YOUR 1942 TAXES ARE NOW DUE AND MUST BE PAID ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31, 1943, TO AVOID PENALTY.

We respectfully ask those taxpayers, who can and will to pay their taxes as early as possible to avoid the last minute rush. We, like many businesses are shorthanded, and we will be unable to get as much office help as we need for the tax-paying rush that usually comes the last week of January.

Both men and women are required to pay a poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of. Those who are 60 years of age or more are not required to pay a poll tax and are not required to have an exemption to vote: those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1942, are required to have an exemption: those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1942 or will become of age during 1943 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January 1943, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year: no charge is made for exemption certificates.

When you come in to pay your taxes - - - also give us a rendition of your property for next year's taxes. Due to gasoline rationing and the rubber conservation program, we will be unable to call on you as we have in the past. Please lend us your cooperation in this matter.



All holders of "B", "C" and Supplemental "D" Ration Books must have inspections every two months, with inspections at least 30 days apart.



As usual, I don't know anything about what we are allowed to say in letters, so I don't suppose I should say much about the trip down, except that it was much more uncomofrtable than the trip across. However, we all survived execpt one of our Staff Sergeants, who is in the hospital with a damaged knee-cap which was the result of the ship lurching violently in a storm.

We are not permanently settled yet, so I don't know what kind of accomodations we will have, but for the present we at least have a roof over our heads.

The climate is not quite what I expected, for it gets terribly cold at night and doesn't get very warm in the daytime unless the sun happens to be out,-and this is the rainy season. However, it is much better than England, for when the sun does shine, there is plenty of heat in it. It reminds me very much of the climate of San Francisco, or Mexico City.

The one really marvelous thing about the place is the abundance of oranges and tangerines. They aren't much cheaper than in the states, for the natives are probably making small fortunes on them, but they are so convenient and plentiful that we eat them by the dozen. We, of course, didn't see an orange while in England, so we're having a field day on them now. There is absolutely nothing else to spend money on. That reminds me that I haven't been able to have my allotment made out yet that I mentioned in my last letter,-and I probably won't be able to until we get settled. If I get too much money on hand, I'll send a money order. I sent a Christmas cable from here today, but if you received it, there was probably no indication on it that it came from here rather than from England. They say that regular air-mail

Ration Books War Ration Book No. 1-Used for sugar and coffee, will be required to obtain book No. 2 soon. Those not having Book No. 1 may obtain them from the local ration board until Jan. 15, 1943. War Ration Book No. 2-To be

issued soon, will provide for rationing on a "point system."

Mileage Ration Books-Books, A, B, and C used for passenger car gasoline; E and R books, for non-highway uses; D, for motorcycles: T for trucks and commercial vehicles.

### **Rationed Food Commodities** Sugar-Stamp No. 10 in Book No. 1 good for 3 pounds until mid-

night, Jan. 31, 1943. Coffee-Stamp No. 28 in Book No. 1 (for those 15 or older) good for 1 pound until midnight February 7, 1943.

Meat-Voluntary share-the-meat program sets limit at 21/2 pounds per person per week. Meat will be rationed under the "point system" after Book No. 2 is distributed.

Mileage Rationing Gasoline-Value of each coupon in A, B, and C Books is 4 gallons. First 8 coupons in A Book are good until midnight Jan. 21, 1943. Those who think they are eligible

Deadlines for first tire inspectors in the mileage rationing program are January 15 for commercial vehicles and January 31 for passenger cars.

District officials urged motorists to avoid unnecessary rush at the end of the month by getting inspections immediately. Officially designated OPA inspectors are located in every community. Neither gasoline ration books nor tires will be issued in the future to motorists who do not heed the inspection deadline. Other dates were listed as fol-

lows: Jan. 21-Last date for using No. 3 coupons in "A" mileage rationing books. No. 4 coupons will become valid Jan. 22. Jan. 31-Last date for issuance of temporary "T" coupons directly

by county boards. Beginning Feb. 1, "T" rations will be issued on the basis of ODT certificates of war necessity; last date for obtaining three pounds of sugar with coupon No. 10 in war ration book one. Feb. 7-Last date for obtaining one pound of coffee with Stamp No. 28, which became valid January 4th.
