#### 380 Votes Cast In School Trustee **Election Here**

A total of 380 votes were cast in the Clarendon Independent School Trustee election held here last Saturday. This was considered a big turn out in accordance with the total number of poll tax receipts issued this year.

The three candidates elected were: Walter B. Knorpp, J. Alfred McMurtry and L. L. Wallace. Knorpp and McMurtry were both up for re-election. The third member retiring this year was George Thompson who did not seek re-election.

Votes for the five candidates in the race were as follows: Walter B. Knorpp 264, J. Alfred Mc-Murtry 246, L. L. Wallace 242, Harlie Gordon 209 and Pat Donley Farm Bureau County Spelling Bee Donors Being Signed Slavin 127.

R. E. Drennan received 116 votes for county board member and W. A. Poovey also received 116 votes for Trustee for the county at large. They had no oppopents in the race.

#### That long-awaited-for drouth breaking rain arrived Saturday night to bring that honest-togoodness smile back on the faces of thousands of Donley County residents. It was the first real beneficial rain the entire county had received in months and even though it contained streaks of hail and lots of lightning and wind, it was still tops with local residents.

A streak of small hail passed over Clarendon, moving southeast in the first major downpour and damaged small fruit considerably and other streaks of hail in varying amounts were reported from different parts of the county. Clarendon itself looked like a lighted Christmas tree shortly after midnight when a majority of residents came to life after hearing the storm warning blasts of the fire siren. The storm proved to be nothing serious but many residents staved up most of the night on the alert just in case.
