### **Fly Traps Greatly Protect** Cattle

COLLEGE STATION - "The horn flies were bad and the cattle were nearly crazy. Out of the brush comes an old cow at a dead run. She heads for the trap, goes through it, and starts grazing easy on the other side.' That is an example of the

stories going the rounds about the new horn fly trap designed by W. G. Bruce of the USDA Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, and tested experimentally on several Texas ranches. The trap resembles a carni-

val "crazy house" and is placed where cattle must pass through it on their way to water and in similar locations. Weighted flaps knock off the

flies and traps-placed to take advantage of the insect's habit of flying to the side when disturbed-catch them.

There has been no difficulty n familiarizing livestock with the trap. Once the flies become annoying, the cattle soon learn to make for the trap.





HE'S no softie, this Modern Linerider. Like the old-time cowboy, his work calls for plenty of nerve. His face is sunburned. His muscles are hardened by many hours out-ofdoors, climbing 50-foot poles and clinging tenaciously to cross-arms while dodging "hot" wires that might otherwise send him hurtling to the ground--and sudden death.

He works under tremendous pressure. Many of his jobs are like that at Clyde, struck by a tornado on June 10, 1938, in which 12 persons were killed and communications completely disrupted.
