## Three vehicle accident claims two lives

A three-vehicle accident claimed two lives in Hedley last Friday afternoon and left emergency crews wondering for a time if a baby might also have been injured.

Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Chad Simpson said Anginette Barajas of Longmont, Colo., was driving southbound on US 287 headed out of Hedley about 2:20 p.m. when she attempted to pass a 2003 Freightliner 18-wheeler driven by 52-year-old Luther Carnahan of Mart, Texas.

At the same time, Carnahan changed lanes in an unsafe manner in front of Barajas' 1999 Honda Accord, causing her to veer to the left to avoid colliding with the truck. The truck moved back to the right, and Barajas overcorrected to the left, started slid-

ing, overcorrected to the right, and slid sideways into oncoming traffic in the northbound lanes of US 287 into the path of a 2006 Volvo truck tractor semi-trailer driven by Lester Valentine of Las Vegas, Nevada.

Valentine could not avoid the collision as he struck the Honda broadside, ripping the car into three pieces, crossing the southbound lanes, and coming to rest in a field.

Donley County Justice of the Peace Jimmy Johnson pronounced Barajas, age 26, and her passenger, Kathleen Harman, 49, dead at the scene.

An empty child's safety seat had the attention of everyone at the scene.

"We were very concerned about the possibility of a baby," Simpson

said. "But there was an extensive search of the wreckage and the area, and no baby was found. There was also no diaper bag or any other items to make us think there was a baby."

Valentine's passenger, 49-year-old Debra Bowling of Jackson, Miss., suffered minor injuries and was treated at the scene.

Those responding to the accident included the DPS, the Hedley Volunteer Fire Department, the Donley County Sheriff's Office, Associated Ambulance Authority, the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department, and the Texas Department of Transportation.

Trooper Simpson said no charges have been filed in the case; but, as in all fatalities, it will likely be presented to the Grand Jury for consideration.

## More attend annual July 4th celebration

Attendance was up slightly when the 129th annual Saints' Roost Celebration was held on the Courthouse Square Tuesday.

Comments generally favored the celebration's return to the square this year after it was held in City Park for the last five years due to the restoration of the Courthouse. People said this year's celebration "felt" more like the Fourth of July because it was held in its traditional location.

Appropriately, the 1890 Donley County Courthouse was in the spotlight this year, and members of the Clarendon High School Junior Historians gave tours of the building Tuesday morning.

The Craft Fair and the Old Settlers Reunion were also held Tuesday. Wes O'Neal of Holiday, Texas, traveled the greatest distance to be there. J.T. Lamberson and Rose Lee Watson were the oldest man and woman present. Wilma Spier was recognized as the person who has lived in Donley County the longest.

The Al Morrah Shrine Club served 882 plates of barbecue this year. In 2005, the Shriners served a little over 794 plates. Funds from the annual barbecue are used in conjunction with the Khiva Temple of the Shrine in Amarillo to help pay for transportation of kids to the Shriners' burns and crippled children's hospitals.

The annual Western Parade had 43 entries in four divisions, up from 35 entries last year. The Chamber of Commerce reports that Donley County 4-H Club float won first place in the float division. Phebe Ann's Friendly Family Phloat placed second. In the Riding division, the Crown of Texas Arabian Horse Club

won first place while Gene Hommel and family and their 3-H Cattle Company placed second.

In the Antique Vehicles division of the parade, Wondell Luttrell won first with a 1925 Model T, and Ken and Carol Carden placed second with a 1949 Hudson Commadore. The Clarendon Country Club golf carts won first place in the Miscellaneous division, and Wondell Luttrell placed second.

Several organizations held fundraisers, and the following are the results available at press time. There were three winners of the Lions Club Cow Patty Bingo - Terri Floyd, Genella Eads, and Rick Osburn. Kade Johnson of Shamrock won the custom commemorative spurs from the Clarendon Masonic Lodge. There were three winners of the Clarendon Firebelle's Penny Raffle - Kyle Hill, Chancy Cruse, and Jason Carr. Jimmy and Joyce Phillely won the custom outdoor grill given by the Chamber of Commerce.

Earlier in the week, the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association held a two-day ranch rodeo and other events, which are reported separately this week.

The Kids' Parade got things started on Saturday. Division winners were Cody Crump and Dylan Boothe in the 0-4 Division, Chardy Craft in the 5-8 Division, and Kristen Watson in the 9-12 Division.

At the annual Henson's Turtle Race on Saturday afternoon, 124 turtles competed, which was down from last year's 181 turtles. Braylee Shields won the 0-4 age division. Shiann Cook won first place in the 5-8 division. Kevin Mitchell won the 9-14 age division.

## Clarendon Fire Department marks centennial

Tears and laughter were the hallmarks of the Clarendon Volunteer Fire Department's centennial celebration Sunday afternoon as firefighters recalled humorous moments in years gone by and paid tribute to the sacrifices made during the 2006 wildfires.

"I'll say one thing about this bunch," Fire Chief Delbert Robertson said, "They have put in the time this year and have done a super job."

Captain Patrick Robertson choked back tears as he described what the department, the Firebelle, and their comrades from Howardwick went through this spring.

"I don't think anyone who wasn't there during the wildfires can really understand what it was like," he said. "It went on and on, and we were there doing our part. That's what firefighters do. But these ladies could have been home."

The I-40 Fire on March 12,

2006, was the worst, Capt. Robertson said. For that evening, tragedy struck when one of Howardwick's trucks overturned and plunged into a valley of fire and smoke. With fire on three sides and no road out, fellow firemen pulled Howardwick's Joey Garcia to safety as two Firebelle, who also happened to be LVNs, braved the heat and the danger to assist James McMorries and Jeff Cook.

"Within seconds these two ladies were there, and they stayed with the injured Howardwick firemen," Capt. Robertson said. "Chandra Holman stayed by Jeff's side and saw that he wasn't moved improperly, and Rhonda Howell performed CPR on James McMorries and kept him alive while help came from 25 miles away."

Garcia and Cook continue to recuperate from their injuries. McMorries succumbed to his injuries on April 9.

For their service and bravery, the Clarendon VFD bestowed the National Medal of Honor for Courage on Holman and Howell. It is the highest honor that can be given to someone who is not a member of the fire department.

Cook pinned the medal on Holman, and McMorries' widow, Tanis, pinned Howell and said she owed the lady a debt of gratitude for letting her have a little more time with her husband.

The remainder of the celebration was marked by reminiscing and tributes to the Clarendon department.

Chief Robertson said eight men had led the fire department since its organization by the city in 1906. W.C. Stewart was first and was followed by James Trent, who served until 1946. Carl Bennett served until 1957 and was followed by B.L. "Mut" Graham until 1963. See 'Firemen' on page 10.

## City aldermen deserve our appreciation

Our hats are off to the Clarendon Board of Aldermen for their willingness to reconsider a plan of action.

In the course of the last several months, the city has wrestled with the future of its sanitation service.

There is nothing wrong with the service as it is. But it does require the city to expend money on wages and fuel to haul our trash to Memphis every week, and it does result in more than \$40,000 per year leaving Clarendon and going to Memphis.

Several times, the aldermen have wished they could save that money and keep it at home, and they have on more than one occasion talked about opening a local landfill. The question was always one of location. Where could such a facility be placed?

Then last month one alderman brought to the board's attention a tract of land southeast of the city. The land was for sale and might contain enough natural resources – caliche and gravel – to make it worth buying even if it were not used for a landfill. The board acted quickly and voted to buy the land right then.

The action was well-intentioned, although it might have been a bit hasty. Many people were surprised by how fast the board moved on the land. Particularly surprised were neighboring land- and home-owners, who immediately became concerned about what was happening.

More than 20 such citizens attended last week's city meeting to express their alarm. Even though they were not on the agenda and even though most of them are not citizens of the city, the board graciously agreed to listen to them.

The residents, in turn, were respectful in their comments and questions. They rationally explained their concerns and fears, and some even went so far as to offer to repay the city's \$1,000 in escrow money that would be lost if it broke the contract to buy the land.

In the end, the mayor and aldermen determined that the proposed landfill was going to cause more hard feelings and bad blood than it would ever be worth.

It would be nice to keep the landfill fees at home and maybe even bring in money from out of the county. It would be great to save the time of traveling back and forth to Memphis; and it would be great, too, to save the wear and tear on city equipment going up and down the highway. But you can't put a price on being good neighbors, and the board correctly realized that.

If a different and more agreeable site can be located, a city landfill is an idea worth pursuing. But for now, the system has worked. Residents took their concerns to the city early, and the aldermen listened and changed their course of action accordingly.

## Government must insure kids' safety

The expansion of the Internet has ushered in a world of unlimited opportunity. Nearly 80 percent of Americans are online, and almost two-thirds use the Internet at home. The Internet provides businesses access to new markets, students access to new ideas, and friends and family members access to one another. The ease and speed with which information travels today is unprecedented – and is getting faster everyday.

Along with the many advances offered by the Internet, however, America must confront the new and daunting challenges it brings.

As our children are exposed to the Internet at an early age, predators are a dangerous threat to their safety. There are thousands of predators prowling online at any given moment; and each year, one in every five children receives an unwanted sexual solicitation online.

This is a frightening reality which we must confront as explicit material becomes increasingly available online. Since 1996, the FBI has documented a 2,000 percent increase in the amount of child pornography on the Internet, and 25 percent of all children have been exposed to unwanted sexually explicit material, according to a study conducted by the Department of Justice. These numbers are alarming, and we must act to protect our children so they

can safely use the Internet as an educational tool without being in danger.

I am currently co-sponsoring the Internet SAFETY Act to shield our children from these aggressive predators. This legislation provides law enforcement officials with additional resources to prosecute adults who create and distribute child pornography. Under this bill, it will become a federal crime to produce or knowingly facilitate transmission of child pornography and to financially support or operate child pornography sites. It will also increase existing penalties for child pornography, child prostitution, and sex trafficking.

The Department of Justice's Project Safe Childhood Report, published in May, outlines the most dangerous ramifications of the increasing child exploitation via the Internet. In addition to posting offensive graphics and vulgar videos, Internet predators are now attempting to lure children into face-to-face meetings. Each year, one in 33 children receives a sexual solicitation to meet the predator in person. Unfortunately, only one out of four targeted

children reports such an advance to their parents.

The Internet SAFETY Act creates an Office on Sexual Violence and Crimes against Children within the Department of Justice to further support the protection of our children.

The Department of Justice will also provide over \$14 million this year to support regional Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Forces. This national network of 46 ICACs, which includes a unit in Dallas and a newly created unit serving South Texas, cooperatively targets online child pornographers.

Prosecuting Internet pornographers not only reduces the amount of sexually explicit material currently available online, but also prevents countless children from being exploited as the subject of future images. Clearly the children forced to participate in such despicable acts suffer great physical, emotional, and psychological harm.

There can be no higher priority than ensuring our children's safety. The opportunities offered by the Internet are great, but so is our responsibility to maintain a safe and secure environment for our children, who are growing up in an age of unprecedented technology. In protecting them, the Internet SAFETY Act also protects our future.

## City reverses course on proposed landfill

The idea of a city landfill southeast of Clarendon became short-lived after neighboring landowners voiced their opposition last week.

More than 20 citizens attended last Tuesday's meeting of the Board of Aldermen to protest a landfill that had barely been proposed. The board first discussed and voted to purchase a 160-acre tract for \$112,000 at its June 13 meeting; but by the end of last week's meeting, city leaders were having second thoughts.

"Do y'all even know what it will cost to maintain a landfill?" resident Laban Tubbs asked.

Alderman Michael Tibbets tried to allay the residents' concerns by reiterating that the landfill was only in the planning stages.

"We haven't even done soil samples yet," Tibbets said. "We just bought the land. We're trying to keep money in the community."

Clarendon pays more than \$40,000 per year plus time and fuel to dump in the Memphis landfill.

Residents questioned why more public input was not sought before the purchase was approved and said they feared what having a landfill nearby would do to their property values and their groundwater.

"The water strata in that area is only three feet thick," said Jason Green, who is on the board of the Panhandle Ground Water Conservation District. Other residents noted that several people have been moving to the area southeast of town largely for the quality of water in that area.

Residents also talked about the time and money they had put into improving their property in that area.

"We're building a wedding ranch," said Randy Bond, whose

property is nearby. "We've saved nine years to do it, and I'd like you to reconsider."

City engineer Che Shadle discussed the permitting requirements and said the state would only hear from adjacent landowners and only about environmental concerns if the city were to pursue a landfill permit, which could take 18 to 24 months. He also said the city would be required to cover the trash every day and would have to monitor the site for 30 years if the landfill were to ever close.

But it was the opposition from neighboring landowners that appeared to resonate with the board.

"If we're going to affect that many families, we need to reconsider," Mayor Mark White said and noted that he thought he knew someone who would buy the property from the city if it continued with the purchase.

Other board members agreed with the mayor.

"I don't want to proceed," Alderman Tibbets said.

In other city business, Shadle addressed the recently completed street project and confirmed that the streets do in fact have two coats of paving and said densities on the base were lab tested.

The board considered and approved Ordinance 362, which amends Ordinance 143 to make it the responsibility of the homeowner or property owner to obtain building permits and confirm their contractor's insurances, warranties, licenses, and bonds.

The board was also asked to consider a noise ordinance, but aldermen said they would rather see an ordinance on "disturbing the peace."

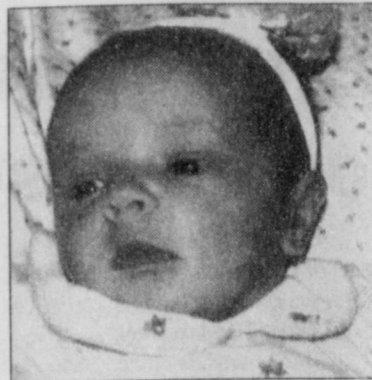

## Sumptuous smoothies, shakes make summer meals lots of fun

Cool, refreshing, quick! Smoothies and shakes are great for a healthy snack, light meal, or split one for a dessert! Here are some tips for super sippers:

Using frozen fruit helps thicken beverages without diluting the flavor.

Whether using fresh or frozen fruit, use fruit at its peak of ripeness to capture the most natural sweetness for smoothies and shakes. Add up to one teaspoon of sweetener (sugar or honey) or the equivalent in sweetening power of a no calorie sweetener if fruit is at less than peak ripeness for the following recipes.

Most smoothies and shakes should be consumed immediately. They may change color if they are allowed to stand for very long.

Enjoy the following six recipes!

**Breakfast Smoothie** - 8 oz (1 cup) nonfat plain yogurt; 1 cup 1% lowfat or nonfat milk; 1-3/4 cup whole fresh or frozen strawberries, hulled; 1 fresh peach, peeled and sliced, or 3/4 cup frozen peach slices (see Note); 2 teaspoons vanilla extract; 2 tablespoons chopped walnuts; and 2 whole strawberries (optional).

Place first 5 ingredients in a blender. Purée mixture for 15 to 20 seconds. Pour into two tall glasses and top each with 1 tablespoon chopped nuts. Garnish glass with strawberry, if desired. Note: If you prefer a thicker smoothie, replace the peach with 1 small sliced banana. The vanilla in this recipe adds sweetness, making any additional sweetener unnecessary.

**Peach-Raspberry Smoothie** - 1 cup unsweetened frozen raspberries; 3/4 cup 100% orange juice (if you

use frozen juice, don't forget to dilute first); and 1/2 cup fruit-flavored, low-fat yogurt (try peach). Blend all ingredients well in a blender and drink!

**Variations:** Frozen strawberries, blueberries, mixed berries, mango, or peaches. Pineapple juice, orange-tangerine juice, and other 100 percent juice blends. Different yogurt flavors. To quickly vary the type of juice, keep on hand different types of 6 oz (equals 3/4 cup) cans of fruit juice.

**Fresh Mango Shake** - 1 small mango (8 oz) quartered, pitted, and peeled; 3/4 cup non-fat plain yogurt

1/3 cup orange juice; and 2 ice cubes. In a blender combine all the ingredients until thick and smooth. Split this drink for a refreshing dessert!

**Let's Drink a Banana Split** (serves 4) - 2 bananas, sliced; 1 can (8 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained; 2 cups fat free milk; 1 cup strawberries; 2 tablespoons honey; 2 cups ice; and 4 maraschino cherries for garnish. Combine all ingredients in blender and blend until smooth. Serve immediately. This recipe is easy to cut in half - transfer the pineapple to a storage container and refrigerate. Enjoy in a salad (or another smoothie!) in a day or two. As an alternative to a maraschino cherry garnish, use a strawberry.

**Coffee Dessert Smoothie** - Makes 1 serving. 1/2 cup double strength coffee, cooled; 1/2 cup fat free milk; 1/2 cup low fat ice cream; 1/2 cup ice; and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla. Place all ingredients and blender and blend until smooth. Serve immediately.

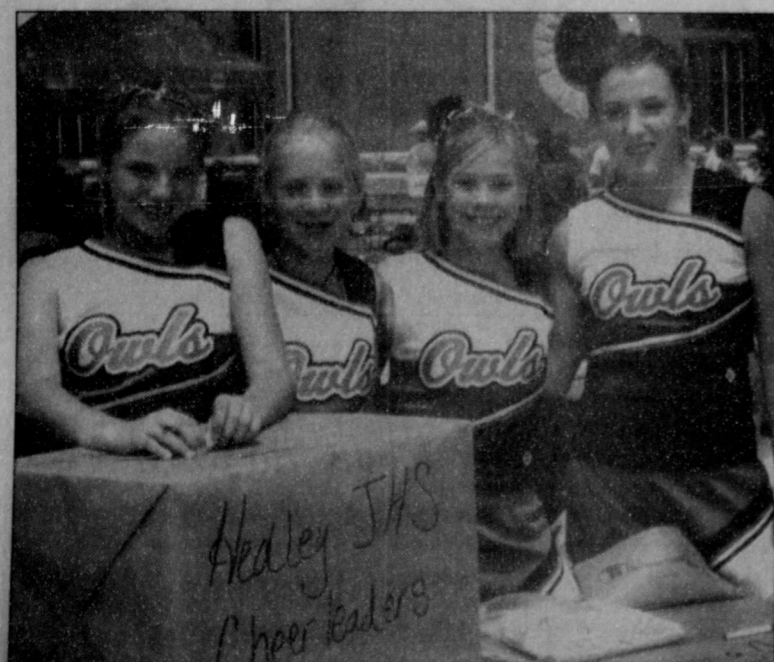

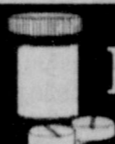

## Drugs in the News

### Oral Drug Tested for Multiple Sclerosis

Recently, medical researchers working with an experimental drug for the treatment of relapsing multiple sclerosis (MS) announced that they were recruiting patients for study in the US. This is part of a multinational study of a new drug called Cladribine, which began last year outside the US. According to researchers, this will be one of the largest MS studies ever conducted. If Cladribine is later approved, it appears to be on schedule to become the first of possibly other oral medicines to show benefit against the symptoms of MS. The only prescription drugs currently approved for MS must be given by injection.

An estimated 400,000 Americans have MS, a chronic condition affecting the central nervous system. Fatty tissue called myelin, which normally helps conduct nerve impulses throughout the body, is lost in multiple areas of the nervous system. The loss of myelin causes scar tissue, a condition called sclerosis. When there is a flare up or attack, the overall effect is a worsening of nerve function. This brings on the more common symptoms of MS such as fatigue, bowel dysfunction, and problems related to balance and mobility.

## Millions of Americans suffer from osteoporosis

COLLEGE STATION - Millions of people are suffering from a debilitating medical condition, and millions more could be at risk, said Texas Cooperative Extension experts.

"Osteoporosis threatens about 44 million Americans, affecting both men and women," said Dr. Mary Bielamowicz, Extension nutrition specialist.

"One out of every two women and one out of every four men are at risk of developing this debilitating disease."

That's why Extension is participating in a four-year, multi-state, federally funded research project called "Osteoporosis Prevention Using Soy," said Dr. Sharon Robinson, Extension nutrition specialist.

Extension has developed the consumer nutrition education part of the project and calls it 'Standing On Your Own,' she said. The program promotes the role of soy in a healthful and bone-strengthening dietary plan. It even provides several tasty and healthful recipes containing soy, she added.

After age 30, most people lose bone mass and density, Bielamowicz said. For women, that loss accelerates during early menopause.

"This natural reduction in bone mass and density often causes the bones to become extremely fragile and susceptible to fractures," she said. "This is osteoporosis."

The National Osteoporosis Foundation reports any bone can be affected by the condition, but those of most concern are the hip and spine.

"A hip fracture almost always requires hospitalization and major

surgery," according to the foundation's Web site (<http://www.nof.org/osteoporosis/index.htm>). "It can impair a person's ability to walk unassisted and may cause prolonged or permanent disability or even death. Spinal or vertebral fractures also have serious consequences, including loss of height, severe back pain, and deformity."

Osteoporosis can be an expensive condition to treat, Robinson said. Necessary medical care may include hospitalization, nursing home care, rehabilitation, special equipment, prescription medications, and home modifications.

Some risk factors are more controllable, Robinson said, and risk-reducing steps taken earlier in life can be beneficial. Her advice: Talk with your doctor.

Do some kind of regular weight-bearing exercise such as walking, stair climbing, skating or bowling, and do some weight training to build bones. Don't smoke. Get the right amount of dietary calcium.

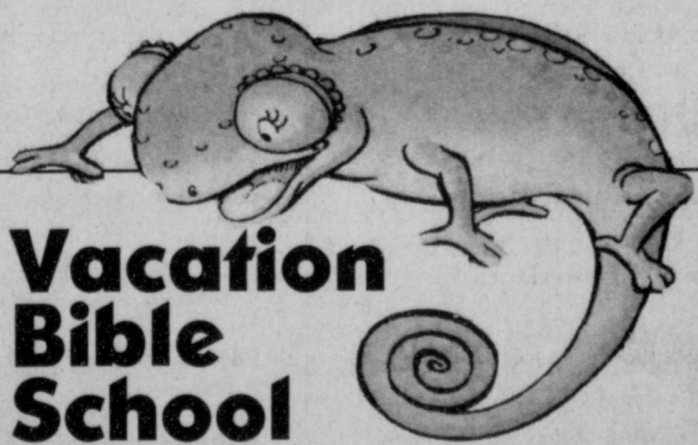

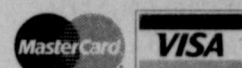

**DOG PROHIBITION ORDINANCE**  
ARTICLE I  
POSSESSION OF DOG ON CERTAIN PROPERTY OF THE AUTHORITY PROHIBITED  
It shall be unlawful for any person to possess a dog on any publicly used property of the Authority except as provided in Article II 3 hereof.

### ARTICLE II

**DEFINITIONS**  
Authority - "Authority" shall mean the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority. Publicly used Property - "Publicly used Property" shall be all such real property of the Authority and surrounding Greenbelt Lake except real property held by a person under a valid License Agreement For Residences with the Authority.

Exclusions - Hunting dogs used during water fowl hunting season and retriever used during field trial events are excluded from this ordinance. Person - "Person" shall mean an individual, corporation, partnership, firm, or any entity whatsoever, whether composed of one or more individuals. Owner - "Owner" shall mean any person owning, keeping, harboring, or having control of a dog.

### ARTICLE III

**PENALTY**  
The owner of any dog who shall violate the provisions of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in an amount not exceeding Two

Basil Smith served two years, and then Billy Jack Land led the department from 1965 to 1977. Jerry Gage served three years and was succeeded by Robertson in 1980.

Former chief Billy Jack Land lauded the department and its men and urged the community to keep the support going, and former chief Jerry Gage recalled a time he and fellow fireman Bob Kidd were called on to take a truck to a fire in Brice. But the old Ford leaked so bad that by the time they got, there all the water was gone.

"There have been a lot of sad, funny, and trying things that have happened," Gage said, "but there has always been a lot of citizen support."

County Judge Jack Hall congratulated the department on its centennial and praised the men for putting their lives on the line to protect Donley County, and Mayor Mark White pledged ongoing municipal support for the department.

"We can never appreciate them enough," White said. "We will continue to support them and hope you will all do the same."

Chief Robertson presented centennial caps to visiting dignitaries and centennial patches to his department. The Firebelles were individually recognized, and certificates of appreciation were presented to the Howardwick and Hedley fire departments.
