H. W. Truitt To Head Clarendon Schools

Harvey W. Truitt, Canadian high school principal for the past seven years, has accepted a contract to become superintendent of Clarendon High School and President of Clarendon Junior College. His contract will become effective July 1st. Truitt will succeed Supt. H. T. Burton, who has headed the local school system for the past twenty-six years.

Truitt has been connected with the Canadian High School faculty for the past eight years and has been principal the past seven years. He has had sixteen years of teaching experience in the Texas Panhandle, with the exception of 2 years in Oklahoma. He served three years in the U. S. Navy during World War II, 19 months of this time overseas in the Pacific Area.

His major in college was Administrative Education and Government and he holds an Administrator's certificate of approval for Superintendents and principals issued by the Texas State Department of Education. Mr. Truitt received his B. S. and M. E. Degrees from West Texas State College at Canyon.

Mrs. Truitt has headed the homemaking department in the Canadian schools the past ten years. Mr. and Mrs. Truitt plan to move to Clarendon some time in June.

Boys Rancher Wins Battle Over Death

The power of prayer and a stout fighting spirit have combined to save the life of one of the young cowhands of the famous America's First Boys' Ranch near Amarillo.

Ronnie Mullins, a 14 year old Rancher from Amarillo, was stricken recently with severe internal bleeding of an unknown cause and for awhile little hope was given for his recovery.

blood to save his life. They also instilled in Ronnie the will to fight and win over his affliction.

But the boys gave far more than material things. They gave their faith in God when every Rancher attended a spontaneous and unscheduled midnight prayer for the recovery of young Mullins.

It took place this way.

Several of the older boys, returning to the Ranch after giving blood to the blood bank and visiting Ronald at the hospital, awakened the Ranch chaplain

and asked permission to go to the non-denominational chapel to pray.

Chaplain Dwayne Engholm readily consented and went with the boys.

In the meantime, some of the boys had awakened the superintendent while others went to the dormitory to ask their chums to join them.

When the superintendent and chaplain arrived at the chapel, they found all of the boys present, together with the staff. For more than an hour the boys and

their chaplain prayed for the recovery of their companion. More than 40 of the boys individually spoke brief prayers.

The next day some of the boys came to Amarillo and instead of going to movies, buying magazines or candy as they usually do, the boys pooled their money to send flowers to their friend. Less than 24 hours after the boys had prayed for him, Ronnie began to show signs of recovery and although he is still under a doctor's care, there is no doubt that he will be completely well in time.

When asked what he thought of young Mullins' turn for the better, one of the Boys' Ranchers said, "We all said some prayers even after we left the chapel that night so we knew that everything was going to be all right."

Would Strengthen School Lunch Program

NOTE: Below is a copy of a letter the Governor has written to the Executive Director of the Texas State Teachers Association. Mr. Charles H. Tennyson, Texas State Teachers Association, 316 West 12th Street, Austin, Texas.

Dear Mr. Tennyson: Knowing of your interest in legislation affecting the public schools of Texas, I wish to call your attention to a pending bill (H. B. 441) by Representative Elbert Reeves that seeks to set up a "Commodity Distribution Division" in the State Department of Public Welfare.

The act would authorize the Department of Public Welfare to enter into agreements with the Federal Government and with distributing agents for the hand-

ling of surplus food made available by the United States Department of Agriculture. These surplus commodities have been an important element in the public school lunch program, as well as in the state hospitals and other deserving institutions.

From time to time the U.S.D.A. has warned us that these surplus foodstuffs will be cut off in Texas unless the State designates or creates by law some agency to deal with the Federal Government and be responsible for the commodity shipments to Texas. We have been operating on a stopgap basis, through the Department of Public Welfare and various county school superintendents, without specific authorization and without any appropriation. We have been notified that this unofficial arrangement will no longer suffice, and that unless the Legislature at this session sets up machinery for handling this program, Texas will not receive any more of these surplus foodstuffs.

I feel that the school people of Texas ought to be aware of the situation, and I present this information to you for whatever distribution you may deem advisable.

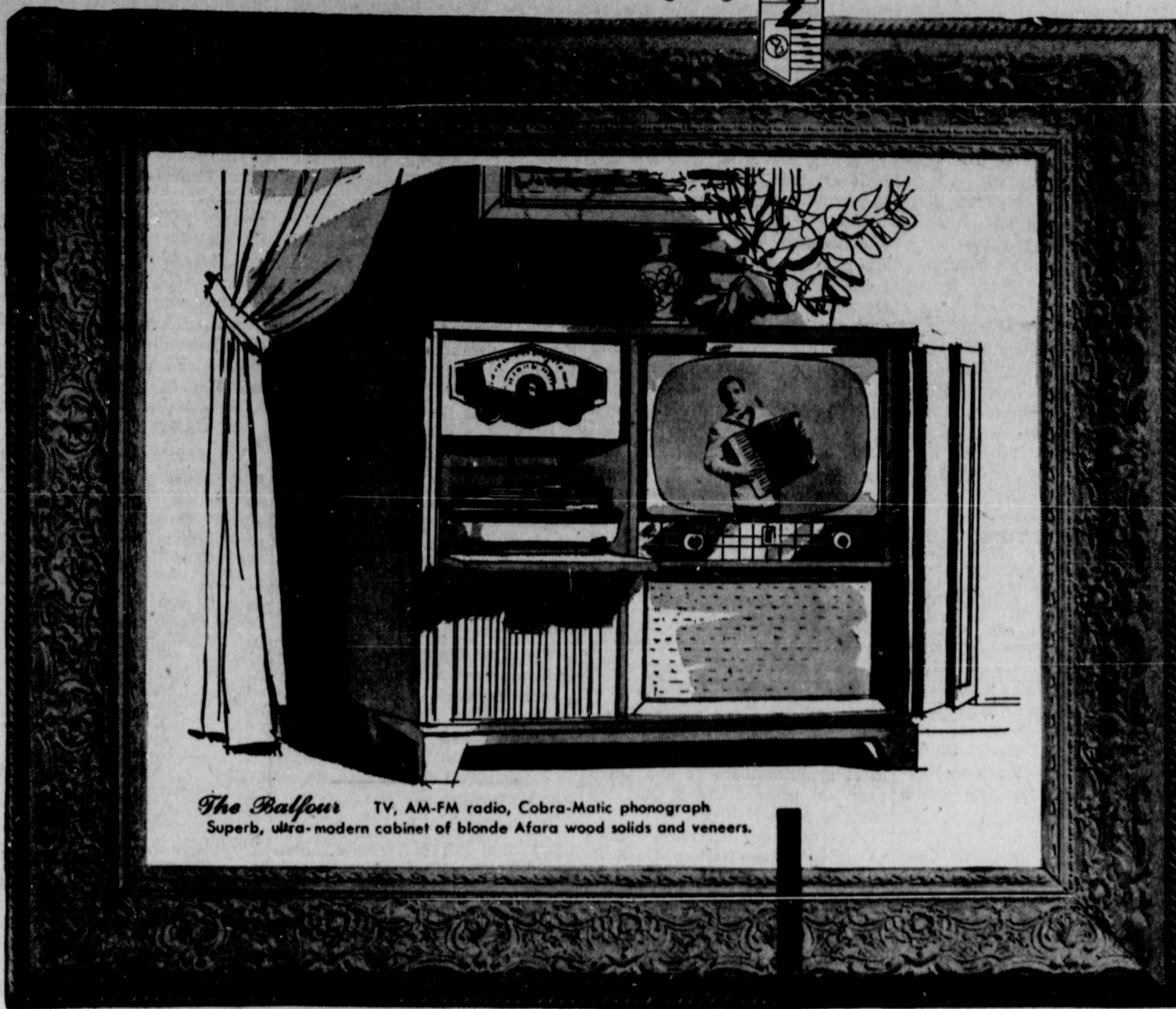

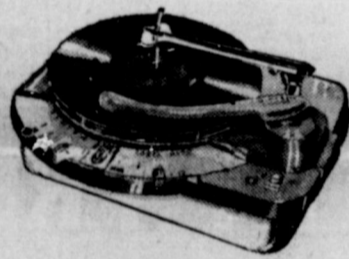

Andy Rogers Sez!

By ANDY ROGERS

Less than thirty years ago any man or group who asked government regulation of their business or someone else's was considered a liberal and often dangerous thinker. Now most of our groups usually considered as conservative light the way for government control and regulation. The argument always is that "we must protect the public" from unethical practices. Folks asking for such laws usually get protected themselves — from competition. The usual method is by creating a new regulatory board, another bureau, to require licenses, have the power to withhold and cancel licenses, set examinations, etc. The people who run the board and make the rules are members of the trade or profession being regulated.

The clamor for such regulation grows every time your Legislature meets. It makes one stop and wonder—wonder if folks really mean what they have said about "that mess in Washington."

A huge portion of your Legislative time, and your tax money, will be spent this year considering new proposals to regulate

various groups and professions. Much of their time already has been spent for this purpose. I feel that the general public is not aware of this. I earnestly asked them to offer their opinions.

The growing awareness, on a state level, that Texas' future depends on proper care and use of water made itself felt last week. Developments include the following:

1. The proposed Canadian River Authority held back for the whole Senate to study and offer strengthening and wholesome new recommendations.
2. A law to cancel all unused surface water permits over 10 years old.
3. To set up a State antipollution committee.
4. To define clearly purposes for which surface water may be used.
5. A constitutional amendment that would ask the State to underwrite part of the bonds needed for local communities to build dams. The State would be repaid by charging industries, cities and other public users for water usage from these projects.

The author of this bill, Senator John Bell, said it would get the Federal government out of the dam building business; that Federal funds would be harder to obtain anyhow; and that on

Federal projects Federal government rules require a large amount of a lake's capacity be kept back for flood control, etc. and that such rules did not work in West Texas anyway.

6. The Governor signed the Act validating the High Plains Underground Water District.

One new bill would permit small counties to pay a constable's auto expenses. Rep. J. O. Gilham was against this bill and said the office of constable should be abolished.

Senator Carlos Ashley's new drunk driving law would not enable anyone to merely pay a fine. He would also have to spend at least 3 days in jail.

Ashley said many offenders didn't mind paying fines but would sober up if held in jail awhile.

Another bill would require all persons convicted of drunk driving to be fingerprinted.

Lots of steam is building up behind a bill to prohibit feeding raw garbage to animals. It would have to be cooked before feeding it. Proponents say that the crippling disease of vesicular exanthema among hogs is spreading toward Texas at alarming speed from our Midwestern states. Also that nearly all hoof and mouth disease outbreaks have been traced to raw garbage.

Homemade garbage would not be affected.

The idea of prohibiting television in automobiles is gaining ground.

Another House member wants the University of Texas Dental School to make false teeth for folks on the old-age pension rolls. Local dentist would take impressions and fit the teeth.

Negro boxers and wrestlers in the professional game only would be allowed to compete in Texas if one San Antonio Representative has his way. He claims the sport is greatly retarded in Texas at present because Negroes cannot participate.

It looks as though you will not pay State tax when you go to the movies after this year. A new law will likely exempt entertainment taxes on admission prices of \$1.00 or less.

How Texas Must Preserve Water

(Written Dec. 14, 1952)

Nature was very generous in providing us the capacity for storing water underground. Although four-fifths of Texas has poor natural surface water resources, the underground water storage space is not only great but widely distributed.

Conservation of underground water means preventing the waste of water which nature has already stored in these subterranean reservoirs. Conservation of surface water is the saving of water that nature would otherwise waste.

Most of the municipal supply in Texas is still coming from underground. Among the 700 or more municipal systems in the state using this source are those of Houston, San Antonio, Beaumont, Orange, Port Arthur, Galveston, Amarillo and Lubbock. Houston and San Antonio are two of the largest cities in America still getting their water from underground. Only about 200 Texas towns or cities depend entirely on surface water.

But when we start thinking of conserving future supplies, we

are apt to make a natural mistake. We may see only the surface water and fail to visualize the need for replenishing the stock underneath the land.

Farmers and city people near a river are easily impressed by the sight of flood waters that sweep by unused. They can be quickly sold on putting up money for a big dam, especially where the federal government will match their dollars.

Big dams are practical and have their uses. But they are only one-half the picture. The dam hasn't been built yet that wouldn't be rendered useless in 50 years by constant siltage behind it, unless expensive maintenance work

is practiced constantly.

We need countless small dams and check dams in the tributaries of the big streams. This puts more of the water in the soil. Money spent in this way helps hold the soil on the land, allows water to seep back into natural underground reservoirs and prevents erosion.

The practical idea, is to strive for a good balance between large dam projects and soil practices which would restore our underground water. Our most valuable mineral is not oil or gas.

FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

COTTON PRICE SUPPORTS SET:

The national average price support for 1953-crop upland cotton will be at least 30.80 cents per pound, the Department of Agriculture has announced. This represents 90 per cent of the current parity price, and is the minimum level of support announced in advance of the season, as required by legislation. If parity is higher as of next August 1, the beginning of the marketing year, the level of price support will be increased accordingly.

At the same time the support was announced, farmers were again cautioned against overproduction of cotton this year. Primarily because exports are falling off and because the last two cotton crops have permitted

rebuilding reserve stocks, it is considered neither necessary nor desirable for farmers to produce as much cotton this year. Production of 12 to 12.5 million bales now appears desirable in 1953, which would require reduction of about 18 per cent nationally below 1952 plantings.

The price supports on other commodities for 1953 are as follows:

Wheat (90% of Parity) Not less than \$2.21 per bu.
Grain Sorghums (Donley County Rate) \$2.38 per cwt.

CONSERVATION HOLDS FARMERS AS WELL AS SOIL:

Conservation farming is helping to hold good farmers on the land as well as good land on the farms, says Ross Springer, Chairman, Donley County PMA Committee.

This applies particularly to young farmers who have had experience on their home farms and special training in crops and soils.

These young men who might otherwise seek employment elsewhere are given an extra inducement to stay on the farm because of the improved productivity of the land. What has already been done to build up the soil also encourages them to continue to improve their farms.

It also applies to tenant farmers, says Mr. Springer. Land owners who are following through on good conservation programs for their farms are making their places more attractive to obtain and hold good farmers. The land owner who takes an interest in his farm and works with his tenants in helping to build a better farm is not only making the place more attractive to a good farmer, but is adding to the stability of his farming operations.

In this way the Agricultural Conservation Program is helping to keep good land on the farms of Donley County and good farmers on the land.

This has helped to improve conditions generally in Donley County, he adds. Better yields from the land has meant more business on Main Street. In addition to the added assurance of enough food and fiber for all, the conservation practices carried out under this program assure continuing agricultural production which in turn adds stability for all enterprises depending on agricultural production.

Farm Bureau Against House Bill 388

Every tractor farmer in Donley County will lose one-fourth of his refund on non-highway gasoline tax if House Bill 388 is passed by the State Legislature, according to H. Wood, president of the Donley County Farm Bureau.

Rep. James W. Yancy of Houston introduced the bill which would take away one cent of the four-cent-a-gallon refund and allocate it to the available school fund, the county farm leader said.

"What the proponents of this bill forget is that the so-called tractor gas 'refund' is not actually a refund since the money never belongs to the state. The tax is collected just as on all gasoline, sent to Austin, and then returned to the rightful owners," Mr. Wood added.

The Farm Bureau leader said that the backers of the Yancy bill were apparently using the strategy of calling attention to the needs of the public schools and then pointing to the refund money as a likely source of revenue. He added that this would make the bill more difficult to defeat because the demand for a teachers' pay raise has touched off the hottest issue of this 53rd legislative session.

"The farmers pay their share of school taxes along with everyone else in the school districts, and it isn't right for an additional burden to be placed upon them," Mr. Wood said.

The head of the county farm organization said that if one-fourth of the refund were lost

now, it might mean that the entire refund eventually might be abolished. He urged all farmers in the county to get in contact with their representatives in the state capital and inform them of their desires and wishes on the refund issue.

During the last legislative session—two years ago—the Texas Farm Bureau was instrumental in saving the tractor gas refund, the county road bond assumption monies, and the rural road program. Before the session was over, the farmers and ranchers of the state had also pushed through a tax on natural gas which is still being fought in the courts.

Texas Production Up In 1952

Cattle slaughtered commercially in Texas in 1952 amounted to 1,175,000 head, or a total live weight of 929,201,000 pounds, as compared with 989,000 head, or a live weight of 784,711,000 pounds, slaughtered in 1951. H. M. Breedlove, county agent, says these figures were released by the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Calf slaughter in Texas rose to 861,000 head in 1952, as compared with 731,000 thousand head in 1951. Commercial slaughter of hogs rose to 2,036,000 in 1952, from 1,941,000 head in 1951, while commercial slaughter of sheep and lambs here in 1952 was 676,000 head, as compared with 593,200 head in 1951.

Nationally, commercial meat production for the year 1952 was 21.4 billion pounds, 6 percent more than the 20.2 billion pounds produced in 1951. As compared with 1951, mutton and lamb production during 1952 was up 25 percent, veal production, 11 percent; beef production, 9 percent; and pork production, 1 percent.

During 1952 a total of 17.9 million head of cattle were slaughtered in the United States, an increase of 9 percent from the 16.4 million head slaughtered during 1951. A total of 8.9 million head of calves were slaughtered in 1952, an increase of 6 percent over the 8.4 million head killed during 1951, Breedlove added.

Commercial hog slaughter during 1952 totaled 77.7 million head,

2 percent more than the 76.1 million head slaughtered in 1951. The number of sheep and lambs slaughtered totaled 14.0 million head, 26 percent more than in the previous year.

For 1953, meat production will probably not be much different from that of 1952. Beef supplies will be larger, but these may be about offset by a smaller pork production which will result from the 12 percent cut farmers have made in 1952 fall farrowings and the 13 percent reduction which is expected in 1953 spring farrowings.

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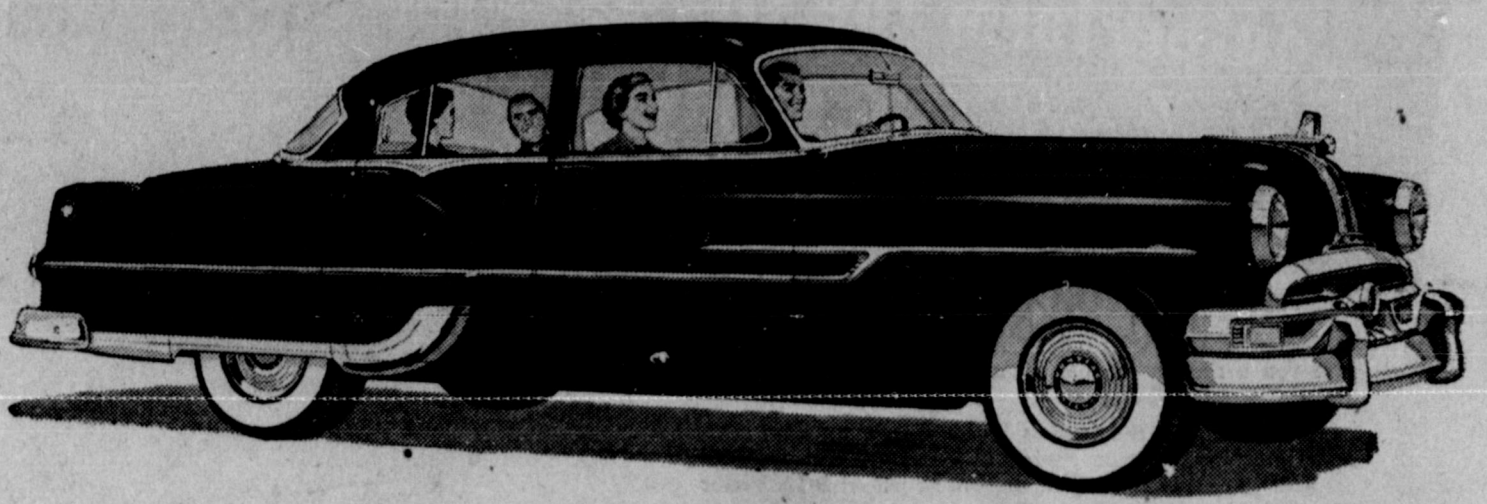

WATER LEGISLATION:

The 8 bills dealing with the water problems in Texas, and recommended by the Governor's Water Committee, are now pending before the committee on conservation and reclamation. The purpose of these bills is to provide a temporary solution to our water problems, but we have yet a long way to go in solving them on a permanent basis. Hearings have been set for all of the 8 bills,

and many interested people from all over the state are in attendance at the committee hearings. Out West Texas group certainly misses Representative Bill Andis here in the House. Representative Andis was stricken Monday morning, with a kidney ailment, and has been confined, since that time, to the hospital. His loyalty to the House, however, is evidenced by the fact that he still takes care of his correspondence with the help of his secretary, who goes to the hospital each day. Bill undergoes surgery early tomorrow morning, and we certainly hope for him and his family that he comes through with flying colors. The State Board of Water Engineers beat the Legislature to

the punch by granting the petition for creation of the Canadian River Water Control & Improvement District. Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd, answering questions raised by the board, cleared the way for action while the bill by Sen. Grady Hazelwood to create a Canadian River Municipal Water Authority was pending in the Senate. Both the district and the authority propose to serve 12 Panhandle-Plains cities with water from a dam to be built near Pampa. When the water board delayed a decision after the Jan. 12 hearing on the district's creation, the cities had Hazelwood introduce the special bill. That put the pressure on the water board. Shepperd ruled that the new district would not con-

flict with the Panhandle Water Conservation Authority created in 1937.

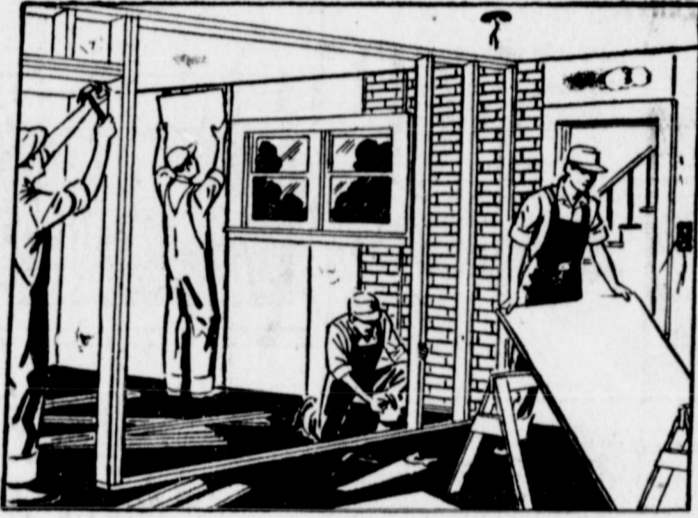
