Texas State Teachers Association Hold Meeting Nov. 23-25

The Seventy-Second convention of the Texas Teachers Association met in San Antonio November 23, 24 and 25th with "Education, Basis of Individual Freedom and National Security" as the theme. The program was one of the best ever and approximately 13,000 teachers were present to hear some of the nation's outstanding speakers.

The meeting was opened with a special Thanksgiving service Thursday morning at the Municipal Auditorium with the Rev. Walter C. Kerr delivering the sermon. The first general session was held Thursday evening. Dr. John H. Furbay, Director of Air World Education, of New York and Dr. T. V. Smith, Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs, also of New York were speakers at that time. Discussion Groups and Professional Problems were taken up Friday with meetings held at various places and authorities on a wide range of subjects directing the work, among them Howard Dawson, Dept. of Rural Education, Jno. S. Carroll, Texas Tech, and others.

One of the most enjoyable sessions was held Friday evening with Jesse Stuart, speaker. Mr. Stuart, author of the book, "The Thread That Runs So True," held his audience as he reviewed portions of the book in connection with his subject "Education and American Democracy."

There were of course Section meetings, School Exhibits and entertainments such as luncheons, teas, breakfasts. A number of Donley County teachers attended.

HOW TO BEAT CHRISTMAS RUSH THIS SEASON

To be sure that your Christmas cards and packages reach their destination on time, it will be necessary to adopt certain methods this time.

These suggestions are based on the fact that most every post office will be compelled to curtail every expense possible. That means less help and shorter hours, despite the fact that this season appears to be going to have an extra heavy mailing season.

All packages outside the state should be mailed not later than December 2nd, and those to be delivered within the state should be mailed not later than December 9th.

Mail all Christmas cards going outside the state by December 10th, and those to be delivered within the state not later than December 15th.

Get your stamps now, buy your cards and place the address on each card. Separate the cards to be mailed to local people and tie the bunches separately. By this method, your cards will arrive on time. Otherwise they may be several days late.

These suggestions are made for the convenience of the mailing public. It is to help you so that disappointments will not occur.

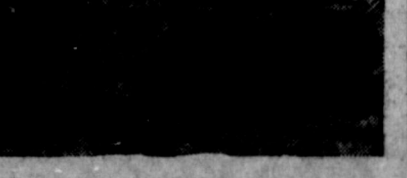
Every effort will be made by your post office force to handle your mailings at any time, but you must cooperate to insure the safe arrival of packages and cards at the proper time.

The same conditions that prevail in your local post office will be found in any and all post-offices this season.

Head-On Collision Takes Life of Lelia Lake Man

The only serious accident reported here over the Thanksgiving holidays was the death of Arthur Dutton, Lelia Lake farmer, who died in a head-on collision at Lelia Lake about 9:45 Thursday morning when the automobile he was driving collided with a heavy truck driven by Gordon Moore, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Moore. It was reported that a car stopped on the pavement in front of the truck and the collision was described as unavoidable when young Moore swerved to miss the car. Gordon was accompanied by his brother Don who received a broken nose and broken knee cap and both received various cuts and bruises. Mr. Dutton was driving alone. He lived only a short distance from where the accident occurred.

Sleigh bells will tinkle, reindeer with big antlers will prance and pant, their ankles popping in rhythm with the bells, when Santa Claus comes to town December 1st at 2:30 p. m. for the big parade sponsored by local business firms.

Many who never saw a reindeer in their lives will be on hand. They'll see Dancer and Prancer, Donder and Blitzen—in person, very much alive, that is, and fresh from the frozen Arctic Circle, brought straight to Texas for the benefit of both children and grown-ups.

Grady Carothers, Goldthwaite ranchman, is inside the Arctic Circle rounding up Santa's sleigh team. When they come to Clarendon for the parade it will be quite a show and all free.

The four reindeer will come wearing red leather harness with bright trimming, and the children can tell which is Dancer, which is Blitzen, which Prancer, for each will have his name spelled out on his bright harness.

Santa's sleigh will be a colorful vehicle, too. It will be bright red and silver with green trim with the words "Merry Christmas" spelled out in the decorations.

The white-whiskered friend of all children will have a new suit made by expert tailors. No imported or second-hand clothes for the ruddy, happy gentleman. This suit set him back a lot of money, but he strives to look his best when he comes to our city.

No expense has been spared by Santa's helpers to make this visit the most enjoyable occasion of this or any other year.

Take these four reindeer. They have been whisked thousands of miles from the far north in Alaska. Grady Carothers has made three trips to Alaska in as many years to help Santa Claus, but it took him two years of trying before he could arrange to bring out reindeer, in the first place.

He had to travel by bus, rail, airplane and dogsled to reach the cold Arctic coast area where the reindeer herds feed on reindeer moss in the snow. Carothers had to sleep out on the snow after he lassoed the reindeer. All around them were howling wolves, trying to slip up and kill the tethered deer. This year's trip alone required seven weeks.

Each year a reindeer sheds those huge antlers—and promptly grows a new set. They grow at the rate of half an inch a day, and in 90 days a reindeer will have grown himself a brand-new set of horns. Up in the Arctic the reindeer use those antlers for snow plows, to push drifts out of their way.

It's natural, Carothers says, for a reindeer to breathe with his mouth open and tongue lolled out, like a dog, when he's pulling

a sleigh. The antlered natives of the Far North have been equipped by nature for life in the Arctic. Hair protects the ends of their noses, between their hooves and all parts of their bodies.

Uncle Sam is mighty particular about reindeer, and that's why it took Carothers two years to arrange to bring the first ones out. The Eskimos are particular, too, but now they know Carothers and Santa will take good care of the reindeer while they're in Texas.

Their native feed is a lichen called reindeer moss, but down here they fare just fine on breakfast food. Rolled oats, that is, with a little mixed grain and a little peanut hay.

Eskimos help Carothers round up and train the wild reindeer to work in harness hitched to a sled. Sometimes they're teamed up with sled dogs at first, until they get used to harness. Then they're allowed to pull a sled by themselves, and finally they learn to draw Santa's bright sleigh.

Then they're ready for the big Santa Claus parade.

The local business firms invite all children of this area to come downtown for the Santa Claus parade, December 1st at 2:30 p. m.

Carothers will help Santa Claus and will return to Texas from the Arctic Circle to be on hand for this big show.

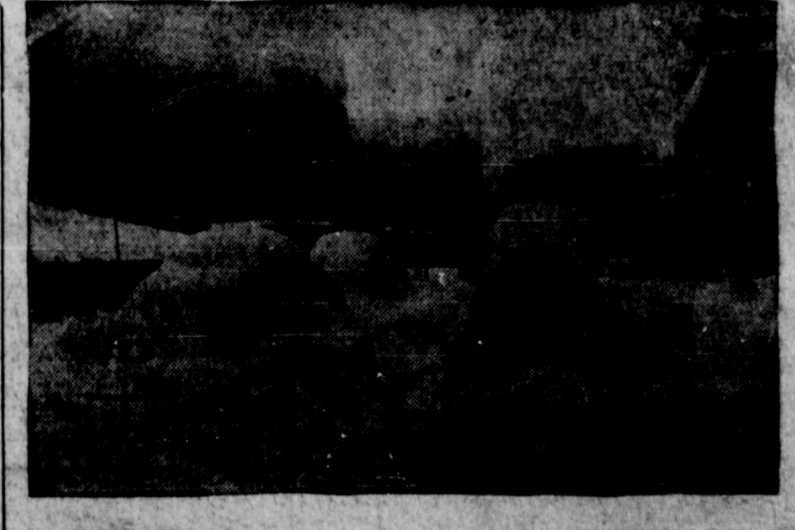

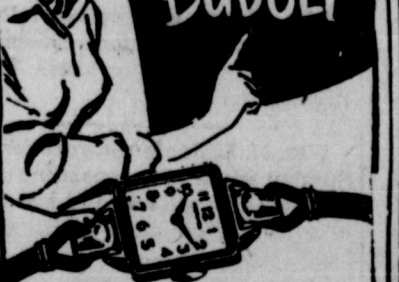



From the County PMA Committee

PAYMENT

If you have completed a 1950 practice be sure to come by the office and sign your application for payment. If you still have a 1950 approval and the practice is completed, be sure to turn the approval in as soon as possible.

1951 PROGRAM

There have been some approvals issued under the 1951 program. Don't forget that the 1951 program has begun. If you want to carry out a practice come by the office and get your approval.

William R. Christal has an approval for some terraces; T. Elmore Bailey and L. C. Selby have approvals for subsiding; twenty-five approvals have been issued for the deep-plowing practice; Roy Clark, Frank Hommel, Herbert Guill and Claude Stanton have approvals for wells; Raymond Farr and Frank Hommel have approvals for earthen dams; thirty-nine approvals have been

issued for winter legumes and sixty-one have been issued for Rye.

GRAIN SORGHUMS LOANS

At the present time forty-seven warehouse storage grain loans have been made. The total amount of these loans is \$55,202.14.

Empty pocketbooks on the farms slow down the wheels of industry in the city.

It is not advisable for farmers to plow up land which can better or more safely be used as pasture in order to help produce a 1951 cotton crop of 16 million bales.

One of the best ways to build protection against erosion into the soil is to grow and plow under a good growth of green manure from time to time.

Quail Season Opens December 1st

AUSTIN — Quail hunters in most of the state may look forward to improved quail hunting this fall, states the Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission.

The quail hunting season for the state is from December 1 through January 16, both days inclusive, with a bag limit of twelve per day or thirty-six per week. However, in the twenty-eight county area of the Panhandle, only ten birds per day may be taken with a possession limit of twenty. West of the Pecos the season is open only during December and the daily bag limit is twelve, with not more than twenty-four in possession. There is no open season on Mearns quail.

The Executive Secretary explains that many counties have special quail laws and urges hunters to check the local regulations before they go hunting.

Wildlife biologists of the Game Department are conducting studies of quail populations through examination of quail wings again this year. The Executive Secretary requests hunters to cooperate in this work by sending one wing from each bird they kill to the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission in Austin. A study of

quail wings will show the percent of young birds and indicate the production and survival for the year.

To facilitate mailing of wing collections, the Game Commission will supply special business reply envelopes on request. These provide space for recording pertinent data and require no postage from the hunter. The active help of hunting clubs and other groups is being solicited.

It is essential that wings from cocks and hens be placed in separate envelopes but any number of wings from birds of the same sex may be placed together. Only one wing from each bird should be saved. Date and county of collection are also necessary. If official envelopes are not at hand, any kind of paper sack will suffice if properly labeled.

One further bit of information is requested. In order to compare quail populations in different parts of the state, a place on the wing envelopes will be shown for recording the number of coveys found per day of hunting. The Executive Secretary states that this will also add to the picture of the state quail situation.

There are many problems to be solved in selecting reading material for adults. Fiction is very frequently not on the approved list for conservative libraries. These books that head the best seller lists for weeks, and are approved by reading clubs whose selection boards should know good material are not worth one's time. I took a membership with a book club for the library to procure books at a price within our budget, but it has been a disappointing scheme. Our most recent edition is "Star Money" by Kathleen Winsor, and it is likely in the class with her "Forever Amber."

Our periodicals are attractive and the monthly editions contain many holiday suggestions. Our magazine rack has some excellent magazines, even the Cattleman, Atlantic Monthly, some Vogue's and many others. The

women who remember to bring these copies regularly are contributing greatly to our readers' pleasure. In the recent Library periodicals, both state and national, there is a movement to use public libraries primarily for research and reference, and these publications have numerous articles in criticism of our libraries that attempt to supply the patrons with material for recreation. These people have never experienced a holiday period or a summer in a small town where children, Juniors and adults all flock in the library for recreational reading. They are quite related, too, over their reading shelves at school. It is very evident that a library with enjoyable material does an excellent part in producing wholesome pleasure to a great portion of our population. Pocket book editions, picture shows, and other forms of pleasure the people have access to are not as satisfactory as reading. Then our budget is too small to purchase reference material. Our copies are donated editions with the exception of a few. Our total income for purchases is never over \$125 or \$130 per year. Paste, and other mending materials and cards for posting the books have to be deducted from

this fund so our present plan of a library is the only logical one. "Nothing can supply the place of books. They are cheering, are soothing companions in solitude, illness, and affliction." — Channing.

Mr. and Mrs. C. O. Hill give this account of a very eventful time during the weeks that school was dismissed. The story is as follows:

We left on Friday afternoon, October 20, and started to Danville, Arkansas via Hollis, Altus, Lawton and McAllister. Arrived at Altus at 6 p. m. As we were leaving Altus on east side town a man who had been ahead of us several minutes, suddenly turned left while a car approaching from

We made two drives on high mountains overlooking wide valleys. From these high viewpoints we could see many miles in either direction. We left there Friday afternoon, November 2, and went to our home in Shelby County, Texas, at Joaquin. We went via Waldron, Mena, Texarkana and Shreveport, La. At Waldron, Ark. we were hit again and our left front fender bent.

We have a buyer for 2 or 3 section Ranch. Would like to have listing on same.

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This entire route is scenic. Pines are on each side of the highways all the way. We arrived at Joaquin about 3:30 p. m.

Our home of thirteen rooms was cold and lonesome. It is on a lake, just west of Joaquin. We spent a week here visiting neighbors, fishing, going to shows and looking over our land.

On November 10, we left Joaquin to go to Sam Houston State College homecoming. Here we saw the parade, football game, and other attractions. We spent Friday night at the Student Center.

Saturday at 3:30 p. m. we started for Kirkland, planning to spend the night at Fort Worth with our son, Andrew Hill. He and his wife had to go to a homecoming, so we rode on to Decatur and spent the night at a hotel by the Court Square. The big clock in the Court House kept us awake much of the night. We left there at 7:20 a. m., ate lunch in Vernon with a cousin and arrived at Lelia Lake at 5:30 p. m. Sunday.
