to ask questions and to provide comments to representatives and technical experts from CTT and its consultants regarding the proposed transmission line. CTT and its consultants will consider information gained during these public open house meetings into the overall routing evaluation that will be submitted as part of the CCN application.

CIT is committed to routing, constructing, and operating the proposed transmission lines in a manner consistent with the values of the local communities, and the rules and policies established by the Texas Legislature, the PUCT, and ERCOT.



# Drugs in the News

**New Psoriasis Treatment Approved** 

Last month the FDA approved the injectable drug Stelara (ustekinumab), a new treatment for moderate to severe forms of psoriasis. Health experts are saying good things about this new treatment, which is called by a number of names including monoclonal antibody, immunomodulator and biological. It joins other biologicals used for this condition, including Enbrel (etanercept), Amevive (alefacept), and Remicade (infliximab). It works by blocking the effect of proteins in the body involved with inflammation and the excessive production of skin cells. Reports indicate that when Stelara was recently compared to Enbrel in a head-to-head, three month trial, Stelara was more effective in reducing psoriasis activity. Since Stelara also reduces the body's ability to fight infection, there is a possible risk for infection.

Psoriasis usually appears as inflamed and thickened or raised patches of skin that are often covered with silvery scales. Other treatments may include topical drugs like corticosteroids, light therapy (sunlight and narrowband UVB therapy), and oral drugs like methotrexate.

#### **Meeting to discuss Buck Creek results**


