Scrap Iron And Waste Fats To Replenish War Production **Materials Now Wanted**

According to county agent H. M. Breedlove, one of the most important drives on scrapmetal and waste fats is now in progress. Our state office in Texas is urging that we get all of the scrap metal possible to the junk dealers so that they can send it to the factories. This scrap metal is coming in too slow, the county agent stated.

"We now only have enough on hand to run for five days if the salvage metals were shut off completely," Breedlove said. "Farmers throughout the county are reporting a great deal of this scrap metal in the communities but that their neighbors just do not take the time to bring it to town. We have a war to win and this material is very important. In fact it is important to the people at home and also to the boys in the armed forces. This scrap metal is used for the making of bullets, tanks, ships and other war machines. It is also used for the making of farm machinery and the more salvage metal that goes to town the more that there will be for farm duty to stop every thing and bring years, if they wish this service. machinery. 



Insured Farms May Earn **Premium Cuts**

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 5-A reduced cost plan by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation for those insured wheat growers who have built up large premium balances in excess of losses will go into effect with the new 3-year contract beginning with the 1943 crop, according to the State AAA Committee.

In some cases, this reduction plan will cut an individual's 1943 crop insurance premiums as much as 50 percent, the maximum allowed. This maximum reduction will be given the farmer only in those years when no loss occurs.

To qualify for the lower premium, a farmer must have insured his wheat crop for an unbroken series of crop years up to the present, with few or no losses. In general, if his total paid in premiums, less indemnities, during this period equals or exceeds his insured production for 1943, the farmer will receive a 50 percent cut in his premium.

If "paid in" premiums during the unbroken series of crop years are slightly less than his 1943 insured production, the grower's Sgt. 


