Shelton among Odessa finalists

Clarendon College President Myles Shelton confirmed Monday that he is a candidate for the presidency of Odessa College.

"It's an interesting opportunity at a bigger school in a bigger community," Shelton said. Odessa's search committee contacted Shelton and asked him

to participate in their application process. T wash t looking; they came to me," Shelton said. "In fact, I didn't respond to their first request." With an enrollment of 5,000 students, Odessa is about five times bigger than CC. Odessa's president, Vance Gipson, is retiring, Shelton said. The Odessa Board of Regents last Tuesday approved Shelton as one of three finalists to succeed Gipson. New Mexico Junior College President Steve McCleery and Western Texas College President Greg Williams are also finalists. The interview process will be set up in September, and Shelton says he thinks a decision will be made in the next 30 to 45 days.

Unfair squeeze will be result of tax freeze

Senior citizens in Donley County will have the opportunity to shift some of their tax burden onto the shoulders of younger residents this November when the question of a tax freeze is placed on at least three separate ballots, but the proposition ought to be

defeated if fairness means anything. The chance to saddle those under 65 with the responsibility of future tax increases is being brought to you by the Concerned

Citizens of Donley County and less than ten percent of the registered voters in the county, the Clarendon College District, and the City of Clarendon.

Don't you just love the way

a vocal minority can really upset by roger estlack the apple cart? We elect qualified (and sometimes unqualified) men and women to serve on our boards and charge them with making decisions in the best interests of all the people; but if just five percent of "the people" don't like the way they do business, they can throw a monkey wrench in the whole works.

And so it is with this proposal which has forced our elected officials to call for three elections – one each for the county, city, and college – so that all of us can decide whether we just freeze the dollar amount of taxes paid on qualified homesteads by our seasoned citizens and those whom the Social Security Administration has defined as disabled.

There are several problems with this tax freeze proposal, not the least of which is a question of fairness. We are all in this together or we are not. We all want public services, but we are not all willing to pay for them. We all want the benefit of living here – as opposed to say Briscoe County, but we are not all willing to bear the responsibilities of living here that come with a county that boasts more opportunities and more assets than many of our neighbors.

If approved, those 65 and over will never have to pay more in taxes than they will on January 1, 2007, unless they make improvements to their homesteads. Even if city, county, or college district voters were to approve an issuance of bonds, the taxes of those residents would still not go up. Which begs the question: If this measure is approved, should not the elderly and the disabled give up their right to vote on such issues in the future?

Oh, many of you "Concerned Citizen" types recoil at such a thought I see. Well, I'll go you one better. If the measure is approved, those whose taxes are frozen should be disqualified from holding office on the board of any entity with a tax freeze in place. That's simple fairness - you should not be able to vote to raise the taxes of your fellow man when you yourself cannot possibly be subjected to those taxes. Otherwise, it is a classic case of taxation without representation. Is it not enough that young Americans carry the weight of the Social Security system and the Medicare system? Is it not enough that the imminent retirement of the Baby Boomers threatens to consume both those systems? Is it now necessary for young Americans - those working to keep small businesses afloat and those struggling to provide for their own families - to be disproportionately responsible for paying for all local services while the most vocal members of AARP flit about in new RVs? The motives of the "Concerned Citizens" are perplexing. By their own admission, they are most upset about the taxation of personal property by entities in Donley County; and at the heart of that fixation lie personal grudges against the employees of the appraisal district. And yet, this tax freeze does nothing to the tax on personal property. And the board of the biggest taxing entity in the county - the Clarendon school district - was told by those "concerned" that they are doing a great job. In fact, the "Concerned Citizens" told CISD that they would be happy for the school to raise taxes on real property if they would just get rid of the personal property tax. Of course, given the fact that the state has a tax freeze on school property taxes for the elderly and disabled, their happy acceptance of an opportunity to raise my taxes doesn't seem all that altruistic.

Federal funds perserving best of Texas

The first settlers in Texas typically found a way to buy small pieces of a large land grant and turn them into family farms or ranches. To Easterners, a portrait of early Texas would include a bustling agricultural community nestled amid a scenic rural vista.

Texas was built on expertise in raising cattle, planting cotton, and raising a wide variety of crops. Most of the production came from family homesteads, farms, and ranches.

There have been consolidations; but, even today, 200,000 or more farms and ranches are working in Texas. Privately owned rural lands in Texas take up nearly 85 percent of our state. Even as public attention goes elsewhere, one-quarter of our state's booming economy still depends on agriculture.

But "fragmentation" – the need to sell parcels of farm or ranch land to keep the rest of the acreage afloat – has become a fact of life in rural areas, particularly scenic areas coveted for recreation or retirement uses. Between 1982 and 1997, more than 2.2 million rural Texas acres were converted to development; Texas lost more rural farming and ranching land than any other state.

Texas is growing rapidly. We enjoy a hospitable business climate, and many people want to live here. As urban populations boom, and more housing is built, attractive rural land is sold to accommodate the demand. The rising prices can bring wealth to some landowners.

How can a state retain the core of its beautiful rural character without threatening vital private property rights? One organization based in Austin, the Hill Country Conservancy, has an answer. The Conservancy brings together developers and environmentalists to preserve lands in one of our state's most beautiful wildlife and aquatic areas, the Barton Springs Edwards Aquifer region in Central Texas. A key tool is a federal government law, the Farm and Ranch Land Protection Program. The Hill Country Conservancy pays landowners for preservation agreements that transfer future land development rights to a non-profit trust, such as the Hill Country Conservancy, or a governmental entity. The original landowner can keep the property, with the rights-holder managing the agreement to ensure the land is not sold to developers. The entire arrangement is aided by matching funds from the federal government.

One of the main draws for businesses and individuals choosing Texas is the striking and scenic nature of our state. Anyone who has driven down the Capital of Texas Highway, walked or hiked in the incomparable Texas Hill Country, or taken a swim in the cool waters of the Guadalupe River can see the benefits that accrue when man watches over and protects our resources.

It's good for everyone that Texas stays naturally beautiful.





"People want service, and they expect it," Wheeler said. "With our headquarters in Memphis, we can provide the residences of Crowell and surrounding areas with the great service that GreenLight Gas is known for."

GreenLight Gas is a whollyowned, not-for-profit subsidiary of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative, Inc., in Wellington and Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., in Floydada. GreenLight is the smallest not-forprofit gas utility in Texas that owns both pipeline and distribution assets. Any profit earned by the system does not go to investors but rather into the infrastructure badly in need of repair.

"Our primary interest in purchasing the assets from Brunello was motivated because the communities needed natural gas service," said Lighthouse General Manager Bill Harbin, "and we wanted to provide that service to the residents with the cooperative philosophy of service before profit.'

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



An Ordinance of the City of Clarendon, Texas, amending the Code of Ordinances and prohibiting certain actions, which constitute Disturbing the Peace.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas That the Code of Ordinances, City of Clarendon,

Texas, is hereby amended by adding an Article to Chapter 9 to be numbered Article 4. Section

9.46, which section reads as follows: 9.46 Disturbing the Peace Prohibited:

A. Prohibited Acts. It shall be unlawful for any person intentionally or knowingly to disturb the peace within the City Limits

B. Definitions. Disturbing the Peace shall include: 1). C. Penalty. Any person who shall violate any provision of this Section 9.31 shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, all be fined in an a maximum amount allowed by law. Each violation shall constitute a separate offense D. Severability. In the event any clause, phrase, provision, sentence, or part of this Section 9.31 or the application of the same to any person or circumstance shall for any reason be judged invalid or held unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect, impair, or invalidate this Section as a whole or any part or provision hereof other than the part declared to be invalid or unconstitutional; and the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas, declares that it would have passed and every part of the same notwithstanding the omission of any such part thus declared to be invalid or unconstitutional, whether there be one or more parts. Drugs in the News

New Smoking Cessation Program Available

A new smoking cessation program is now available. The program involves the use of a new drug called Chantix (Varenicline) and an optional behavioral modification program called GETQUIT. Researchers believe that if a person is smoking while taking Chantix, the drug will block access of nicotine to certain receptors, thus lessening the effect of the nicotine. The desired outcome is to lessen the person's dependence (physical craving) on nicotine and make smoking cessation easier. According to program sponsors, all who get prescriptions for Chantix filled will be offered enrollment in the GETQUIT program at no additional cost.

One physician involved in studying Chantix provides tips as to how to quit smoking, such as staying away from other smokers and using replacement activities such as a specific exercise or chewing gum. One report indicates that 70% of the 45 million American smokers say they want to quit. Another report indicates that less than 7% of those who actually try to stop smoking on their own are able to do so for more than 12 months.
