

In a photo-finish, the House Senate conferees turned out a record \$6.9 billion bienniai budget for near-deadline consideration.

Lawmakers earlier agreed on a \$617 million tax bill which will go into effect July 1, then followed up with \$35 million worth of mandate. new taxes on liquor-by-the-drink and by-the-gallon.

Texans will be paying four per cent sales (five, in most cities) and auto sales-rental tax, 18.5 cents a pack on cigarettes; \$4.50 per \$1,000 on corporation franchises; and \$5 per barrel on beer. 

Movement On Swine Extended In Texas

The Texas Animal Health Commission recently announced a quarantine order that reimposes restirctions on swine movements in Texas placed in effect March 29, to control hog cholera.

The new order became effective May 28, and it will remain in effect until further notice, according to Woodrow W. Bailey. Extension livestock and meats specialist.

All previous restrictions on swine movements contained in the previous order will remain one additional restriction.

ancial assets of \$267,721 and lia- require holding all purchased swine for 30 days at the premise vas a business association with ment will be allowed except for slaughter during the quarantine, Bailey says.

If swine are apparently healthy, this premise quarantine will automatically expire after the 30th day without any inspection, according to Bailey.

He added that it is strongly felt that extending the quarantine control will bring Texas closer to the complete eradication of the hog cholera virus by the December 1972 target date. Although 22 cases of hog cholera have been confirmed since Marcr 29, none of these cases have been connected with swine movements

after that date. Bailey reminds producers that all swine can be moved, provided that proper inspections and permits are acquired.

Swine moving to slaughter can be transacted to packing houses or public markets without inspection or written permits. Once at the market, they can't be legally sold as feeders, he said.

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
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



Funds are available to assist producers for emergency wind erosion control due to the drouth.

The final planting or replant date for cotton is June 10, and for grain sorghum it is July 1. In order to be eligible for price support payment and/or history credit, cotton and feed grain must be planted, cultivated, and maintained until maturity with the expectation of producing a crop for harvest. A good seedbed must be prepared, normal seeding rates seeded, and proper cul-

tivation must be done. If it remains so dry you can come up, you may file an application for acreage credit, and request credit for history and price

support payment. Compliance:

The final date to certify cotton, feed grain, and set-aside acres is August 15. However, to get an early payment, you must make an early certification. The first drafts should be issued in July.

When crops are all planted and you know you're in compliance, you should measure your crops and come on in and make your certification.

Briscoe, Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hall, Hemphill and Wheeler Counties are in the project area. "It is one of 59 applications on hand from local sponsors seeking RC&D Program assistance," Department official wrote

Price. "You can be assured that the North Rolling Plains application will receive careful consideration along with others on hand when new planning starts may be authorized," the officials add-

The Panhandle Congressman has been told unofficially that the project will be funded sometime during the 1972 fiscal year which begins this July 1.

The primary project objectives are: to develop a plan that will develop, conserve and properly use all of the resources of the area, to improve its overall economic condition, and to provide a safer, healthier place for its people to live, work and recreation. Primary project emphasis will

be on soil and water conservation, including construction of reservoirs. Job opportunities and training and expansion of water and sewer systems are also high on the list of project goals.

"This is the type of Federal project that gives a hand-up rather than a hand-out," Price said. 'For this reason, I will be making every effort to see that it is funded as soon as possible. My congratulations to President Harry Frye of Shamrock and to the other public-spirited citizens of the area who are spending so much time and effort to bring a better life to the people of the North Plains area.'

price government - owned grain must certify that he is unable to obtain sufficient feed for livestock from normal suppliers without imperiling continuance of his farming operations, defaulting on existing financial obligations, unsound borrowing, or excessive disposal of livestock, Price said.

"Any farmer or rancher who would have his operations sericusly damaged were he to purchase feed at the market price is eligible for assistance according to Mr. Palmby," Price said. The Congressman added that the Secretary of Agriculture will be sending clarifying instructions to the Texas ASCS State Office which will indicate that County ASCS committees should pay more attention to long range damage that may be done to a farmer or ranches operation if he is forced to spend all current assets on feed for livestock.

"A county committee may be inclined to refuse a man's application if he has a substantial net worth on paper. However, that net worth may be primarily in the form of property or other tangible goods which are not easy to convert into cash. In this case, the farmer or rancher would definitely be eligible for the reduced price grain," Price
