State revokes probation for Ballard

Two men were sent to prison last Monday when the District Court met in Clarendon after they violated conditions of probation.

District Attorney Luke Inman, assisted by Assistant District Attorney Greg Buckley, prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with District Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

Raymond Ballard was convicted and sentenced to 15 years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice after pleading true to the allegations listed in the state's Motion to Adjudicate Guilt of Defendant.

Ballard originally pleaded guilty on July 7, 2008, to the second degree felony of man-

slaughter and received four years deferred adjudication. Subject to certain conditions of probation, Ballard was required to attend and successfully complete the SAJPF program, which focuses on drug rehabilitation. Ballard was expelled from the program, and the state's motion was filed shortly thereafter.

Ballard had been arrested last August and charged with manslaughter after Thomas Childress Herman was found dead in his Clarendon apartment last July.

Before that Ballard had been arrested on and charged with possession of forged checks with Herman's name on them. Ballard was also charged with possessing stolen credit cards not

belonging to Herman.

Robert Harris was convicted and sentenced to 16 months in the State Jail Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice after pleading true to the allegations listed in the state's Motion to Adjudicate Guilt of Defendant.

Harris originally pleaded guilty on April 20, 2009, to the state jail felony offense of burglary of a building and received two years deferred adjudication. Subject to certain conditions of probation, Harris was required to attend and successfully complete the Hidalgo Community Supervision and Corrections Department Restitution Center. On July 24,

2009, Harris absconded from the facility and a motion was filed shortly thereafter.

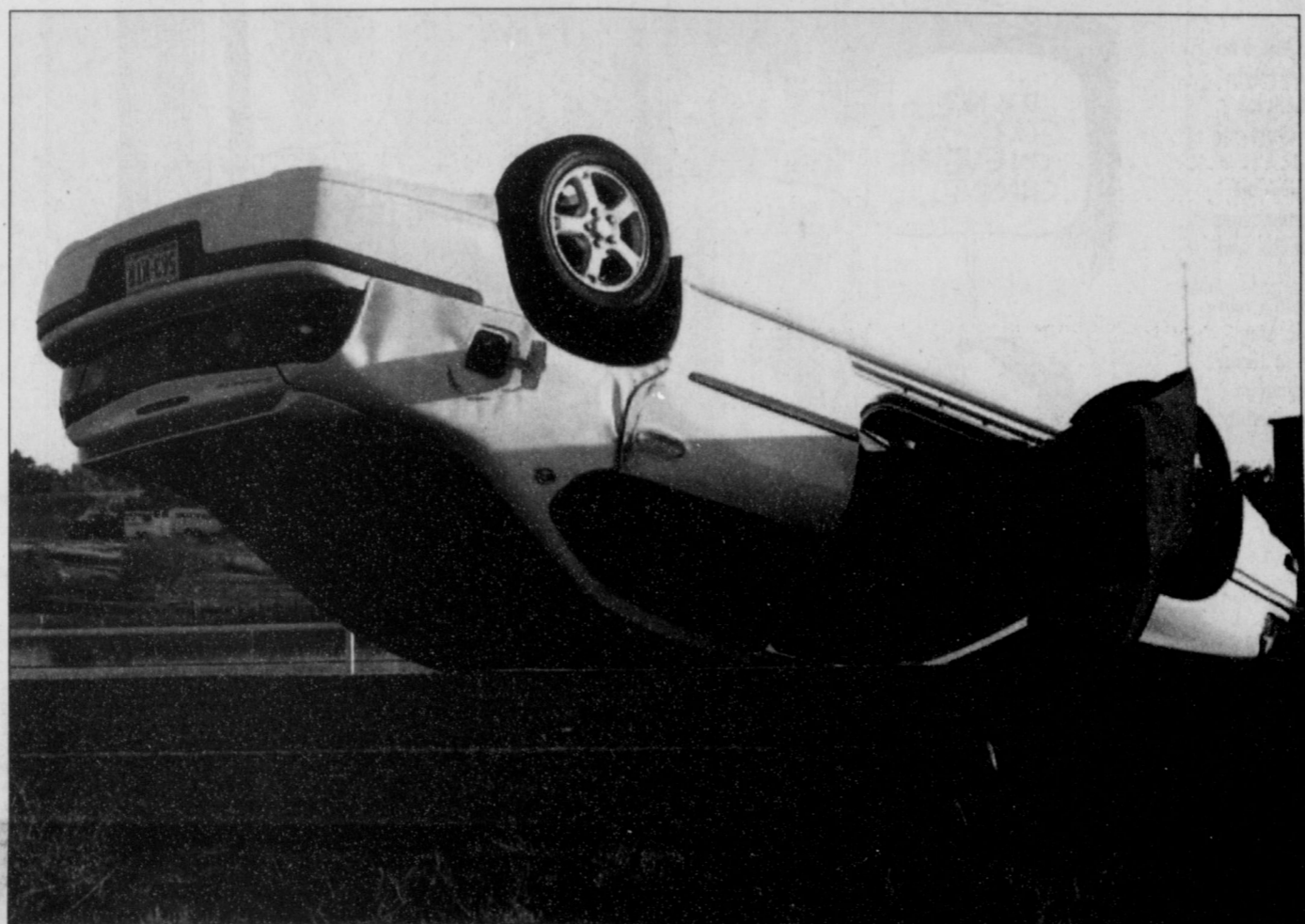
After Harris' plea of true to the allegations, ADA Greg Buckley presented evidence on behalf of the State, and Judge Messer sentenced Harris to 16 months.

Also last week, the court met in Childress on Tuesday and one plea took place.

Childress County Attorney Greg Buckley, prosecuted the case for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Jay Mayden presiding.

Kay Teague Madison was placed on probation for a period of two years for the Class A Misdemeanor offense of theft. Madison

No injuries in two-vehicle accident

A two-vehicle accident near Clarendon last week resulted in one citation but no injuries, according to Department of Public Safety Trooper Chad Simpson.

Stephanie Spillers, age 36, of Clarendon was eastbound on US 287 in a 2008 gray Chevy Malibu last Thursday evening, approaching the Clarendon College Livestock &

Equine Center entrance. Simpson said Spillers was in the outside lane preparing to turn into the LEC.

Twenty-year-old Bradley Riggs of Memphis approached Spillers from behind in a white Chevy Impala and realized that Spillers was turning. He attempted to steer left to avoid collision but struck Spillers in the left rear corner.

Spillers' car traveled into the south ditch and then back across the eastbound lanes of US 287 into the center median where it came to rest. Riggs' vehicle began going sideways, rolled onto its top, and then slid on its top before coming to rest near the south shoulder.

Simpson said both Spillers and Riggs were wearing seatbelts, and

neither one was injured. Riggs was issued a citation for failure to control speed.

Responding to this accident were the DPS, the Donley County Sheriff's Office, the Texas Department of Transportation, the Associated Ambulance Authority, and the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department.

State officials urging vaccination for flu

Without flu shots, dodging the flu between October and May is like trying to keep your hair neat and dry in a typhoon.

That's because your average flu virus comes in sundry types, subtypes and strains. As your body learns to fight one strain, a new one blows in. To regain the edge against this highly adaptable disease, you and your family need to get all of your recommended flu vaccines.

Unlike the similar but milder common cold, flu is nothing to sneeze at. Up to 40,000 U.S. deaths are linked to seasonal flu each year, most among people over 65.

"Getting a shot is the one best way to prevent flu, which can cause serious, sometimes deadly com-

plications," said Dr. David Lakey, Commissioner of the Department of State Health Services.

The new H1N1 virus will require its own vaccine. Much of the concern over H1N1 is that its greatest danger is to school-age children, pregnant women and people with chronic conditions.

"Most people recover on their own," Lakey said. Nevertheless, "[we] still have a population with no natural immunity built up. This flu season will be a challenge."

Anyone 6 months or older should get the vaccines. You can take them in shot or nasal spray form. For the nasal spray, you have to be healthy, between 2 and 49 years old, and not pregnant. The

vaccines usually take effect in about two weeks.

Dr. Lakey also advises some basic practices to guard against cold and flu:

Clean: Wash your hands often. Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds with soap and water or use an alcohol-based hand cleaner.

Cover: Cover your cough. Use a tissue to cover your mouth and nose when you cough or sneeze. Don't have a tissue? The crook of your elbow will do.

Contain: Contain germs by steering clear of others who are sick. If you do get sick, stay at home until you're well again, so you don't spread more germs.

The flu usually gives you a

fever, body aches, extreme tiredness and dry cough — it's more intense than a cold. If you just have a sore throat or runny or stuffy nose, chances are you're safe to go to school or work.

Stomach symptoms such as nausea, vomiting and diarrhea are more common in children than adults.

The catch is, you might not know you have the flu until after you've already spread it to someone else. Adults can infect others a day before they develop symptoms and five days afterward. Children can pass it along for longer than a week.

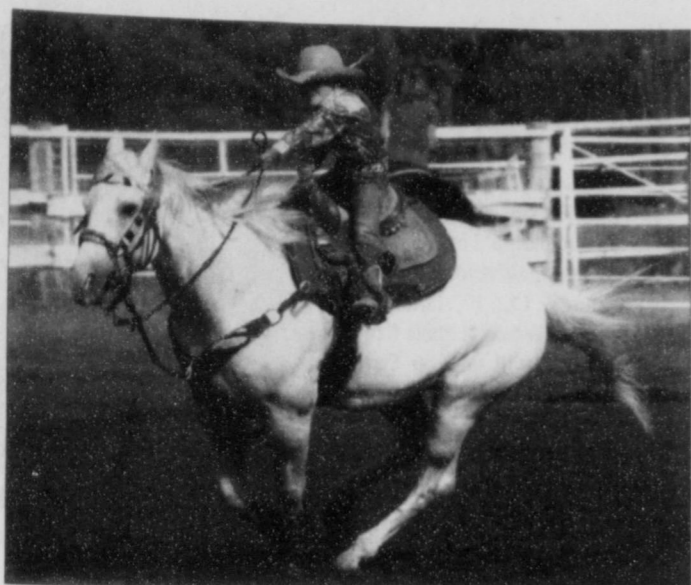
Other activities, such as kid games and chicken drop bingo, will be held all day. Craft booths are welcome, but no food booths are allowed.

pleaded guilty to both offenses and was placed on deferred adjudication.

Madison was arrested in Childress County on March 27, 2008, for the theft charge. Pursuant to the plea agreement, Madison is required to pay \$1,290.00 restitution to the Childress Index, a \$2,000 fine to Childress County and \$290 in court costs, among other conditions of probation. If Madison violates probation, she could face up to one year in the Childress County Jail.

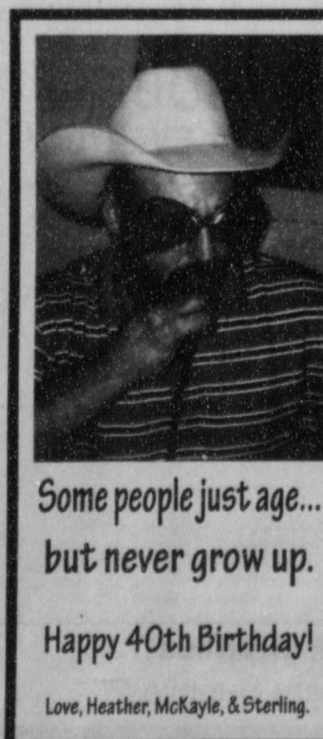

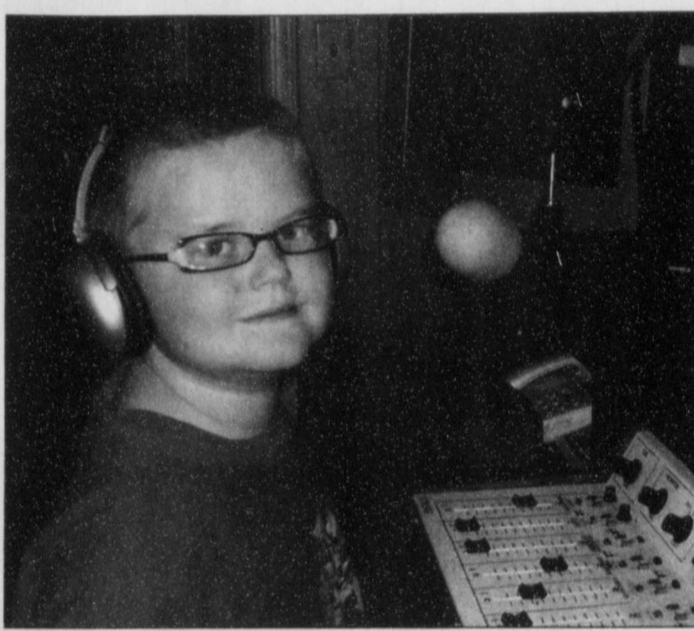

Concerned about diet? Re-think your drink

Beverages are an important part of your diet. They are mostly water, a nutrient that's essential to life. In fact, about 70 percent of your total body weight is water and, most, if not all of your bodily functions depend on it.

When choosing beverages you should try to make them count as healthful contributions to your diet. Your best beverage choices are water, low-fat milk or 100 percent juice, instead of soda, sugary fruit drinks or sports drinks, which are high in calories.

One hundred percent fruit or vegetable juice provides Vitamin C and in some cases, Vitamin A and other nutrients. But one serving of juice a day (¾ cup) is enough as juice can be high in calories. Make sure to read the label and choose 100 percent juice. Many juice-like or punch drinks are less than 10 percent juice and contain mostly sugar, water and are high in calories and of little nutrient value.

Sodas are mostly water, sugar or sugar substitute and some flavor-

ing. Sugared sodas are a source of empty calories and usually replace nutrient-dense beverages such as milk or juice, both which contain many healthy nutrients.

You can easily translate the amount of sugar in soda from grams to teaspoons. A typical 20 oz. soda usually contains a total of 87 grams of sugar. Knowing that four grams is equal to 1 teaspoon, you can figure out that there are about 22 teaspoons of sugar in that 20 oz. bottle of soda. That's a lot of sugar!

Many Americans fail to consume the recommended amounts of dairy foods to receive adequate amounts of calcium and Vitamin D. Diets rich in milk and milk products, combined with physical activity, help build and maintain bone mass, which may reduce the risk of osteoporosis.

How much milk you needs depends upon your age. The 2005 Dietary Guidelines recommend the following amounts: Children age 2-8 2 cups, Children age 9-18 3 cups, Adults 19 and up 3 cups.

Dairy foods can be high in

saturated fat, so it is best to choose low-fat dairy products which are 1 percent fat or less. But "What Counts as a Cup of Milk?"

According to USDA's MyPyramid, 1 cup of milk or yogurt, 1½ ounces of natural cheese, or 2 ounces of processed cheese can be considered as 1 cup from the milk group.

Tips for Making Wise Choices
Include milk as a beverage at meals. Choose fat-free or low-fat milk. If you usually drink whole milk, switch gradually to fat-free milk, to lower saturated fat and calories. Try reduced fat (2 percent), then low-fat (1 percent) and finally fat free (skim).

If you drink cappuccinos or lattes - ask for them with fat-free milk. As a replacement for soda or sports drinks, dilute 100 percent juice with water and ice for a refreshing summer drink. Get in the habit of carrying water with you wherever you go to avoid stopping to buy bottled soda.

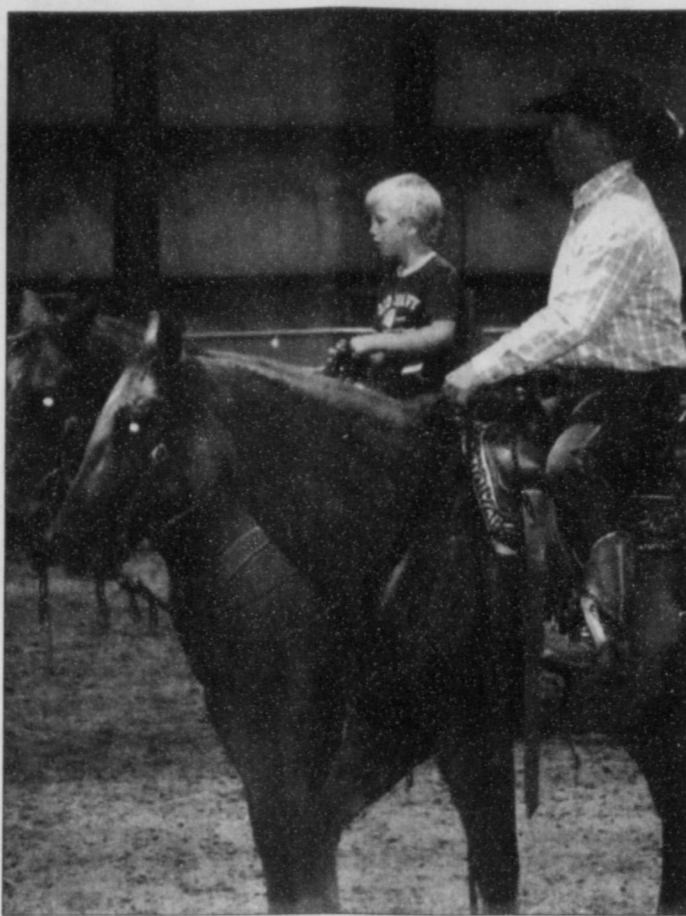

Resistant Hypertension: Test Drug Provides Hope

A challenging health problem is the control of resistant or hard-to-treat hypertension (high blood pressure), especially in older adults. According to a recent issue of the medical journal *Lancet*, test results of a drug still in clinical trial provides hope to physicians and individuals with hard-to-treat hypertension. The drug, which is called darusentan, performed well in a study involving 100 different test sites around the world in which people with systolic hypertension (the top blood pressure number was 140 or above) were evaluated. Their pressure remained high in spite of taking 3 or more currently prescribed blood pressure medicines. During a 14 week study, daily doses of darusentan were administered. On average, persons in the study who received the lowest dose (50mg) experienced a 17 point drop in systolic blood pressure. Those who received a placebo experienced an average 9 point drop in blood pressure.

Control of blood pressure is important in preventing potentially lifethreatening problems such as heart attacks and stroke.

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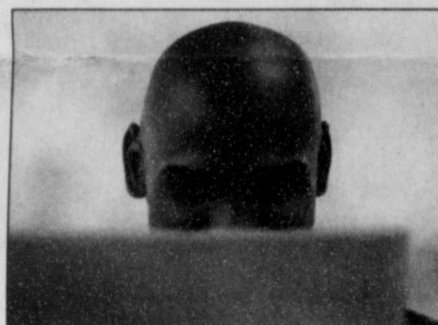

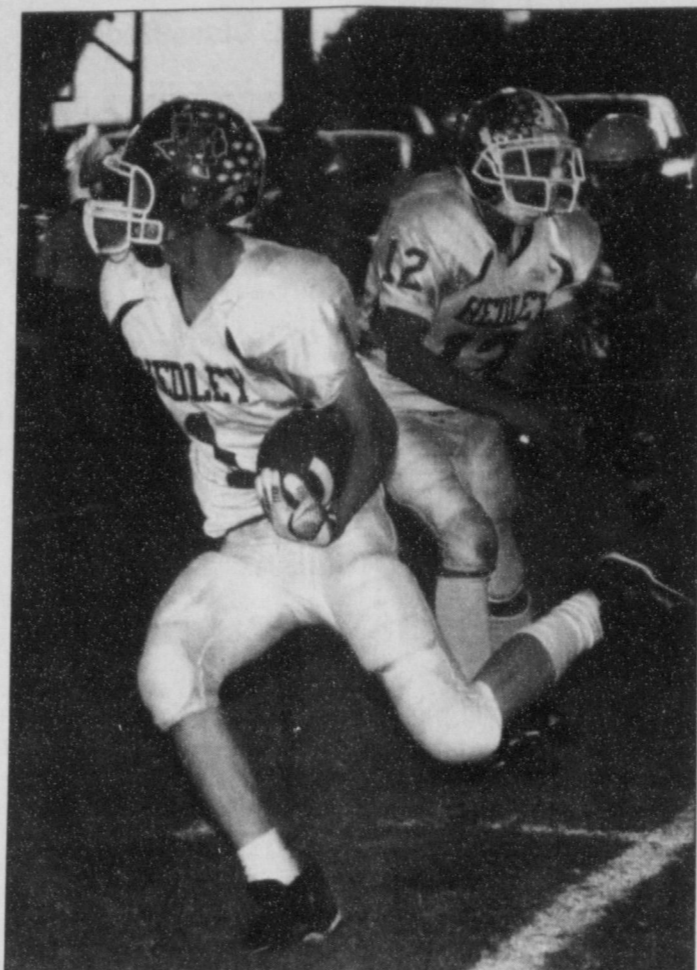

HJH falls to Guthrie

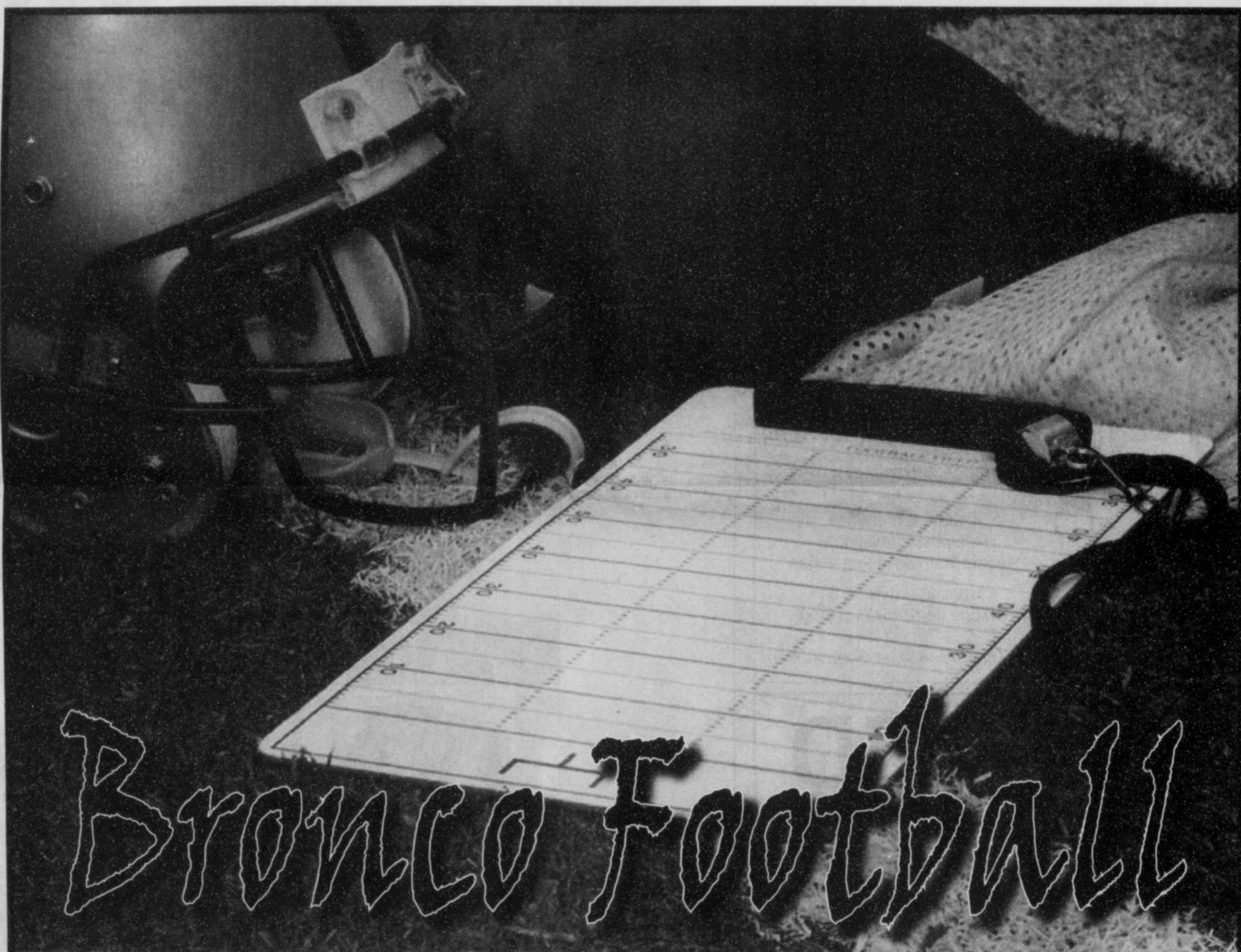

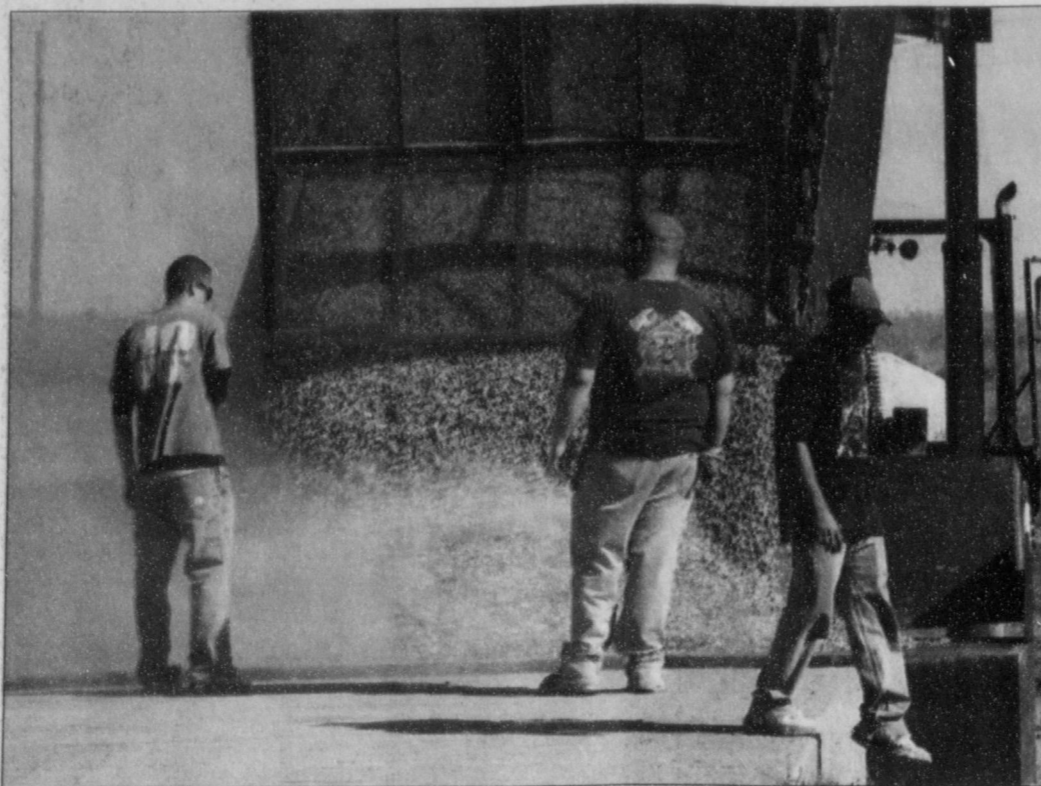
