Place tree orders now at county SWCD office

The Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District is taking orders for several varieties of trees and shrubs that are beneficial to wildlife in this area.

Those species beneficial to wildlife that are sold by the district are Evergreens, Red Oak, Catalpa, Little Walnut, Hackberry, Osage Orange, Honey Locust, Russian Olive, Flaming Sumac Caragana, Lilac, Bush Honeysuckles, Coto-naster, Plum, Sumac, Nanking Cherry, and San Cherry.

The District also offers wildlife packets that include a variety of trees selected to attract particular wildlife. Each packet includes 100 trees, 25 each of four different kinds. They have packets for quail and pheasant, squirrel, turkey, and deer.

They will have Pawnee and Mohawk pecan trees available this year, but orders must be received by November 30, 2004.

This clinic is free and open to the public.

Voters heading to polls next Tuesday

Donley County residents will go to the polls Tuesday to cast ballots in local races as well as voting for state-wide offices and choosing electors for president of the United States.

The General Election will be held November 2, from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Early voting by personal appearance continues through Friday, October 29, in the Courthouse Annex.

As of early Monday afternoon, at least 350 people had people had cast early or mail-in ballots, according to the Donley County Clerk's office. That number is up from the

same point in the 2002 general election, in which 247 people had voted eight days before the election.

According to Deputy County Clerk Kim Layton, there are 2,670 county citizens registered to vote.

On the local level this year, incumbent Democrat Wilma Lindley is facing Republican challenger Vicky Tunnell for the office of County Tax Assessor/Collector.

Precinct 3 voters will have the opportunity for a rematch as Democratic incumbent Commissioner Henry C. "Buster" Shields is pitted

against former commissioner Andy Wheatly, the Republican he unseated four years ago.

Voters in Precincts 3 and 4 have also seen a horserace develop between Democratic incumbent Constable Mike Wallendorff and write-in challenger Tony Sellars.

Also of interest to local voters are the following candidates running unopposed for reelection: Precinct 1 Commissioner Ernest Johnston (D), Donley County Sheriff Charles "Butch" Blackburn, Jr. (D), District Attorney Stuart Messer (R), District

Judge David McCoy (D), State Rep. Warren Chisum (R), and State Sen. Robert Duncan (R).

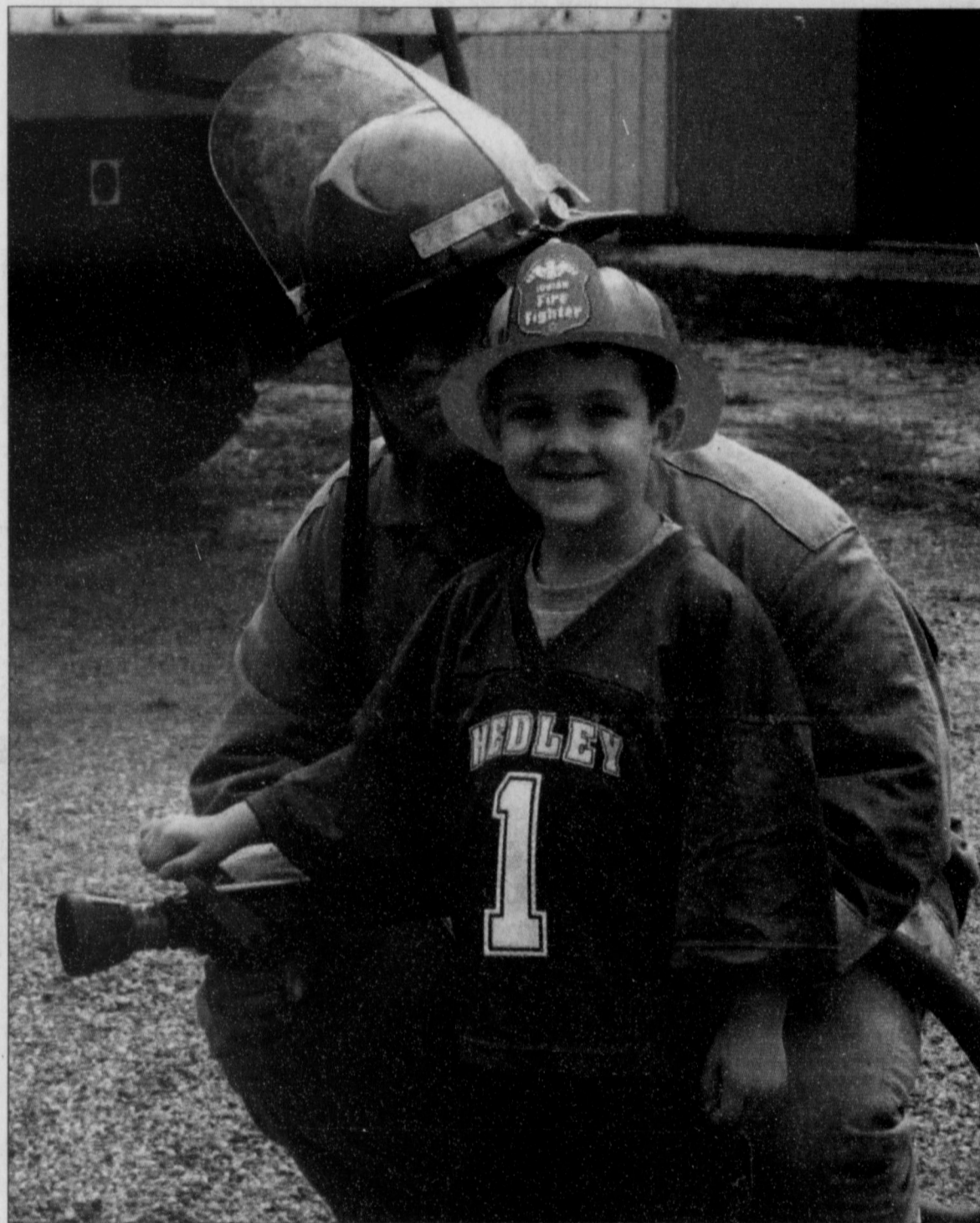
Clarendon native US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R) has no Democratic opponent but does face a challenge from Libertarian M.J. "Smitty" Smith.

Polling places for this year's General Election are as follows: Box 101 - Clarendon College Bairfield Activity Center, Box 102 - Howardwick City Hall, Box 103 - Martin Baptist Church Fellowship Hall, Box 201 - Donley County Courthouse,

Box 301 - Clarendon Community Center - Rodeo Grounds, Box 302 - Cotton Gin - Lelia Lake, Box 303 - Hedley Lions Club, Box 401 - Community Bank, and Box 402 - McClellan House. Check your voter's registration card to see which precinct box you should vote in.

If a voter has any trouble casting their ballot, they are asked to call the secretary of state's office at 1-800-252-8683.

HHS math, science teams compete in Lubbock

Hedley High School's math and science teams competed October 23 at the Lubbock Coronado Invitational Math and Science Meet against nine other 1A-3A schools, finishing fourth in the sweepstakes award.

Hedley was one of four 1A schools at the meet and was the only six-man school competing.

Senior Stephen Howard won a second place medal in Number Sense, a fourth place ribbon in Science, and placed seventh in Math. Will Wallendorff, also a senior, placed seventh in Science. Juniors Holly Davis and

Carmen Garcia placed eighth and tenth in Science respectively.

Sophomores Betty Cruz, Ruth Anne Howard, and Justin Kellas placed fifth, seventh, and eighth in Calculator Applications, leading that team to a fourth place finish. Freshmen Kristen Dwight and Sam Lovely both medaled by taking second and third places in the Science competition.

Each team finished fourth, which was commendable considering the competition and Hedley's relatively small size and lack of experi-

ence from this year's team. Bruce Howard, Hedley Science Coach, notes that only four of the fifteen Hedley competitors were involved in the math and science program from last year.

"We are basically starting our teams over from scratch, and we are very excited and proud of this new group of students who will sacrifice and work to become strong academic competitors," said Howard. "By the time district competition rolls around, we hope to have championship caliber teams again."

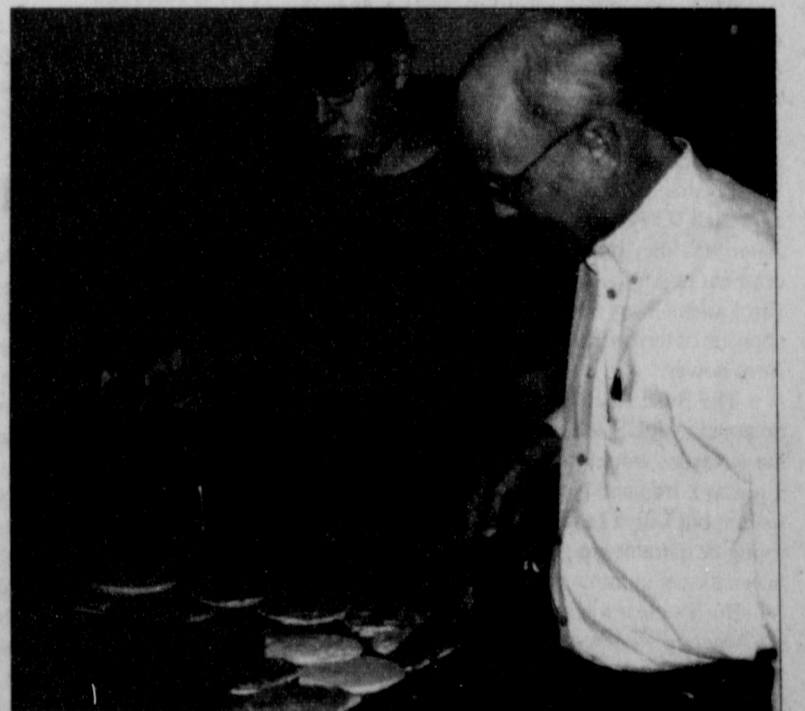
MCNH is also having a color-

Bush offers best choice for security

The clock is ticking fast now. By the time the next issue of the ENTERPRISE reaches you, the election will be over.

Well, at least the voting will be over. I wish I could say for certain that we will know by next Wednesday who will be the next president; but after 2000, all bets are off.

Already, thousands of lawyers are standing ready to file challenges to Tuesday's election based on everything from so-called voter intimidation to registration snafus to voter confusion. In fact, some lawsuits have already been filed. Nothing like getting an early start, you know.

An AP/Ipsos poll released this week found that 60 percent of Americans think there won't be a clear winner by November 3 and that 50 percent think there will be court challenges. These positions were reflected in stronger percentages among Democrats.

The Dems meanwhile keep going on about the "fairness" of the last election, stressing the importance of counting every vote, which makes it sound like we didn't count them all last time even though we did — several times — and their guy lost every time.

Meanwhile, this year's race is still very close. Most polls have President Bush in the lead, but almost all of them are within the margin of error. I still can't fathom how anyone can be undecided, but there are those folks out there.

The most important topic for me this year is foreign policy. Domestic issues like the minimum wage and tax cuts become a moot point if terrorists succeed in killing a great number of us. In this regard, President Bush has offered the most consistent and the best policy, which, put simply, is "kill them before they kill us."

Sen. Kerry, on the other hand, has been inconsistent in his support for the War on Terror. If anything, he has been consistent in advocating a weak response to threats to freedom.

Kerry has repeatedly complained about the war in Iraq despite having voted to give Bush the authority to use force against that nation. He has said that the United States should have put together a "real coalition" before going to war in Iraq even though we have 30-plus nations on our side. Which brings me to a couple of questions for the senator.

First and foremost, how many Frenchmen does it take to make a "real coalition?" That's assuming, of course, that the French could tear themselves away from humiliating little Muslim school girls and from selling their vote on the Oil For Food program in Iraq long enough to lend a hand.

Secondly, by the senator's standards, the first President Bush did have a "real coalition" after Saddam invaded Kuwait, and yet Kerry voted against the use of force for that operation. So what does it take before Kerry is willing to use America's military? Maybe a President Kerry would only consider something a threat when the great Canadian hordes come marching across the border.

The president has given Kerry a lot of grief — and rightly so — over comments the senator made about going back to a time when terrorism was just "a nuisance."

The fact of the matter is that terrorism was never just a nuisance, but the Western world just treated it that way. We should have reacted more strongly decades ago, starting when those hostages were taken in Iran in the 1970s. Unfortunately, we didn't do that; and with each successive terrorist attack, they became more entrenched.

There was a time when blowing a hole in the side of a US warship would have been an act of war. But under the last Democratic president, it was just a "ho hum" incident. There were no consequences for the attack on the *USS Cole*. There should have been a dramatic response, but there wasn't.

President Bush's administration takes a different approach. They identify threats and take them out. After 9/11 they immediately ousted the Taliban government in Afghanistan that was harboring and aiding Bin Laden. They correctly identified Iraq as a state sponsor of terrorism and removed that government from power.

The Bush Doctrine is working. There have been no attacks on US soil since 9/11 (although I'm sure the terrorists would love to pull one off before next Tuesday). Iran and North Korea are still rattling their sabers, but Libya has seen the error of its ways and is trying desperately to get back in the good graces of the international community.

Bush's clear vision is the only course for protecting America's interests. He is the only man in this race who can take the oath of office in January and truly fulfill the driving purpose of the United States Constitution to "provide for the common defense" and "secure the blessings of Liberty."

Would Kerry really fight the enemies of America aggressively? Maybe. Maybe not. His record certainly doesn't show that he would; and I, for one, am not willing to risk that.

Texans finally get their due deductions

The year 2004 marks two important milestones for young Texans. Eighteen-year-old Texans will get their chance to cast their first ballot in a Presidential election. Secondly, for the first time since these young men and women were born, Texas taxpayers can again take advantage of a major federal tax write-off. President Bush recently signed into law a bill restoring the ability of Texans to deduct their state and local sales taxes from their federal income taxes for fiscal years 2004 and 2005.

Simply put, the law reinstates the sales tax deduction, which had been dropped in a 1986 overhaul of the tax code. The 1986 legislation allowed residents of states with income taxes to deduct the taxes they paid to support their state governments, while Texans were denied a similar deduction for taxes paid to support their state government. The reason was solely because Texas and six other states did not levy an income tax and relied primarily upon the sales tax.

The result of that change eighteen years ago was to force 55 million Americans, or nearly one in five, to pay more

than their fair share of federal taxes. That measure cost Texas families itemizing their deductions an average of \$408 per year.

Since I came to the Senate, I have worked with my colleagues and sponsored legislation to restore the state sales tax deduction. Today, I am pleased to announce this victory for tax equity.

The American Jobs Creation Act of 2004 (H.R. 4520/S. 1637) includes language to allow a state sales tax deduction. This will give Texas taxpayers and those living in the six other states without a state income tax the option of deducting state and local sales taxes on their federal income tax returns in 2004 and 2005.

The restoration of the sales tax deduction will not force Texas taxpayers to keep a shoebox filled with a year's worth of sales receipts unless they choose to do a full itemization. Instead, they will be able to use sales tax tables compiled by

the Secretary of the Treasury to determine the amount of the deduction to which they are entitled. These estimates will take into account the taxpayer's state of residence, filing status, number of dependents, adjusted gross income, and state and local sales tax rates. It is important to note that Texans will want to hang onto receipts for big-ticket items such as boats, cars, or trucks. The new law allows a taxpayer to write off the taxes on those large items in addition to the amount they derive from the sales tax tables.

The Texas economy will also benefit from fixing this flaw in our federal tax system. The average family of four will save \$928 in federal taxes each year. This means, according to the Texas Comptroller, more than \$974 million will stay in the hands of Lone Star State taxpayers and will lead to: 21,798 new jobs, an increase in state sales tax income of about \$49.7 million, and an increase of \$1.2 billion in state gross product, including \$819 million in new investment.

That positive impact explains why I am committed to making this deduction permanent.

Loopholes defeat purpose of minimum wage

I read your October 21 commentary, and, as usual, I agreed with about half of it. I wish newspapers, TV, etc., were more balanced, but none, it seems, are. Any reader can easily tell if their local news staff is Republican or Democrat simply by the way any article is printed and where the emphasis is.

I read your comments on the minimum wage several times, and I still don't know for sure if you are in favor of increasing it to some dollar figure more in line with the times or leaving the low income ones to continue their struggle.

Many believe, including you, that minimum wage is \$5.15 per hour. That is not entirely true. I called US wage in, I think, Maryland and was told the national figure was \$5.15, but it varied from state to state and I should call the Texas Workforce in Austin. They informed me that \$5.15 was standard in Texas, but there were exceptions. (Aren't there always?)

Grocery and department stores are allowed to pay \$4.30 per hour for anyone in training for the first ninety days. Restaurants (who charge \$1.35 for a cup of coffee) can pay as little as \$2.13 per hour because the tips added will put wait help over the top. Over the top of what? The bare minimum? Restaurant employers are supposed to add the weekly tips to the weekly (or should I say "weakly") salary and make up the difference if the total is less. A survey last year found many who ignored this rule. I was under the impression that a tip was a physical "thank you" and had nothing to do with salary.

So if the minimum wage is \$2.13, \$3.50, \$4.30, \$5.15, or \$7.00, it will make little difference as long as these loopholes exist.

Many also believe that minimum wage earners are well off because they also receive all those "benefits." Check that out sometime.

You mentioned the election hinged on a "handful of simpletons," 20 percent who are undecided. Funny, I would have guessed it would be more... especially after the debates. I still don't have a candidate to vote against.

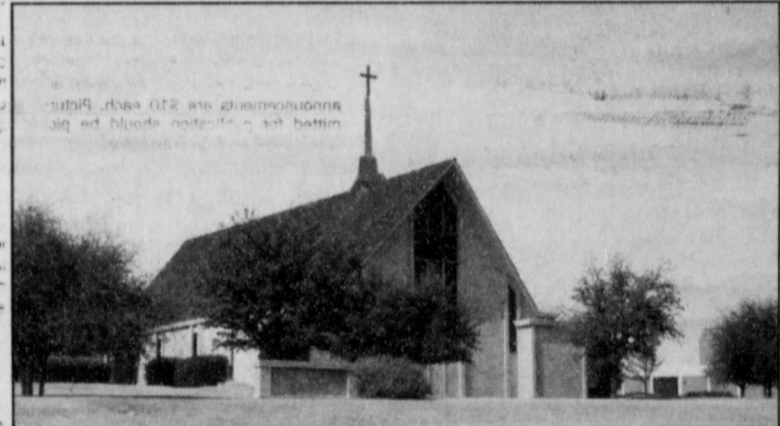

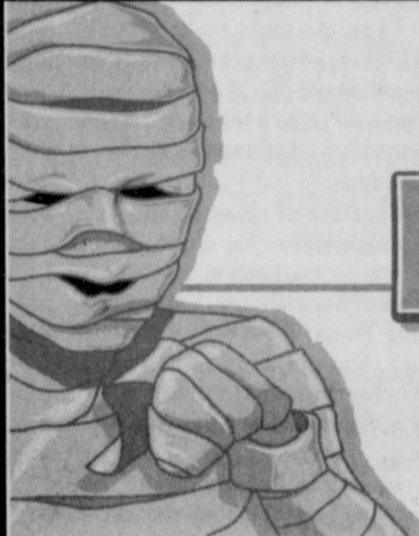

only are these short people very creative in their uses for syrup, they like to share with the important people in their lives. There is no such thing as "safe distance" when a 3-year-old is sticky.

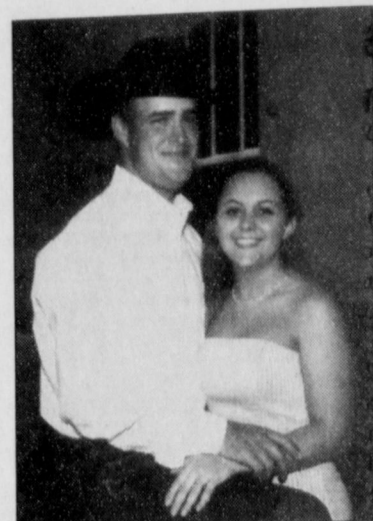

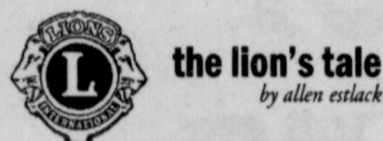
Governor taps Donley official for committee

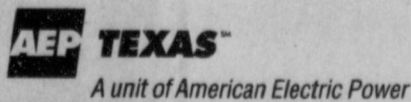

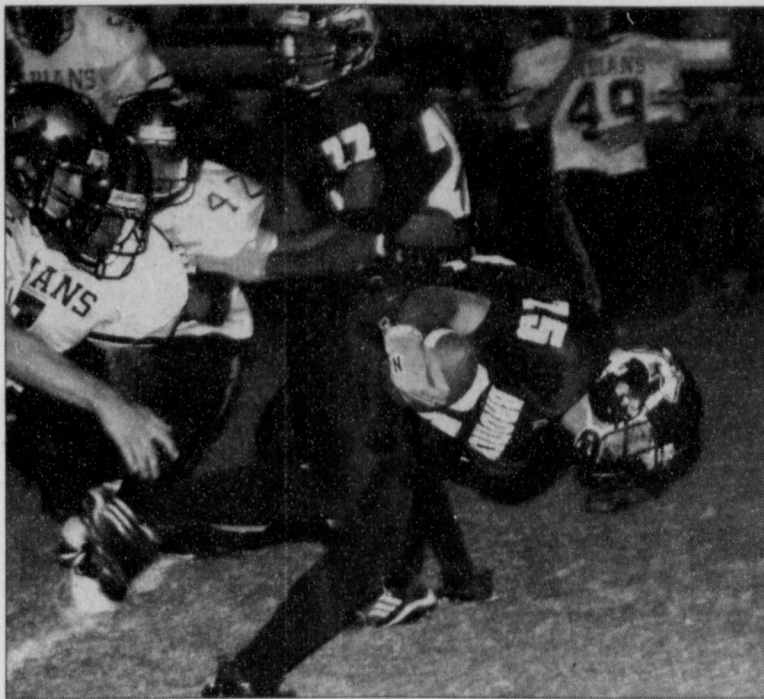
Despite trailing 7-33 in the first half, the Broncos continued to play hard and actually played the Indians to a one point difference in the second half of play.

Nathan Gribble and Devin Noble scored to put the Colts on the board.

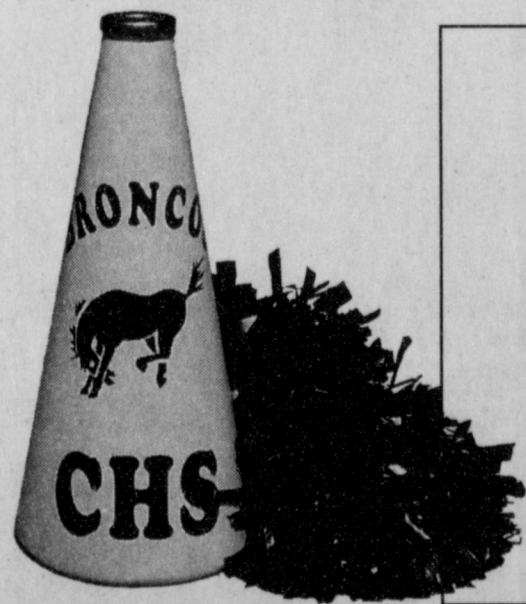

4-H meetings are held the first Tuesday of each month. If you are interested in joining 4-H, contact the county agents at 874-2141. You may also attend any meeting.

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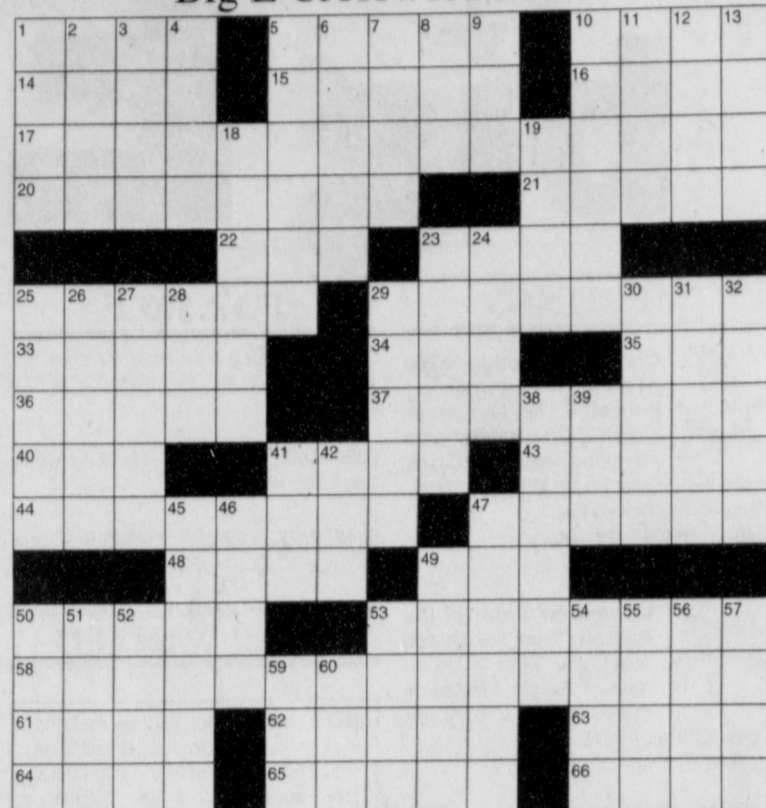
