## Senate must move toward confirmation

President Bush on Tuesday named John Roberts as his nominee to take Sandra Day O'Conner's position on the Supreme Court.

Following O'Conner's retirement announcement, there was much clamor for Bush to nominate someone of her judicial philosophy - which is to say a moderate. There was also pressure for

him to name another woman or a minority to take her position. But, unfortunately for lib-

erals, there is no Affirmative Action plan for the High Court. There is no constitutional quota for the number of women or minorities or ideologues on the court. It is simply left to the pres- Commentary ident and his own philosophy to by roger estlack nominate potential jurists.



Likewise, it is up to the Senate to confirm - or not confirm - said nominees. They should, however, carry out that duty in a dignified way and not in a way that seeks to destroy the personal reputation of the person nominated (as was the case with Justice Clarence Thomas). Most importantly, they should vote (as has not been the case with some of Bush's so-called 'extreme" lower court nominees).

Despite pressures and expectations, Bush nominated a man... a white man... and a conservative at that. Mere moments after Bush formally announced his selection, top Democrats on the Senate Judiciary Committee were in front of the cameras with a less than enthusiastic response.

Sen. Patrick Leahy (D-Vermont) said, "We need to consider this nomination as thoroughly and carefully as the American people deserve."

Translation: "Judge Roberts is about to receive the Congressional equivalent of a digital prostate exam without the medical benefits."

Sen. Chucky Schumer (D-New York) said, "I voted against Judge Roberts for the DC Court of Appeals because he didn't answer questions fully and openly when he appeared before the committee.'

Translation: "I voted against this conservative the last time because he wouldn't dance to my song, and I'm sure as heck not going to vote for him this time if he won't do a little polka for us."

Schumer lamented that the president's consultation of senators prior to naming Roberts "wasn't a full as some of us would have liked." Never mind the fact that Bush did consult with 70 out of 100 senators, which is 70 more than he has to. Truthfully, Chucky was probably only going to be happy if he himself were the one nominated - and then he'd still be suspicious of Bush's motives

Leahy also said the Senate wasn't going to be a "rubberstamp" for this nominee. He later went on to criticize the Supreme Court, calling it an "activist court" and said, "No Supreme Court of my lifetime has overturned or undercut more laws passed by Congress than this court has, everything from Violence Against Women on through, environmental laws, employment laws, all of these things."

I guess Leahy would prefer the Supreme Court be comprised of pushovers who would willingly rubberstamp every stupid thing that gets passed by Congress. But we can't really expect a Senator from Vermont (the home of avowed socialist Congressman Bernie Sanders and turncoat former-Republican-now-"independent" Sen. Jim Jeffords) to understand and appreciate concepts like a limited federal government, states rights, constitutionally enumerated powers, and simple checks and balances.

I'm pretty sure Judge Roberts understands and appreciates all those things. Otherwise, Bush would not have nominated him.

Who sits on the Supreme Court will affect our government, our legal system, and our lives for decades to come. It is no place for middle-of-the-road types. We need good people who can read the Constitution as it's written, recognize its intended and selfimposed limitations, and rule on cases accordingly.

Judge Roberts appears to be just such a person Let's hope he makes it.

In a totally related (sort of) story, you may remember that a few weeks ago the Supreme Court ruled that municipalities can use their power of eminent domain to take private property from one person and give it to another all in the name of economic development

Justice O'Conner dissented in the case and warned that no Motel 6 would be safe from someone wanting to put up a luxury hotel. Funny that she should mention hotels because now news reports are saying that real estate developer Logan Darrow Clements has announced his desire to build a new hotel in Weare, New Hampshire. He wants the city fathers there to use their new found power to condemn the land at 34 Cilley Hill Road and give it to him for his

Not coincidentally, 34 Cilley Hill Road is the address of one David H. Souter - the same David H. Souter who is a member of the Supreme Court and voted with the majority in the aforementioned economic development case.

Clements said the land "is a unique site, being the home of someone largely responsible for destroying property rights for all Americans." He plans to call the establishment "The Lost Liberty Hotel," and it will include the "Just Desserts Café."

Now that's poetic justice.

But living in the dorm has had its moments. Like the day I was replacing the toilet paper and threw my keys and wallet into the toilet.



### Texans make senator proud of her state

Every once in a while, someone in Washington asks me why we Texans have so much love for our state. Is it the food? The weather? The culture?

While I love the food, weather, and culture in Texas, the real reason I am so proud of our state is its people. And I have no better evidence of the character of Texans than an episode I heard about the other day at the Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport.

A plane filled with soldiers coming to the U.S. from Iraq for two weeks of rest, landed after the long flight from Kuwait International Airport. Its passengers were stunned to see two fire engines racing toward their plane with lights flashing and sirens blaring

The soldiers said they had been informed the plane was waiting for equipment to arrive. What they thought might be some sort of minor emergency was actually Dallas-Fort Worth's special salute to home-coming soldiers. The two emergency trucks fired a water "salute" over the taxiing airplane.

"I didn't expect such a welcome," Pfc. Heather England, a satellite communications operator for the 578th Signal Company, told officials at the airport. "Soldiers on the plane got a bit choked up as they watched the water splash on the plane's windows."

The welcome did not end with the

water salute. Hundreds of Texans applauded the returning soldiers as they got off the plane. They asked for their autographs and offered them food, beer, cigarettes, soft drinks

## Why do we care about the income gap?

I didn't wake up this morning wondering whether I had shrunk the income gap between me and Bill Gates or Warren Buffett. I have never wondered about that. But that's me. If I am to believe THE NEW YORK TIMES and other major newspapers, lots of people are obsessed with the difference between their incomes and the incomes of richer people. Then again, maybe most people are more like me and don't give a dam. So why are those newspaper editors and reporters preoccupied with the matter?

I suspect it's because fundamentally they dislike liberal market society. Of course, they wouldn't put it that way. They would say simply that the phenomenon known as the "growing income gap" is

Now this is all nonsense at many levels. As Alan Reynolds of the Cato Institute has indefatigably shown, newspapers

the IRS and Census Bureau to get preconceived results. For example, Reynolds explained recently that using income-tax information to measure income makes the rich look comparatively richer than they are because the bulk of the middle class's capital gains are in tax-deferred IRAs and 401(k)s - they don't show up on tax returns. He's also shown that the charge that the middle class is shrinking is true, but not in the way the newspapers (and the socialist think tanks) would have us believe. In fact, more people are rising out of the middle class than are falling out of it. The lower class is shrinking too. But those truths rarely get mentioned.

It is true that our society has a wide range of incomes, although even "poor" people (a relative term) have cable color television, microwaves, washers and dryers, and cars. I don't know whether the

"income gap" is growing, but why should anyone care? It is perfectly consistent for the gap to grow even as the lowest-income people get richer. Don't confuse comparative with absolute position. I could be richer this year than last and still have lost ground to Bill Gates. Only someone consumed with envy would worry.

In a free society, there will be and should be differences in income. That's because some people are better at serving consumers than others - more innovative, more ambitious, more energetic, more intelligent. Why should they be denied their just rewards for making our lives better? And whom would we hurt most if we deny them? Mainly ourselves.




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

## Parents should be wary of kids' Internet cyberfriends

It is surprisingly easy for chilcrime, either as victim or perpetrator. Parents who would not permit a stranger into their home to talk with their child unsupervised think nothing of permitting their child to talk with cyber-pals unrestricted.

However, unlike in the real world, it is impossible to verify that a cyber-pal is who he says he is.

In a class on The Internet and Your Child, we watched while the instructor pretended to be a 14 year-old girl. Within 20 minutes, a man exposed himself (live by his webcam) to the class believing he computer(s) in a common family area was corresponding with a girl in a children's chat room.

Other children ruin their lives becoming involved in crimes, sometimes without realizing it. The thrill of sneaking into someone's will disappear at age 18; but they're computer as a reminder to all.

Unfortunately, few parents know what to look for or what to do to decrease the chance of their child's being involved in Internet crimes. 4. Distinguish between a "friend" and a "cyber-pal." Friends are people you have met, and you can verify the truth of who they are. met on the Internet and cannot verify. It doesn't mean they are false or bad, only that you can't prove they are who they say they are.

5. Periodically discuss what information you may share over the Internet. Do not give out any personal information over the Internet, even to cyber-pals and friends. With all the search capabilities on the Internet, it is easy for a predator to find where you live and deduce family sched-

6. Teach your child to understand and respect intellectual property rights. Copying electronically stored material may not seem as bad but it is still stealing. Gone is the and bookmarks for use of sites that 2141.

9. Establish a rule about when your child may meet a cyber-pal in and needs to be checked periodically. person. There being no further business, we were adjourned.





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



The court also approved a project proposed by Life Scout McCullough Roach to prepare a plaque listing the names of local Eagle Scouts to be hung in the Courthouse.

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
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

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## Drugs in the News

### One Dose of this Antibiotic Effective for Pneumonia

Last month the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved azithromycin (Zmax) oral suspension as a one-dose-only treatment for adults with bacterial sinusitis or a different infection called communityacquired pneumonia. Zmax is provided in a liquid drug delivery system that gives all the medication in one large 2 gram dose. This approach produces levels in the blood that are three times higher than the standard dose of the drug. Experts indicate that this high dose is valuable when the burden from the bacteria in the lungs is at its highest. The other advantage of a single dose of any drug is that health care providers do not have to worry about people forgetting to take their medication every day. An official with the company that makes Zmax indicated that one dose of this antibiotic is just as effective as treatments that must be taken from 7 to 10 days.


As with many oral antibiotics, Zmax may cause diarrhea, nausea, and abdominal pain; side effects which often resolve in a couple of days.



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
