



FOUR WIDOWS OF TEXAS HEROES STILL GET PENSIONS

AUSTIN-Four pensioners of Texas war for independence receive \$37.50 quarterly from the resulted in establishment of the Republic of Texas more than a century ago.

A bounty of 640 acres of land was given to the soldiers who death in a peace-time accident fought in that war, when the republic took over the vast land areas that formerly had been under Mexican control.

Later pensions were granted to the families of Deaf Smith and other participants in the war by Mrs. Clyde Easterling and girls individual pension acts. Some of these acts provided money grants; others grants of public land.

It was not until 1870 that a general pension act for the survivors of the Texas War for Independence was passed.

At least two of the remaining pensioners married a participant in the decisive battle of San Jacinto, in which the Texan forces under Gen. Sam Houston defeated the Mexicans under Gen. Santa Anna. The husband of another of the pensioners was Santa Anna's guard after capture of the Mexican commander


