

Eight pounds of calcium arsenate per acre as a dust is the right amount and should be applied when there is dew and the wind velocity not over five miles per hour.

There is more to cutting and keeping flowers for house or show than one would think. The blossoms do mighty well to live at all after being severed from the plant.

Flooding the beds the day before the flowers are to be cut is a help.

Very early in the morning before the dew is gone or better still after sundown is the best time to cut.

It is wise to carry a bucket of water with you when cutting, placing the newly cut stems at once in deep water prolongs the life of the flower. Do not crowd many flowers into one bucket, or you will find it impossible to remove them with out tearing or bruising them. Carry the flowers to cool dark cellar or room; place the flowers in deep jars of water to harden for several hours or better over night.

In cutting use a sharp knife or razor blade. Cut each stem on an angle so it will not adhere closely to container thus preventing water from being absorbed.

Never use scissors which crush the steams in cutting reducing the intake of water. If flowers should become wilted place in very warm water; let stay in dark place till cool.

When garden lillies are to feature in a bouquet remove stamens as soon as blossoms are cut.

Temperature and humidity play an important part in keeping qualities of flowers and keep them out of drafts. Bloom life and floral life are

the best preservative. Keep containers clean: wash with warm soda water, strip off all foliage that might get in the water.

Add a lump of charcoal to keep the water sweet.



hances the danger." The Director of the Commission's Wildlife Restoration Division said that the past mild winter

apparently caused the present infestation. Normal winter weather usually kills the screwworm fly, except in lower South and Southwest Texas. This year, however, flies survived in such numbers as to bring on an early and heavy outbreak of worm infestations. The screwworm attack begins when the flies infest wounds, some of which are caused by tick bites and barbed wire fences. The flies lay their eggs on the edges or on a dry portion of the area attacked. The eggs hatch within less than a day and the young whit' h worms burrow into the flesh.

The victim sometimes is so weakened by the parasites that it dies. Deer are so wild that ranchers and others seeking to aid infected animals, seldom can seize them until they are in the last stages of a fatal attack.
