It has been two weeks since we received a new book—either gift or purchase. This is quite unusual, but there are some enticing periodicals ready for your pleasure. These periodicals are not attractive to boys as they ask for "Field & Stream," "Popular Mechanics" and "Flying type magazines. If you have a file of "Wee Wisdom", "Children's Activities" "Jack and Jill," or "Playmate" these children would devour them. Clarendon children enjoy reading.

"The Legacy of Gabriel Martel" by Marie L. Nowinson has not attracted the reading patrons as it should. It was a \$10,000 Christopher Award winner and apparently conservative. It has been on the best seller list, and chosen by several famous writers in the lists of books they like

best. "The Edge of Time" by Loula Grace Erdman was reviewed by Hoffman Birney in the "New York Herald Tribune Book Review." The book is discussed with approval, stating in conclusion, "Miss Erdman writes tenderly and understandingly of the "sodbusters" whose faith built much of the West and who never merited the contempt with which they were often regarded." Recent advertisements and lists of books for every age are very temptingly displayed in all the "Book Review" sheets I receive, but it isn't likely we can make any purchases before January as books are expensive and funds are always lacking.

Information Bulletin from our Library of Congress states there are about 5000 books out of the Library all the time, and most of these are in the possession of members of Congress and their families. Some Congressmen read all the latest works of poetry and fiction, others seek historical information, and views and actions of great men of early days. Many of the wives of senators and representatives read extensively for their own pleasure and earnestly study historical and political questions expressly for the purpose of aiding their husbands in their public duties. The families of Congressmen study popular books upon art and household decorations. The American and English poets are extensively read and not a few are careful readers and ardent admirers of the classic poets.

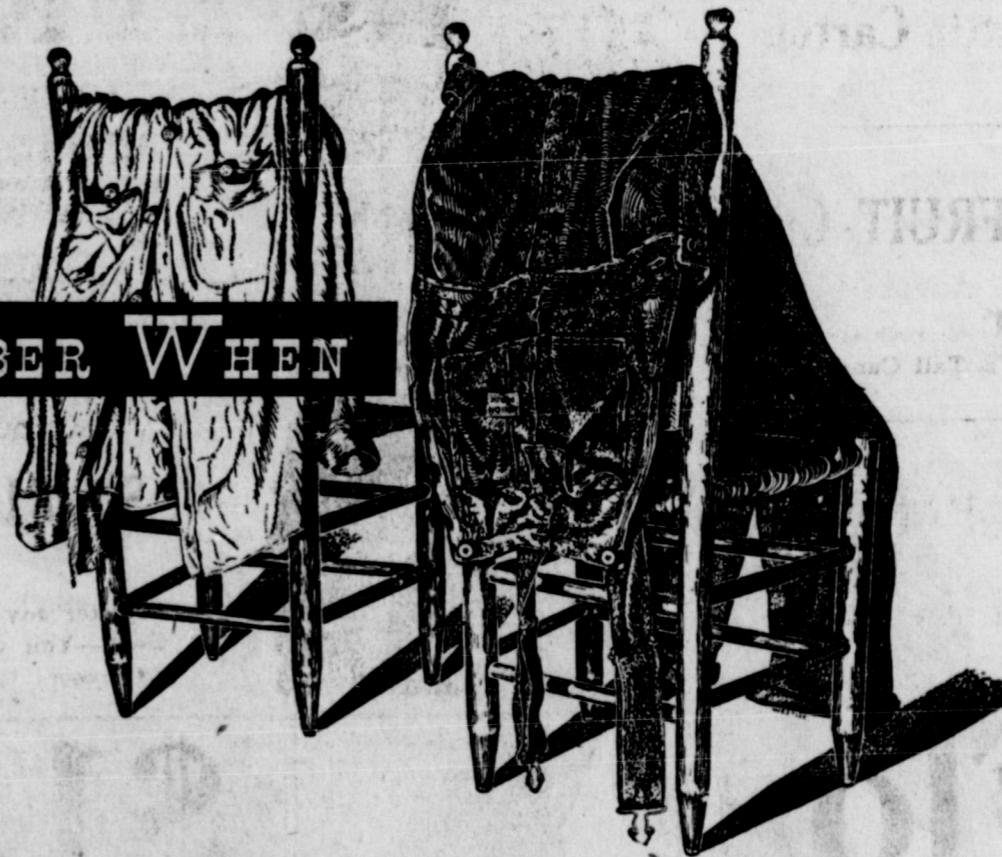

Monk Vance, County Agricultural Agent, Harris County, carries a column in a Houston paper under the title of "Farm Corner." In a recent issue he had this to say about the P.M.A.:

In a quiet manner the Production and Marketing Administration is tightening its purse strings on assistance payments to farmers.

At one time in order to get across to farmers the importance of soil building, the P.M.A. footed almost all the bill for seeds, fertilizers and other practices.

But now Congress seems to be all but demanding that a cut-back be made on farmers using the same assistance over and over. This has been going on gradually and will probably be felt even more so by farmers in the future.

One good example of the increase in the farmer's share of the bill is in phosphate, a material most every farmer has applied to his soil. Since 1945, the farmer's share of payment has increased from \$4.20 to \$12.30 a ton, while the actual total cost of phosphate has increased only \$1.50 per ton, from \$29 to \$30.50.

The farmers will be expected to put up more of the price of most other items of P.M.A. assistance, especially if the farmer's record shows he has used it before.

The entire P.M.A. program was set up originally to assist in soil building improvements where the farmer couldn't afford to do without financial assistance. Then the farmer had learned what the practice will do, the P.M.A. expects him to continue with it without assistance from P.M.A.

Another thing that P.M.A. isn't doing and that's experimenting with new practices.

After a plant or fertilizer has been proved by the experiment stations or farmers themselves to be good (such as crimson clover), the P.M.A. committee then help the farmer get it started and then eases off on the amount of financial assistance.

The practices and rates of payment are set by the State P.M.A.

Committee in the fall before they go into effect the following year, and then the county committees determine which of the practices authorized are needed most in their particular county.

THE COTTON SITUATION

Production of at least 16 million bales of cotton is needed in 1951 to take care of expanding defense requirements, needed domestic use and exports, and to maintain a reserve supply at home. This means planting a considerably larger acreage of cotton than was planted in 1950, and planting it in accordance with good soil conservation and farm management practices.

In 1950, Donley County producers planted a total of 25,855 acres of cotton. The allotment to Donley County producers was 31,207 acres. In order to meet the national demand for cotton, as much should be produced in 1951 as was produced in 1949. In planning your farming for 1951, do not forget SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION. That farm you have should be cared for.

E. S. Ballew of Clarendon Elected To Serve On The Board of Directors Of Hampshire Swine Registry

CHICAGO, ILL. — At the annual membership meeting of Hampshire Swine Registry held here last week, E. S. Ballew of Clarendon, Texas, was elected to serve on the board of directors for the coming three years. Mr. Ballew has been engaged in the breeding of Hampshires for nearly a quarter of a century and has been showing prize winning Hampshire barrows in Texas shows for the past 21 years.

Two years ago, Mr. Ballew was chosen to serve on the official type committee of the Hampshire breed. This committee, composed of representatives of all phases of the swine industry, serves as the guiding force in the selection for type at the national type conferences. Here using live animals as a basis for study, Hampshire folks for the past 12 years have combined their views as to the best means of improvement within the breed. Foremost in the thoughts of these folks has been

the ability of the breed to profitably produce lean meat products demanded by the consumer.

This wide experience with the Hampshire breed gives Mr. Ballew a sound qualification to serve as director of this organization that officially records all Hampshire hogs in the nation. National headquarters for the breed are located in Peoria, Illinois. In addition to recording activities, this organization publishes Hampshire Herdsman, a national magazine devoted to the interests of the belted breed.

Mr. Ballew is the first director ever elected to the board from the state of Texas. It is appropriate that Texas be represented in view of the increase in Hampshire production in the state. In 1949, Texas ranked 8th in the nation in number recorded and 6th in new memberships in Hampshire Swine Registry. Although 1950 records are not complete, early indications point to

new all time highs for the state. Other directors elected for three year terms were Paul E. Althoff, Arcanum, Ohio; and Guy E. McReynolds, Ashland, Nebraska.

At a directors meeting following the membership meeting, all officers were re-elected for 1951. They are: James B. Nance, president, Alamo, Tennessee; Harry M. Knabe, vice-president, Nehawka, Nebraska; R. L. Pemberton, secretary, Peoria, Illinois; and Miss Lou L. Reed, treasurer, Peoria, Illinois.

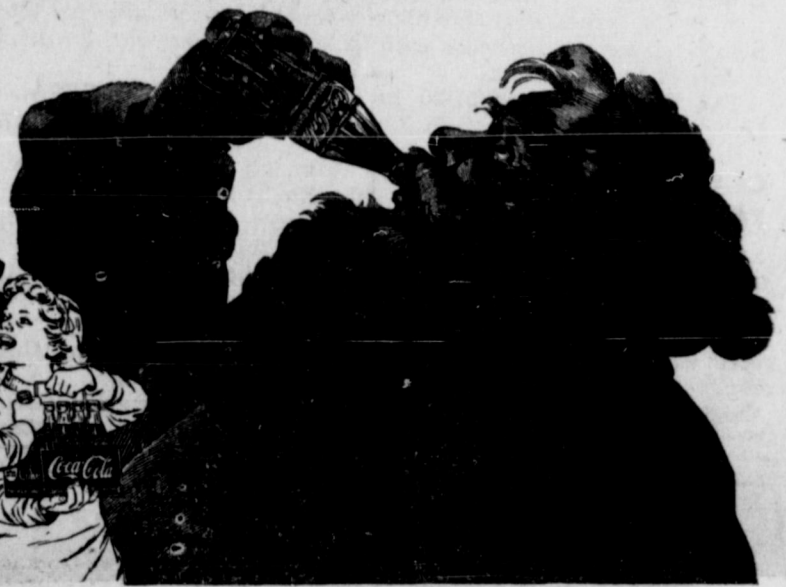

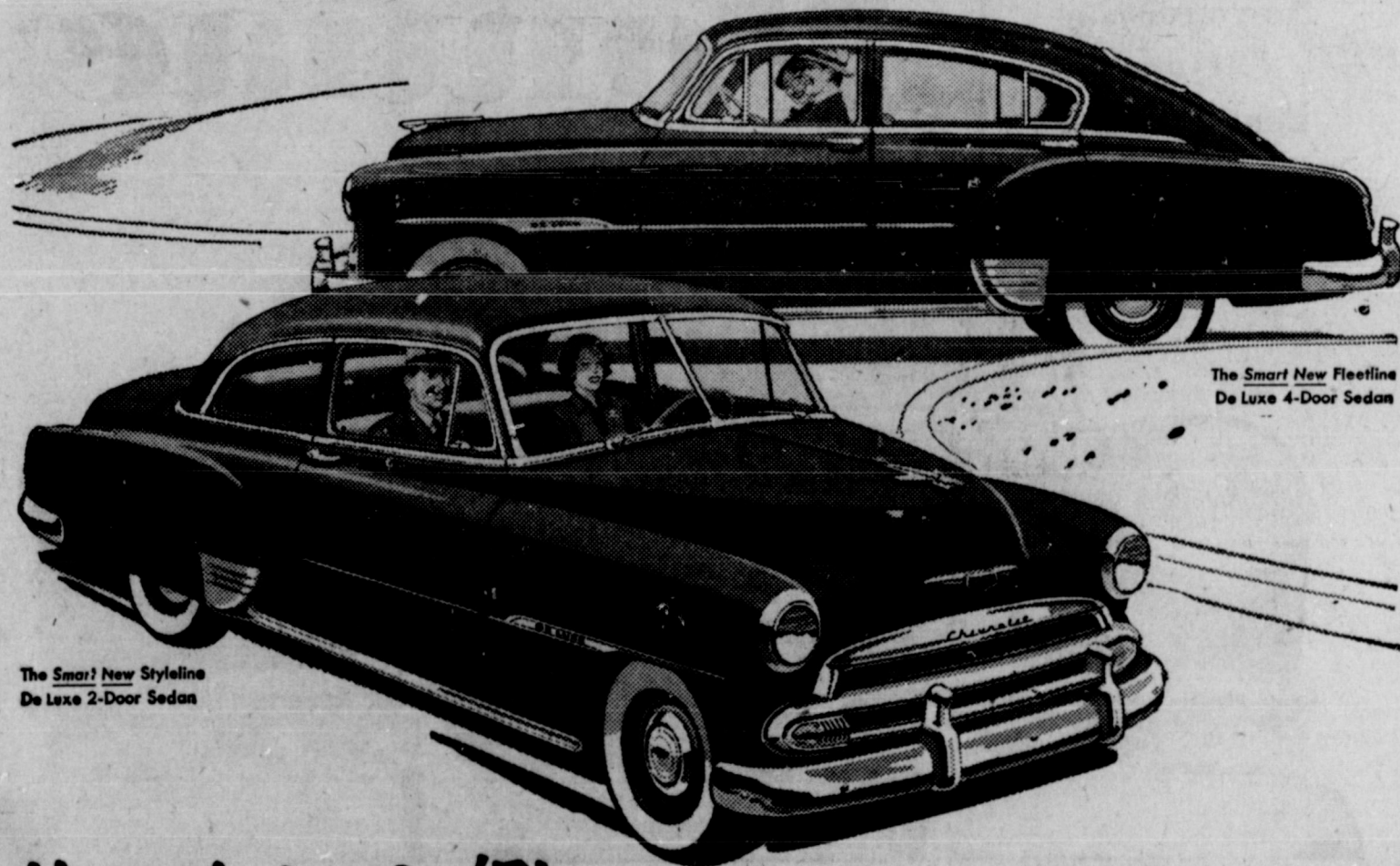

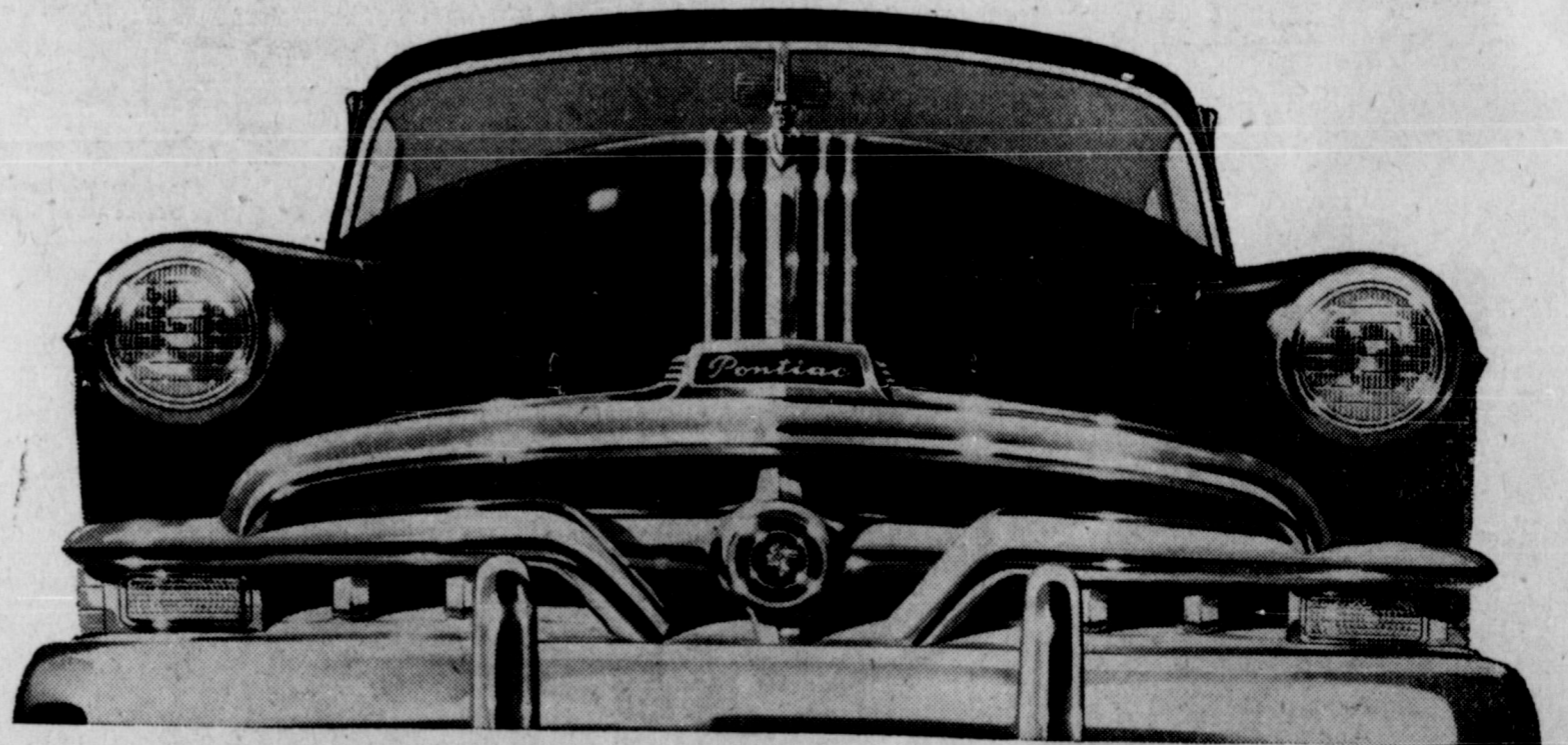

While over 200 Scouters were present at these various sessions, the Annual Meeting will give a chance to over a thousand Scouters to hear Mr. Perin speak on Scouting.

Mr. Perin is outstandingly qualified to appear as the Annual Meeting speaker, as he has had a long and varied background in Scouting. As a boy in Hurricane, Utah, he advanced in Scouting

from Tenderfoot to Eagle Scout, and served in his Troop as a Junior Assistant Scoutmaster. While he was attending the University of New Mexico he served in Scouting as both Assistant Scoutmaster, and then as Scoutmaster. During his summer vacations in college he served on the staffs of Zion and Grand Canyon National Parks as a guide. In 1931 he flew news photographs between Chicago and Cincinnati. After leaving college, Mr. Perin became Supervisor of Camps and Forestry Construction at the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation in New Mexico. He also helped establish the University of New Mexico Archaeology School.

As a member of the Professional Service of the Boy Scouts of America, Mr. Perin graduated from the 47th National Training School and served as Field Executive, Cincinnati, Ohio, Assistant Scout Executive, Santa Fe, New Mexico, and Phoenix, Arizona. In 1942 he became Scout

Executive, Safford, Arizona, and remained there until he joined the National Staff of the Boy Scouts of America in 1947. His capacity since that date has been as Assistant National Director of the Boy Scouting Service, working with local Boy Scout Council training committees, and training the volunteer leaders in the Movement. His present home is in Kansas City, Missouri.
