#### City sales tax receipts increase again in April

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn said Friday that the state collected \$1.57 billion in sales tax revenue in April, up 17.2 percent compared to April 2005.

Clarendon, Hedley, and Howardwick were among Texas cities receiving higher sales tax receipts.

The City of Clarendon received a rebate of \$29,120.99, up 4.08 percent from last April and pushing the year-to-date total ahead 8.4 percent.

Hedley was up 125.64 percent from \$522.16 last April to \$1,178.24 this year and is running 87.6 percent ahead for the year-to-

Howardwick is also up with 4.79 percent growth for the yearto-date and receiving \$857.72 for 6.8 percent growth in April.

May's sales tax allocations to local governments represent March sales that were reported to the Comptroller in April by monthly tax filers, and January, February and March sales reported to the Comptroller in April by quarterly tax filers.



## Government like a parasite on economy

One of the biggest success stories of the American economy in the past decade is the Internet search firm Google. After a humble start in a Stanford University dorm room, the company went public in 2004 and now has a stock price of about \$370 per share.

Founders Larry Page and Sergey Brin and many other wealthy officers of the company got rich the only way you can in a free market: by producing something other people want. A lot of brilliant people worked long hours producing computer software that hundreds of millions of people chose to use, in the midst of a highly competitive market that offered lots of other

But in our modern politicized economy - which National Journal columnist Jonathan Rauch called the "parasite economy" - no good deed goes unpunished for long. Some people want to declare Google a public utility that must be regulated in the public interest, perhaps by a federal Office of Search Engines. The Bush administration wants Google to turn over a million random Web addresses and records of all Google searches from a one-week period. Congress is investigating how the company deals with the Chinese government's demands for censorship of search results by Chinese users.

So, like Microsoft and other companies before it, Google has decided it will have to start playing the Washington game. It has opened a Washington office and hired well-connected lobbyists. One of the country's top executive search firms is looking for a political director for the company.

What should concern us here is how the government lured Google into the political sector of the economy. For most of a decade the company went about its business, developing software, creating a search engine better than any of us could have dreamed, and innocently making money. Then, as its size and wealth drew the attention of competitors, anti-business activists, and politicians, it was forced to start spending some of its money and brainpower fending off political attacks. It's the same process Microsoft went through a few years earlier, when it faced the same sorts of attacks. Now Microsoft is part of the Washington establishment, with more than \$9 million in lobbying expenditures last year.

By Washington standards, Google is still a bit player, with lobbying costs of less than \$1 million per

Seasoned Washington players have been patronizing about Google's political innocence. Technology lobbyist Rhett Dawson says that the company "is quickly going through a maturation phase. ... It pays to pay attention to Washington." Lauren Maddox, a former Newt Gingrich aide recently hired by Google, says that the company's lobbyists are explaining to them that the "policy process is an extension of the market battlefield."

Microsoft went through the same hazing, though with more of an edge. A congressional aide said, "They don't want to play the D.C. game, that's clear, and they've gotten away with it so far. The problem is, in the long run they won't be able to."

Sorta like, "Hey, Bill, nice little company ya got there. Shame if anything happened to it."

And companies get the message: If you want to produce something in America, you'd better play the game. Contribute to politicians' campaigns, hire their friends, go hat in hand to a congressional hearing and apologize for your success.

The tragedy is that the most important factor in America's economic future - in raising everyone's standard of living - is not land, or money, or computers; it's human talent. And some part of the human talent at another of America's most dynamic companies is now being diverted from productive activity to protecting the company from political predation. The parasite economy has sucked in another productive

The slowdown of the American economy over the past few decades can be blamed in large measure on just this process - the expansion of the parasite economy into the productive economy. The number of corporations with Washington offices has shot up. along with the number of CEOs who visit Washington regularly. And if you thought the growth of the parasite economy would slow down under Republican government, you'd be wrong. The number of companies with registered lobbyists is up 58 percent in six years, and official spending on lobbying has risen from \$1.5 billion to \$2.1 billion in that time.

In 1998, Bill Gates wrote, "It's been a year since the last time I was in D.C. I think I'm going to be making the trip a lot more frequently from now on."

And that's what the parasite economy is costing America. The founders of Microsoft and Google and other innovative companies are going to waste their brains on protecting their companies rather than thinking up new products and new ways to deliver them.

Google's new presence in Washington is entirely understandable, but it is a tragic symbol of the diversion of America's productive resources into the unproductive world of political predation and the struggle to

The Center is actually nine different sites. It includes a wide array of habitats along a 120-mile stretch from South Padre Island west to Roma, Texas. The Center promises visitors a "birders' eye view" of the seasons in the Lower Rio Grande Valley. In winter, there are warblers, sparrows and purple martins. The spring brings swallows and migrating raptors. Summer offers the long-billed curlews and orchard orioles. With autumn arrive buntings, cuckoos and ruby-throated hummingbirds.

This is all great for Texas tourism. In 2001, wildlife-associated recreation - fishing, hunting, and wildlife-viewing, including birding - contributed \$4.7 billion to the Texas economy. Nature tourism alone contributed \$301 million in additional local tax revenues.

Texans are fortunate indeed. Almost year-round, we need look no further than our own backyard to watch a woodpecker negotiate the trunk of a tree, or listen to a mockingbird croon from a tree branch. Watching the millions of birds that live in or visit Texas is yet another great way to enjoy the beauty of our state.



However, having seen first hand how the ambulance service is funded as well as the nursing home, I definitely see need to have a hospital tax.

Ambulance services for the most part run in the red. They don't make money. The reason for this, besides the cost of equipment and supplies, is the fact that a large portion of the services provided is never paid for at all. I agree that the rest of the tax-paying base should not be responsible for the bills that are not paid by others; but, as we all know, that is the way our government is run. If the ambulance service does not service the area you live in, it is simply because their response time is probably longer than that of the service that does provide service to you.

If you want the Clarendon ambulance service to respond to your home, you can request it to your 911 operator, and I am sure they will get them in route to your location. Of course, if you're having a heart attack, you may not be too worried about whether or not your taxes are paying for the service. You're just damn glad that someone is there to help you!

Believe me the other area ambulance services are not providing the service that Associated Ambulance Authority is providing. Our ambulance service is called on frequently by surrounding towns to provide mutual aid because they don't have the personnel or equipment that Clarendon EMS

As far as the nursing home is concerned, if you don't have a family member living there, you might consider that some day you may. I hope that if the need ever arises and I have a family member that needs to be cared for, the MCNH will be available for my family or myself. It is convenient, and it is good to have people you know and live near taking care of loved ones.

#### USDA program creating huge burden for citizens

This letter should only be of interest to people who eat, buy the food for others to eat, or worry about the amount of money the government spends.

My concern is the USDA's "National Animal Identification System" that will put every animal that could be food for human consumption in a national database that will track every animal, even horses, from birth to death. The startup cost is projected to be 33 billion dollars. That's \$115.78 for every man, woman, and child in the US.

I have raised show chickens since the 1940s. I will tell how the plan would affect me and others in our area who raise poultry, cattle, swine, horses, sheep goats, etc. We will be required to have GPS coordinates for satellite assisted location of houses, farms, or ranches and to supply the owner's name, address, and phone number for government identification.

I would have to pay for three of these locations: one for my son's place where the incubator is, one for my home where the breeding birds are primarily located, and one for the rented range layer house where we have growing pens.

Under the NAIS program, when a chick is hatched, it would have to have a permanent identification number. This has to be reported to the government in 24 hours. If we move the chick to my house the next day, we have to make another government report within 24 hours. If that bird is moved on to the growing pens, it's another 24-hour report. Every time a bird moves to a new location (such as the vet's, a new owner's place, a chicken show), each move must be reported to the government within 24 hours. Another report must be made when the bird dies or is slaughtered.

During the show seasons, we may show 50 to 75 birds at each show. Since

permanent identification for chickens will be between 30 and 50 cents per bird, the fees will not only be expensive but the reporting will be a monstrous job.

But I'm not just talking about our birds. Let's say, for instance, that you order 100 chicks for family use. You won't just pay for the chicks; you would also have to pay for the tags and the labor to attach them. In addition, you will have to provide the government database with your name, address, and phone number; and you will have to have a GPS for your home or farm. And every time you prepared one of these birds for Sunday dinner, you will have 24 hours to report the death of that bird.

Keep in mind that the NAIS program is not just for chickens. It includes all kinds of poultry as well as cattle, swine, sheep, goats, horses, etc.; and it covers their every move from birth to death.

Our local ranchers will be affected on a huge scale. Everybody in this country knows that every calf just won't be born on the same day. Not only will the rancher have to try to keep the cow away long enough to implant an ID chip on each calf born, he will also have 24 hours to make his report. Every time he moves that cow or calf to a new location not physically attached to that pasture, he will have another 24-hour report.

If the kids participate in an equine program, a rodeo team, or if they just ride to exercise their horses off the home property, it's a report. Every move 4-H and FFA members make with their animals will require reports to the government within 24 hours of that move. Under NAIS, the small owners will

have to keep up with every animal from birth to death, but the feedlot owners will operate under one GPS identification number. Big broiler producers will be able to raise hundreds of thousands of broilers under one number. It is not just the cost to the producers, but can you imagine how many people operating computers it will take to record and process all of this infor-





Knee or Hip Pain

Glucosamine Sulfate has proven to be an effective treatment for joint pain. Some studies have used Gluscosamine Hydrocholoride and it has been slightly less effective. My preference is Glucosamine Sulfate 500 mg with MSM (a dietary source of sulfer) 200 mg and take four capsules daily.

Glucosamine Sulfate may be taken with other medicines.

Most sources are from shell fish although we carry a vegetable source glucosamine for people allergic to shell fish.

Nutritional products are the least regulated in the health industry. They are not required to show standardization. Pharmaceuticals must be able to show records of testing for exact content. 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





#### A New Type of Insulin Product

Although there are many available insulin products for the treatment of diabetes, research continues to uncover new therapies that increase

Many insulin users have complained about their need for multiple daily injections, and those who wear insulin pumps are often burdened by the bulk. To increase comfort and compliance, Novo Nordisk has recently released a new insulin product called Levemir (insulin

Levemir was approved for once or twice daily dosing for those with type I diabetes or type II diabetes who require insulin. This product is long acting, like Lantus insulin, which involves fewer injections. Initially, a dose of 10 units in the evening or at bedtime is used. Doses may be increased or decreased according to response. Levemir should not be mixed in the same syringe with any other insulin products or used in an insulin pump. Glucose monitoring is recommended with its use. As with other insulin products, the most common side effects are low blood sugar and allergic reactions. This new insulin comes in a vial or
