

to receive **CASA** help Abused and neglected children in Donley County will soon have new advocates in the court system now that CASA of the High Plains

Local kids

has expanded its coverage to this county.

CASA, which stands for Court Appointed Special Advocate, is a system by which a volunteer is appointed by a judge to provide factual information to the court on behalf of a child. CASA volunteers come from all walks of life and only handle one case at a time.

"We have been very interested in serving Donley County because it is a good fit for our area," said Janet Watts, Executive Director for CASA of the High Plains.

Watts said her office is looking for six to eight local people to serve on an advisory committee and help recruit volunteers. Training will begin in September.

CASA represents children placed in the foster care system, most of whom have been removed from their homes because of their parents' addiction to illegal drugs, typically methamphetamines. Watts said the cases are simply situations where the parents care more about themselves than about their own chil-

Once in the foster system, children can be placed in several different homes and be served by several different caseworkers from Child Protective Services (CPS).

"The great thing about CASA is that those kids have the same representative from the time they enter the system to the time they reach a permanent home," Watts said. "CASA is their only consistent face."

Ann Huey is a CASA volunteer and advisory committee member in Clarendon and has worked as a foster parent and with the CASA system for over 20 years. She has been instrumental in bringing CASA to the kids of Donley

"I just saw what CASA did for my kids, and I want to be a part of getting that started here," Huey said.

CASA is a non-profit organization that is separate from the state-run CPS. Cases are handled by a Cluster Court, which only deals with CPS cases. The court operates with the permission of District Judge David McCoy and is overseen by Judge Phil Vanderpool of

The Cluster Court is the only one of its kind in the state and covers CPS cases in 23 counties in the Texas Panhandle. A special prosecutor serves the court with the permission of District Attorney Stuart Messer.

CASA of the High Plains was established in Gray County 1994 and now serves seven other counties including Donley, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hemphill, Roberts, and Wheeler.

There are currently 122 kids in cases overseen by CASA of the High Plains, including 12 kids in six cases in Donley County.

"As soon as volunteers can be trained, Judge Vanderpool will start appointing volunteers to cases here," Watts said.

Most volunteers average 10 hours per month on a case, and most work full time at other jobs. Watts said volunteers can work on their own schedules but they do have to attend

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US overreacts to terrorists' strikes in UK

The US response to the July 7 terrorist bombings of the London tube system has been predictable: more hasty security measures. On July 21, police began conducting random searches of bags and packages carried by people on the New York City subway; those who refuse to be searched are not allowed to ride.

According to Mayor Michael Bloomberg, "These kinds of security measures are necessary." But any security measure must pass two litmus tests. First, it must be proven to be effective. Second, it must not violate constitutional rights. Mayor Bloomberg's "necessary" security falls down on both counts.

The odds of catching a would-be subway bomber are not very good. New York's subways carry about 4.5 million passengers on the average weekday, according to the Metropolitan Transportation Authority. If on any given day there were a single terrorist riding the subway, and half the passengers were carrying some sort of bag, the probability of finding him or her during any particular search using a truly random search pattern would be about one in 2.25 million or about four ten-millionths of one percent. Such odds are only slightly better than winning New York's Mega Millions lottery (about one in 175 million). Even multiplied by thousands of intrusive searches that's a poor bet - and that assumes terrorists are too dim to adapt by, say, strapping bombs to their bodies.

Random searches on the subway are as useless as random searches of airline passengers at the gate - a practice that fortunately has been eliminated by the Transportation Security Agency after TSA administrator James M. Loy decided it was a "stupid rule." The spectacle of security personnel patting down grandmothers and toddlers deserved the ample ridicule it generated. Furthermore, the procedure netted exactly zero terrorists. It is also rather telling that British authorities are not instituting random searches on the London tube system - a testament to the fact that doing so would be ineffective and cripple a transportation system that moves seven million people daily.

Aside from the futility of random searches, Bloomberg's panacea ought to be rejected because the Fourth Amendment of the U.S. Constitution guarantees the right of the people to be "secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures." Without probable cause such as someone fitting the physical description of a suspected terrorist - a random search of subway passengers is the antithesis of the Fourth Amendment.

That amendment is already in the intensive care unit thanks to the numerous exceptions made in the name of the war on drugs, as well as some of the provisions of the USA PATRIOT Act. If Mayor Bloomberg's measures are adopted nationwide, the prohibition against unreasonable searches will be in danger of expiring entirely.

According to New York Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly, passengers are free to "turn around and leave" to avoid being searched and having their rights violated. But this is hardly providing the protection of the Fourth Amendment. To begin, it is an impractical solution. Presumably, people are using the subway to go somewhere - most likely to work. It is highly unlikely that many employers will take kindly to an excuse of not wanting to have Fourth Amendment rights violated as a reason for being late or not showing up to work. Also, a decision to turn around and leave is likely to be viewed as suspicious behavior by law enforcement and might be used as "probable cause" for detention and an even more extensive

Officials in Washington, DC and San Francisco are waiting to see what happens in New York before deciding to implement random searches on Metro and BART, respectively. But deliberation won't change the fact that random searches are both ineffective and a gross violation of constitutional rights. The decision should be a no-brainer.

The outrage in America after the London tube bombings is certainly understandable - as is the desire for Americans to feel safe. At most, that's all random searches on the subway will do: make people feel safer. But such measures won't actually make them safer. It is all too easy to adopt the attitude of one New York subway passenger: "It's just part and parcel of the world we live in."

But nothing could be further from the truth. The world we live in is represented by the Constitution and the principles upon which American society rests. As such, we should heed Benjamin Franklin's admonition that those who would "give up essential liberty to obtain a little temporary safety deserve neither liberty nor safety." Random searches on the subway ultimately mean we have neither.

Lone Star State can brag about its Navy

There are many reasons why Texas is unique, but one of the most interesting is the fact that our state, alone, had its own battle-tested navy and continues to have an

existing, albeit honorary, navy today. Texas has had three navies in its history. The First Texas Navy was formed during the battle for independence from Mexico. This fleet was decommissioned after independence was won but continuing threats from Mexico led to the bitterly con-

tested creation of the second navy. The Second Texas Navy, commanded by a naval officer by the name of Edwin Moore, held off threats from Mexico to the young Texas Republic. Squabbles over naval funding led to the decision to "rent" out the fleet to the breakaway province of Yucatan as it fought Mexico's central government. Texas' two sailing ships, the Austin and the Wharton, scored a spectacular victory at Campeche during May in 1843 by driving away a Mexican fleet containing what was, at that time, the world's mightiest warship, the 1,100-ton iron steamer the Guadalupe. This was the only time in history that a sailing ship defeated an iron steam-powered warship.

Not long after that battle, the Second Texas Navy was decommissioned, but Moore gained a place in Texan's hearts. In 1867, Moore County in the Panhandle was

named in Moore's honor. The Third Texas Navy was established in 1958 by Governor Price Daniel, as a commemorative organization to assure the survival of Texas' Naval history, boundar-

Ironically, the Third Texas Navy is by far the strongest of the three, for her flagship is the Battleship Texas, which Capitol fought in both World War I and II

The Texas navy now includes World War II vessels including PT-309 in Galveston, PT-305 which is being restored, the submarine USS Cavalla in Galveston and the famous aircraft carrier USS Lexington, which is moored at Corpus Christi. Other WWII

ships include a Liberty Ship, the Edwin W. Moore built in Houston and named after the Second Texas Navy commander, and the USS Orleck, a Gearing class destroyer built in Orange, which has now returned to its birthplace to serve as a museum. The oldest ship in the Texas navy is

the Elissa, a tall sailing ship built in 1877. She now calls Galveston home. Texas' navy also includes an honorary roster of active duty ships serving

with the United States Navy and the Coast Guard. These include the nuclear-powered aircraft carriers, the USS Eisenhower and USS Nimitz, and several nuclear-powered submarines, the Houston, City of Corpus Christi and the Dallas. The USS Texas is brand-new and will be part of the Virginia class of submarines.

One of the best known ships in Texas' navy is the USTS Texas Clipper II, which up until June of this year, was the Texas State Maritime Program's training ship. It replaced the Texas Clipper I, which was sunk to provide an artificial reef 25 miles off the coast. The Texas Clipper II started life as the USS Chauvenet in 1970 and was converted to serve as a maritime classroom in 1996. Her place is being taken by a newer and larger vessel, the USS Sirius, which will be given a new name at a christening ceremony planned for this November. I have been invited to christen her.

This would be my second christening of a Texas ship. I was honored to christen the first in its class of a versatile and powerful amphibious assault ship, the USS San Antonio, named after a vessel in the Second Texas Navy, which was lost to a hurricane. I asked, of course, that the sparkling wine used to christen the ship come from a Texas vineyard, but I had forgotten how strong we make things in our state. I walloped the bow of the ship two times with the bottle without affect. On the third try, the bottle exploded, dousing me with sparkling Texas wine. Some newspapers quipped that I christened myself.

I cannot tell you how much it meant to me to play a small part in launching another vessel, which will defend America and build on Texas' heroic naval traditions. In November the new floating classroom will take its place in our state's naval history. I look forward to meeting the newest member of the Third Texas Navy's fleet.

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
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Drugs in the News

Bird Flu Vaccine Test Results Are Positive

A new vaccine to protect against a type of influenza virus referred to as "bird flue" or "avian flu" is being considered for mass production in the US. While the vaccine is not yet available commercially, test results have been encouraging. Recent test data on 450 healthy adults indicate that the immune response provided when the vaccine was administered may be enough to protect humans from this particular strain of the virus that has killed millions of birds and up to 50 humans in Asia. The US government has expressed considerable interest in developing this vaccine based on concerns that this strain could mutate (change) into a form that would easy spread among humans throughout the world.

Recent reports from one official at the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases indicates that the FDA could approve the new vaccine rather quickly and authorize production of around 2 million doses of the vaccine. This would provide a small stockpile of vaccine that the government could use during an epidemic of avian flue if such were to occur in the United States.
