# Hedley freezes taxes

Elderly and disabled citizens in Hedley got their property taxes frozen last Thursday during the regular meeting of that city's Board of Aldermen.

Mayor Janie Hill said city leaders had discussed the tax freeze for two or three months after receiving a petition from the Concerned Citizens of Donley County, calling for an election on the

"We just decided it was the best thing to do because an election would cost us so much money, and we have a limited budget," Hill said.

An election would have cost Hedley about \$2,000, Hill said; and City Hall expects to receive only \$17,500 in property tax collections it this year's budget.

The board voted in favor of two motions. The first was not to place the issue on the November ballot, and the second was to approve the tax freeze.

Alderman Leon Ward was the lone vote against both motions. Mayor Hill said Ward wanted the issue to go before the voters, but the rest of the board disagreed.

"We hardly ever raise taxes here," she said, "and we assumed it would pass because most of our citizens are over 65. It is just such a minor issue

The freeze will fix the dollar amount of city taxes paid on qualified homesteads beginning with property tax statements that will be mailed out in October 2007. Higher tax rates or higher valuations cannot make that amount go up, but improvements - such as building on to a home - can raise the tax levy.

The freeze does not apply to taxes on personal property, such as cars and

City Secretary Randy Shaw said Hedley rarely increases its tax rate and did not think the freeze would have much of an impact on the city's

"We don't have much of a tax base, so we don't depend on property taxes too much," Shaw said. "We depend on utility sales for our income. The freeze will only have an effect if some time in the future the board decides to go up a lot on the tax rate."

A representative of the Concerned Citizens was scheduled to speak about taxation of personal property at Thursday's meeting but did not show.

Shaw estimated taxation of personal property accounts for less than 20 percent of total property taxes collected, and Hill said she did not think the city would alter its policy on personal property taxes.

"I don't foresee us ever changing that in the future," Hill said. "But I do think we have a lot of people that don't pay it."

In other city business, aldermen received the audit report for 2005-2006 from CPA Denise Foster with Foster & Lambert, and the board approved the audit unanimously.

## **Dignity needs** to be brought to retirement

In his September 22 op-ed article in the WALL STREET JOURNAL, Democratic National Committee chairman Howard Dean vowed his party would "ensure that a retirement with dignity is the right and expectation of every single American," and prevent "the privatization of Social Security."

Mr. Dean didn't tell us what he means by "privatization of Social Security" or "retirement with dignity," but he seems to conclude that the former would jeopardize the latter. Is he onto something?

In testimony before the House Ways and Means Social Security Subcommittee 12 years ago, I explained some of Social Security's weaknesses, and expressed support for the same ends Mr. Dean seeks:

I offer this testimony in the spirit of the starting point for an alternative: a concept of privatization wherein Americans benefit from the engine of a free economy and free choice. With privatization properly structured, today's elderly will be protected, the young will retire with higher income, and our political leaders will have offered, once and for all, a lasting solution for which all voters will be thankful.

The following year, in a paper titled "Retiring with Dignity: Social Security vs. Private Markets," I wrote that "retiring with financial dignity is in jeopardy."

"Compassionate in intent, but flawed in design," I argued, "Social Security will prevent many from enjoying financial security in their later years."

In fairness, Mr. Dean may simply not know what privatization means. In that, he is not alone.

Privatization, although complex in detail, is based on four simple principles. The first is the freedom to choose one's own retirement package. Today, workers are required to pay Social Security taxes, employer and employee combined, equal to 12.4 percent of their wages up to \$94,200; they have no choice. Privatization would offer a choice - to stay with Social Security or participate in an alternative retirement plan. No one would be forced to leave Social Security, but everyone would be allowed to.

The second principle is the opportunity to save. Many workers have little ability to save after paying their payroll and income taxes, plus food, shelter and clothing expenses. Privatization would give them this opportunity, because part of the 12.4 percent tax could be saved and invested in personal retirement accounts.

The third principle is the chance to accumulate real wealth. The part of the payroll tax that was saved would be invested in portfolios of wealth-producing assets. The portfolios would be regulated and broadly diversified across asset classes such as stocks and bonds

Given the history of global capital markets, the savings during one's working years would accumulate to hundreds of thousands of dollars in retirement. This is an opportunity many people simply never have had. This wealth would be people's personal property, much like their 401(k) plans or individual retirement accounts, and the government could not take it away. In contrast, and unbeknownst to many, retirees have no legal right to Social Security benefits.

The fourth principle is the freedom to give. Under today's law you are not able to bequeath Social Security benefits after your death, for that is when they end. With privatization, once you had purchased an annuity that ensured a stipulated level of retirement income, you could pass on the remaining assets to whomever you wished - your children, your church, anyone - whenever you wish. You wouldn't have to do that, but you could.

Beyond these freedoms and opportunities, privatization offers greater dignity in retirement - in part because it would provide greater benefits for each dollar saved than Social Security does for each dollar taxed. Greater retirement income at a lower cost allows people more options, more opportunities, more choices and more dignity during both their retirement and working years.

These benefits would not come without risk, but neither do Social Security's benefits. Privatization would force people to face market risks while Social Security forces them to face political ones. But under all reasonable assumptions, a well-designed saving and investment system, with personal property rights, incurs less risk than the government's tax-based system. As I wrote in "Retiring with Dignity":

What the public has been encouraged to think is a secure, funded, government pension program that offers retirees reasonable benefits in return for taxes on their labor is, in fact, something else. It is a coercive, intergenerational transfer tax system that relies on unrealistic assumptions and pays unreasonably low

All of us, our children and their children too, should have the ability to retire with financial security and dignity. Privatization, properly structured, will not only provide that, but additional freedoms and opportunities as well.

Privatizing Social Security would give people the freedom to choose how to finance their retirements, the opportunity to save, the chance to accumulate wealth and the freedom to give it to the people and causes they love. Does Howard Dean really want to prevent that?





## Football is more than a game in Texas

Texas fascinates, and even mystifies, the outside world. The latest indication of this is "Friday Night Lights," a new NBC television drama about high school foot-

The series is set in "Dillon, Texas," which doesn't exist. But the Dillon mascot is a panther, the same mascot as Odessa Permian High School. It's obviously based on the original "Friday Night Lights," a controversial book about Odessa Permian's 1988 football season.

It's easy to see why Hollywood has again visited Texas. Those not fortunate enough to live here know that Texans, by and large, have a pride in our state that's unmatched anywhere else. Outsiders find that difficult to understand.

The first episode was entertaining. Dillon won its opening game on a lastminute "hail Mary" pass, but the star quarterback is seriously injured. The writers tried to capture some uplifting aspects of Texas football to players, their fans, and the community. Some fictional and negative aspects of our Friday night custom showed up as well. After all, this is enter-

High school football can teach players, parents, siblings, classmates, and community fans lessons about sportsmanship, integrity, leadership, character, and patience. The process can educate us on how to be gracious winners and proud losers. Done properly, as it usually is, high school football can be a great vehicle for learning life's lessons.

The new TV show had its origins in 1988, when a Philadelphia writer arrived in Odessa announcing his intention to spend a year writing a book about Permian football. He indicated the book would be the football equivalent of "Hoosiers," the heartwarming story about a small Indiana high school that won the state basketball championship in 1966 against bigger rivals and long odds.

That's not the way it turned out. Although the tale of Odessa Permian's 1988 season contained positive scenes, it also implied that a relentless drive to win, class differences, and racial issues tainted football in Odessa. In 2004, a movie version of "Friday Night Lights" was produced. Like the book, it was a critical and financial success.

But feelings in Odessa were mixed at

best. Some critics pointed to clear exaggerations in the storytelling. Others correctly noted that football is usually a unifying event, but the book portrayed it as a divi-In fact, most schools and coaches do

their best to avoid overemphasis on winning. A great example could be seen last month in College Station, when the Westlake Chaparrals from suburban Austin were playing A&M Consolidated. In the second quarter, as Matt Nader,

a star offensive tackle for Westlake, sat on the bench, his heart went into ventricular fibrillation. He was treated, revived, and taken to the hospital. During the crisis, players from Westlake and A&M Consolidated stood on the field and spontaneously began a silent prayer.

Chaps Coach Derek Long told his team: "There's a lot that's more important than a football game. And family is more important." Both teams agreed to halt play right there. The game was declared a tie.

It may be only happenstance, but NBC was wise to schedule "Friday Night Lights" for Tuesday evening. If they aired it on Friday night, nobody in Texas would be home to watch it.

## Domestic violence touches many lives

October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month. Family violence is a very real problem in communities around the world. One out of three women are physically or sexually abused at some point in their life.

Pregnant women are more likely to be victims of homicide than to die of any other cause. Approximately one in five female high school students report being physically and/or sexually abused by a dating partner. Domestic violence costs employers \$4.1 billion in health care and related costs with 13.5 million workdays lost by abused employees. The dynamics of family violence also includes the criminal justice system.

Everyday, law enforcement officers place their lives on the line when they respond to a domestic violence call. Likewise, judges hearing divorce cases and granting Protective Orders are often shot and wounded or even killed by a disgruntled spouse/partner.

Shelter centers are not immune either. In the 15 years I have worked for Tralee Crisis Center, we have had bomb threats, break-ins, and threats of violence, causing us to have heightened security measures not only at our shelter but also at our main Tralee Crisis Center is this communi-

ty's resource to provide help and healing to the many who suffer from partner abuse. Services provided by Tralee Crisis Center include food, shelter, and crisis intervention and transportation to safety. While continuing to provide this intervention service victims, Tralee will shift our program effort over the next three years toward the prevention of violence in our communities.

The quality of our community life suffers when the health and well being of individuals and families are being destroyed. Shelter programs, churches, schools, businesses, and social service agencies must come together with a clear message

that domestic abuse will not be tolerated. Everyday many children are being raised and subjected to violence in their homes. Many studies have shown that this type of environment often produces boys who will grow up and be abusers and girls who may learn that violence against women is As a member of a community, you can

Once-a-Year Drug Tested for Osteoporosis

An interesting thing is happening with companies that make drugs for osteoporosis (a condition in which the bones become fragile, leading to possible fractures). Researchers who design such drugs have extended the number of days a drug can be taken and still provide protection to individuals who are experiencing bone loss. Fosamax and Actonel can be taken by mouth, once-a-week. Boniva, which is approved to be taken once-a-week, has been shown to provide protection when taken once-a-month.

Now we are hearing from one manufacturer (Novartis), that its with a drug called Reclast (zoledronic acid) have shown that f incidence of postmenopausal osteoporosis can be reduced in women with this drug if it is taken only once-a-year. The drug is designed to be given as an injection. In clinical trial, Reclast reduced the risk of new spine fractures by 70% and hip fractures by 40%. Reclast is also know as Aclasta in other countries where it has been approved for Paget's disease. According to Novartis, the side effects of Reclast are generally minor and are short lived.

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




