## HIGHWAY DEPT. ASKING FOR BIDS ON NEW BRIDGE

It looks now like it won't be too long off before construction will start on the new bridge to span Red River which is located 5 miles north of town on Highway 70.

The Texas Highway department is running a contractors notice in this issue of the Leader asking for bids on .662 miles of Salt Fork of Red River Bridge and Roadway approaches.

It has been understood that the new road bed location will be just south of the present bridge and will cut through the big red clay bank giving a clearer view of the bridge and a straighter approach. It was also understood that the old bridge will be left standing for traffic until the new bridge is finished. The bids on the structure will be awarded probably August 17 and construction will start any time thereafter.

## Organizational Meeting Called For August 9th

Dr. J. Gordon Stewart received a letter this week from Phillip W. Gauss, Jr., Tuberculosis Field Worker with the Texas State Department of Health, requesting an organizational meeting in Donley County preparatory to bringing the state portable X-ray equipment to Clarendon again this year. This is a free service by the department and they want everyone to take advantage of it. Last year 288 persons used the service and out of this group the X-ray pictures revealed four actual cases of TB, 6 suspected cases and 2 others that had congested lung conditions.

It has been requested that a part of Mr. Gauss' letter be published so that everyone may know what he would like to have and expects when he arrives here. It reads as follows:

"I intend to be in Clarendon on August 9th at 7:30 p. m. for the purpose of holding a preliminary organizational meeting for your proposed mass X-ray survey. Past experience has shown us that a great deal of planning and organization is necessary to insure the success of this program. We have also been able to ascertain through this experience that one of the most important factors in a successful mass X-ray survey is the original preliminary meeting which is to be held on August 9th at 7:30 p. m. in Clarendon. It is most important that a large group of people be present at this meeting. Members of every civic and social organization within your county should be urged to attend. It is also important that members of the ministry, press and city and county officials also be present."

This meeting as mentioned above will be held at the Lions Club Hall just south of the Piggly Wiggly. This is a county-wide proposition and all interested parties are urged to be present.

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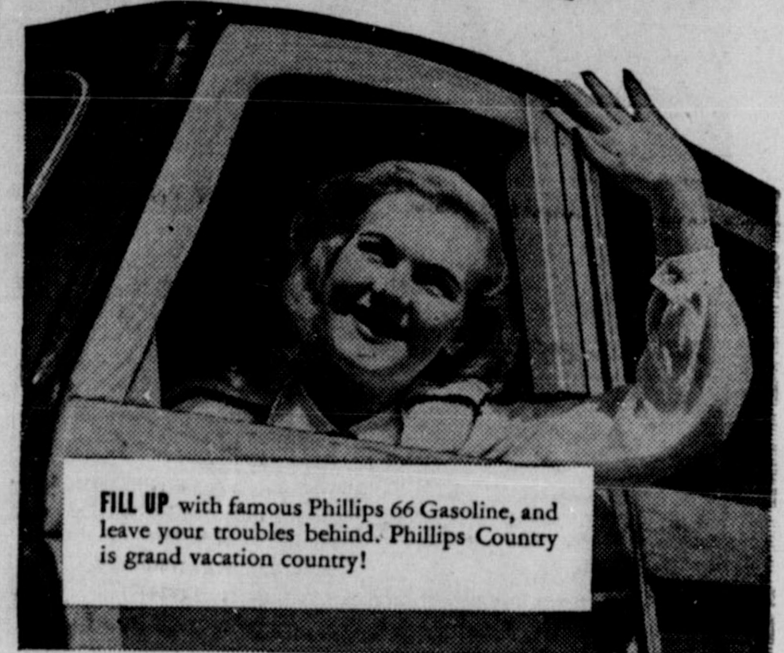
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LEGAL

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Providing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so to read hereinafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall print thereon) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

Proposing an Amendment to Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions shall be printed on the ballot, and the Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by the Legislature shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 59 of this Article shall not apply. But the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to the compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature, and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances of each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall

be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session.

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D. 1950.

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and operation of county health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide for the same. The total number of such units shall not exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall be levied, and such tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51F of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51F of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and the proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Sec. 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

The plan of salvation relative to the divine and human side, has been the burden of our theme for the past few weeks. That is, the part that God performed and the part that man does to save himself. This is brought about both by the works of God and the

works of men. We cannot be saved without the works of God; neither can we be saved without our own works.

The well instructed man does not select a few verses, claim them as his, and build a religious system on them, but learns how to receive the entire scripture as one consistent and harmonious whole. He does not give out one class of scriptures to one man, and another to another, and another to another, but receives the whole as from God, and for him.

Probably as convenient a place as any, at which to begin; the plan of salvation, relative to the works of men, will be to reconcile an expression made by the Apostles

Paul, with one made by James. Paul says of our justification, "It is not of works lest any man should boast." Eph 2:9. While James says of our justification, that "by works a man is justified." How can it be true, as Paul asserts, that our justification is not of works, and yet true, as James says, that we are justified by works? The great Luther felt this so keenly that he repudiated the Epistle of James, and decided it was not canonical. He thought the language of the two apostles utterly irreconcilable. He made up his mind that Paul was right—that justification is not of works—that by the deeds of the law no flesh could be justified in the sight of God. He saw no way to harmonize James with this, and decided that the Epistle of James was not of divine authority. But this will not do, if it was from a great man. There is no serious doubt about the authorities about the genuineness of the Epistle of James. The matter, then, is not to be settled in that way.

Some have tried to solve the difficulty by supposing that Paul was speaking of one kind of faith and James of another kind. But this will not do, for two reasons. In the first place, they were neither of them talking about faith at all. In the second place, we find no such expressions as "different kinds of faith" in the Bible. The Bible knows but one faith. As Pollock in substance, expressed it, "All faith is the same kind, though not the same in degree." Hence, we read of "much faith" "little faith" "great faith" "strong faith", "faith growing," etc., yet all the same in kind, but not the same in degree or quantity. If you had one pint of clean wheat, it would as certainly be wheat as if there were a thousand bushels, the same in kind but not the same in quantity. Precisely so, from the first impression the

truth makes on the heart, up to the fullest assurance of faith ever attained by the most devout saint, it is faith, nothing but faith, nothing but faith, the same in kind, though not the same in amount or degree. The matter is not to be settled, then, by any subtleties or speculations about faith.

How then, is the matter to be settled? This answer we will find out next week.

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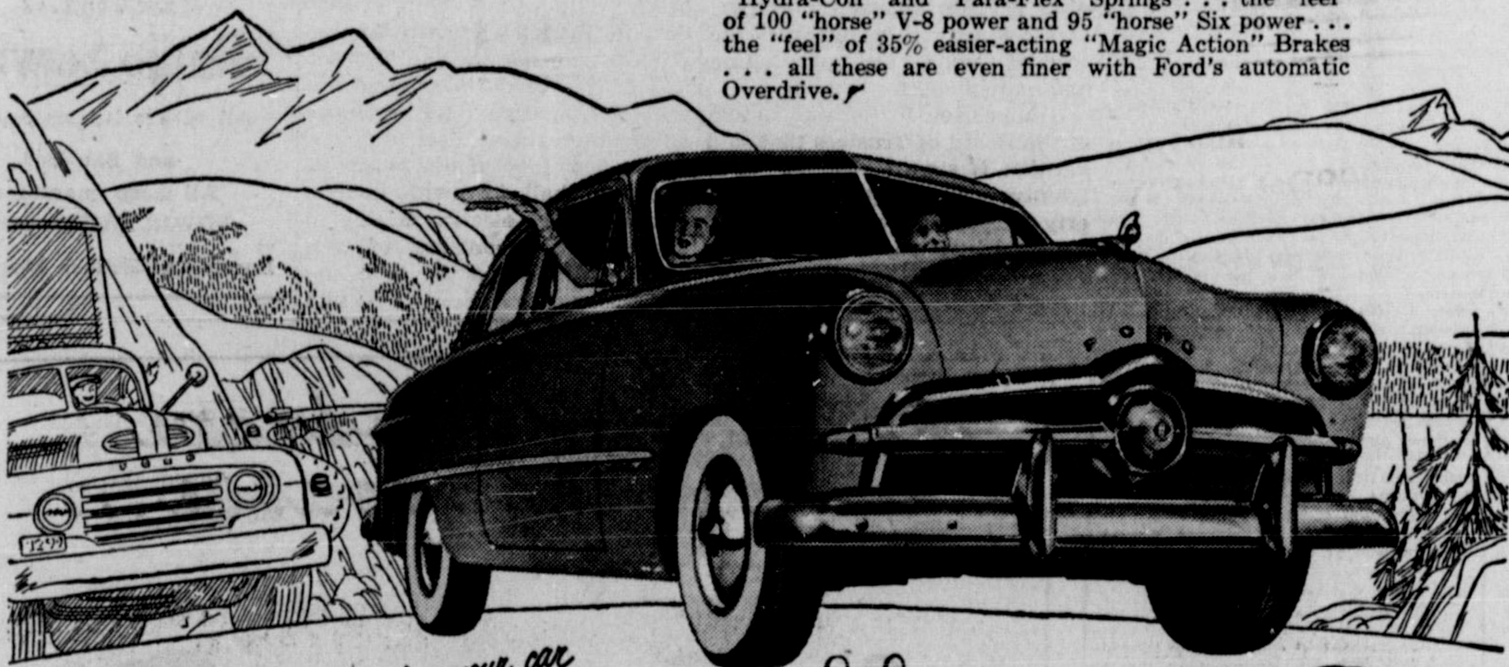

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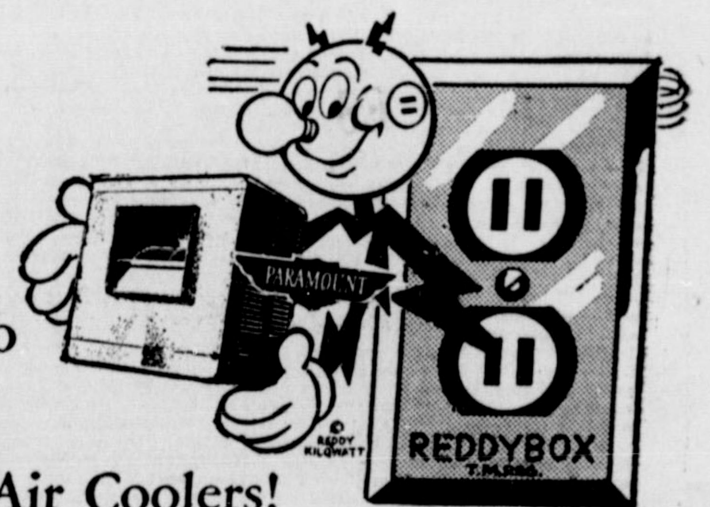
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**THE TEMPLE OF TRUTH**

Did you ever wonder why there was attached to your Social Security Card a stub showing your name and number? The answer is simple, says F. B. Ellington, Representative of the Social Security Field Office in Amarillo. "This stub," he says, "provides you with an official record of your name and number as they appear on your card. They should be kept in separate places, so that if the card is lost you will have this record of your number."

For fast service in getting a duplicate card in case you lost your original, Ellington says: "Get an application form at your local post office, fill it in, attach

the 'stub,' and mail them to the Amarillo Social Security Office. Your duplicate card will be sent you by return mail." Failure to attach the stub, he cautioned, will cause a delay of about a week in getting your duplicate, for without this official record of the number the application will have to be sent to Austin or to Baltimore, Maryland to get an official record of the number.

## Facts And Figures On Polio

By Dr. Roy James H. LaLonde, Buffalo, New York

(Continued from last week)  
The diagnosis of poliomyelitis has always baffled our medical "educators." It would seem that inasmuch as the paralysis itself is the first symptom, it is quite necessary to await this phase of the condition before they can proceed further. Of course one can readily perceive the degree of cell degeneration within the patient before anything is done to concretely arrest the process. But then one can not chastise medical wisdom for its inability to incorporate therapy in any disease until it shows every earmark of a disease.

Someone has asked, and quite justifiably: "Can a physician treat a disease without diagnosing it to know what medicine to give?" During the first few hours or days the physician must necessarily wait, helplessly and solicitously, watching the patient and hoping that "things" will soon develop so that he will know what to prescribe. What does the chiropractor do? He proceeds to adjust his patient and then the disease process in its incipient form disappears like magic. Fever subsides, your future disease process takes wing and the body once more begins to assert its former integrity. Maybe you will never know that your patient did or did not have polio but you found a subluxation and did not care what the potential symptoms might turn out to be without proper treatment. The physician can do nothing until the case is developed; the chiropractor can adjust immediately after he finds the subluxation. As an eminent chiropractic authority once said: "You don't need to know whether it's infantile paralysis or not; whether it is coming to that or not. Take this case as you find it, palpate the spine, find the subluxation, adjust it, and if your work is accurately done you will never know what it might have been."

This, surely, is the Chiropractic procedure and therefore must completely divorce itself from those measures which have fallen short of this end to immediately place the patient on the road to recovery. We must not procrastinate in delivering our adjustments. While much good has been accomplished in the restoration of wasted and paralyzed muscle tissue in the post polio cases, much greater benefits can be achieved in the incipient ones. These are the patients who must hear more about our work, so that when they are stricken these people are brought to chiropractors and can therefore more readily be restored to useful lives. To draw upon the words of Dr. Palmer who has keenly observed the pathology under discussion: "Pathology is anatomy gone wrong. Symptomatology is physiology gone wrong. Pathology is the observation of diseased anatomy. When you observe a cancer you are studying pathology, because you are studying tissue in a diseased condition. Symptomatology is the description of the patient gives of how he feels—and physiology is the study of functions in the individual.

"Physiologists have not classified functions, therefore it would be impossible for them to comprehend symptomatology. That is why the chiropractor with his process of analysis, which is more a process of elimination than subdivision, is able to take a case like 'infantile paralysis' and analyze it to its elements, because he analyzes not only matter but functions. (Adv.)

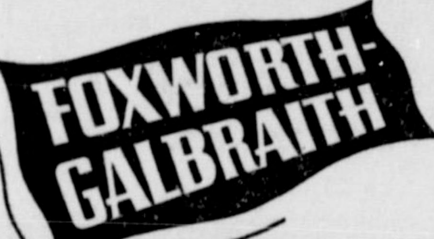

**Wheat Allotments**  
The 1950 Wheat Allotments were mailed from this office Tuesday. The County Allotment for Donley County was such that only an eighteen percent cut in the usual wheat acres, or average wheat acres, was necessary. Enough of the County Allotment has been set aside to take care of new or prospective wheat growers and appeal cases, so that every one will have a chance to get an allotment. New or prospective wheat growers have until August 31 to come into the office and apply for a "New Growers" Allotment, and those who have already received their allotments have fifteen days from the date on the allotment, or until August 17, to make an appeal to the County Committee concerning their allotment.

**Wheat Loans**  
We are still making out quite a few Wheat Loans, both Warehouse and Farm Storage. This year has really been a record year for Wheat Loans in Donley. We expect the total amount of loans made out for this year to pass the \$350,000 mark this week.

**Soil Conservation Practices**  
We are glad to see so many more farmers taking advantage of the assistance offered them by the Agricultural Conservation Program this year than did last year. This time last year only 189 farmers had completed soil and water conservation practices. This year 253 farmers have already completed conservation practices. We believe this is highly commendable and encourage everyone to help us raise this number. This week we have issued ap-
