Labor Shortage On Farms Is Expected

A shortage of farm labor in Texas may be experienced in the summer and fall months.

Summarizing the prospects, however, T. R. Timm, extension economist in farm management, says the probable shortage will be more in the form of the wage farm operators will be able, or required, to pay than a physical shortage. Reports from over the state, he continues, indicate that during peak seasons at least, many farmers will have to pay higher wages than in corresponding periods of 1940 in order to obtain all of the labor needed. Moreover, the proper distribution or routing of migratory labor may be more difficult than in recent years.

The latter condition is forecast by the delayed season, which was due to excessive rain. This caused farmers in south, central and north Texas to plant their cotton at about the same time. As a result, picking seasons between regions will be close together.

Cotton itself presents a peculiar problem, Timm says. Mechanization of cotton farms has been increasing rapidly for several years. As a consequence more and more farmers are increasing the amount of hand labor employed during the seasonal peak and de-

creasing the number of regular workers on farms. The progress of mechanization, therefore, appears to depend to some extent upon the presence of an available supply of seasonal laborers. On the other hand, such a supply is created, in part at least, by mechanization.

Conscription of men into the army most likely will further reduce the labor ranks. Nevertheless, it seems that most of the increase in labor charges is and will continue to be a result of alternative possibilities that laborers have in jobs relating to or induced by the defense program.

Timm suggests that farmers keep in touch with their county agricultural agents, who are working closely with the Farm Placement Service of the Texas Employment Service, migratory labor camps of the Farm Security Administration, W. P. A. offices, and office of the agricultural statistician, Agricultural Marketing Service, in trying to assist farmers in solving their acute problem.

Meteor Crater



Thousands of years ago a giant meteor flashed across the heavens to plow its way into the earth five miles south of a point on U. S. Highway 66, 29 miles west of Winslow in Northern Arizona. Geologists do not agree on the time but there is no disagreement that the main body of the meteor rests more than 1300 feet below the surface. It has been estimated that more than 400 million tons of rock and earth were displaced when the meteor struck. The crater is 4150 feet in width and 600 feet in depth. Exploration drilling to find the main body of the crater was first started in 1909 and the meteor located in 1932.

PROTECT CLOTHING AGAINST MOTHS

COLLEGE STATION—Clothes moths feed on wool, hair, feather, fur, upholstered furniture and leather, but they do not eat cotton, linen, rayon, or other fabrics of vegetable fiber or silk, according to Cameron Siddall, entomologist for the Extension Service of A&M College.

He says articles in a reasonably tight trunk, chest or wooden box can be protected perfectly during the summer by scattering between the folds of the clothing either flake naphthalene or para-dichlorol benzene. Either of these moth-preventatives should be separated from the clothing by sheets of thin, clean paper. Four ounces will give protection under ideal conditions, but the specialist says it pays to use more—possibly a pound—and be safe. Both chemicals are inexpensive.

The addition of flake naphthalene is advised since it destroys any moth which may have gotten in the clothing before it is wrapped. Under any circumstances, however, keep all covers tightly closed.

Cotton Status Is Explained

Farmers with cotton in the government loan will receive full payments for their equities if the government should take title to the cotton.

This was emphatically pointed out today by Walter J. Flynt, County AAA Secretary, when he was advised by the United States Department of Agriculture that title will not be taken to loan cotton without prior public notice.

If the government should take title to loan cotton, the cotton producers would be paid any amounts by which (1) the redemption costs of their notes (which include principal, interest, and carrying charges on the pledged cotton) were exceeded by (2) a fair value for the cotton at the time, which would be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture on the basis of the then prevailing average market prices for cotton with reasonable allowances for differences in grades, staple lengths, and locations.

"Don't be misled by false representations to the effect that the government will not give full value for cotton equities when and if it is necessary for the Commodity Credit Corporation to take title to the cotton," the AAA

official warned.

The notes secured by 1938 crop cotton, the maturity date for which was extended to July 31, 1941, are not callable on demand. The notes secured by 1939 crop cotton matured on July 31, 1940. The notes secured by 1940 crop cotton do not mature until July 31, 1941, but they are callable for payment on demand at any time. It is possible that the government may find it desirable to take title on August 1, 1941, to any cotton remaining pledged to secure notes which are overdue at that time. In the event, however, that the government should take title to any of the stocks of loan cotton, at least ten days public notice of such action would be given by a press release.

Correct Tire Inflation Will Conserve Gasoline

What has tire inflation to do with increased gasoline consumption?

This is an important consideration today with thought turning nationally to ways and means of making the gasoline supply go farthest as an aid in defense planning.

Tire engineers, according to Mr. H. L. McElvany, local Goodyear dealer, have over a period of years made extensive tests and comparisons, finding that a slight reduction in air content of tires increases gasoline consumption.

"On the 6.00-16 size, popular on a large group of cars in current use," said Mr. McElvany, "28 pounds of air is a normal pressure, but reduced to 24 pounds, or say roughly, reduced 14 percent, will increase the car owner's gasoline consumption two and one-half per cent. That is, if the highways over which he travels are smooth, but if they're rough, he will get even less miles per gallon.

"That is a good reason for watching tire inflations—seeing that they are up to recommended figures, so that the owner will get the ultimate safe mile possible from each tire," he continued.

"There are other things that the car owner will want to check more carefully, in addition to pressures. First, alignment of wheels, so that slow even wear of casings will result; frequent inspection of tires to be sure that nails and glass embedded there are removed, and finally, that his driving generally be improved. By that I mean the car owner should avoid quick getaways from stoplights, should not slam on the brakes, should keep his speeds down to a reasonable minimum. Thus he will not only get more mileage from his gasoline, but will really add miles to his tires' service.

"And one more point," concluded Mr. McElvany, "right now is an especially good time to replace worn tires. We are conducting a tire sale from now to July 5, offering real savings on Goodyear tires to the car owners of Clarendon and surrounding territory.

Speaking in the interest of his candidacy for the United States Senate, Mann added: "Strikes in defense industries must be stopped. They imperil the freedom which has made it possible to strike. A defense strike is a blow at democracy."

Mann outlined in detail the bill he proposes to introduce immediately in the senate which will "deal effectively" with strikes in industries producing defense material. Under the bill, work stoppage is eliminated, but labor is

insured fair wages and guaranteed the right to bargain collectively.

Declaring that a public office and the influence and publicity that goes with it should not be capitalized on for the purpose of making money, Gerald Mann has turned over to the press copies of his 1939 and 1940 income tax returns showing that the total income of the Mann household for those years consisted only of his salary as Attorney General, fixed by law.

have been definitely drawn" Mann continued. "The race has narrowed down to a contest between Gerald C. Mann and the Governor of Texas. Wheat Buyers: Attention!

Since Wheat Marketing Quotas are in effect, it will be necessary for you to co-operate with the AAA Office by keeping certain required records. The forms on which these records are to be kept are in the office now and are ready to be delivered to you when you need them.

The Wheat Marketing Quota law requires the "Over-planted" producer to pay a penalty of 49c on each bushel of wheat which he cannot identify by a White Marketing Card. It is the duty of the Wheat Buyer to see that this 49c penalty is paid on the unidentified wheat.

For the producer who is not "over-planted", the Buyer must fill out a form to show that the wheat he sells is identified by a Marketing Card and no penalty is paid.

These forms are of as much importance to the buyer as to the producer, so it will be to your advantage to come to the AAA Office at Clarendon for complete instructions - and come BEFORE you buy any wheat.

Naval News

NEW ORLEANS, La., June 15.—By enlisting now in the United States Naval Reserve, unmarried young men between the ages of 17 and 36 may obtain valuable training as radiomen and signalmen.

Preference for enlistment in this division of the Naval Reserve—known as Class V-3—will be given radio operators, both commercial and amateur, already licensed by the Federal Communications Commission, according to an announcement today from headquarters of the Eighth Naval District, where officials are directing enlistment in this branch of the reserve.

Because of the national emergency and the opportunity which Class V-3 offers for thorough training, Naval officials anticipate little difficulty in reaching their quota in short order over the eight states of the district. Persons interested should make inquiry through their nearest Navy Recruiting Station.

Acceptable candidates are enlisted as apprentice seamen and will be ordered to active duty as vacancies occur at the seven radio and signal schools throughout the nation. On reporting to school, students will be furnished, without expense, their initial outfit of uniforms and clothing as well as such equipment as may be necessary. At the training schools, students receive a four-month course and will be graduated as seamen, second class, for radioman, signalman or yeoman.

The Naval Reserve enlistments are for four years, but it was pointed out that men called to active duty will be expected to remain in that status only for the duration of the national emergency. Navy officials expect all men to be returned to inactive duty as soon as their services can be spared.
