

Government works best out in public

In Texas the law is clear. Governing bodies must conduct the people's business in public or else face some serious penalties.

This statute has protected the public and elected representatives alike for the past 42 years with a basic premise: public bodies should deliberate in public.

The days of making backroom good ol' boy deals in private are a thing of the past because the Texas Legislature outlawed it by passing the Open Meetings Act in 1967, and strengthening it in 1973 after the infamous "Sharpstown Scandal."

Yet, there are some serious and troubling attempts underway that could open the door for that very thing to occur. At least three Texas cities and the Texas Municipal League are endorsing a legal challenge in the courts that will render Texas' Open Meetings laws ineffective. TML, which is supported by your tax money in the form of membership fees, is urging more than 1,100 Texas cities to sign on to a federal lawsuit.

The details of the challenge are stated simply: These public officials claim the Texas Open Meetings Act unconstitutionally restricts their right of free speech under the First Amendment. Of course, they are free to say anything they wish to anyone they wish at any time they wish. However, when they are meeting as a quorum of a governmental body, they must say it in front of the public at an open meeting.

Even more importantly, the First Amendment cannot be a shield to prevent accountability of public officials but guarantees access to the workings of these governmental bodies just like it does to our courts.

TML wants criminal penalties such as jail time stripped from the law that has protected the public for more than four decades. They believe the current language is too punitive and argue "less restrictive penalties would not only continue to preserve the integrity of the Texas Open Meetings Act but would also recognize the fundamental right of city officials to

In other words, if public officials break the law in the future by conducting business in secret - i.e., exercising their rights to "free speech" behind closed doors, a slap on the wrist should be punishment

It simply defies logic and apparently not all of TML's own members agree with this position. As reported in The Brownsville Herald, Nov. 21, 2009, TML board member and Mercedes Mayor Joel Quintanilla said, "Either I misunderstood the entire meeting or something is happening. The way I understood it, we all (board members) voted in favor of keeping the restrictive penalties, not lessening them."

Quintanilla went on to say, "We didn't want elected officials to get comfortable."

He's not the only one apparently confused by TML's action. Mercedes Commissioner Ruben Guajardo is also quoted as saying, "The consensus (of the TML Resolutions Committee) was that things were fine the way they were (with the Texas Open Meetings Act) and that trying to reinvent the wheel was not in the best interest of everyone involved.


"We (the resolutions committee) felt that to change something (in the meetings act) was just not correct. It really wasn't right. The consensus was to leave the Texas Meetings Act the way it is."

I couldn't agree with Commissioner Guajardo or Mayor Quintanilla more. As a member of the public, I am left confused by what is happening and why. But I do know this. I don't want elected officials to get too comfortable either because I have seen firsthand what can happen if they do.

I hope you will join me in supporting the idea that the Open Meetings Act should be left intact and open government, without any strings attached, should continue to be the law in Texas. I also urge you to contact your city leaders and encourage them not to join in this effort that could weaken the Texas Open

If clarifications are needed to address modern day changes such as electronic and digital communications, then they should be made at the statehouse - not city hall. And, at a minimum, you should point out to your public servants that any discussion on this or any other issue involving "free speech" should be debated in a public meeting instead of a rubber-stamp style vote to please Austin lobbyists.

Open government is fundamental

Open government is fundamental to our democratic system, and essential for elected officials to be responsible and accountable to the people they serve.

Otherwise, politicians would be able to conduct business in secret and our government would be more rife with corruption, cronyism, and scandals.

Yet, the Texas Municipal League, a lobbying organization funded by taxpayer dollars from its 1,100 member cities, is continually trying to chip away at the public's right to know.

On Oct. 23, TML passed a resolution offered by the City of Sugar Land that seeks to pass a law that provides "less restrictive penalties that balance the First Amendment right of government officials" who violate the Texas Open Meetings Act.

Simply put, they want to take the teeth out of the Open Meetings Act and make it ineffective

The Open Meetings Act states that it's illegal if a member or members of a governmental body conspire to circumvent the law "by meeting in numbers less free speech." than a quorum for the purpose of secret deliberations."

An offense is punishable by a fine of \$100 to \$500 and/or confinement in

the county jail for one to six months.

The law's intent is to prevent government decisions from being made in secret. The penalties are necessary to prevent rogue elected officials from thumbing their nose at the statute. The reality is that there are only a handful of prosecutions under this statute, but the officials mind their P's and Q's. If there lars as well - outrageous. is nothing to hide, why disrupt the status

TML's resolution is disingenuous and duplicitous. It starts off by saying Texas cities support the Open Meetings Act, but its criminal penalties create an "unreasonable and possibly unconstitutional constraint on the ability of public officials to communicate with their colleagues regarding public matters outside of governmental meetings." This has never been a problem before, so why the sudden heartburn?

The resolution encourages "less restrictive penalties" that would preserve the integrity of the act and "recognize the fundamental right of city officials to

Stripping away the enforcement mechanism crucifies the integrity of the Act. TML is saying we need more government secrecy to protect free speech.

What tortured logic.

In the meantime, the cities of Alpine, Rockport, and Pflugerville aren't waiting on the Legislature. They're planning to file a lawsuit that seeks to declare the criminal penalties of the Open Meetings Act unconstitutional, and seeking other TML member cities to join in. This unspoken message is that it makes public lawsuit is being paid for by taxpayer dol-

> It stems from another lawsuit brought earlier this year, Rangra v. Brown, in which the Fifth Circuit Court of appeals dismissed a challenge to the Open Meetings Act.

Passed in 1973 after the infamous Sharpstown scandal, the Open Meetings Act has been successful in allowing more sun to shine on state and local government.

It would be a giant step backward for the courts or Legislature to weaken the act. What are the people at TML afraid of, anyway?

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

Whatever happened to 'do no harm'?

Back when he was running for president, Barack Obama promised that health-care reform would save the average family \$2,500 per year. That promise has long since been abandoned, but one might still expect that health-care reform won't leave the average American worse off.

Increasingly, it looks like that won't be the case. On Monday the Congressional Budget Office released a new report showing the Senate health bill would actually increase premiums by 10-13 percent for the millions of Americans who buy their insurance on their own. Those increases are over and above the increases that would occur if we did nothing. Today, an average insurance policy can cost about \$2,985 for an individual or \$6,328 for a family. Without reform, that cost is expected to rise to \$5,500 for an individual or \$13,100 for a family by 2016. But under the Senate bill, those premiums will increase to \$5,800 for an individual worker and \$15,200 for a family plan. In other words, the Senate bill would cost a typical family an extra \$2,100.

According to the CBO, those with employer-provided plans won't necessarily be paying more under the Senate bill, but they certainly won't be paying less, either. And even here, the bill will do nothing to restrain growing costs. Whether or not the bill passes, premiums for employer-provided family plans are expected to roughly double for small businesses by 2016.

This comes on top of the tax

increases contained in the bill. The Senate bill, for instance, has at least 15 new or increased taxes totaling more than \$493 billion. Those taxes include an increase in the payroll tax for individuals earning more than \$200,000 per year, a 5 percent tax on cosmetic surgery, taxes on health-care providers and medical-device manufacturers, and a 40 percent excise tax on so-called "Cadillac" insurance plans — that is, insurance plans that the government considers too generous. According to CBO, roughly 19 percent of workers would initially find their plans subject to the tax. However, because the tax threshold (plans with valued in excess of \$8,500 for an individual or \$23,000 for a family) is set to increase at a rate slower than medical inflation, as time goes by more and more savings. The reality is that the bill will middle-class workers will be hit by it.

Americans will pay more in still other ways. The Senate bill would require everyone to buy insurance plans that meet government-designed minimum requirements. This will force some people who are happy with their insurance to switch to more expensive plans, and failure to comply brings a penalty of up to \$6,750 for a family of four.

Another provision would mandate that employers provide insurance to their workers. If they fail to do so, and if even a single worker qualifies for federal subsidies, the employer could be fined up to \$750 per employee. The CBO estimates that those penalties will amount to more than \$28 billion. Unemployment is now 10.2 percent, and the Senate bill will make it more costly to hire workers.

And because the penalty only applies in the case of subsidy-eligible workers, it is low-wage and unskilled workers who will suffer the most. An earlier CBO report called into question claims that the Senate bill would reduce future budget deficits. Although CBO "scored" the bill as reducing the deficit by \$127 billion over the next ten years (which is about \$50 billion less than the deficit the government ran last month alone), even that tiny savings depends on budget gim-

spending. Any wagers on the chances of that actually happening? In fact, the CBO warned that it will be "difficult" to achieve the predicted likely end up adding to our already unsustainable debt.

President Obama is fond of saying that "we can't afford to do nothing" on health-care reform. Of course, no one really proposes doing nothing. Opponents of the proposed reforms actually support a wide range of alternatives that build on free markets and consumer control to reduce costs. Some of those reforms have been "scored" as substantially reducing premiums and avoiding new taxes.

Still, given the higher taxes, greater debt and, now, higher premiums under this bill, even "nothing" is looking better all the time.

Cholesterol-Lowing Drugs May Reduce Gallstones

According to a new study, statin-type cholesterol-lowering drugs, when used long term, appear to reduce the incidence of gallstone formation and possibly the need for gallbladder surgery. Results of the study appeared in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association. Researchers associated with the study report that protection appears to increase the longer these drugs are

The gallbladder is a small sac-like organ located just below the liver. It contains bile, a liquid involved with the digestion of fats. Stones or pellets can form when the bile contains too much cholesterol. The majority of gallstones are made up of hardened cholesterol. If enough stones accumulate, they can block the flow of bile from the liver. If they do not cause abdominal pain, they are called "silent stones". However, many people have pain the in the upper right abdomen, in the back between the shoulder blades, or under the right shoulder. If blockage of the bile duct continues, infection may result. Surgical removal of the gallbladder may become necessary.
