

### H-wick will vote Saturday

Howardwick voters will go to the polls Saturday to select three members of the Board of Aldermen and a new mayor for that city.

Early voting was brisk; and with about four hours of early polling time left Tuesday, 75 citizens had cast their ballots.


Six people are vying for three positions on the Board of Aldermen. Incumbents Lee Ann Cook and Sam Grider are joined on the ballot by challengers Susie Langford, H.L. "Buster" Baird, Stanley Couch, and Milton Brown.

But perhaps the most interesting race is that for the title of mayor, which has been vacant since Nancy Davis did not run for reelection a year ago. Voters have two choices for the job - Paul Bartlett and the late James McMorries, who passed away from injuries suffered while fighting the I-40 fire on March 12.

McMorries filed for the office but passed away after the deadline to remove a name from the ballot.

City officials say ballots cast for McMorries are legal and will be counted. If he wins, it will be up to the Board of Aldermen to appoint someone to serve in his place.

Howardwick City Hall will be open for polling this Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Anna Jarvis passed away in 1905; and in 1907, on the two-year anniversary of her passing, her daughter (also named Anna) helped organize a Mother's Day celebration at her mother's church in West Virginia. Other states soon started celebrating the day; and on May 8, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

Mother's Day is also an opportunity for mothers to share in the achievements and accomplishments of their children. A happy and successful child inspires a special sense of pride in a parent. Mothers are there to share in the rites of passage that children experience, from your child's first words and first day of school to their first job and first love

#### Reader objects to personal property tax

anyone is holding the city back from being something to be proud of. The city and the county are two separate entities, and two separate taxing authorities. If the city wants to do something in Clarendon, who's stopping them from doing it and improving the city? As I understand, almost all counties in the state of Texas abolished personal property taxes years ago, and they have moved forward and out of the dark ages without taxing their residents to the

And furthermore, I haven't heard any "bitching" from any of the "complainers," only true honest statements concerning their legitimate concern over the personal property taxes that are eating them alive, and forcing them to "contemplate" moving

#### Americans can petition without feeling guilty

A few weeks ago, I noticed an ad in the ENTERPRISE stating that a group of concerned citizens were going to meet and sign petitions to try to abolish taxes in Donley County. Naturally, I showed up to sign these petitions. These petitions were for the personal property tax, hospital district tax, and to cap the amount of tax seniors and disabled persons pay.

When I arrived at the meeting, I was impressed with the amount of cars parked at the Lions Club building. I thought we might get this done. I went inside and started signing petitions. That was what the meeting was for, and that was why I came. This meeting was to try to get the concerned citizens organized and get enough signatures on a petition to get these propositions on the ballot in the future.

As I mingled and looked around, I noticed that some of the concerned citizens were not there to sign anything. They came to glare and be naysayers about the very

idea of these troublemakers daring to be so bold as to do this in broad daylight. I signed the petition to abolish the personal property tax because I don't think it is fair. I paid tax on my vehicles when I

bought them. I pay tax on the oil and gasoline I put in them. I pay tax on the tires and other accessories I have to buy for them. I also buy a sticker every year to satisfy the state. I think that horse has been sufficiently whipped. The Hospital District Tax has the word

"hospital" in it. We don't have a hospital. This tax subsidizes the nursing home, the ambulance association, and the indigent care for the county. If the nursing home is operating in the black, why do we have to pour money into it? The indigent care should be funded through the commissioners' court. The ambulance association doesn't cover the north part of the county. If you have a 779 prefix telephone number, the 911 call goes to Shamrock and the ambulance comes out of McLean. If I have a heart attack and call the ambulance, it will come out of McLean. Will the Donley County ambulance association pay that bill because I paid my hospital district taxes in Donley County? I think not. An ambulance association is only as good as the volunteers. Other small towns in our area have excellent ambulance service and don't use any tax money. There are a lot of government grants for ambulance service in rural communities like Clarendon. Why don't we use them?

Most senior citizens and disabled persons are on a tight budget. I see no reason to make their life harder than it already is.

The Constitution of the United States of America guarantees us the right to meet and discuss these tax options. That is how our country was built. We don't have to feel guilty about what we signed and should not be scolded like third graders that were late for class. If you don't agree, vote against it when and if it gets on the ballot. Otherwise, grow up and quit your bitching.

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
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#### M. Santos shoots 66 scratch score at CCC By Sandy Anderberg







#### Important New Use For This Osteoporosis Drug

Raloxifene (Evista) is a prescription drug tat is used to prevent and treat osteoporosis. It is chemically related to another drug called tamoxifen (Nolvadex), a common treatment for breast cancer. Unfortunately, tamoxifen causes many unwanted side effects, so alternative therapies are desirable.

The National Cancer Institute recently released the first results of a clinical trail that evaluated the differences in raloxifene and tamoxifen in preventing breast cancer. Postmenopausal women were given 60 mg of raloxifene or 20 mg of tamoxifen and followed for 5 years. Both drugs decreased the risk of developing invasion breast cancer by 50%. Women in both groups had equivalent numbers of strokes, heart attacks, and fractures, but those who took raloxifen had fewer side effects. Women who are taking tamoxifen and have not experienced problems are not being encouraged to switch to raloxifen. If approved by the FDA, raloxifene my become an important alternative for the prevention of invasive breast cancers in women who may not be able to tolerate tamoxifen.






