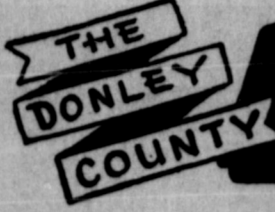

Farm News

Set-Aside Requirements

A major change has recently been made in the land eligibility requirements for set-aside.

Set-aside acres shall be cropland which is at least equal in productivity to the average productivity of other cropland on the farm and could be devoted to the crop for which payments are made. In the event the County Committee determines that the productivity of the set-aside acreage is substantially below average, appropriate reduction in payments shall be made.

Irrigable land within the farm's irrigation system shall be designated for set-aside when the established yields for the allotment of feed grain base from which set-aside is determined is normally irrigated, the payment for the allotment or base shall be made on the basis of a dryland yield. The County Committee shall establish a yield for the crop which is representative of dryland production for the farm. The payment reduction will be made on the amount of acres set-aside for that crop which is irrigated.

If you have any questions, come by the county office and we will be glad to discuss them with you.

Final Grazing Date

The final date for acreages set-aside under the cotton, feed grain and wheat programs will be May 14, 1971. Grazing privileges will not be permitted again until October 15.

Sign-up for the 1971 farm programs is now underway at the county office and will continue through April 9. We encourage you to sign up as soon as possible.

Boll Weevil Survey Here Wed., March 17

A trash survey to determine the over-wintered boll weevil population in Donley County will be held next Wednesday, March 17 at the Fair Building in Clarendon starting at 9:00 a.m., according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. The survey was originally scheduled for February 24 but was canceled because of the snow storm.

Don Rurrel, area entomologist with Texas A&M University Extension Service, will conduct the survey again this year.

Trash samples should be taken from areas that have a collection of leaf litter such as, shelterbelts, cottonwood trees and along creeks.

The trash samples should be taken to the Fair Building by 10:00 a.m. on March 17, Gooch said.

After the survey is completed the information on the number and location of the boll weevil will be available to farmers and others interested in the results of the survey.

Bulldogs Prospects For Coming Year

Coach Dave Neely reports that the Clarendon Bulldogs will lose three players from the starting squad next year: Tony Moya of Raymondville, David Land of Dimmitt, and Juan Villarreal of Zapata.

Land averaged 11.1, Villarreal 13.8 and 9.8 per game this season. Villarreal ranked in the top 15 in scoring and rebounding in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference. Moya averaged 22.5 points and 10 rebounds per game this season.

Two starters and three top reserves were freshmen this year and figure in Neely's plans for next year's Bulldog squad. These include Bobby Martin, Jesse King '63', Edgar Lopez of Las Cruces, N. M., Ron Schulz of Spearman, and '63' Ray Dickson of Clinton, Oklahoma.

Another prospect who will be eligible next year is '610' Kim Blout of Hackensack, N. J. Blout enrolled the second semester this year and will be trying for a starting berth at a guard spot.

According to Neely, getting some size is of upmost importance to compete in the tough WJAC. Quoting Neely, "We would of course like to obtain a big man, 6'7" or 6'8" or bigger, to use in the center of our attack, as well as a couple of wing men between 6'4" and 6'6". We like to run, so speed and quickness is a factor in our recruiting efforts."

Dave Neely, coach of the Clarendon College Bulldogs, was named Region V Coach of the Year at the Region V Basketball Tournament Friday, March 5, 1971.

Tony Moya Named To Reg. V Tourney Team

Tony Moya, a 6'5" sophomore and an outstanding member of Coach Dave Neely's Bulldog basketball team, was named on the Region V All Tournament Team at Big Spring the past week. Moya is a native of Raymondville. He has averaged 22.5 points and 10 rebounds a game and became the all-time leading scorer for Clarendon College by scoring 1075 points in two years. His 696 points for the 1970-71 season is also a school record.

Other honors have been received by Moya this season. He received honorable mention on the All Region Team, made First Team All Conference, was named to the All Tournament Team of the Murry State Tournament, and All Tournament Team of the Pratt, Kansas Tournament.

West Texas Utilities Sponsors Student To Science Symposium

West Texas Utilities Company will sponsor an outstanding student from Clarendon High School to the 11th Texas Nuclear Science Symposium for High Schools to be held in Austin June 7-11, according to Local Manager Allen Estlack.

Held on the campus of the University of Texas at Austin, the four-day symposium is co-sponsored by the University and the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation. West Texas Utilities Company and nine other investor-owned electric utility companies in Texas compose the foundation. The foundation is supporting research at the University in seeking a future source of energy supply for generation of electric power by controlling nuclear fusion reactions.

A number of noted speakers from science, industry and education will address the delegates to the symposium. Two afternoons will be spent touring the science laboratories at the University.

The company also will sponsor a teacher to accompany the student. Both the student and teacher will be selected by the high school. Some 550 delegates from throughout Texas will attend.

"This is an unusual opportunity for those attending to participate in a most educational, interesting and eventful experience," Mr. Estlack said. "We are pleased that we can make it available to each of them."

SAVE CALF CROPS BY USE OF VET CHECKS

The loss of a calf crop can result from the use of a non-breeding herd sire and that could amount to a sizeable disaster. The chance for such a happening can largely be eliminated, says County Agent Ronald Gooch by having a fertility check of the sire or sires.

The local veterinarian can make the check and predict with a high degree of accuracy the breeding potential of the herd sire before he is turned out with the cow herd.

The semen evaluation on the sire should be done a few weeks before the breeding season. In cases of substandard breeders, this allows for sufficient time to find and test replacements.

Bulls which do not meet minimum standards can be sold or held for retest depending upon the advice of the veterinarian.

Semen testing, points out the county agent, also provides an opportune time for a complete physical of the bull which should include the feet and legs.

Donley County's population in the 1970 census was 3,641, down 18.2 percent from the 1960 figure of 4,449, the bureau of the census U. S. Department of Commerce, reports.

The official population of the state was 11,196,730, up 16.9 percent from the 1960 population count, which was 9,579,677.

The 1970 census counted 3,466 white persons in Donley County, 95.2 percent of the total; 174 negroes, and 1 persons of other races. In 1960, 95.0 percent of the population was white.

The census showed 161 children under 5 years; 726 in ages 5 through 17; 1,970 people 18 through 64; and 784 who were 65 and older. The population 14 years and over included 1,962 people, 329 who were widowed, 93 divorced and 631 never married.

Donley County's 1970 population was classified as 100 percent rural.

There were 1,380 households, with 3,504 persons, including 320 one-person households. In addition 137 persons were living in group quarters.

The 1970 census counted 1,649 housing units in Donley County, 1,008 of them occupied by owners in 1970 was 61.1 percent, compared with 56.4 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 1,566 single family houses, 50 housing units in multiunit buildings and 25 homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 4.2, compared with 8.5 in 1960.

Of all the occupied housing units, 1,308 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 72 lacked some or all plumbing.

The median value of owner-occupied houses in Donley County was \$7,200, compared with \$5,700 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was \$46 per month, compared with \$51 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

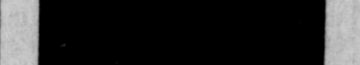

Accent On Health

Making medical history comes to few people, but this distinction has come to an Ohio boy who medical authorities say has survived a case of human rabies.

Rabies in man is considered a fatal disease, but the six-year-old Lima, Ohio, youngster defeated the odds in the astounding medical event. He was asleep last Oct. 10 when bitten by a bat, which was captured by his father and submitted to a laboratory, where the tests were positive for rabies. The boy received a 14-day series of inoculations.

On October 30 the youngster complained of neck pain and over the next several days experienced lethargy, general discomfort and loss of appetite.

When his condition worsened,

the lad was admitted to a Lima hospital with 104-degree fever. Although the fever decreased, he became more lethargic, developed stiffness of the neck, lost the ability to speak or understand, had a weakness of the left arm and other symptoms and finally lapsed into a coma.

To facilitate breathing, a surgical opening (tracheostomy) was made in his throat. After a week, the boy gradually began to improve. Steady but slow progress continued and before Christmas he was able to walk with assistance and speak in short sentences. Later he was able to leave the hospital.

From the time the boy entered the hospital, test after test was

run in an effort to pinpoint the cause of his illness. Blood tests were made — with negative results — for encephalitis and other diseases. Other tests also were run.

Using information concerning the circumstances of the original bite, clinical illness and laboratory findings, medical authorities said the evidence strongly suggested that the boy had an active case of human rabies. His case still is being watched closely.

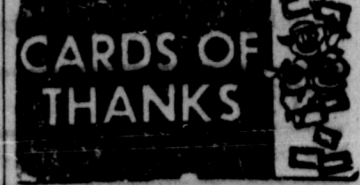
The child's clinical improvement was significant and usual, said health authorities. Humans with rabies have been known to survive for up to 133 days. But, says the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., there has

been no laboratory - confirmed case in which the patient showed actual physical improvement after the first month of illness.

During the boy's treatment, heart and breathing functions were monitored continuously. Prevention of hypoxia - oxygen starvation - was accomplished by the throat operation and careful nursing care.

While this youngster is considered the first to survive human rabies, there is no speculation that the future holds any hope for other rabies victims. The Texas State Department of Health

advises all animal owners to have their pets vaccinated against rabies and to avoid contact with any "friendly-acting" wild animal.

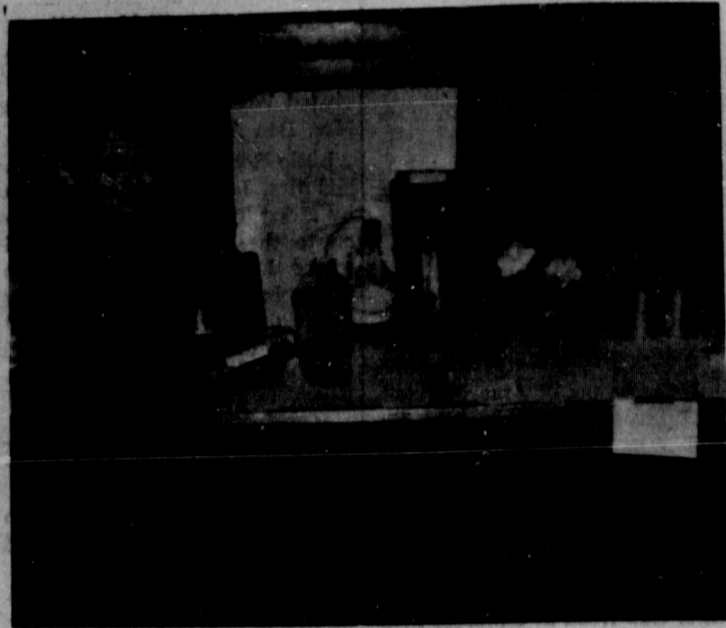

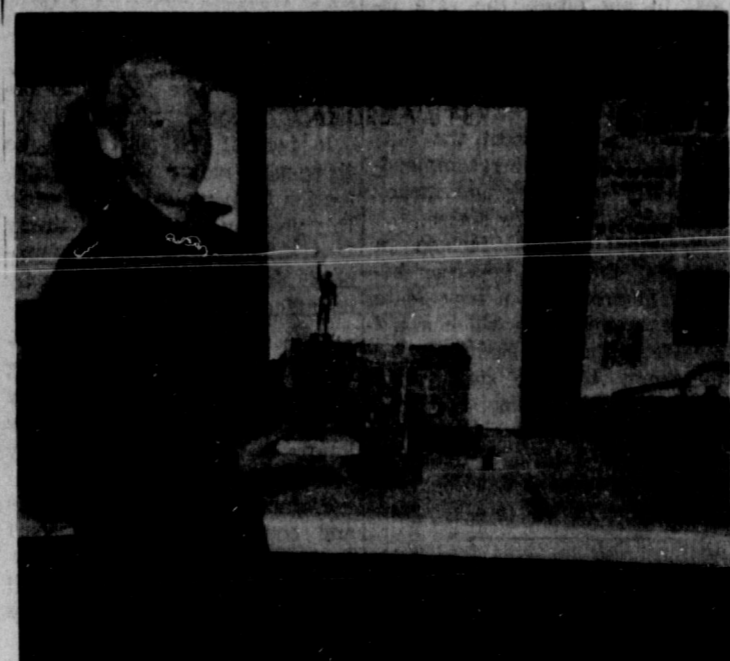

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 8:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Nell Corneli, is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting and Cula Jo Trout is hereby appointed Deputy Clerk for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at Clarendon Consolidate Independent Public School Administration Building within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. 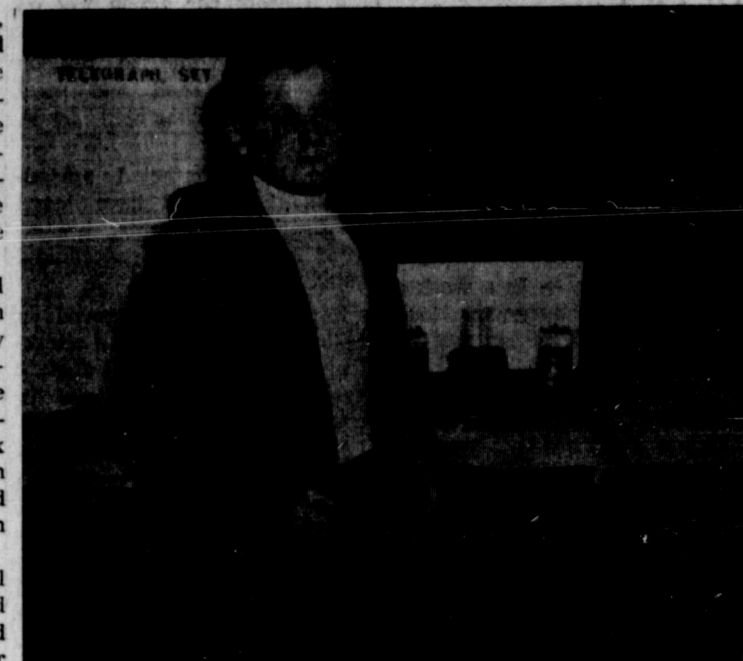

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Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol
By Vern Stanford

AUSTIN, Tex. — In a week of major financial flurry, the House passed a \$492.5 million tax bill and an \$80 million college tuition hike, while the Senate approved a \$185 million college building bond plan.

Here's the breakdown on the tax bill:

An increase in the sales tax rate from 3.25 to 4 per cent, \$279.8 million.

Increase in the auto sales tax rate from 3 to 4 per cent, \$63.75 million.

Increase in the hotel occupancy tax from 3 to 4 per cent, \$6.3 million.

A \$1 tax on transfer of corporate securities, \$10 million.

A 10 per cent levy on entertainment admissions, \$26.6 million.

Increase in the corporation franchise tax rate from \$3.25 to \$3.75 per \$1,000 of assets, \$39.5 million.

A 5 cents per gallon tax on aviation jet fuel, \$50 million.
An increase in the tax on sand, gravel, shell and marl from submerged lands, \$10.6 million.

The House rejected amendments that would have taxed corporation net profits, timber, snuff and sales to government units.

Representatives approved a tuition increase from \$50 a semester hour charge on out-of-state students, or about \$700 per semester.

Both bills now go to the Senate, where Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes has promised extended hearings. First, however, the Senate — unlike the House — proposes to total its spending proposals to see just how much revenue is required to balance the budget.

Senate voted 21-7 for the House-passed bill to provide tuition-backed revenue bond financing of new higher education facilities in San Antonio, Dallas, Odessa, Houston, Lubbock and El Paso.

COURTS SPEAK — Texas Supreme Court refused to review a Sunday closing law case involving Cook's discount store at Bryan, thus again affirming Tex-

as' blue law.

A woman who burned her fingers due to a defective safety glove at the Dallas Texas Instruments plant nine years ago got a new trial in her damage suit for more than 20,000.

U. S. Supreme Court, in a case of interest to Texas, held unanimously that highways constructed with federal funds cannot cut through public parks except in "the most unusual situations."

U. S. Supreme Court in a Houston case held that an indigent cannot be jailed to work out traffic fines for non-jailable offenses.

Court of Criminal Appeals held two boys sentenced for murder in Edinburg were placed in double jeopardy because of their age.

REDISTRICTING ROW LOOMS — Lawmakers, armed with new census tract maps, are tuning up for some early showdowns on congressional and legislative redistricting.

Sen. J. P. Word of Meridian introduced capitol bills for his redistricting committee to start work on within the next week. Word said he plans no out-of-Austin public hearings like those being conducted by the House redistricting committee headed by Rep. Delvin Jones of Lubbock.

Forty-six of 52 big-city House members served notice on Jones they don't like his preliminary sketches of new district lines. They interpret Jones' early efforts as designed to safeguard rural congressmen.

Under a fair plan, they said, Harris County should include four congressional districts, Dallas County three, and Bexar and Tarrant counties two each. Instead of the 11 districts to which the metropolitan counties are entitled, they argued, Jones has indicated only seven districts would be dominated by the bigger cities.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. Preston Smith named Houston attorney Carl Illig to the Texas Water Development Board.

Smith selected for the Texas Tech University Board of Regents Bill E. Collins of Lubbock, Dr. John James Hincey of San Antonio and Johnny Clinton Formby of Hereford.

Among other recent appointments announced by Smith were: John B. Turner Jr. of Houston to Texas Industrial Commission; C. H. Coffield of Houston to Texas Conservation Foundation; Aubrey D. Vielkel of LaGrange, Roger Gilbert Zercher of Blanco, William C. Petri of Austin (reappointment) and Thomas C. Ferguson of Burnet (reappointment) to Lower Colorado River Authority Board.

Wright Matthews of Palestine (reappointment) to Upper Neches River Municipal Water Authority Board of Directors.

LOCAL SCHOOL COSTS SET — Local school district share of the state's public education system cost in 1971 - 1972 will be \$245.1 Million.

State Board of Education set the local fund assignment for the next school year at a meeting here last week. (March 1)

Assignment includes 20 per cent of the foundation school program cost (\$215.1 million), plus another \$30 million in special credits earned by the districts during the past year.

Total cost — both state and local share — of the foundation school program for the 1970-71 school year is estimated at \$1,075,634,247 (billion).

Professional and teacher aide salaries this year will cost \$926.7 million; maintenance and operation of schools, \$76.8 million; transportation, \$26.8 million; Texas Education Agency administration, \$2,093,000 and special programs, \$7,082,000.

Many local school districts pay for additional services with local tax money and support salaries for their teachers higher than the minimum scale.

CRIME INCREASING STILL — Major crime increased in 1970 by 5.1 per cent, according to a report by Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Although Texas' crime trend remained up, Speir noted, the rate of increase was down from a 19.9 per cent gain for the first six months of last year and compares with almost 16 per cent for all 1969.

DPS director said there was a major crime every one-and-one quarter minutes.

Crime rate jumped 4.8 per cent in cities and 7.9 per cent in rural areas. There was some decline in the crime rate (5.9 per cent) for cities in the 50,000 - 100,000 population bracket. It was up

25.2 per cent in 10,000-25,000 cities. In big cities, the rate increase was just 2.8 per cent. Crime clearance rate rose slightly.

BETTER BUDGETING URGED — In a new report, the Texas Research League recommended better budgeting and money management for the state.

Recommendations include a proposal that the governor become chairman of a new State Budget Commission which would include Legislative Budget Board members. A single staff would serve the Commission, and only a single budget would be presented to the Legislature. System envisions "Budget execution" as part of the money management.

Bob Price

Congressman Bob Price of Pampa has called upon Congress to repeal the Gun Control Act of 1968.

In a strongly worded speech Price urged House liberals to face reality and, "consider the fundamental fact that guns and ammunition do not kill people—people kill people," and that, "as long as criminals think they can profit from crimes involving the use of guns, criminals will use guns to commit crimes."

The Texas lawmaker stated that those interested in controlling armed crime and violence would serve their purposes better by focusing attention on reforms of the criminal justice system. "What is needed is upgrading and better equipping state and local police forces, enacting tougher laws to deter potential criminals and to severely punish convicted felons, streamlining criminal court procedures, and reforming for penal system."

Price also introduced legislation removing Federal restrictions on the sale of .22 calibre rifle ammunition. The last Congress had passed Price's proposals to eliminate record keeping requirements for shotgun and rifle ammunition, but his specific proposal relating to .22 calibre rifle ammunition passed the House, then saw no final Senate action.

In support of his second proposal, Price cited Treasury and Justice Department reports that in the first two years since the passage of the Act, there was not one single instance where any of the recordkeeping requirements for sporting ammunition proved helpful in law enforcement or led to the successful investigation and prosecution of a crime.

Price declared, "Repealing the Gun Control Act of 1968 would rid the American people of the burdens of a law that never should have been passed in the first place."

"Repealing the remaining restrictions on the sale of .22 calibre rifle ammunition would remove perhaps what to thousands upon thousands of freedom-loving and law-abiding sportsmen and merchants is the most aggravating single feature of the Act itself, a feature that has been conclusively shown to have absolutely no bearing on crime prevention and crime control," he said.

VET TO STATE HEALTH BOARD LEGISLATION UP

The addition of a practicing veterinarian to the State Board of Health was cited by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA) as its prime legislative goal during the current session of the Texas Legislature.

Dr. Robert A. Emmett, president of the TVMA, and Dr. William L. Anderson, chairman of the TVMA Legislative Committee, jointly announced the organization would seek passage of a measure to increase the size of the State Board of Health from nine to 12 members, one of whom would be a veterinarian.

Under the bill, which is being sponsored in the Senate by Sen. Ralph Hall of Rockwall, the reorganized State Board of Health would be composed of seven practicing physicians, two dentists, one pharmacist, one graduate (sanitary) engineer and one veterinarian. The measure would add one physician, one dentist and the veterinarian to the makeup of the current board.

It's Much Easier Now To Buy Vehicle Tags

It doesn't take "Pull" to obtain 1971 license plates. In fact, if you pull apart the three-part motor vehicle registration form mailed to you early this year by the Texas Highway Department it will make the process slower and unnecessarily complicated.

Even though the handy three-part form carries the warning "Do Not Separate or Detach Any Parts of This Notice" in large letters on the reverse side, many motorists are doing just that.

Highway Department officials and county tax officers report that many motorists in applying for license plates by mail detached only one part of the form and sent it in.

Department officials stress that the entire form must be mailed in or brought to the county tax office or substation. A sticker strip showing the new license number will be attached to all sections of the form and the tax office will separate the form, returning the license receipt to the owner.

Motor vehicle owners still can obtain their 1971 license plates by mail if they send in the entire three-part form, their registration fee and \$1 for handling their county tax officer during February. That allows the month of March for the application to be processed and the license plates returned before the April 1 deadline for displaying the new plates.

During the month of March, it will be necessary for owners to apply in person at the county tax office or substation for 1971 license plates.

In either case, owners will save themselves time and trouble by using the new computerized application. You won't need your title certificate or last year's registration receipt.

But, remember, leave the three parts of the registration application intact.

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Spring Squalls Bring Danger

Winter and spring are seasons which bring a special brand of danger to the boater.

George Cook, director of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Water Safety Services, said the unpredictability of the weather during this time of the year makes boating more dangerous.

Don't venture out in a boat if rough weather has been forecast. But if you're caught in a storm, here are some things to remember:

Put life preservers on all passengers in the boat. Don't leave preservers lying around or in a locker.

Head into the waves at a slight angle.

Reduce speed.

Seat passengers in the bottom of the boat as close to the center as possible.

Head for the nearest shore.

If the wind and waves are too high, or if your motor fails, trail a sea anchor from the bow to maintain a heading into the waves. A bucket or weighted clothing will serve as a sea anchor in an emergency.

Stay calm. Panic can kill you.

VA Announces Interest Rates On Mobil Homes

The Veterans Administration announces that the rate of interest on GI loans to buy mobile homes has been set at 10.75 per cent.

Purchase of mobile homes under the GI loan program was authorized for the first time by the Veterans Housing Act of 1970, and Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson says that 20,000 veterans are expected to make purchase during the first year of the program.

Johnson said that two-thirds of the loans would be granted to Vietnam era veterans.

VA will guarantee up to 30 per cent of a loan for a mobile home, up to a maximum of \$10,000 for the loan. Once the loan is paid the veteran is again eligible for a guaranteed loan on a conventional house, a guarantee that may go as high as \$12,500.
