Don't muzzle free speech on the radio

First Amendment Center founder

In celebrating the eloquence and essential truths in our Declaration of Independence this month, we should remember that our national leaders were politicians - not always idealistic and straight.

Throughout history our politicians have demonstrated a penchant for passing laws and promoting policies with seductive, but deviously misleading, titles.

So it was a couple decades after Independence that the fifth Congress enacted the "Sedition Act of 1798." It had nothing to do with punishing sedition. It was intended only to muzzle newspaper publishers who were chronically critical of President John

So it is again in 2007 when members of the 110th Congress talk of enacting "Fairness Doctrine" legislation. It has nothing to do with fairness. It is intended only to muzzle right-wing talk-radio hosts who are chronically critical of Democrats in Congress.

Rush Limbaugh, Sean Hannity, and Michael Savage are the targeted, unfair poster-boys-of-the-airways whose syndicated programs have stimulated a sudden surge of congressional interest in forcing "fairness" on talk radio.

This concept of a "Fairness Doctrine" is a flawed federal policy relic from early days of radio when the Federal Communications Commission decided to force broadcast owners to air opposing viewpoints.

From the day it was implemented, enforced FCC "fairness" violated the free-speech rights of broadcasters. It took the FCC more than 50 years before it officially killed the doctrine in 1987, acknowledging that enforced "fairness" was "unconstitutional on its face."

For more than a half century, then, the commission, Congress and the federal courts deprived broadcasters the rights of free expression that newspaper owners had enjoyed since 1800 - the year the original

As Independence Day approached, a study - startling in its findings - was released by the Center for American Progress asserting that 91 percent of talkshow programming was "conservative." The study found only 9 percent to be liberal - or "progressive," to use the word the center prefers.

Since the study came out, three influential Democratic senators, Dick Durbin of Illinois, Dianne Feinstein of California and John Kerry of Massachusetts, have expressed favor for Fairness Doctrine legislation.

Durbin said: "I have this old-fashioned attitude that when Americans hear both sides ... they're in a better position to make a decision. Feinstein and Kerry expressed similar views, shared widely among Democrats in both congressional houses. Congressman Maurice Hinchey, a New York Democrat, has said he will soon reintroduce a bill mis-titled the "Media Ownership Reform Act" that will include a mandate reestablishing the Fairness Doctrine.

Even as support for fairness seemed to be building, a majority of House members took a wiser course, voting last week to bar the FCC from using any taxpayer dollars to reinstitute the doctrine.

The idea of any agency of government deciding what is "fair" in the news media is silly on its face, as well as unconstitutional. It makes no sense. Can anybody imagine a "fairness" decision adjudicated by the Clinton-Gore administration that would be judged "fair" by the Bush-Cheney presidency? And a commission selected to reflect the political "fairness" of both administrations would be in a food fight before the table was set for its inaugural luncheon.

It is difficult to grasp what there is about the Limbaugh-Hannity-Savage syndrome that so frightens Democrats. Despite the rants of Rush and the railing of Sean, Democrats won both houses of Congress in

Despite their blasts at Bill Clinton during eight years in office that included the Lewinsky scandal, he left the presidency with approval ratings more than double those of the present conservative incumbent.

Despite constant attacks on Al Gore by Rush and Sean in 2000, the then-vice president clearly won the popular vote for president. The Supreme Court, not talk radio, put George Bush in the White House. And Gore's approval ratings today, despite continuing right-wing radio needling, more than triple those of the

Yes, Sean and Rush have large and loyal audiences. They may vote just as Rush and Sean recommend. But most folks in our media-saturated world, with a multiplicity of sources of information, are uninfluenced by right-wing radio.

As David Obey, the Democratic congressman from Wisconsin, said, "Rush and Sean are just about as important in the scheme of things as Paris Hilton."

Were Congressman James Madison, the father of the First Amendment, around today, I suspect he would tell folks who want to hush Rush and silence Sean simply to reach out and turn the dial.

He also would remind them of his own old-fashioned idea, enunciated in the First Amendment. It begins with the words: "Congress shall make no law..."

AC president: Time to write to governor

In his recent newspaper editorial, Governor Perry said, "community colleges are an essential contributor to the state's future." While it's encouraging to read his words - his veto of \$154 million in community college funding suggests otherwise. of the future. More than half of all high It is unfortunate that the Governor's staff has given him bad advice.

As a result, local taxpayers will pay twice - once to fund their fair share of college costs and a second time to cover more of the State's obligation to the colleges. The Governor must acknowledge and correct this mistake. Until he does, his words about how much he values community colleges mean little.

In the sixties, state leaders expanded the Texas community college system to promote economic development. The agreement was simple. The state agreed to fund 100 percent of the instructional costs at community colleges if local taxpayers would pay for building, equipping, and maintaining college facilities.

Local taxpayers do their part. But the State has never fully met its obligation. Community colleges, on average, receive about half what the state promised.

How does this affect communities? In the short run, our colleges may be able to absorb some costs, delay some projects, and postpone higher tuition. But, if this veto stands, it will ultimately shift more of the state's responsibility to local taxpayers

This funding cut will jeopardize important programs and services at our colleges. Your nurse, paramedic, firefighter, x-ray or lab technician, dental hygienist,

community colleges. Each year, our colleges produce thousands of graduates and trains tens of thousands more in skills that are vital to the life of the region.

Our colleges train the Texas workforce school graduates who go to college start at a community college.

But the Governor's action hurts in other ways too! The accusation of fraud deeply offends every employee, alumnus, supporter and business partner of our col-

The community colleges have done nothing wrong - a fact underlined by members of the state legislature. Just this week, Senator Judith Zaffirini, Chair of the Senate Higher Education Committee, and a member of the Legislative Budget Board said, "This unwarranted and unexpected veto will not only strain community college resources, the grim reality is that to make up for this lost funding, they will have to raise local property taxes, increase tuition, reduce services, or sadly, do all

She added, "Even more shocking is the governor's veto message accusing the community colleges of falsifying their appropriations requests. Having attended every budget hearing, I know that community college officials submitted full and accurate information in their budget requests. That the governor would accuse them of falsehood is beyond comprehen-

She went on to explain, "The Legislature, in good faith, chose to fully fund community college employee benefits with that community colleges are under-funded and over-burdened."














Texas public servants need some fairness

Imagine sitting around the kitchen table with your spouse, planning for a well-deserved retirement, only to learn that your monthly Social Security benefits will be hundreds of dollars less than expected. Unfortunately, this nightmare is experienced by many of our state's teachers, police officers, firefighters and other public servants due to a bureaucratic rule that causes Social Security to report erroneous projected benefits and arbitrarily reduce their benefits. To prevent this, I have introduced legislation that protects the retirement savings of our hardest working public servants and ensures that they are not caught off guard by unfair regulations.

Instead of paying into the Social Security system, many state employees and public servants contribute to a non-Social Security plan such as the Teacher Retirement System of Texas or a firefighters' pension fund. When they retire, they receive benefits from these plans rather than from Social Security.

But difficulty can arise for Texans who spend part of their career as public servants not eligible for Social Security, and another part of their career in a Social Security covered job. When the Social Security Administration (SSA) attempts to estimate future benefits for a person with this type of career history, it does not know that they will be receiving pension payments from a public sector retirement plan. As a result, the SSA over-estimates the monthly amount this person is eligible to receive in Social Security benefits, and passes the incorrect estimate on to them to use when planning for their retirement. It is only when these retirees actually apply for benefits that the SSA "corrects" its mistake and reduces the amount of their monthly Social Security check using a rule called the Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP).

After many years of saving, planning

and trusting that the government will provide what it promised, too many Texans affected by the WEP are left holding the bag. The amount that a person's Social Security is reduced due to the WEP is



arbitrarily decided by the SSA and may not properly reflect the amount of Social Security the person has earned. And, contrary to its original purpose, the WEP tends to have the most negative impact on people with lower incomes.

Congressman Kevin Brady and I have introduced the Public Servant Retirement Protection Act of 2007 to amend the WEP and ensure that Texas' public servants are not undermined by discriminatory Social

Security formulas. Estimated benefits statements produced by the SSA should not mislead Texans about the amount they have paid into the Social Security system, and the amount they can realistically expect to receive in return.

The difficulty many Texans have with the WEP and other regulations reflects broader problems with our nation's Social Security system. It is a 1930s government program that needs major reforms to remain viable in the 21st Century. Millions of Texans depend on it in their retirement years, and trust the federal government to give them accurate information about their benefits. I am committed to keeping our promises to today's seniors and the hardworking Americans who will rely on this safety net in the future. Social Security reform is long overdue, and I will continue to work toward a lasting, bipartisan and comprehensive solution.

Drugs in the News

New Drug Approved for Sleep Problems

The FDA recently approved a new oral drug for three conditions associated with excessive sleepiness in adults. The drug is Nuvigil armodafinil), a slightly modified version of Provigil (modafinil), another sleep disorder medicine. Conditions for which Nuvigil may be used include excessive sleepiness associated with narcolepsy, shift work, and obstructive sleep apnea. The drug targets the sleep area of the brain and is considered safer than stimulant-type drugs, such as amphetamines, that are sometimes used for these same conditions. According to news reports, when the drug becomes available in the US, which could be up to 3 years away, it will be provided in 3 strengths to make use of the drug easier in all these conditions. In addition, the company that makes Nuvigil says it plans to study its use in other conditions such as bipolar disorder and for sleepiness in persons with Parkinson's disease.

For persons with shift work sleep disorder, it will be recommended that Nuvigil be given once daily about an hour before the start of the work shift. It is not taken during sleep hours, nor is it intended as a replacement for sleep.






