REPORT CAUTIONS PARENTS AGAINST CARELESSNESS IN YOUTH SUPERVISION

After four days in session, the grand jury for the March term dred school musicians. Soloists of District Court reported out to District Judge A. S. Moss last Thursday afternoon, returning 12 indictments and including in its report a few words of caution to Donley County parents to be careful as to the associates and activities of their children when away from home.

In its message to parents, the report stated that "they cannot be too careful in knowing where and with whom they are associating. Failure to do this leads in some instances coming to our attention, to deplorable results that can be avoided by better home supervision." The report was signed by W. T. Hayter, foreman of the grand jury.

Risley, while intoxicated: and Adamson, embezzlement of public funds ( county). A former tax assessor-collector.
