

# Some liberals still hung up on Bush's win

Most Americans know that the 2004 presidential election is over. Most of us - regardless of party affiliation - know who won. Most Republicans and conservatives are happy about it, and most Democrats and liberals are not happy but at least rational enough to know they lost this one but vow

to fight again next time. And then there are the others... the ones who keep reliving the election, keep fighting for their candidate, and can't accept the inevitable outcome.

Faithful readers of this column may remember a little over a month ago the story of several distraught Democrats

seeking out professional psychological help because they had developed symptoms of "Post Election Selection Trauma" - or PEST - which includes loss of appetite, sleeplessness, nightmares, and pervasive moodiness all stemming from the reelection of George W. Bush.

That story kind of went by the wayside, and it appeared that things were going to straighten out pretty well until last week when Congress convened to count the votes of the Electoral College - the votes that really matter in our federal republic.

Led by a loudmouth Congresswoman from Ohio named Stephanie Tubbs Jones, a handful of Democrats in the House of Representatives stopped the official tally by objecting to the Buckeye State's Electoral votes, citing election "irregularities." One senator was needed to really bring the process to a screeching halt, and the left found that person in Barbara Boxer of

Jones said she didn't want to put the nation in turmoil or overturn the election but said she was convinced that Congress must "protect the integrity of the true will of the people."

Well, not that it matters to her, but the true will of the people seemed pretty clear to this West Texas boy. President Bush got about three million more votes than Sen. Kerry did, and he won Ohio by about 118,000

Democrats complained that there was fraud in Ohio, that there were long lines, and that minority polling places had a shortage of voting machines. I don't buy the fraud argument (and neither did Kerry apparently since his attorneys didn't pursue any legal action on those grounds), and the other two problems can be explained by the high turnout of the election.

Anyway, the joint session of Congress recessed. The House and Senate engaged themselves in a useless debate over the legitimacy of Ohio's votes; and eventually they reconvened in joint session, counted the votes of the Electors, and - lo and behold - George Bush won again. Imagine that.

Still, 37 Ohio voters fought on and kept pursuing a lawsuit pertaining to the 2004 election right up until Tuesday of this week after it became apparent they weren't going to stop Bush's inauguration. But even they aren't entirely through.

"We are not quitting," attorney Cliff Arnebeck said. "We are going on to any other forum that's available, and we intend to pursue those avenues aggressively."

Whatever that means.

And so we move forward to the seemingly unstoppable swearing-in ceremony next Thursday. What's a diehard Democrat to do now? The Associated Press reported this week that David Livingstone of Detroit has the answer - boycott.

Livingstone doesn't want anyone to go to work (a consistent Democratic Party platform plank) or buy anything next Thursday.

"I view the inauguration of Bush as a black Thursday for this country," Livingstone told the AP. "We've tried marching in the streets to stop the war, we tried writing letters, we tried initiatives on the Web, but Bush doesn't listen. It seems to us the only thing Bush and the Republicans will listen to is money.'

Livingstone has kindred spirits around the country, and one in Louisiana is even planning a jazz funeral procession through New Orleans to mourn Bush's second term and the so-called "death of democracy.'

And don't think that just because Bush successfully takes the oath of office next week that this will some how all go away. One news report this past week mentioned that a small band of diehards was still trying to figure out how to constitutionally overturn the 2000 election and "restore" the presidency of Al Gore. All of this is really quite sad. It's the liberals who have the Web site called MoveOn.org. Maybe they ought to think about doing some moving on of their own. Move on to Canada preferably, but at least move on to the next election.

## Inauguration is living American history

On January 20, Washington, D.C., will Orleans was known, host one of democracy's greatest pageants, the inauguration of the U.S. President.

While the inauguration ceremony, first performed in 1789, seems timeless, it has actually changed a great deal over the years. The first took place a month late in New York City because George Washington was delayed by harsh winter weather. As he traveled to New York, Congress debated the title for the chief executive of the United States. John Adams, Washington's vice president, argued for "His Most Benign Highness" but fortunately for us all, Congress settled on the title we still use: "President of the United States."


George Washington's oath came straight from the Constitution: "I do solemnly swear that I will faithfully execute the office of the President of the United States and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States." He then added, "So help me God," starting a custom followed by every president since.

The New York state chief justice determined that Washington should swear on a Bible, which set off a scramble to find a copy of the Good Book. When none was found in New York's Federal Hall, a Bible was borrowed from a Masonic lodge a few

President Washington also started the custom of the inaugural speech. In his second term, he began the practice of having the oath administered by a U.S. Supreme Court Justice.

The first inauguration in Washington, D.C., was of the third president, Thomas Jefferson, who walked to and from his boarding house to the Capitol for the swearing in. In his second term, he rode on horseback from the Capitol to the White House. A small band played music, and a crowd gathered to watch the procession. Thus the inaugural parade was born.

President Jefferson also held an open house at the White House, a now-discontinued tradition that almost resulted in calamity for Andrew Jackson. "Old Hickory," as the hero of the Battle of New had to flee from a friendly, but unruly, crowd by exiting the White House



by sen. kay bailey hutchison through the years. It was held indoors until 1817, when President James Monroe was sworn in on the east portico of the Capitol. It remained there until Ronald Reagan moved the ceremony to the west side of the Capitol in 1981 to allow more

Even the date of the inauguration has changed. Congress passed the 20th Amendment of the Constitution in 1933 to decrease the delay between election of a new president and the end of the outgoing president's term by moving the ceremony up from March 4 to January 20. President Franklin Roosevelt was the last president to take his oath on the original date and the first to take his oath on the new.

While most Americans believe no inauguration is complete without festive balls, this was not always the case.

President James Madison's famous wife, Dolly, presided over the first inaugural ball in 1809. In 1869, President Ulysses S. Grant's inaugural ball degenerated into a food fight. President Woodrow Wilson declined to host any balls because he considered them undignified. Because President Warren Harding opposed the festivities in 1921, unofficial balls were the rule until President Harry Truman revived the official inaugural ball in 1949.

Because of heavy demand, President Dwight Eisenhower held two inaugural balls, and the numbers have grown ever since. This year, though many balls are being held, the Black Tie and Boots inaugural ball hosted by the Texas State Society is considered "the" inaugural ball to attend. Its tickets sold out online in less than an hour, and those sold by mail were snapped up immediately as well.

If you are in Washington, D.C., through April, you may want to visit The Library of Congress and see "Presidential Inaugurations," a display of artifacts, documents, and photographs from the ceremony's long history. Exhibits like this remind us that the traditions of the Presidential Inauguration are something we can take pride in, whether we are in Washington D.C. or in Washington-on-the-Brazos.

# St. Mary's Academy

The Birthplace of Catholic Education in the Panhandle

Then...

St. Mary's Academy was built on land bought by Bishop Edward J. Dunne for \$2.00 a block and opened on January 16, 1899. The basic curriculum was English, Latin, Algebra, Geometry, General Science, and History. Extra courses included Astronomy, Physical Education in the form of rhythmics and gymnastics, sewing classes which were often held on the lawn in nice weather and one of the sisters taught evening classes in shorthand and typing for young women in town.

Day students were for both boys and girls, but the boarding department was for girls only. On average the second floor housed about 20 girls. St. Mary's Academy also served as a finishing school for young ladies.

The school served to draw the townspeople together as there were many non-Catholics attending. The academy continued until the fall of 1911 with an enrollment of 135. An epidemic of typhoid fever broke out in the boarding department with nine of the boarders coming down with the disease in less than 24 hours. Dr. Carroll advised the sisters to close the school and send the balance of the boarders to their homes. The sisters later transferred to Amarillo and re-opened St. Mary's Academy, where it remains open today. In 1918, the school was torn down and sold for lumber.

Now...

As years passed, the property was leased to individuals to house their animals. In the mid 1970s Father Arnold J. Carlson decided to let the property grow up naturally. While this seemed a good idea to him, it soon became apparent to the neighbors and parishioners that this was not a wise decision. Overgrown and uncared for, the property became and eyesore because people began to throw their trash there; and parishioners were concerned about it being a hazard.

In the summer of 2004, the members of St. Mary's Church had the property cleaned and prepared to begin building a park.

In January of 2005, wheat seed was planted in the hoped of having a ground cover to hold the soil until grass could be seeded and take hold. Plans for a park are currently being made. The First Annual Pilgrimage, remembering the beginning of 106 years of Catholic education in the Panhandle, will be held at the site on January 16, 2005. The pilgrimage will begin with a Mass held at 11:00 a.m. to be followed with a tree planting and blessing of the site by Bishop John Yanta. The public is invited.

What a mess!
