Wildcat Well Now Drilling Below 6,000 Feet

From all indications, Donley County will get their deepest test well in the Lewis W. Welch R-G Ranch wildcat now being drilled 12 miles southeast of Clarendon. The depth reported by Karl Fink, head tool pusher, Wednesday morning was 6,092 feet. According to what information we have been able to obtain, this is already deeper than any previous well in this area. Mr. Fink reported the formation as granite wash, lime with streaks of shale and some chert with granite wash. It is presumed to be Pennsylvanian and if this is true and if something hard is not encountered there are other pay formations below this depth. No important indications have been encountered to date but there is always a possibility of striking a good pool as long as they are able to keep drilling.

Some of these suggestions are from the "Times Book Review" notes. It seems the life expectancy of the average book is a short and sometimes happy one lasting from three to six months. During this period it may sell

any where from 2500 to 10,000 copies, unless it is picked by a book club, or becomes a best seller. At the end of its run, the book drifts off to that grave yard of vanished hopes. A few of the better editions each year have an unpredictable habit of lingering on after the funeral. But they never attain the lasting attraction of Dickens, Stevenson, Cooper and those of the far past. Perhaps this is due to our view point—changes of life to day. At any rate a Librarian soon learns the

books to be selected for each reader patron from the little people thru the various ages of the grown ups.

"Life of an American Workman", Walter P. Chrysler is one of the most fascinating biographies we possess for boys, but most of them enjoy mystery adventures and westerns. The above biography has been so extensively advertised, and I especially appreciated our free copy.

A few new books arrived this week—Thomas B. Costains' "Son of A Hundred Kings." His brilliant warm, appealing story of a young boy and a Canadian town during those colorful days at the turn of the century.

"This, his first period novel, has the same narrative skill and rich characterizations that have so delighted the millions of readers of his excellent historical novels. Then we have two memorial books which were gifts to the junior boys—"The Man-Eating Leopard of Rulroprayog" by Jim Corbett, and "Dapple Gray" by Thomas C. Hinkle. Each of these writers have books on our shelves which

are greatly enjoyed by the boys and girls who read with us.

Harnett F. Kane has a new book we have recently purchased, "Pathway To The Stars." It is a novel based on the life of the Old South's greatest landowner. The colorful and absorbing narrative is based on the thousands of old letters and records that Harnett Kane had access to, and these have been his source of material to reveal a portrait of one of the strangest men who ever lived, and the vivid, lusty New Orleans of which he was a part. Our readers should enjoy this book.

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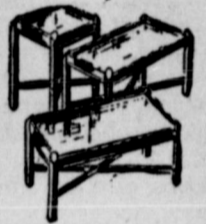

HYSTERIA, DEFEATISM, HYSTERIA, NEVER WIN

This is no time for hysteria, defeatism, or criticism of public officials whom we do not know are guilty of breach of the rules of conduct. Charges and proofs are two different things. When we cannot substantiate our claims, better not make them.

We well recall the crisis of the past few years when the future looked dark. When Dunkirk hit, the English speaking people did not fold up and quit. When Hitler marched on Egypt and it looked like nothing could stop his armies before he reached the Suez Canal, the English speaking folks only redoubled their fight. When Pearl Harbor was hit, and Manila fell, we retreated, but did not surrender.

MacArthur surprised the world by his military tactics in Korea, but they have failed, and now our forces are in retreat, with a half million Chinese hot on their trail. We are retreating, but we are not whipped.

We have listened to a lot of so-called military experts, who can tell us all of the mistakes which have been made. Certainly any one with a grain of sense can look back and see the mistakes which were made, but every American is willing to admit that they were mistakes of the head and not of the heart. America was determined to bring about world peace as quickly as possible, and did the job up fine. These were mistakes, but who in our generation has not made mistakes—serious mistakes—too.

It is evident that Prime Minister Atlee has sold President Truman on the combined thought of the French and English. It was reported before the coming of Atlee that Truman was fighting mad and ready to use the atomic bomb. Whether he has been talked out of this no one knows.

From information which has come out of Washington we are convinced that Atlee has a rather sound program for world peace. While it goes against the American grain to retreat, it is sometime better to retreat with honor than to be whipped in dishonor.—Canyon News.

Polio Fund Shows \$300,000 Deficit

AUSTIN—The problem of facing a home front war centering around the scourge of polio was put squarely up to the people of Texas recently.

All of the state's vaunted resources were being mustered as a mighty "Governor's Fight Polio Committee," named by Governor Allan Shivers, began pushing the urgent drive. Action on the community level will be emphasized through the new 150-man committee which will supplement the local machinery already set up in most areas.

Primary objective of the movement is to overcome a \$300,000 deficit in treating the record number of polio cases which has become so large that Texas in 1950 reported almost one tenth of all the new polio cases in the nation.

The actual drive for funds, so far as the general public is concerned, will center around the 1951 March of Dimes, January 15-31. But emphasis also will be placed on large individual donations.

Members of the "Governor's Fight Polio Committee" attended meetings in Austin recently, carrying through a final pre-campaign state-wide meeting. They took back home the message that polio cripples the economic structure of the community and state just as it cripples the persons who contract the disease.

Leading authorities pointed out that money is needed to care for patients and above all to carry out research into the cause of the disease.

In the words of Governor Shivers, "Texas must meet the challenge of this dreaded scourge until science can conquer it."

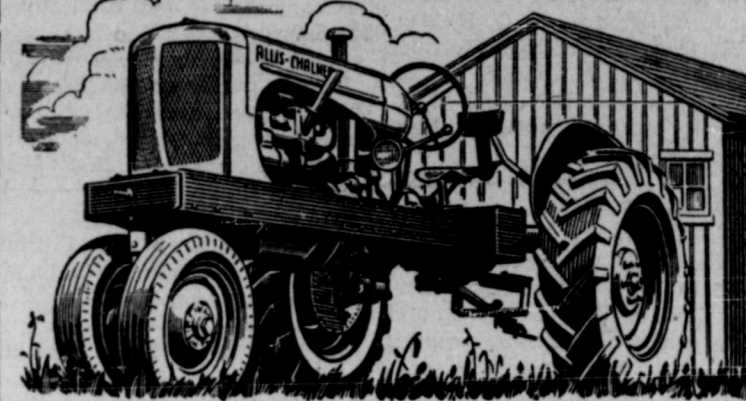

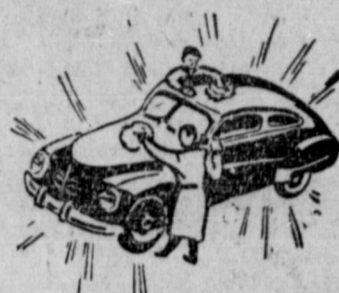

Bids To Be Opened Feb. 10th On Tech Student Union

LUBBOCK—The New Student Union Building at Texas Technological College became near-reality today with the announcement that the Board of Directors will open bids on the structure at the Feb. 10 meeting.

The building plans were approved by the Board last August but it delayed action because of the Korean war. The structure is expected to cost \$500,000.

Profits from the Texas Tech bookstore will pay for the greatest part of building costs, \$400,000. The other \$100,000 will be furnished by concessions operated on the campus by the Student Association, plus gifts.

Ed Smith, assistant to the President of Tech, said building costs have risen sharply in recent months.

"It is not known just what can be built with available funds," Smith said. However, architects are completing new plans.

Smith said that Board Members believe that the National Production Authority ruling against construction of places of entertainment will not affect the Union Building.
