New hours for dump

The County Dump is located on County Road T east of Hwy. 70 South.

Attendant David Sharp will be available during these hours to help county residents unload their trash into the BFI roll-off box.

Residents are reminded that all chemical containers must be steam-cleaned before dumping. All tires must be quartered. No building materials over four feet long and no composition shingles are allowed.

The County Dump is available for rural county residents only.

Jobless figures fall

Donley County's unemployment rate for August fell to 4.6 percent as the number of people looking for work dropped to 77.

The seasonally unadjusted data from the Texas Workforce Commission showed a local workforce of 1,686 with 1,609 people employed.

The size of the workforce was higher in July at 1,780, and the unemployment rate was higher also at 5.3 percent and 94 people looking for work.


One year ago, Donley County had an unemployment rate of 5.2 percent with 95 people looking for work out of a workforce of 1,811.

Statewide, the seasonallyadjusted unemployment rate fell to 4.2 percent in August, down from last month's 4.4 percent, and down from 4.9 percent a year

County okays budget

Donley County Commissioners approved a \$1.95 million budget for the coming fiscal year September 20.

Commissioners also adopted ad valorem tax rate of \$0.4253 per \$100 valuation and a debt rate of \$0.085914 per \$100 valuation. The rates will increase taxes on a \$100,000 home by \$22.72 per year, commissioners said.

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Has the time come to sell nursing home?

They say that history repeats itself, but lately it seems as though we've been thrown back to the 1990s. Hillary Clinton is trying to take over America's health care, O.J. is in trouble with the law, and now the Donley County Hospital Board wants to sell the Medical Center Nursing Home.

We've been through all this before, but there are,

of course, modern twists on these old stories. Hillary is now "consumer friendly," or so we're told. O.J. at least didn't kill anybody this time. And the hospital board may actually have the support of the people in their present endeavor. Or at the very least, they don't have commentary any organized opposition to selling MCNH.



Which begs the question: Why is this time differ-

The answer is unclear. Either the people just don't care, which is doubtful, or people are in favor of it.

The hospital board has put in a pretty good effort to communicate what they want to do. Last summer's town hall meeting was very well attended, and hospital district officials explained in clear language what challenges the nursing home would face in the next few years. There were some suggestions from the audience that night, and those were acted upon. The chief suggestion was to have an outside analysis done on the nursing home. The results of which seemed to confirm what the board had already learned - that the nursing home would need to be expanded to stay competitive.

In a nutshell, the problems facing MCNH are as follows: Texas ranks near the bottom of the 50 states in terms of funding for Medicaid beds in nursing homes, a large number of MCNH residents only need assisted living type services and therefore receive the lowest Medicaid reimbursement, and half of the hospital district's property tax revenue goes toward bonded

Add to that rising expenses - the increase in the federal minimum wage will cost MCNH at least \$45,000 to \$50,000 per year - and the ever increasing difficulty of paying competitive wages, especially when the district can't afford to provide employees with health insurance.

Everything is working fine the way it is now, district officials tell us. But as we go further into the future and these trends continue, the nursing home becomes more costly to operate.

If the taxpayers of Donley County want to keep their ownership of the nursing home, several things would have to happen. The facility would have to be expanded to accommodate more residents, which is already in the works, and taxes would have to be increased. How much is unclear, but MCNH officials say it would be very significant. And these measures may only kick the ball down the road five or six years.

Of course, the state could do much to fix this problem by increasing the funding it provides for Medicaid beds. We don't have to be number one in the 50 states, but we could at least catch up with New

The likelihood of that happening, however, is almost zero given our present leadership in Austin. An administration that cuts the legs out from under community colleges probably doesn't care much about nursing homes either.

Not everything is different about this sale effort though. From talking to Board President Alan Fletcher this week, the ultimate goal is the abolishment of the hospital district. Sell the nursing home, get the city or the county to take over the ambulance service, and then go through the process of ending the hospital district.

That seems to be a bad idea. Regardless of the fate of the nursing home, the hospital district should continue to exist with its primary focus being the operation of emergency medical services and offering whatever incentives it can to attract other medical services to Donley County.

The district's enabling legislation gives it a laundry list of services and facilities it can provide or operate. And while the people of Donley County may not be ready to utilize those powers now, it's always nice to have options. This community is on the path of growth, and it needs every option possible available when the time comes.

But that's the future. What about right now? What should happen to the nursing home and its huge payroll? The taxpayers of Donley County need to understand what's at stake, and they need to be okay with the sale of the nursing home. They've paid for it; they deserve to know what's going to happen to it.

Hospital board members say they haven't gotten much feedback on this issue, and they say they have received no negative feedback whatsoever. Is that tacit approval from the voters, or is that apathy?

Iraq course must include winning

Our mission in Iraq is among the most important in our nation's history. As the central front in the Global War on Terror, Iraq is where the forces of freedom, tolerance, and democracy are fighting to defeat the tyranny and oppression of Al-Qaeda and radical Islam. We know from our troops in the field that if we allow the terrorists to win in Iraq, they will surely follow us home. This war has been costly for America in both lives and dollars, but the consequences of failure would be catastrophic.


On September 10th, Congress received a revealing report from General David Petraeus, commanding officer of the international coalition in Iraq. Gen. Petraeus led the 101st Airborne with distinction and served in Iraq for three years before he was unanimously confirmed to this position by the U.S. Senate. His report detailed encouraging signs of progress and offered clear, achievable goals.

But, as our military success continues, we will increasingly rely on Iraqi political leaders who have thus far failed to make adequate progress.

Earlier this year, our generals on the ground proposed, and President Bush approved, a surge of 30,000 troops deployed to Iraq. These expanded forces shipped out with the objective to stabilize Baghdad and embattled regions and return home. As Gen. Petraeus reported, he is now able to recommend a draw down of the surge because conditions on the ground merit such action.

For example, Al-Anbar was once an Al-Qaeda stronghold. Thanks to the renewed focus of the surge and coopera-

tion with local sheiks, progress in this province is reported to be remarkable. Young Iraqis, once disillusioned and eager to join

now enlisting in the national army. In Baghdad, the number of violent civilian deaths has fallen by 80 percent, and nationwide, car bombings are down 50 percent. As Gen. Despite clear progress, some of my Senate colleagues continue to disregard the advice of our military leaders and call for precipitous withdrawal of our entire force. We've seen many challenges in Iraq, and mistakes have been made; but our goal of a stable Iraq that can be an ally in the Global War on Terror must not be diminished. We cannot endanger American security because of political expediency. Instead, we can now keep our commitments with fewer American forces because the surge provided a safer environment for the training of Iraqi troops. President Bush recently announced that 5,700 American service members should be home by Christmas and tens of thousands more

While the security improvements are apparent, more must be done to achieve long-term political reconciliation. The U.S. Ambassador to Iraq, Ryan Crocker, also testified last week and described a somewhat fractured and ineffective Iraqi government. As we aid in the establishment of stable leadership, we must recognize the cultural and sectarian divisions that have existed in Iraq for 14 centuries.

We should allow Iraqis to create semi-autonomous federal regions, sharing in national oil revenues, and each responsible for local law enforcement, commerce, security and education. Such a solution helped to stem the tide of violence in the Balkans in the 1990s and would facilitate peace in Iraq. We should also expect more constructive involvement from neighboring countries in the region, which have a large stake in a stable Iraq.

Whatever course our continued progress in Iraq takes, it must not include abandonment of our principles nor disregard for the gains already made by our armed forces. Our Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, and Coast Guards have sacrificed greatly to keep us safe and free, and we must support them as they complete their mission. Although some may call for surrender, I remain dedicated to winning the Global War on Terror so that future generations may experience the same freedom past generations gave to us.

Drugs in the News


Some AIDS Drugs Show Promise Against Cancer

Researchers at the National Cancer Institute have evaluated prescription drugs for AIDS called protease inhibitors as to their ability to work against different types of cancer. These particular drugs were chosen because of their effect on a protein that is involved with many types of cancer. In the medical journal Clinical Cancer Research, these scientists report the results of their evaluation in test animals. Of the six protease inhibitors studied, three inhibited cancer cell growth. According to a Reuters report, the scientists have started a clinical trial in humans that will involve Viracept (nelfinavir), one of the protease inbibitors that performed well in the test animal trials.

Other protease inhibitors include Agenerase, Lexiva, Crixivan, Kaletra, Norvir, and Fortovase. They all block an enzyme in the body called protease. This enzyme is responsible for producing long protein strands that are need to assemble new viruses. When the enzyme is blocked by these drugs, new virus particles cannot mature. In such instances the HIV (human immunodeficiency virus) cannot infect new
