



Auto Mechanics Wanted Now

"Almost every trained worker in the automotive service industry and Induction District, only half \$138 per month. who may find himself without kind of a civil service job," Paul H. Figg, director, Tenth Civil Service Region, said today.

Auto mechanics, electricians, body and fender men are urged to convert their skills to aircraft employment by Mr. Figg, who pointed out that the federal government needs these experts for civilian jobs at air fields throughout Texas and Louisiana.

Men who have never worked on an airplane engine, but who have two years experience as an auto mechanic can qualify as a junior aircraft engine mechanic, \$1860 a year, and likewise auto electricians with two years experience can qualify as a junior aircraft electrician at the same salary.

Body and fender workers with four years experience can qualify as a sheet metal worker at \$9.12 a

Less experienced men may meet the requirements for general mechanic's helper, \$1500 a year, and men without any experience but who have an aptitude for mechanics, may qualify as a mechanical learner, \$1080 a year.

"Many persons without special training or skills will be interested in the classified laborer position, which pays as high as 88c an hour in some localities," Mr. Figg

Bundle Mailing Deadline Is Nearing

The bulk of Christmas mail must be in the post office by December 1st this yeear if deliveries ing to Smith W. Purdum, Second Purdum is responsible to Postmaster General Frank C. Walker for smooth and efficient air and railway mail service.

Unprecedented wartime de mands on the postal and transportation systems, plus a prospective record volume of Christmas mailings, were cited by Mr. Purdum than ever before. "It is physically impossible for the railroads and important war materials, to handle Christmas mailings as rapidly as in normal times", Mr. Purdum said. "If the bulk of parcels and greeting cards are held back until the usual time-the period of areach their destinations after Christmas.

In 1941, about 21,950 mail cars were required between December 12 and 24 to deliver Christmas mails-enough cars to make a train 270 miles long. This year, the extra cars needed to move holiday mails are largely being used by the armed services, and a severe shortage is in prospect.

The postal service usually borrows about 2,500 trucks from the Army and other Government agencies, and rents about 10,000 from private owners, to handle

Some Fencing **Materials**

Fencing materials at retail levels are not covered in the recent "freeze" order on farm ma-

However, fencing materials at manufacturer and distributor levels fall under the general "freeze" order and cannot be released until permanent rationing is begun, the Texas USDA War Board said this

Under the general order, most types of machinery were "frozen' as of November 1 to allow the government time to establish quotas since permanent rationing will get underway in the near future.

Purpose of the farm machinery rationing program is to route limited farm machinery into essential channels where maximum contribution will be made to the war program.
