Dangerous dogs must be registered with the local animal control authority, and they must be restrained at all times on a leash or in a secure enclosure.

Owners of a dangerous dog must obtain liability insurance coverage or show financial responsibility in the amount of at least \$100,000 to cover damages that might be caused if the dog attacks.

# Aldermen table seal coat plan

Clarendon city officials tabled a resolution on a proposed street project last Tuesday after hearing from another engineering firm.

The Board of Aldermen had previously been considering a program from Oller Engineering of Lubbock and a possible \$10,000 plan to seal coat a few streets this year.

But Tuesday night the city's current engineer, Che Shadle of OJD Engineering, addressed the board and said the city already has a seal coat program in place and that it could partner with the college to get bids this year.

Some aldermen were disgruntled about the city's previous paving projects with Alderman Ann Huey calling one project "a disaster."

Alderman Kyle Davis also expressed reservations about the scope of the project outlined for this

"Ten thousand dollars isn't going to cover all the streets that need repairs for the seal coat project," Davis said. "I think we should wait until next year when we have more money to cover more streets."

No action was taken on the seal coat project. Aldermen will discuss the matter further at the next city


In other city business, the board heard a presentation from Tylan Shelton from RD, Inc., on wind energy. He asked the city to pay half the cost of a \$2,000 study for a possible 10 megawatt wind farm. The board took no action on this request.

City Administrator John Webb updated the board on job openings the city has. He was looking to fill one vacancy and said he would like to hire one more person since summer is approaching. The board set the dates for

aldermen and city employees to paint the interior of City Hall on the weekends of March 28 and April 4. Changing stated city meetings

to a monthly schedule was tabled for the time being.

During the board's comments section of the agenda, Alderman Davis said he was receiving several complaints about the water rate increase. Webb said he had received only a couple of complaints. The administrator also said that 56 percent of accounts did not change and that other accounts are now paying for what they use.

# In government we do not trust

President Barack Obama declared in his inaugural address that "our patchwork heritage is a strength" because people of all backgrounds and creeds had come together to make America great. But there was one group, Obama suggested, that wasn't quite welcome in the American family: the "cynics," those miserable killjoys who dare to "question the scale of [the federal government's] ambitions."

There, Obama echoed his 2008 opponent, John McCain, who has repeatedly warned that there's a specter haunting our country, in the form of a "pervasive public cynicism" toward government.

"Cynicism" is a scare word, meant to discredit those who cast a skeptical eye on politicians' grand designs. But Obama and McCain are right that distrust of government is on the rise.

For five decades, researchers at the University of Michigan have asked Americans "How much of the time do you think you can trust the government in Washington to do what is right?"

In the early 1960s, three-quarters of respondents answered "just about always" or "most of the time." After Vietnam and Watergate, Americans weren't quite so gullible, and the trust numbers never again reached their Kennedy/Johnson-era peak.

This month, Michigan's National Election Studies group released new survey data that reveals another decline: Only some 30 percent of Americans trust the feds most of the time or always, which is down sharply from trust's post-9/11 high.

When political trust declines, the D.C. cognoscenti typically wring their hands and hold earnest conferences at the Brookings Institution, exploring how best to restore the people's faith in their rulers.

But, as usual, the political elites have it precisely backwards. Declining trust in government is a good thing, something that Americans of every political stripe ought to celebrate.

Conservatives should welcome increasing skepticism toward federal power, because that skepticism makes ambitious federal programs much less likely to pass. Vanderbilt University's Marc Hetherington, one of America's leading scholars on the subject, writes that declining faith in the feds makes "another Great Society or New Frontier... unlikely in a post-Cold War world.

Professor Hetherington leans left, so he's not happy that the data has driven him to that conclusion. But even though increased political distrust presents major challenges for the Democratic agenda, liberals should recognize that there's a silver lining in the growing cloud of skepticism.

When Americans trust their government too readily, they tend to support policies that most liberals oppose. The post-9/11 period led to the greatest rise in olitical trust since Watergate, which helped George W. Bush make the case for what turned out to be a disastrous war in Iraq.

Professor Hetherington's research shows that declining trust decreases support for foreign-policy adventurism, and other scholars have shown that it also makes the public less likely to endorse restrictions on civil liberties.

In the '50s and '60s, high levels of political trust served as a presidential enabler, allowing unrestrained spying at home and unnecessary wars abroad. In 1971, just as Americans were beginning to wake up to the dangers of excessive trust in the federal government, the Watergate tapes captured an interesting exchange between Richard Nixon and his chief of staff, H.R.


The two were debating what to do about the impending release of the Pentagon Papers, a classified history of the Vietnam War that documented a host of government lies. Haldeman warned Nixon that the release would undermine the public's belief in "the implicit infallibility of presidents, which has been an accepted thing in America," and reveal that "people do things the President wants to do even though it's wrong, and the President can be wrong."

No American today could pronounce that phrase, "the implicit infallibility of presidents," without a smirk, and we should be very glad about that. Our

Founding Fathers knew that no man was infallible. With that insight in mind, they designed a constitution that would prevent any one man, or body of men, from seizing unchecked power. Today's politicians and pundits may lament rising political distrust, but when the voters refuse to take claims of federal benevolence on faith, they're honoring their forefathers and fulfilling their duty as citizens.

What, after all, could be more American than distrust of government?



Here in Texas, a recent string of suicides within one Recruiting Battalion prompted me to take action. Since 2001, the Army's Houston Recruiting Battalion has lost four Army recruiters to suicide; all were combat veterans. After learning of these tragedies, I expressed my serious concern to Army Secretary Pete Geren and called for an in-depth investigation. Shortly thereafter, Secretary Geren directed Brigadier General Frank Turner to lead a far-reaching Army probe into the suicides. Last month, I visited a recruiting station in Houston to meet with recruiters from this battalion and hear from them directly about their recruiting experiences and daily challenges. BG Turner joined me and updated me on actions taken by the Army as a result of his investigation.

The Army has taken several steps to improve the environment within the Houston Recruiting Battalion and

implement suicide prevention measures to address problems uncovered by BG Turner's investigation. Sadly, the rising trend of suicides is not limited to this unit; it has become a serious problem Army-wide. Having asked the leadership of the Senate Armed Services Committee to host a hearing to examine this recent trend, I was pleased when the Committee recently announced it will hold a hearing March 18 on the issue of recruiter suicides, as well as the broader mental health issues facing our military. I will be participating in this hearing to tell the story of these fallen recruiters, as well as to help shed light on the alarming rate of soldier suicides, find solutions, and provide additional support to our troops and their families.

On my part, I will also continue to look for ways to dedicate additional federal resources and attention to research and treatment of the complex mental health conditions affecting our service members. I was pleased to support the Dignified Treatment of Wounded Warrior Act, which was signed into law last year. This new law takes several steps to improve the health care and benefits for recovering veterans, troops, and their families. Of note are provisions that expand the treatment and research for traumatic brain injuries, post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic eye injuries, along with a guarantee that combat veterans who request mental health evaluations receive them within 30 days of their request.

While the military and the Department of Veterans Affairs have made significant strides in identifying the "invisible wounds of war," we can do better. We need to reach out to our wounded warriors and ensure they have the proper care to make a full recovery.

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



Volunteer fire fighters protect more than 27,000 square miles in the Texas Panhandle. Often those men and women serving their communities through volunteer fire and rescue departments have to pay out of their own pockets for training. These volunteers leave jobs and families when they stand up to protect their friends, neighbors, and communities' resources.

On March 12, 2006, when two devastating wildfires destroyed more than 900,000 acres of the Texas Panhandle, the largest wildfires in recorded Texas history, the Panhandle suffered a tremendous emotional and financial loss.

Advantages of a 5-in-1 Children's Vaccine

A recent study published in the Pediatric Infectious Disease Journal reveals that 5-in-1 combination vaccines may increase the number of children receiving vaccines in a timely manner, while decreasing the number of shots for protection against potentially deadly diseases. The socalled 5-in-1 vaccine is designed to protect against five different diseases: hepatitis B, polio, diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis (whooping cough). It is estimated that only 26% of children in the United States receive their vaccinations on schedule. This increases the chance that children might become infected with one of these easily preventable conditions.

In the study, 2880 children were administered a 5-in-1 vaccine. The results of the vaccination were compared to 2672 children who lived in the same state who received a typical vaccination schedule. It was found that children receiving the new combination vaccination were more likely to receive their vaccinations on time. Additionally, children who got the 5-in-1 vaccine received 30% fewer shots than children receiving other vaccination schedules.



She was preceded in death by her parents; and a sister, Margie Montgomery.


