## DONLEY COUNTY JERSEY HERD SWEEPS TOP HONORS at ABILENE AND PLAINVIEW DAIRY SHOWS

The Green Belt Dairy Herd owned and exhibited by J. R. Gillham swept top honors in the Annual Panhandle Plains Dairy Show at Plainview, April 6-13, and at the West Texas Jersey Show held at Abilene, April 16-19. Tulip's Design Bob, senior bull calf, won the junior and grand champion honors in the bull class at Plainview for Gillham. Aim's Observer Sue was first junior calf and junior champion female at the same show. 113 head of Jerseys were shown by 26 exhibitors from Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma. Approximately 500 head of dairy cattle of five breeds were exhibited at the show.

Aim's Noble Prince, aged bull, was senior and grand champion of the West Texas Jersey Show at Abilene, where 144 head of the top Jerseys of the state were exhibited. Gillham's Tulip's Design Bob was first senior calf and junior calf at the same show. Knolle Jersey Farm, the world's largest herd of registered Jerseys, furnished the major competition for Gillham's herd at the Abilene Show. Tulip's Design Bob defeated the Knolle entry, Masterman Hotspur for the junior championship. The Hotspur bull was junior champion at several state fairs last fall. Aim's Observer Sue was first junior calf and reserve junior champion of the Abilene Show.

In addition to the above winnings, Gillham's entries won 20 other blue ribbons, 14 red, 8 white and a number of other prizes at the two shows. In January five Jerseys of the Greenbelt Herd were exhibited at the Fort Worth Show where they won two first and three second places.

Frank E. Cannon placed second at the Plainview Show with his two year old Jersey Bull and in the Holstein Division Billy Phillips and F. C. Crofford exhibited five animals. Their entries were fourth in the junior bull and heifer classes, and 8th in the sub junior heifer group. Gillham exhibited seven Holsteins and won second sub junior bull, third junior bull, second and fourth sub junior heifer, first and second junior heifer, and first on calf herd.

## Donley Youth Wins Top Showmanship Award at Dairy Show

Otto Rudolph Jander, 14 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Jander of the Martin Community, won the top showmanship award at the Panhandle Plains Dairy Show offered by the American Jersey Cattle Club. Otto won the award in his first show in competition with over thirty top junior showmen of the entire Panhandle Plains Area. The Plainview show was the Donley County youth's first effort out side of Donley County.

D. T. Simens, fieldman for the American Jersey Cattle Club, judged the showmanship contest, and was very complimentary in his remarks concerning the ability of the local youth. Young Jander received a plaque and will receive a gold medal from the American Jersey Cattle Club as a reward for this honor.

## Water Bond Election Set For May 12th

An election has been called by the City Commissioners of the City of Clarendon, to determine whether or not to issue municipal water bonds in an amount: up to \$15,000.

The election has been set for Saturday, May 12.

There has been an acute shortage during summer months for the last several years, and the City is now in a condition to provide necessary water for this summers use if this bond election is carried.

The City Commissioners stated that taxes would not have to be increased to take care of this bond issue. A bond expert has looked over the city finances, and reports that the City of Clarendon is in such good financial condition, that a bond issue of \$100,000.00 could be issued at no increase in tax if the people so determined.

The bonds bear interest at the rate of 3 per cent and mature in 1953, 1954, and 1955.

A water engineer from the Texas Board of Water Engineers reports a good supply of water in the southeast part of town, and that a water well of over 500 gallons per minute should easily be obtained.

The City Commissioners and the Mayor realize that a great many questions will arise in connection with this election, and welcome anyone who would like to discuss it with them.

POST OFFICE WILL BE MOVED OVER WEEK END TO BLOCKER BUILDING

The ten year lease having expired May 1st, the post office will be moved this week end to the building owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Blocker next door south of the West Texas Utilities office in the next block south of the present location.

Since moving the fixtures involves a lot of labor, and setting them up again takes a lot of time, patrons of the post office in Clarendon are requested to exert a lot of patience in getting mail next Sunday.

Everything possible will be done to get the fixtures in place behind locked doors, working every hour possible, still there will be a disruption that is naturally to be expected. The new location will be occupied on a ten year lease.

There will be a number of improved features in the new location provided for the comfort and convenience of the employees and patrons of the post office. Just have patience until these new features can be placed in operation.

One section of 75-cent boxes will be added to the equipment. Those wishing a box are requested to file applications to those already on file. The boxes will be assigned in order of filing.

There will be little delay in dispatching mail going out of town. Every detail has been worked out to cause as little delay as possible. Again, please be patient since this type of delay happens but once in ten years, postmaster J. C. Estlack stated.

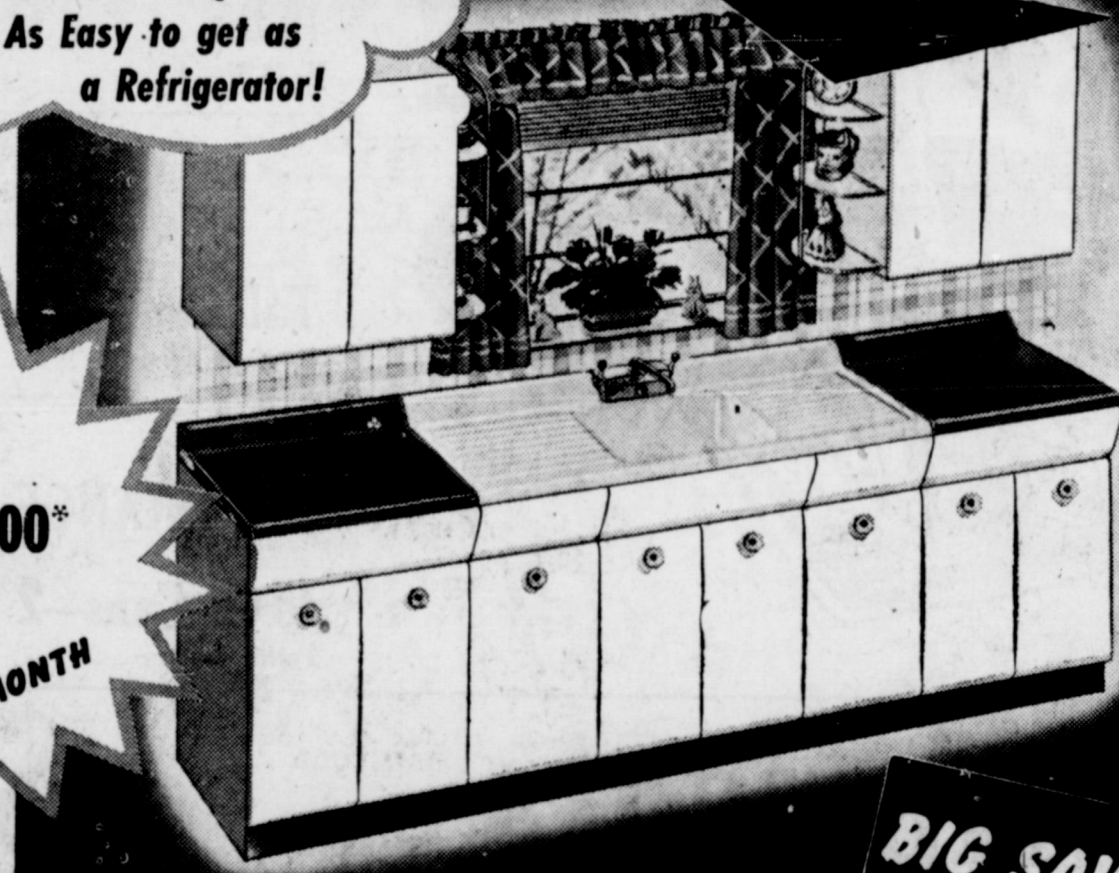

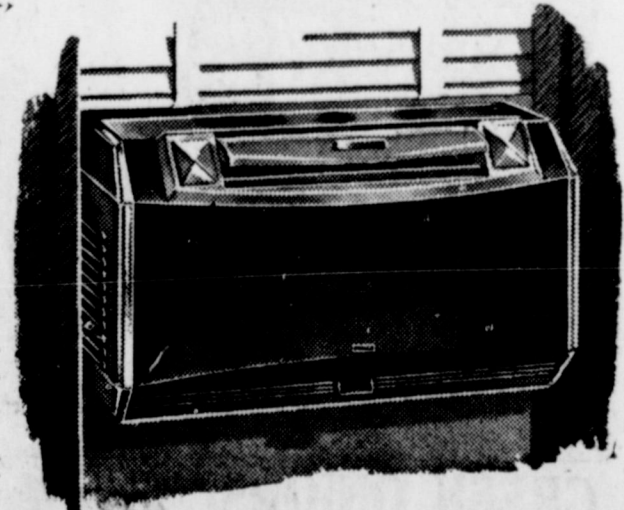

FARM NEWS From the County PMA Committee

A FARMER WELL PLEASED

Nelson D. Seago is a good example of a farmer that is pleased with subsoiling. Last year Mr. Seago earned assistance for subsoiling all of his farm except the alfalfa land and 14.0 acres. This year, he could only earn assistance on the 14.0 acres, but he liked the practice so well that he subsoiled the rest of his farm again without assistance.

If you do not know anything about this practice, why not ask Mr. Seago about it. He is one of the many farmers in Donley County that heartily approve this practice.

Most of the farms in Donley County that have tight land have earned assistance on this practice either in 1950 or 1951. Payment cannot be earned again on land that has been subsoiled and assistance earned under a previous program.

RYE AND WINTER LEGUMES

If you have an approval for Rye, Austrian Winter Peas or Hairy Vetch be sure to report it before May 1, 1951 or the approvals will be cancelled. The County Committee extended the closing date to this time so that more of you could come in and report these practices.

EXTENDED E BONDS INCREASE IN VALUE

Extending a Series E Bond for another 10 years after it matures will increase its value by a third. B. V. Vance, Chairman of the State Production and Marketing Administration Committee, reminds farmers.

Recently enacted legislation has authorized continued pay-

ment of interest on the bonds after their original 10-year maturity date. The first E Bonds mature on May 1, 1951.

Under the new law, three choices are open to the owner of maturing E Bonds:

(1) He can receive full cash payment for the Bond at maturity.

(2) He can hold the Bond for up to another 10 years—it will be automatically extended if it isn't turned in at maturity.

(3) He can exchange the "E" Bond for a "G" Bond.

Mr. Vance explains that the Series E Bond which is extended at maturity will pay an average interest for the 10 years of about 2.9 percent compounded semi-annually. Thus, a \$75 Bond, which is worth \$100 at the end of 10 years, would be worth \$133.33 if held for another 10 years.

Series G Bonds earn interest at 1/2 percent and give the owner current interest income. This interest will be mailed to the bond owner semi-annually until maturity of the G Bond in 12 years. G Bonds may be cashed any time after 6 months of the date of issue, provided advance notice of 1 month is given.

ELECTRICITY NOW ON 85 PERCENT OF FARMS

Cooperatives that distribute electricity are bringing about a quiet revolution in the rural areas in America, Knox T. Hutchinson, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, told the Wisconsin Rural Electric Cooperative Association recently. He pointed out that more than 5 million farms or 85 percent are electrified in the country and only about 800,000 remain without service.

Indicating the importance of electricity in defense production,

the Assistant Secretary pointed out that electric power has 400 known uses on the farm, and farmers are constantly discovering more ingenious ways to employ that power. In dairy areas, for example, as much as one-half of all the coop power consumed goes directly into production, in the operating of milkers, sterilizers, cooling equipment, feed grinding, hay drying, silo filling, and the like.

Not only is electricity helping to produce more food and fiber, he said, "it is helping to turn over a new leaf in the Nation's thinking about life on the farm. Not so long ago the farm, without electrical conveniences, was considered merely a place on which to make a living. Today people, including the younger generation, are fast coming to recognize the farm as a choice place on which to live."

### To The People of The 18th District

From Your Congressman Walter Rogers

My office has received approximately 100 telegrams signed by approximately 150 people. I have also received approximately 100 letters and about 15 personal telephone calls concerning the action of the President in relieving General MacArthur of his command. Out of all of these communications there were approximately five that approved the action of the President. Almost all the others demanded the impeachment of the President, Dean Acheson and various other civil officers. These communications came from the 18th District. I had other communications from outside the District totalling approximately fifty. These were divided in approximately the same ratio. The offices of other congressmen have also been flooded by these communications, most of them expressing heated disapproval of the President's action in this respect. This overwhelming expression of the sentiment of the people affords an excellent opportunity for any man in public office to play poli-

tics, and to appeal to the aroused emotions of the people. Many have succumbed to this temptation and are attempting to use this serious situation as a political football. This I cannot conscientiously do, as indignant as I might feel about the action and as aroused as my emotions might be under the circumstances. If there was ever a time in the history of this country when cool, calm and collected deliberations were needed in the Congress, it is now. I sincerely regret that the action was taken and I pray to God that our position and our way of life will not be jeopardized by it. General MacArthur is an outstanding military genius. This no one can deny, not even the President. He was a military official, and under the Constitution and laws of our Government, he was and is subject to the orders of the civilian officials. However erroneous, however unsound or mistaken those orders might be, they are not grounds for impeachment. The American people are entitled to know the truth as it is written in the law and the Constitution. The provision of the Constitution providing for the impeachment of the President, Vice-President and other civil officers, Article II, Section 4, is as follows: "The President, Vice-President and all civil officers of the United States shall be removed from office on impeachment for a conviction of treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors."

I can tell you that every act of the President of the United States since his induction into office has been thoroughly and searchingly examined in an effort to discover grounds upon which impeachment proceedings could be instituted, and the same is true of Dean Acheson and the other public officials in the Administration. There is no doubt that such proceedings would have been instituted long ago had any evidence been uncovered that would meet the require-

ments of the Constitution. If there is a citizen of the United States anywhere who has any evidence upon which a public official could be impeached, it is his bounded duty as an American citizen to come forward with it and let the law take its course. Let the chips fall where they may. At any time such information or evidence comes into my hands or to my knowledge I will consider it an honor to institute impeachment proceedings against the offending party, whether he be the President of the United States, or the lowest public official in our Government, regardless of his party affiliations. I have discussed the matter at length with members of both parties who have been in Congress for the past seven years and who have done a great deal of work on this subject, and not one of them has furnished me with any evidence of any facts of this nature that would come within the purview of the Constitution, and they have stated to me that it is their opinion that the facts they have uncovered would not

be sufficient upon which to base such a course of proceedings. I shall cast my vote for a resolution inviting General MacArthur to appear before a joint meeting of congress, and will look forward to hearing a full discussion of his views. The Congress is entitled to this and the American people are entitled to it. This is no time for partisan politics. We are at the crossroads, and the issue is clearly cut. It is Americanism versus Communism.

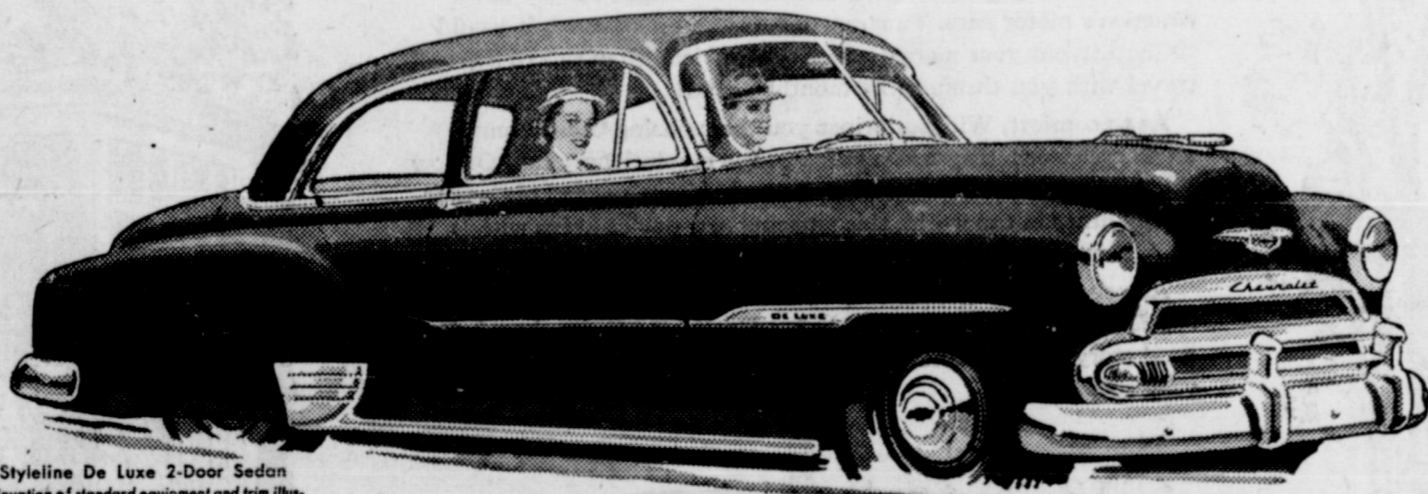

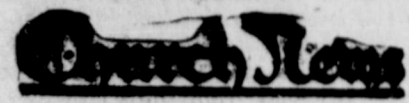

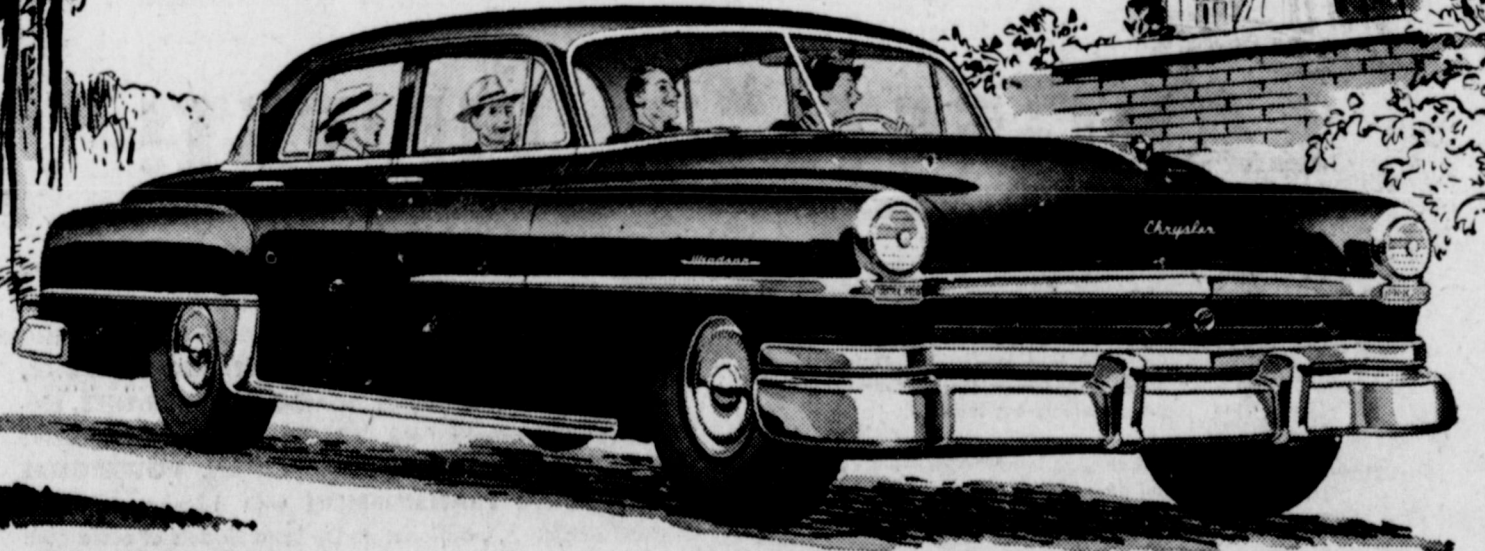

**Walter McLaren Accounts Old Days**

At the Special Pioneer Day program recently at the First Christian Church at Claude, Texas, Walter McLaren had the following letter read to the pioneers and friends. Other stories of the Early Days were told by old timers following the reading of this letter. It was as follows: First I might tell you that I came to the J. A. Raach in June 1887 with a brother old than I and a sister. We were met by Mr. and Mrs. Goodnight in Ft. Worth. They were on their way to Kansas City. After staying all night in a hotel, we took the Ft. Worth and Denver train for Quanah, Texas. That was as far as the passenger trains were running at that time. The next evening we rode a freight train from Quanah that was hauling building material for the road. We must have ridden about 15 or 20 miles. Mr. Goodnight had left a buggy and team with a friend. We were to drive it to the J. A. Ranch. We left out that evening and drove about 12 or 15 miles and stayed

overnight with a man and his wife in a large tent. They were furnishing meals for men who were building the railroad. The next morning we started for the ranch which was a distance of 75 miles. We arrived at the ranch about sundown. We had a brother-in-law who was assistant manager for the ranch. He wanted to test my brother and me out as to how we worked. We were put to chopping wood for the mess hall. To my own knowledge and satisfaction, we cut cedar wood for three weeks. No joking, it was the largest pile of wood I have ever seen when it was all cut. No exaggeration, it must have been 12 or 15 feet high and I have no idea how much ground it covered. To say the least, I was not quite 17 and brother Robert was about 19 or 20 years old. After we had finished the wood job, we were sent out to work with the chuck wagon. John Mann was the wagon boss. He was a brother-in-law to Mrs. Hawthorn who lives here in Claude. In September of that year, 1887, Robert and I went to the Southwestern University

near Austin to school. I am thinking perhaps I may be saying too much about myself.

In July, 1888, Charlie Smith, a cousin of mine and I came to Goodnight. Mr. Goodnight had planted about 100 acres of wheat back east of Goodnight near the railroad track. He had secured a thrashing machine to come out from Vernon to thrash this wheat. Believe it or not, the wheat made about 1200 bushels. Consequently, we had the pleasure of helping to thrash the first wheat in Armstrong County. There were only very few farmers between Goodnight and Claude. Mr. Goodnight gave them seed wheat to plant that fall. He was a man who wanted to see the country developed. Therefore, he did not make a charge for the wheat. I am rather at a loss as to what else to say.

After working for my Uncle for about 5 or 6 years, I accumulated a little herd of cattle and moved to Robert County on the Canadian River. A school mate of mine from Weatherford, Texas, had some cattle near Pampa, Texas. He and I drove our cattle to the river and bought a small ranch. After the state placed the land on the market in Hutchinson County which was not organized, we took up land about 25 miles north of Panhandle.

In those days, there were no churches to attend. Finally Mr. and Mrs. Laferty had filed or bought a section of land on the Canadian River from the state. He had been a minister of the gospel so he organized a Sunday school class which was to be held in a grove of China trees. We had no way to go except by horse-

back and by wagon. Mr. Laferty lived about 15 miles from my camp or a distance of about 40 miles from his place to Panhandle which was his nearest trading point. Very well do I remember, he came and stayed overnight with us on his way to Panhandle. This was in the fall of the year—I will say it must have been in November. We had butchered a beef and had it hanging up in a log cabin where we kept our saddles and horse feed. The next morning he left our camp for Panhandle and wanted to make the round trip to Panhandle and back to his place that day and part of the night. This would have been a distance of 65 miles. He told us that if we found a quarter of beef gone, we would know that Laferty had got it, and sure enough, when we got back to our camp we missed the beef and thought nothing of it. It was not worth more than five or six dollars.

When I came to the J. A. Ranch, a three year old steer would bring 25 bucks — and it would be a good one at that. Here is something else that might be of some interest to you, especially the young folks who are here today. I am thinking Mrs. Dodge will no doubt verify at least part of this statement; Mr. Goodnight gave the right of way to the railroad to the county lines of Armstrong and Donley which is a distance of 12 or 15 miles or the equivalent of about 900 acres of land.

Mrs. Goodnight paid for the first church at Goodnight, Texas. No doubt, Brother Avery took an active part in designing the church. He was living at Clarendon and would drive to Goodnight to preach. He and I were good friends.

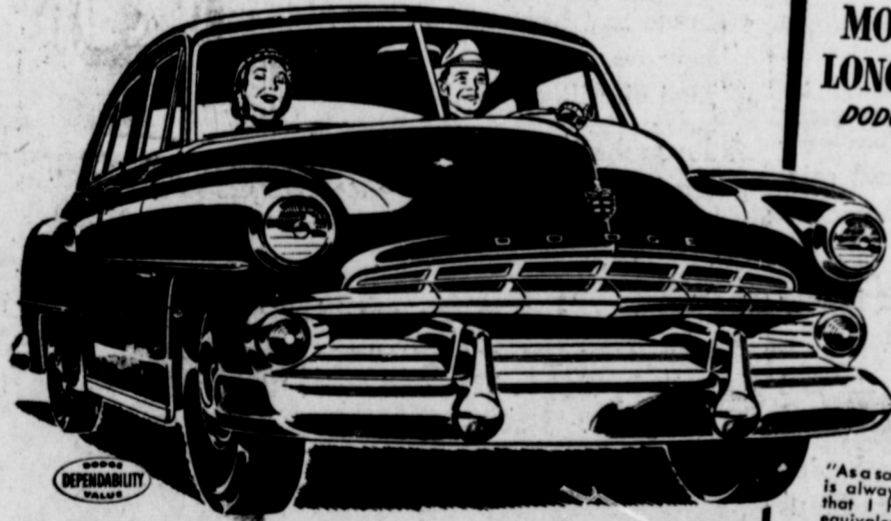

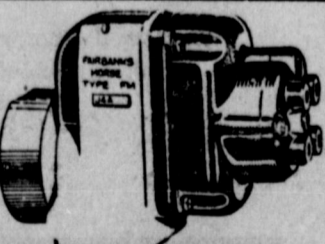

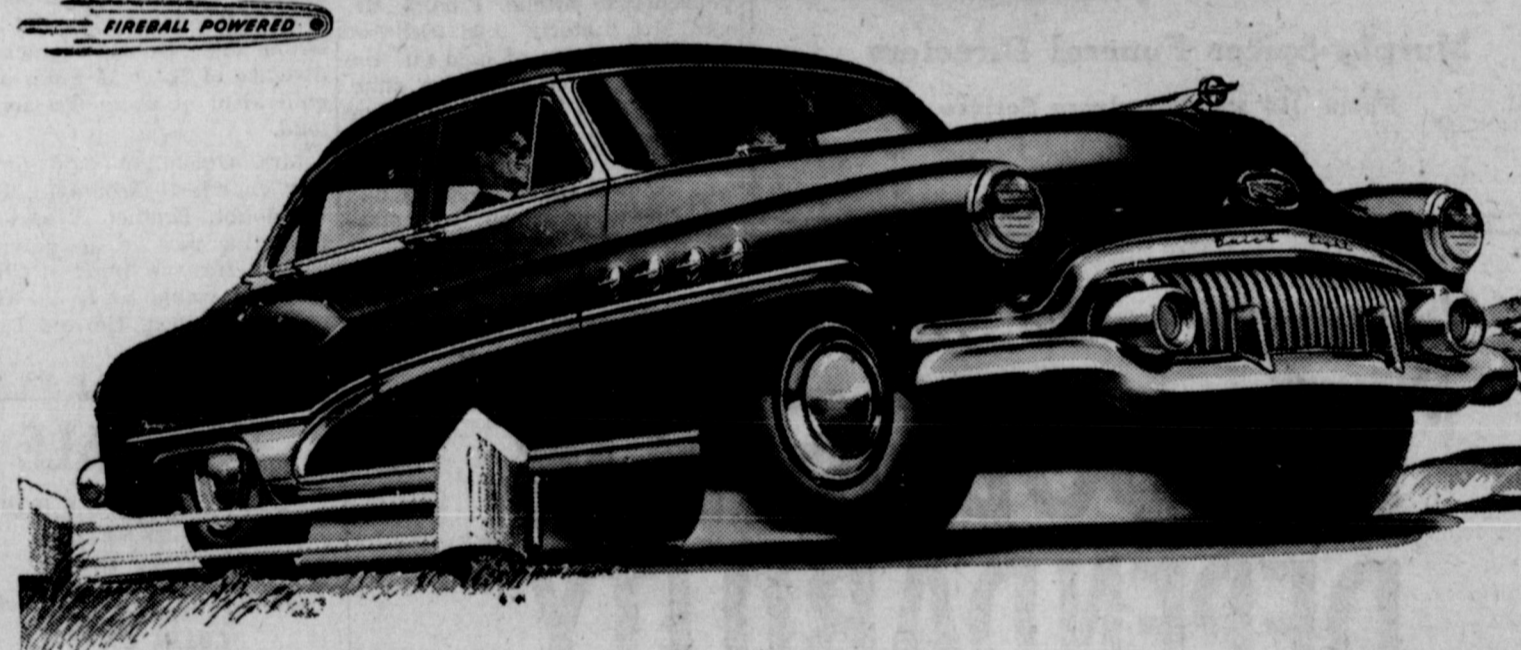
