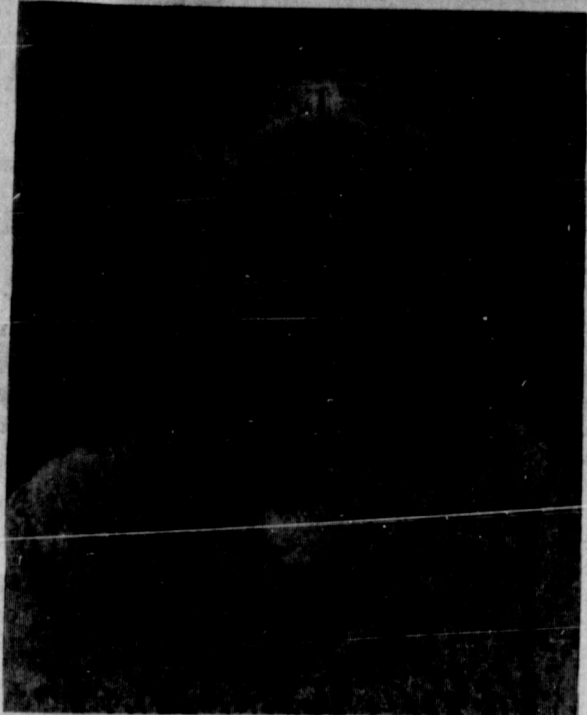

Donley County Hospital Board To Sell Adair Hospital and Equipment

The Board of Directors of Donley County Hospital District have been trying for some time to resolve the question of who actually owns the property known as the Adair Hospital and the equipment located therein. We have consulted with several law firms and the old Board of Directors of Adair Hospital, a non-profit corporation, in an effort to determine with certainty the real and true owners of the Adair Hospital and its facilities. The Donley County Hospital District has been made aware of the Constitution of the State of Texas which says in part as follows:

"The Legislature may by law provide . . . for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements, located wholly within the District which may be jointly or separately owned by and city, town, or county . . ."

also the Donley County Hospital District is well aware of the law passed by the 61st Legislature creating the Donley County Hospital District which provided in part as follows:

"Any land, buildings, or equipment which may be owned by Donley County or by any city or town in Donley County by which medical services or hospital care, including geriatric care, or furnished to needy persons of the county, shall become the property of the hospital district and title thereto shall vest in the hospital district . . ."

in addition the Donley County Hospital District has been made aware of a reverter in the deed from the Adair Hospital, a non profit organization, to the City of Clarendon and County of Donley wherein it is stated in part as follows:

"Whenever such property as herein conveyed shall cease to be used for a hospital as herein provided, then and there upon, this conveyance shall be null and void, and the said land and premises shall absolutely revert to the grantor herein, same being the

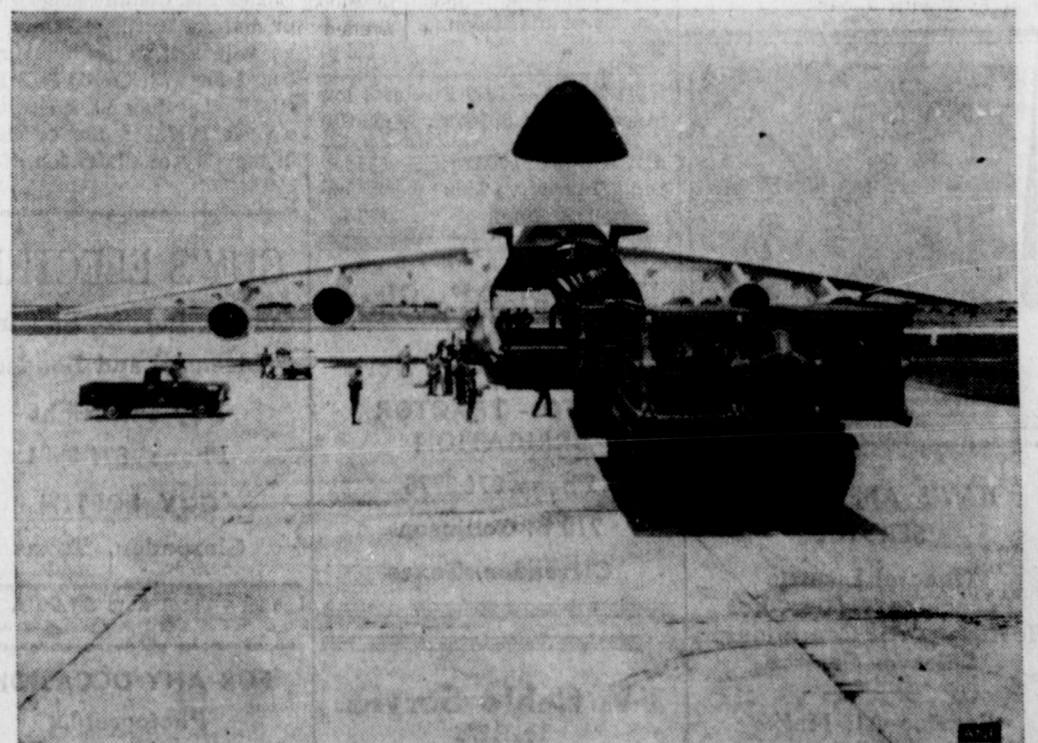

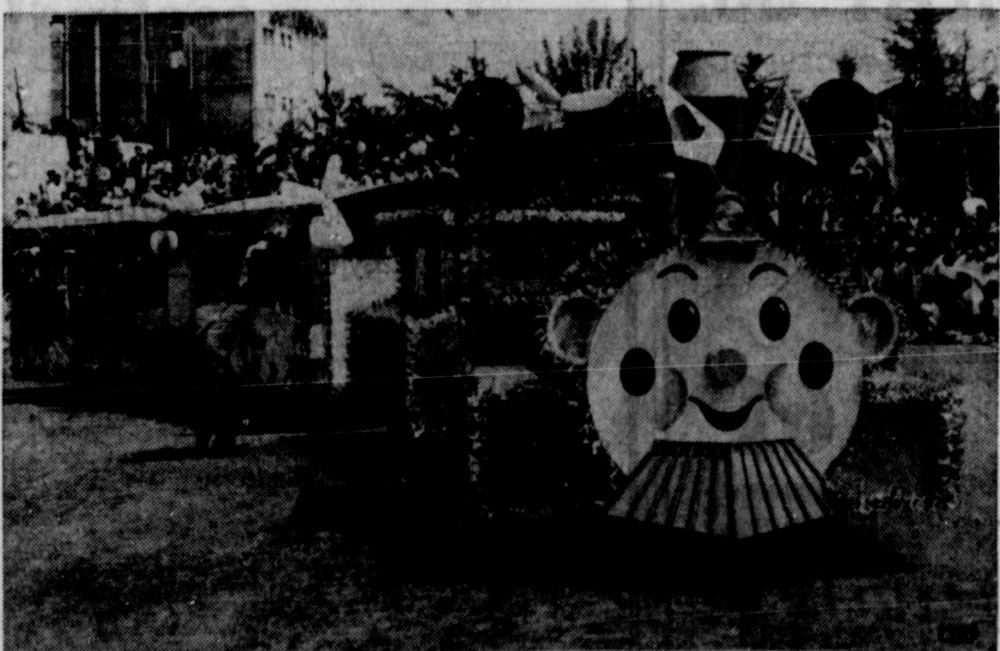

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol
By Vern Stanford

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas 1972 political campaigns jumped off to an early start last week amid earthquake - proportioned new rumblings in the long - running Securities and Exchange Commission stock manipulation case.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes announced he will run for governor, and called "loss of faith and confidence in state government" the No. 1 political issue.

Barnes termed the shadows cast by SEC's inquiry into stock trading of state officials one of the reasons for lost confidence by the public.

"I visualize the role of the governor as a much more aggressive role than it has been in the past," he said. Barnes, who is 33, added "a young governor with progressive ideas would be an asset" to Texas.

Barnes said he would aim to make the state Democratic party an "energetic force for sound government, not just a political tool to be used briefly every two years and then discarded. I want Texas to be strong in national affairs."

Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin, recovered from a March heart attack, announced he will file as a candidate for a fourth term.

"In the light of the scandals that have rocked our state government this spring — and the resulting investigation which my office has begun at the request of the Legislature — I feel it a question of duty to Texans to make the race," said Martin.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde reportedly retains interest in the governor's race.

Gov. Preston Smith still hints he may run again, brands federal handling of the stock case "political harassment."

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court upheld a Tyler court verdict awarding \$5,000 accidental death policy recovery to a widow whose husband was shot to death allegedly after committing adultery with the wife of another man.

High Court set July 14 arguments in a Dallas woman's damage suit claiming negligence by a private plane pilot in an accident which killed her husband four years ago.

Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the life sentence in a Beaumont rape case.

Austin Court of Civil Appeals reversed a Houston trial court and upheld State Board of Examiners of Psychologists' decision denying Houstonian Joseph D. Farrar a license to practice psychology because his master's degree was not primarily psychological but educational.

AG OPINIONS — Minors can be tried for liquor law violations without notification to parents if court is unable to locate parents or guardians, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has said.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that:

A trial judge has discretion to grant probation when satisfied

the best interests of the public and the defendant will be served, and the defendant is not under burden to show eligibility for probation, though the judge may require appropriate proof.

Board of Private Detectives, Private Investigators, Private Patrolmen, Private Guards and Managers has discretion to decide whether or not license of those within its jurisdiction will be denied because of a conviction for felony.

Whether Parks and Wildlife Department executive can retire as a "commissioned peace officer" is a fact question to be determined by PWD on the basis of whether he was engaged primarily in criminal law enforcement activities of the department during 10 years.

APPOINTMENTS — Raymond Vowell of Austin will succeed Burton G. Hackney of Texas Public Welfare Commissioner.

Governor Smith named W. A. Hughes of Decatur 25th district judge, Harry Hopkins of Weatherford 43rd district judge, and William B. Sullivant of Gainesville 25th district attorney.

Smith appointed Hugh O. Wolfe of Stephenville to North Texas State University Board of Regents.

CONVICTION "TAX" LEVIED — Cost of moving violations and other convictions will go up under a bill signed into law and designed to provide funds for projects to improve the criminal justice system.

In addition to other taxable court costs, \$2.50 will be charged in each misdemeanor conviction in justice of the peace or municipal court. County misdemeanor convictions will be charged an additional \$5 in court costs, and felony convictions, \$10.

Prevented Planted and Destroyed Cotton:
If, because of the weather, you did not get your cotton planted and want acreage credit for history and payment purposes, you must file an application for credit by no later than June 25th.

If you planted and lost your cotton, your application for acreage credit must be filed within 15 days from the time you abandon the crop.

You may plant grain sorghum on these acres without a reduction in the cotton payment.

1971 Loan Rates:
The 1971 basic county loan rate for wheat grading No. 1 is \$1.28 per bushel plus or minus applicable premiums or discounts. The loan rate for grain sorghum grading No. 2 or better is \$1.75 cwt.

Final Payments:
Data for farms which have already been certified has been submitted to the Data Processing Center for payment. We expect to issue the first checks July 1.

To get an early payment you must certify early.

Preliminary Wheat Payments:
The rate to be used in determining preliminary wheat payment is 75 percent of the estimated wheat certificate rate for 1971. This rate is \$1.60 per bushel. Therefore, the preliminary payment rate will be \$1.20.

Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price has joined with a group of Republican House members in introducing a substitute bill for the welfare reform plan recently approved by the House Ways and Means Committee.

The Ways and Means Committee proposal, which was authored by Committee Chairman Wilbur Mills (D-Ark.), expands the current system in numbers and in tax costs, institutes guaranteed annual income maintenance, and federalizes the welfare program.

Price and his colleagues are strongly opposed to the Mills bill and are working to prevent Mills from tying his welfare proposals to the social security amendments and forcing the House to vote for both issues at the same time.

The substitute bill introduced by Price, Barry Goldwater, Jr. (R-Calif.), Bill Scherle (R-Iowa), Philip Crane (R-Ill.), Texas Republicans Jim Collins and Bill Archer, among others, embodies the President's special revenue sharing concept and turns the welfare program over to the states.

In addition to instituting state welfare control, the Republican substitute provides strong work incentives rather than a guaranteed annual income, a feature of the Mills proposal which Price contends will "in many cases 'guarantee' idleness and shiftlessness." The bill also provides mechanisms for reducing welfare case loads and lowering welfare program costs to the taxpayer.

In commenting on the proposal Price stated, "This bill, which is also gathering momentum in the Senate side will allow states for the first time to totally operate their own welfare program without federal strings attached."

Price declared, "Welfare is not a right; it should be given only to the truly needy. A sound welfare system should be hard to get on, easy to get off, and should provide strict penalties for welfare cheaters. If a person were caught stealing from a store he would be tried as a common thief. Why should it be any different in the case of a person caught stealing tax dollars through welfare fraud?"

Price has also sponsored a work incentive bill entitled the Employment Opportunity Act of 1971, which would provide counseling, child care, training and job placement service needed to move employable persons off welfare rolls and on to payrolls.

Under this bill state and local governments would be reimbursed 40 percent of the costs of providing jobs in such vital areas as health, education, social service, beautification, pollution control, and urban and rural development. Private employers would be reimbursed 50 percent of an enrolled worker's pay while he undergoes on-the-job training; 25 percent during the following 2 years, and 10 percent for the final year.

Price said the Employment Opportunity Act of 1971 uses a mixture of public and private resources to make productive workers out of welfare recipients. "This is one approach that really has not been explored in depth yet; the surface attention given to it by current work incentive programs is clearly insufficient."

Irrigation Timings Critical For Narrow-Row Cotton

Research is underway at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Lubbock to determine the response of narrow-row cotton to various amounts and timings of irrigation applications.

"We have just begun a systematic study on narrow-row cotton irrigation," says Dr. Otto Wilke, agricultural engineer at the Center. "There are many things that we still don't know about irrigating narrow-row cotton."

In 1970 tests, higher yields were obtained when irrigations were initiated at the first bloom rather than at the early squaring stage, points out the engineer. However, these tests were conducted on an Amarillo loam soil with plants numbering less than 80,000 per acre. Higher plant populations normally used in narrow-row production may have depleted the soil moisture earlier and caused plant stress. Also, tight soils may have prevented the plant roots from penetrating deep into the soil for available moisture. In these cases, a positive response to earlier irrigation might have been obtained.

"As far as cotton micronaire and grade are concerned, these values decreased as the amount and frequency of irrigations were increased," reports Wilke. "However, heavier (three-to-four inches) and less frequent irrigations produced more pounds of lint per acre-inch of water than lighter, more frequent irrigations supplying the same amount of total water."

Maximum lint yields were obtained with eight-to-ten inches of total irrigation water applied in three irrigations between the first bloom and the August 15 cutoff date. However, according to Wilke, the lint yield per acre-inch of water increased as the total number of inches of irrigation water applied decreased. "Producers with large cotton acreages and limited water might consider staggering planting dates to permit the application of

a single irrigation at peak bloom," adds Wilke.

Livestock Marketing Terms Explained

Everybody in the livestock and meat industry is interested in market news reports, but how many people really have a good understanding of the trade terms used in these reports?

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has some fairly definite meanings for each of the terms they use, says Dr. Ed Uvacek, Extension livestock marketing specialist.

Supply, demand, trading activity, clearance, and price trends are some of the major terms frequently used in the Texas Livestock Market News Report.

"Supply" is the quantity available for the current day's market and it includes the day's receipts plus any carry over from the previous day. "Demand" is the desire to possess a commodity, coupled with the willingness and the ability to buy. When buyers seek commodities more urgently than normal, demand is termed as "good." When the opposite situation exists, demand is referred to as "poor."

The terms "trading active," "trading moderately active," or "trading slow" are used to indicate the relative pace at which sales are made. When sales are moving more rapidly than normal, market reports say "trading active."

If sales are moving at a normal, market rate, the report will quote "trading moderately active" while "trading slow" reports sales are being made at a slower than normal pace.

Dr. Uvacek points out that clearance is a term used to show how well commodities are being taken from the market. "Complete" clearance means that all offerings have been sold. "Incomplete" clearance is measured numerically in head or by the supply unsold at the closing of trading.

An important part of any market report is the "price trend"—the direction prices are moving in relation to prices paid in the previous trading session. Trend will be described as "higher" when prices are measurably greater than in the previous reporting period. "Strong" indicates a definite, but not measurable, leaning toward a proposed price change.

Prices are reported as steady when they haven't changed from the previous period. A definite, but not measurable leaning toward lower price levels is termed "weak." Market reports quote price trends as "lower" when sales prices are measurably lower than in the previous trading period.

Make Sure Your Boat Lights Work

By checking boat lights before the long haul to the lake, many boat owners can save themselves a spoiled trip, according to George Cook, director of Water Safety Services for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Most motorboats in Texas fit into the less than 16-foot long or the 16-foot long to less than 26-foot long categories, said Cook. These boats are required to have, first, a bright white light aft

which can be seen in a 360-degree radius.

In addition, these boats must have a combined lantern in the fore part of the vessel and lower than the white light which shows red 112.5 degrees to port and green 112.5 degrees to starboard.

Any motorboat may carry and exhibit lights required for larger vessels including a separate red light to port and a separate green light to starboard. They may also exhibit a white light fore.
