



#### IT'S TIME TO TAKE A LITTLE THOUGHT

. Most Americans have been slow to give much credence to the evidence that has been piling up for two years on the presence of communism, nazism and facism right here in our own nation. The findings of the Dies committee, the machine of our own American congress for ferretting out the trouble-makers, and other reputable sources have been discounted by an unwary public, and more's the pity, actually hindered by those whose official position should have given the work their strongest co-operation.

Almost every week there is some happening in the nation, however, that should give pause to those who can hardly believe there is present in the United States any militant isms which would wreck our government in twenty-four hours if the opportunity came along. Only a few days ago in the general conference of the united Methodist churches in Atlantic City, there was a demonstration by a determined, wild-eyed group of so-called Methodists who are organized under the title of the National Council of Methodist Youth. They resented the presence of Martin Dies, himself a Methodist, who addressed the conference by invitation. They were prevented by police from picketing the hall with placards, but did distribute circulars attacking Dies and his committee.

Such adolescent movements are directed by mature agents of the late Georges Clemenceau.
