## JONES CONGRATULATES GENE WORLEY ON RECENT VICTORY

TELEGRAMS, LETTERS AND POSTALS FLOW INTO WORLEY'S OFFICE

More than 100 telegrams were received by Gene Worley Sunday congratulating him upon his victory. More than 800 letters and post cards had been received up until Wednesday noon from voters and the many who voluntarily helped Worley win his race.

Cong. Marvin Jones called Worley by phone Sunday offering congratulations to the man who was nominated Saturday to succeed him.

"What are known as the common people elected me," Mr. Worley said, "and I am most grateful." He continues to get his pounds of postals from these common people who stayed in there and pitched through the heat of a mighty interesting campaign.

An infected foot resulting from walking too much during his race, has kept the "runner candidate" close to his room for the past several days. A physician bandaged the injured member Sunday. Wednesday Mr. Worley was walking around with a hobble gait.

Mr. and Mrs. Worley plan to spend a week or more with Mrs. Worley's parents at Bonham, Texas as where they can rest up and relax from the strenuous labors of the past three months. Mrs. Worley looked after his office and headquarters in Shamrock during the campaign.

Deskins Wells, whom Worley defeated, wired his congratulations. Worley called Wells by phone and thanked him.

Mr. Worley was elected over Mr. Wells in a landslide that saw the tall, Shamrock legislator win at least 23 of the 28 counties in the district. The victory was considered sensational in view of the fact that in the first primary Mr. Wells, with more than 16,000 votes, led Mr. Worley by 6,000 votes. In the second primary Worley picked up 24,000 votes against only 7,000 for Wells. The latest count showed Worley with 30,424 votes and Wells with 22,894 votes.

It is expected that Mr. Jones will recommend that Mr. Worley be made a member of the important agriculture committee, one of the most important in the house. Mr. Worley plans to make agriculture and related industries his major study.

Mr. Worley called J. C. Estlack here early Monday and asked him to thank his friends in Donley county, the county that gave him a record vote of almost 2-to-1, the best in the entire district. Estlack was county campaign manager with plenty of help from "the common people" who made up the thousands to select Gene Worley for the biggest job in the Panhandle.

Mr. Worley has been asked to speak at the Farmer-Business Man picnic at Lelia Lake this Thursday afternoon. He also has an urgent invitation to attend a "chili banquet" staged by the Pampa "Mr. Worley Goes to Congress Club" in September. Knowing how busy he will be with personal affairs the next few weeks, the public will hardly expect Mr. Worley to accept all the invitations he receives. That is humanly impossible.

## Virginia School Has Local Man On Its Faculty Now

Hobart E. Stocking, youngest son of Mrs. Sarah M. Stocking of this city has accepted a position on the teaching staff of the department of Geology of West Virginia University.

Mr. Stocking was educated in the Clarendon schools and graduated later at Johns Hopkins University with an M. A. degree in oil geology. During the past year he completed residence requirements for the Ph.D. degree at the University of Chicago.

Professor Stocking has had a wide experience in geology working in Mexico, Texas and New Mexico. He has variously been employed in geological research by the Texas Company, Humble, Sinclair and the Shell Corporation. For two years he did geological reconnaissance in Portuguese West Africa and worked for a while with the United States Geological Survey.

He will assume his new duties at the University of West Virginia, Morgantown, W. Va. September 1st.

CARBON SPECIALIST FROM PENNSYLVANIA HERE AFTER 22 YEARS

The first carbon black plant in the nation was built at Cabot, Penn. It was there that Henry Gerner grew up and made a special study of the product. All his active life he has been connected with the industry.

A few days ago, he stopped at Lelia Lake to pay his respects to the Gerner brothers, nephews. Though on his way to California, he took time out to learn more of the carbon black industry in the Panhandle.

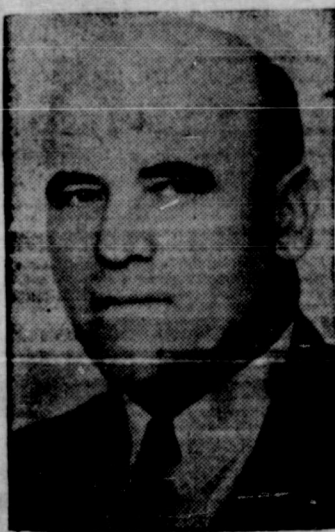
Accompanied by Albert Gerner, the elderly man was shown some of the largest plants in the Pampa country. He was surprised to know that the "pellet" method invented in a Cabot laboratory was being used on an extensive scale in Texas. Mr. Gerner was astounded at the size of the Panhandle plants and the immense production.

The elderly man stated that the oil supply had been practically exhausted in his state, and that the carbon industry was at a low ebb as a consequence.

## Culberson Wins By Voters' Help

PEOPLE CONDEMN ACTION OF MEN WHO FIRED HIM OFF JOB

There was much unction in Culberson winning as he will succeed Lon A. Smith, who voted with Jerry Sadler to oust him as chief of the gas utilities division on Oct. 16, 1939. Efforts to elect him had been examined for the division. As soon as he was fired Culberson announced as a candidate against Smith, who later announced he would not seek re-election. "I am going to do my best to

have the commission conducted apart from all political influences," said Culberson, "like it was when John H. Reagan and other great men composed its membership. I want to get it away from all political expediency and bickerings knowing the people want their government run in a businesslike way and not dominated by political considerations and influences."

When Judge Culberson takes his oath of office January 1st, he will begin serving by a vote of the people in a position from which he was "fired" by the men now on the Board. Culberson was chairman of the gas and utilities division at the time he was discharged.

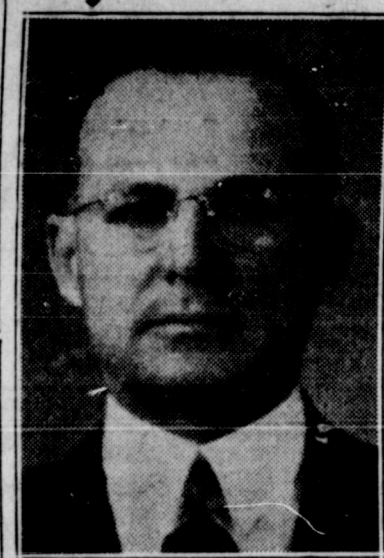

SMALLPOX VACCINATION WILL BE REQUIRED

## Worley's Lead Over Wells Now Totals 7,514

With unofficial returns virtually complete, latest figures today gave Eugene Worley of Shamrock a lead of 7,514 votes over Deskins Wells of Wellington in the 18th district congress race.

Worley held a total of 30,359 votes to 22,845 for Wells.

Worley led in 22 of the 28 counties, carrying all but Collingsworth, Briscoe, Castro, Farmer, Deaf Smith, and Sherman. Wells polled his big vote in his home county, Collingsworth, receiving 2,289 there to Worley's 571. In Wheeler county, Worley's home, the winner received 2,169 and Wells got 1,069.

In Potter county (Amarillo), Worley polled 4,608 and Wells 2,680.

Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo won the 31st district state senate seat over Max Boyer of Perryton with a total of 26,060 votes to 23,511 for his opponent, a majority of 2,549.

Boyer carried 13 and Hazlewood 13 counties in the district, but Hazlewood received 4,788 votes in Potter county to 2,082 for his opponent, furnishing him with the winning margin.

AUSTIN (Special)—The summer elections are over and the reaction is good. Here in Austin the election of Judge Olin Culberson means far-reaching changes in the railroad commission set-up. Commissioner Lon A. Smith, retiring, unofficially admitted possibility of at least 105 of his "employees" losing their jobs on the first of next January. Commissioners Smith and Sadler have been voting together and have controlled the hiring of personnel for the last two years. One of those they fired was the new commissioner-elect. So the political axe will likely do a lot of house-cleaning.

The four senators, running for re-election, who lost out included: J. Manley Head of Stephenville, Gordon Burns of Huntsville, Will Pace of Tyler, and Morris Roberts of Pettus. Respective winners for the places are: Judge Karl Lovelady of Meridian, Clem Fain of Livingston, County Attorney T. C. Chaddock of Wood County and Fred Mauritz of Ganado. Senator Vernon Lemons of Waxahachie was re-elected. John Lee Smith of Throckmorton, the greatest orator in West Texas, Ben Ramsey of San Augustine and Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo are new senators also. There are ten new senators. Senator Houghton Brownlee of Austin won over Homer DeWolfe, the latter an opponent of the governor.

**To Be Next Speaker**

On Sunday, following the primary, Homer Leonard of McAllen, who was re-elected last month for sixth term in the house, announced Sunday he already has over 100 of the members of the new legislature pledged to vote for him as Speaker. Leonard, who will be 42 next January 14th, was chairman of the all-important revenue and taxation committee of the 46th Legislature. A former editor, having served in this capacity for the McAllen Monitor for seven years, Leonard is now a practicing attorney and partner in a printing business in McAllen. He probably presided at least one third of the time during the 46th when Speaker Emmett Morse took time off. As a former chairman of the appropriations committee, Leonard has a familiarity with details of legislation that possibly no other present member has. His ability as a speaker is marked; his decisions are fair and he is ever ready to assist any member with any proposed legislation. The McAllen legislator also will be found working hand in hand with Governor O'Daniel as they already are closely tied in friendship and association, being the best of friends. Mr. Leonard married Miss Nona Byerly of McAllen and they have two young daughters, Barbara Mae and Marcia Fae.

**Department Heads Busy**

Election of so many new senators as well as 91 new members of the House has made a big problem for department heads who are in the habit of employing from one to four or more 'friends' of any new member who comes to them for 'favors'. Rumor here over the weekend was to the effect that a long list of present employees of the Liquor Board will be fired on September 1st to make room for the hiring of new 'political' employees. A number of other departments are ready to do the same thing, possibly on a smaller scale. Liquor Administrator Bertie Ford recently "promoted" a former deputy supervisor back to his old job when Ford found out the new senator at Waco was a close friend of the former official.

**Willkie Will Get Many Votes in Texas.**

With a mass meeting being held in Dallas this week of democrats from all over Texas who want to vote for and support the Republican nominee, Wendell Willkie,

observers in Austin see a possibility of a big vote in November for the Republican. With men like Mike Hogg, Ralph Moore, Ernest Bosl and many others taking a lead in the movement, the November election will be a hot one. Few, if any, will yet be so bold as to predict that Willkie will be able to carry Texas although all point to the Hoover miracle in 1928.

**A Real Worker**

One of the most unobtrusive men about the State Capitol today is the assistant secretary of state, the Honorable Claude Williams of Longview, former district attorney there. An independent oil man in his own right by ownership of a number of producing wells in the East Texas field, Claude Williams brought to Austin early in 1939 by the O'Daniel administration. While Claude Williams' name seldom gets into public print, as he prefers to work without the glare of publicity, yet he has become one of the most valuable officials in State government. Williams is studious, gentlemanly and scholarly personality. One is immediately impressed by the man's outstanding sincerity of purpose and manner. Not needing the salary which the job carries, he throws himself into his work for the love of it. If Claude Williams should decide to go further in politics, the State of Texas will hear a lot of him and will come to know him and respect him as his friends do now.

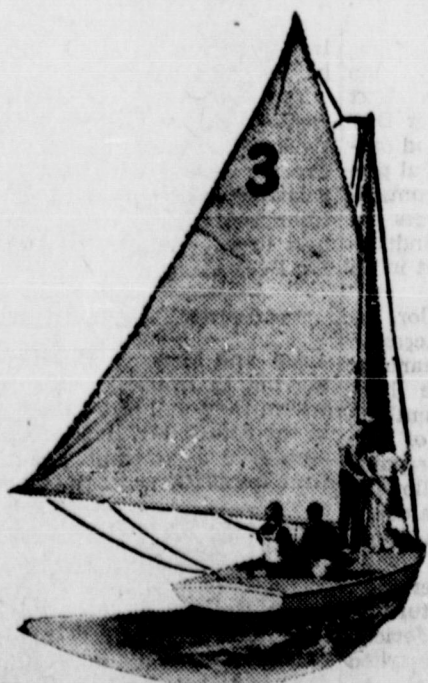
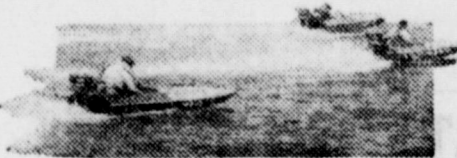

### Pastureland Grass Will Be Discussed At Amarillo Convention

Emphasis on a grassland agriculture will feature a five-state meeting of agriculturists scheduled for Amarillo on September 5 and 6th. The meeting will be one of a series of grassland conferences held in the nation this summer.

Regional problems of seeding, adapting introduced grasses and improving native grasses, range management, and the raising of nutritional levels of grasses will be discussed.

Under-secretary of Agriculture Grover B. Hill is expected to conduct the session devoted to range grass problems and M. L. Wilson, federal director of the Extension Service, will speak on "Grass and Man."

The meeting will bring together farm leaders, ranchers, and representatives of the land-grant colleges, the experiment stations, state extension services and the various agencies of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to discuss the problem raised by Secretary of Agriculture Wallace:

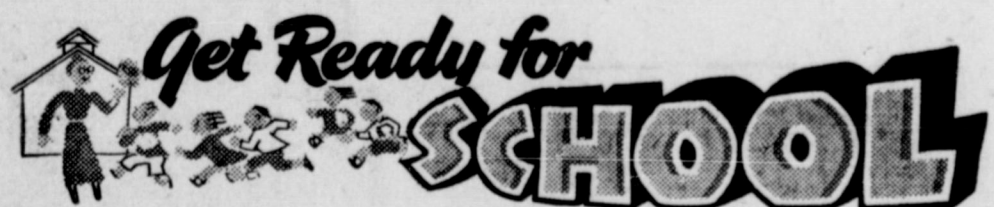
