THE LAST SOLDIER

All of us have observed with reverence the recent passing of General Walter Williams, the last surviving member of the armed forces who fought on either side in the War Between the States - almost 100 years ago. As flags were lowered to halfmast all over the United States, many persons respectfully paused to reflect on many events. Among many other recollections, it brought to mind my college days when I worked at the Confederate Pension Office in Austin while attending the University of Texas Law School. While I was working there in 1932, General Williams' Confederate pension was granted. None of us could forecast at that time, of course, that he would be the last of that noble group to survive. Confederate pensions were paid by the states and not by the Federal government.

in an earlier newsletter I noted the preparations for commemorative observance of the Civil War Centennial. The 85th Congress established a National Civil War Centennial Commission to prepare for the observance during the years 1961-1965. This period of great strife should invoke in all of us reflections of our heritage, and it is hoped that in the Centennial observance every corner of America will focus attention on the principles laid down a century ago and, having done so, look to the future with democratic ideals more profoundly avowed than ever before.

The Civil War Centennial Commission has recently published some facts about the War which, although they are matters of record, are not generally known and which I thought you might find interesting.

This was the FIRST war in which:

Railroads were extensively used for the rapid movement of military supplies and of large bodies of troops from one theatre of operation to another.

Aerial reconnaissance was first effectively used from anchored balloons in military operations.

A multi-manned submarine sank a surface vessel.

Medical care of the wounded was systematically organized. Participants, sites and equipment were photographed on a

large scale. A practical machine gun was

developed. Voting by soldiers and sailors in service was provided for by

Large-scale coverage was carried on by recognized news correspondents at the front.

national laws.

The repeating rifle was used by large troop units.

The Medal of Honor was awarded.

According to the U.S. Census, the population of the United States in 1860 was 31,443,321 persons. Of these, approximately 23,000,000 were in the 22 Northern states and 9,000,000 in the 11 Southern states. Of the latter total, 3,500,000 were slaves. The total war dead from both armies was about 500,000. The chance of surviving a wound in Civil War days was 7 to 1 as compared to 50 to 1 in the Korean War. About 15% of the wounded died in the Civil War; about 8% in World War I: about 4% in World War II; and about 2% in the Korean War.

President Lincoln had 4 brothers-in-law who served in the Confederate Army. Jefferson Davis graduated 23rd in his class at West Point. He served in the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, was a colonel in the Mexican War and

served as Secretary of War in President Pierce's Cabinet from 1853-1857. Of the original 26 members of the Confederate Senate, 14 were former U.S. Con-

General George McClellan 'Stonewall" Jackson and General George Pickett were graduated from the same class at West Point. Pickett received his appointment to the Academy through John Todd Stuart, Livcoln's law partner.

Taking the 1960 Census nationally will require the services of 160,000 enumerators, 10,000 crew leaders, and 400 district supervisors, all temporary workers. The district supervisors, working under the general direction of the permanent regional field directors, are responsible for all phases of the census in their districts. Duties of the district supervisor include the recruiting of the crew leaders, obtaining space for crew leader training, recruiting and training a small office staff, reviewing the completed questionnaires, and direct supervision of the field canvass which begins on April 1.

Prior to the start of the census, all households will receive in the mail an Advance Census Report Form, a new census-taking device which is designed to speed up the field canvass and provide more accurate statistics. Distribution of this form, which contains the basic population and housing questions, gives the family a chance to assemble information about each member in advance of the census taker's visit.




