It said the action was necessary to head off speculative price boots caused by the tremendous demand generated by canned goods rationing.

> Effective this past Tuesday, no distributor of those vegetables were allowed to sell at a higher points allowed for March. price than he did in the five days between last Thursday and Monday of this week, Feb. 18 to 22. The surprise price action applied to all dealers except the grower.

Here are the facts on the food rationing sign-up:

Register at the College building or your nearest rural school any time today, Friday or Saturday, but it is requested that you not wait until the last minute.

Take along a filled in customer's declaration form (declaring the food, which is to be rationed, on hand). Clip this from the Leader, fill it out and take it with you, but do not sign it until the registrar asks you to sign it.

Take along your No. 1 ration book. If you don't have one, apply for it at the rationing office.


