TO IMPROVE TEXAS RANGE GRASSES

AUSTIN — The University of Texas Plant Research Institute is well into its program to lay a scientific base for improving Texas range grasses.

Dr. W. Gordon Whaley, Institute director, reports that:

A general survey of the characteristics and distribution of 254 Texas range grasses will be published this summer, and a new survey to summarize reproduction and breeding data on Southwestern grasses is underway.

Several basic nutritional studies of Texas grasses have been completed or are in final publication stages, including two projects which may improve phosphorus fertilizer practices.

Four studies of grass reproduction have been started, including one to produce mutations and other inheritable changes in grasses by doubling their chromosme numbers through exposure to the drug alkaloid colchicine.


Other investigations underway include a study of what constitutes drouth resistance in Texas grasses and a general project to discover and study natural hybrid plants and attempt to reproduce them artificially.
