## Raymond Hay Killed CEILING PRICE C-C Organization Meeting Set **In Airplane Crash**

Second Lieut. Raymond Hay of Clarendon, was one of ten Killed In Plane Crash been ordered in a new regulation of the Clarendon Chamber of a cold wave sent the mercury airmen killed in the crash of an army heavy bomber ten miles southwest of Boise, Idaho, late Friday night.

Notice of his death was received Saturday night by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Hay of this city.

Funeral services will be held Friday afternoon at 3:30, at the Baptist Chruch, with Rev. E. L. Moody conducting the service. Lieut. Hay, who was 21 years old, had been reared in Clarendon and was a graduate of the Clarendon High School. He entered the Army Air Forces nearly eight months ago. His father has been connected with the Greene Dry Goods Company at Clarendon for a number of years.

Raymond was a member of the local Baptist Church, having been baptized several years ago.

Here is a calendar of dates and deadlines in the war rationing program which have been set by the Office of Price Administratoin and the Office of Defense Transportation:

Jan. 21 (midnight) - No. 3 coupons (first page) of "A" gasoline ration books expire.

Jan. 22 (12:01 a. m.)-No. 4 coupons (second page) of "A" gasoline ration books become valid. Good until midnight March 21. Value of each No. 4 coupons has not yet been announced.

Jan. 31-Final date for issuance and use of temporary transport gasoline rations for trucks and commercial vehicles. Owners of such vehicles should have certificates of war necessity from ODT by that

Jan. 31-Sugar stamp No. 10 in War Ration Book No. 1 (good for three pounds) ex-

Feb. 1-Sugar stamp No. 11 becomes valid. Good for three pounds until March 15.

Feb. 5 - Final registration day for institutional users for their February allotment of

Feb. 7-Coffee stamp No. 28 in War Ration Book No. 1 (for those 15 years old or over on date the book was issued) expires. Good for one pound until

## COLD WEATHER FOOD RATIONING **PLANS OUTLINED FOR FIRST TIME**

The Office of Price Administration for the first time revealed details of the general food rationing program, expected to begin before the end of February. How the program will operate was explained by Kenneth E. Stauffer, chief of the OPA's processed food division. He spoke Tuesday before retail and wholesale grocers from nine Midwestern states at the first of several regional meetings to acquaint the food industry with the program.

### **Price Control Set** On Used Farm **Machines**

Lubbock, Jan. 12-In a move designed to relieve farmers from paying excessive prices for five kinds of used farm machines, the Office of Price Administration has placed price controls on all sales of the used machines made by dealers, auctioneers or farmers themselves, the Lubbock district office has been notified.

Machines covered are farm tractors, except crawler tractors, combines, corn pickers, corn binders, and motor or tractor operated hay

Some reports have reached the Lubbock district office of sales of ancient used equipment in West Texas at prices higher than the ceilings for new equipment. The new control will aid farm-

ers who are trying to maintain their production of crops despite serious manpower shortages, district officials said.

A National OPA study of prices at farm auctions showed some instances where sellers obtained as much as 100 per cent profit for equipment several years old.

The control measure specifies that private owners and auctioneers may not sell used tractors combines, corn pickers, corn bindother distributors of gasoline, exers and hay balers less than one year old for more than 85 per cent of the base price, and not more than 70 per cent of the base price for such machines more than one year old. 

high school and must be between 18 and 21 years old. For the advanced course he must have had For specialized training for the

Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, the applicant must have completed high school and must be from 17 to 19 years old. Successful candidates will be placed on active duty and assigned to designated colleges and universi-

The Army and Navy will contract with selected colleges and ialized training.

Detailed plans have been worked out by both Army and Navy as well as plans for the proper induction of these men into the service at the conclusion of this intensive training.

YOUR 1942 TAXES ARE NOW DUE AND MUST BE PAID ON OR BEFORE JANUARY 31, 1943, TO AVOID PENALTY.

We respectfully ask those taxpayers, who can and will to pay their taxes as early as possible to avoid the last minute rush. We, like many businesses are shorthanded, and we will be unable to get as much office help as we need for the tax-paying rush that usually comes the last week of January.

Both men and women are required to pay a poll tax. Unpaid poll taxes are a lien upon any real or personal property you may own, or come into possession of. Those who are 60 years of age or more are not required to pay a poll tax and are not required to have an exemption to vote; those who have moved into the county since January 1, 1942, are required to have an exemption; those who have become 21 years of age since January 1, 1942 or will become of age during 1943 are required to secure an exemption certificate during January 1943, before they may vote in any of the elections during the year: no charge is made for exemption certificates.

When you come in to pay your taxes - - - also give us a rendition of your property for next year's taxes. Due to gasoline rationing and the rubber conservation program, we will be unable to call on you as we have in the past. Please lend us your cooperation in this matter.

> Good dairy cows need to rest. but they won't lie down in mud unless they are exhausted. Exhaustion lowers milk production about as much as wet and cold do. To assure dryness the floor should be of sand, gravel or shell. Keep the gutter open.

Since each letter appears on four stamps, and since three letters may be used, a total of 12 stamps may be spent during each ration period.

One of the four stamps under each letter has a figure 8, one has a 5, and one has a 2 and one has a 1. Thus, with three letters in each ration period, the consumer will have three 1-point stamps, three 5's, three 2's and three 1's. This is a total of 48 points per ration period per consumer.

During the week sales are frozen, the OPA will announce the ed items. Abundant foods will be assigned lesser value in points. Scarce foods will be assigned greater value in points.

The point values of the rationed goods will be announced in the newspapers and will be posted in grocery stores.

## 4-H Club Boys Are **Contributing To Food Output**

County agent H. M. Breedlove says that Texas 4-H Club boys in 1942 produced and sold livestock and livestock products, and poultry and eggs valued at more than \$1,000,000. The actual amount received for the beef calves, swine, sheep, goats, wool, mohair, poultry and eggs they marketed was \$1,099,514.15.

Swine ranked second to beef calves both in weight and value. A total of 14,249 pigs, weighing 2,594,316 pounds went to market and sold for \$334,203.58.

In order of value, the boys sold \$29,123.16 worth of poultry; 535,-152 dozen of eggs for \$150,935.33; 4,706 sheep for \$50,361.02; 47,556 pounds of wool for \$18,005.38; 271 dairy cattle for \$19,604.49, and 4,-074 pounds of mohair for \$1,-

The boys exhibited 2,844 beef calves, 3,874 swine, 3,061 sheep, 1,828 poultry, 66 dairy animals and 175 goats. They shipped 1,917 sheep, 1,139 swine and 910 beef calves, and the gross returns therefrom was \$156,687.95.
