





HANDI THE THREAT OF REGULATION

Most of us feel secure in this country because it is our impression that the laws of the land are written for us by our duly accredited representatives in Congress. Anyone who is satisfied in this belief is likely to receive a severe jolt upon examination of the actual facts in the case.

For, as a matter of truth, an increasing number of the regulations and edicts in force in the United States today are the product of special bureaus, boards, and commissions not directly responsible to fully. the public.

Of course, no one denies the need for a certain amount of ad- the Pacific. ministrative law. But it must be used wisely if the processes of democracy are not to suffer harm, and the vast growth of quasi-judicial and quasi-official agencies can be a serious matter indeed if this truth is not remembered. tion of 70 to 80 octane gasoline.

Part of the trouble to be found with this type of "law" arises from the fact that much of the legislation being administered by the bodies in question has been loosely defined. An outstanding example the next decade that fits this particular situation is to be found in the case of the National Labor Relations Act and Board, in which the cases of Board bias that have been so abundantly spread on the record have been and new tank car business. made possible by deficiencies or one-sidedness in the Wagner Act itself.

Back in 1937, when a special government committee was appointed to study the field in question, it was found that about 130 regulatory agencies were in existence, and the Judiciary Committee of the House of Representatives was moved to comment: "It is practically impossible for a member of Congress, much less for an individual citizen, to find his way among these many agencies or to locate the particular officer or employee in any of the agencies with whom any particular officer the waste liquors of the paper industry. or employee in any of the agencies with whom any particular problem should be discussed with a view to settlement. bodies has probably grown since that time. Major measures now before Congress designed to eliminate certain of these abuses deserve the careful consideration of all citizens. The Walter-Logan Bills, for instance, now pending in Washington, would provide for judicial review of the decisions of these agencies. Experiments in various states faced with the same problem, such as Rhode Island, are worth observing. And the main point of all is surely to remember that when individuals, no matter how well-meaning, are given the unlimited power of "final say," the processes of representative democracy are likely to go "out the window."





AUSTIN, -- Practically all of the 20,000 quail which the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission will distribute this year have been planted in practically every section of the state, it is announced by the executive secretary of the Game Department. The birds are obtained from Mexico where they are trapped and are shipped to sportsmen and other persons interested enough in restocking their places with quail to pay half of the cost of the birds.

The policy of distributing quail on this basis has been followed by the Texas Department for several years. In addition, the Department is planting several thousand birds this year on quail restoration areas which are being set up in various parts of the state with the aid of federal Pittman-Robertson funds. More than fifty of these areas have already been established by the Division of Wildlife Restoration of the game department and as many more will be completed by the end of the year.

Many of the quail demonstration areas need not be restocked due to the fact there are a small number of birds on these areas to stock considerable countryside.

Mexican quail, which are used by several states for restocking purposes, are moving through Texas now. It is estimated by the Uvalde Leader-News that more than 100,000 will be sent through the ports of Laredo, Del Rio and Eagle Pass. Of this number the Texas Game Department gets 20,000 and was able to purchase them, by obtaining bids, at the lowest price in history of game distribution. The birds were purchased for 69 cents each by Texas. Other states are paying as much as \$1.30 per bird.
